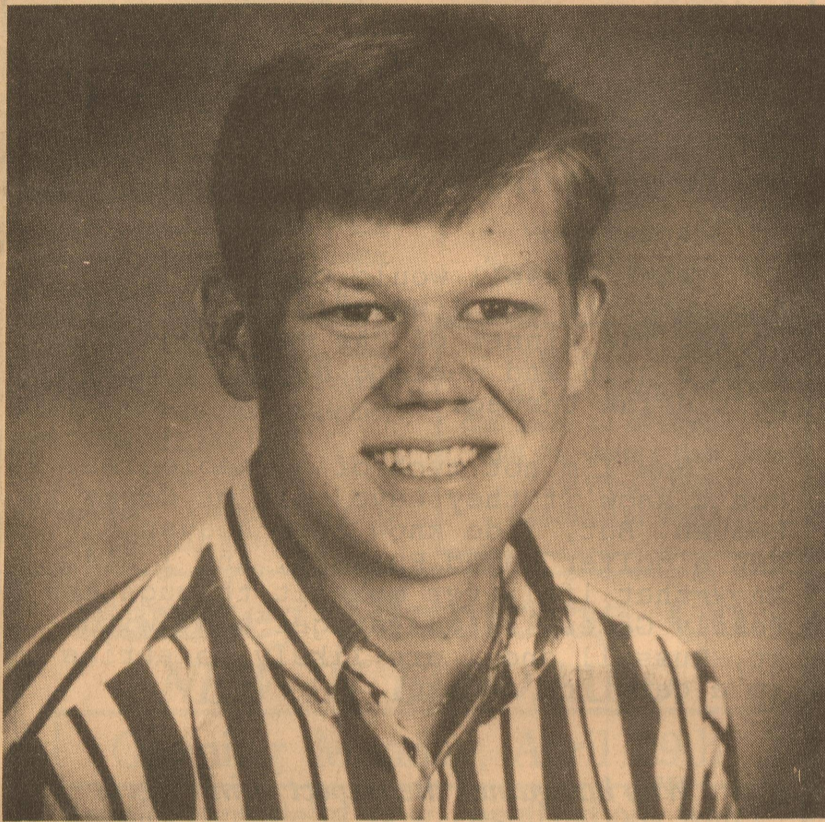

## Martin Receives DEKALB Award

Pat Martin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Martin of Eldorado, was recently named winner of the 1991 DEKALB Agricultural Accomplishment Award. The award, sponsored nationwide by DEKALB Plant Genetics, is presented to the outstanding senior agriculture student demonstrating superior scholarship, leadership and supervised agricultural program. Pat attends Eldorado High School where he has been President of FFA Chapter, District FFA Secretary, and Class Secretary. His agricultural program consists of breeding sheep. Following graduation, Pat plans to attend ASU in the fall.

As this year's winner, Pat receives a pin and certificate,

and his name will be inscribed on a special plaque displayed in the Ag department at E.H.S. The DEKALB Award, often considered the highest honor a vo-ag student can receive on the local level, is presented at nearly 3,000 schools annually.

A long time supporter of youth activities, DEKALB has presented Ag Accomplishment awards since 1947. 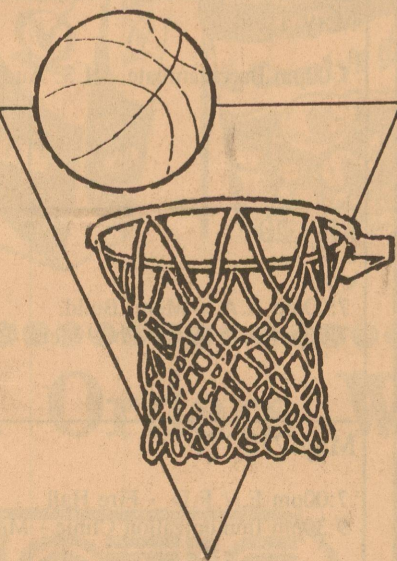
Many High School Students will be recognized and awarded for the many achievements that have been accomplished during this 1990-91 school year.

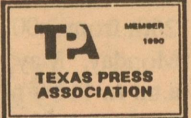

Mrs. Harber taught in the Eldorado School System from 1962 until 1980 when she decided to retire and begin working full time in her ranching interests. The Area Agency on Aging

The Concho Valley Area Agency on Aging (AAA) is located at 4860 Knickerbocker Road, in San Angelo, and serves a thirteen-county area. The AAA provides services to senior citizens to ensure they are able to remain independent and age with dignity.

Each city, county, and non-profit agency is unique in the services it provides in its community through funds provided by the AAA. Some of these services are: Congregate or group meals, home-delivered meals, Senior Center Operations, Homemaker I and II, transportation, legal services and will clinics, case management, emergency response, residential repair, visitation, and respite care.

The AAA also offers a Nursing Home Ombudsman Program. The Nursing Home Ombudsman receives and investigates complaints by residents of nursing facilities. Ombudsmen are volunteers trained to serve as mediators among residents, their families, and facility administration to help resolve problems concerning the residents' quality of life. Serious complaints are referred directly to the AAA Staff

Ombudsman and then to the Texas Department of Health. The Ombudsman volunteer provides a valuable service to nursing home residents and their families and new volunteers are welcome.

Senior Centers have been designated as the focal points for the elderly to obtain some or all of the above-mentioned services. The Senior Center in your area may provide supportive services, such as: Advocacy, information and referral, letter reading/writing, telephone reassurance, outreach, discount programs, material aid/income support, health promotion, health screenings, and services in care facilities. Because every Senior Center is different, contact the Senior Center in your county to find out which services are available to you and your family.

To participate in any of these programs, a person must be 60 Years of age or older- There is no income criterion. Voluntary contributions are encouraged and any money collected is put back into the program to help maintain and expand services. However, no senior citizen is denied any services because they cannot contribute.

The Texas Veterinary Medical Center at Texas A&M University is offering a special three-day summer program for high school students interested in careers in veterinary medicine.

Students interested in science, mathematics or veterinary medicine will get the opportunity to attend special classes, observe clinical diagnoses and treatment of animals.

"It's a high level of show and tell," says Kurtz. "The students get to do microbiology cultures, look at embryos, attend lectures and tour the College of Medicine."

Kurtz says students get a good feel for Texas A&M and find out what is involved in a veterinary medicine career.

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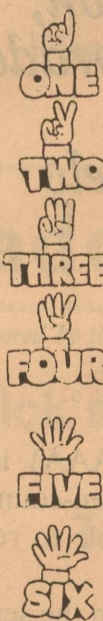

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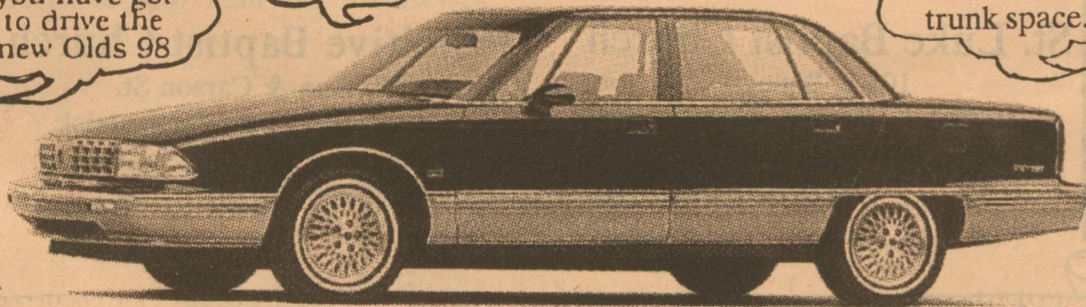
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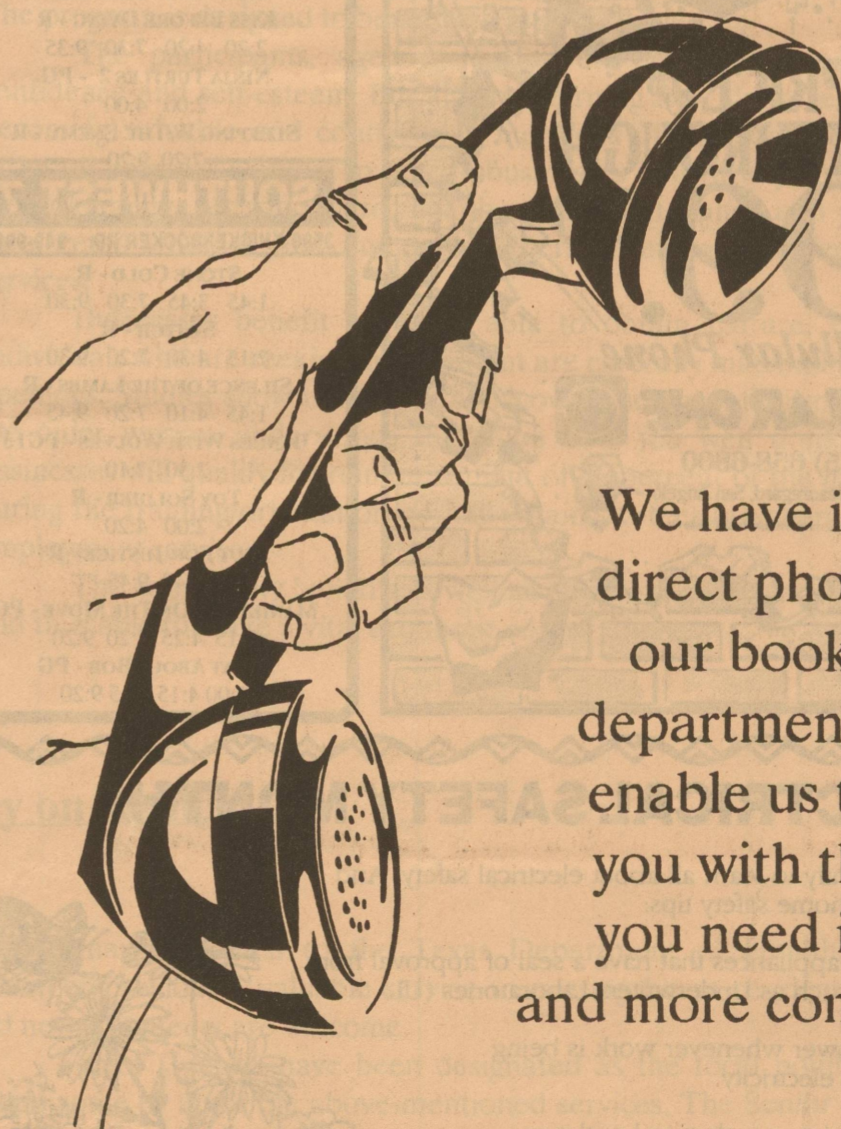

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# Unofficial City Council Minutes

A Regular Meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held Tuesday, May 7, 1991, at the City Hall with all Councilmembers in attendance. Also in attendance was Randy Mankin, Councilmember-Elect. No other citizens were present.

## HEARING - AMENDMENT #3 TO UTILITY ORDINANCE #101-89:

A Public Hearing for Amendment #3 regarding Landfill Operations to Utility Ordinance #101-89 was opened, with no citizens present. Hearing was closed, and motion was made by Barbara Jackson and seconded by Debbie Ballew that Amendment #3 be approved as proposed. Motion carried.

## JERRY JONES (VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPT.):

Jerry Jones met with the Council to request the purchase of two air packs and bunker pants out of Fire Department budgeted funds. The balance of funds was discussed, and motion was made by John Callison and seconded by John Nikolauk that permission be granted with the purchases not to exceed budgeted funds for Equipment/Pagers. Motion carried.

Mr. Jones also reported that several of the firemen wished to attend the 1991 A & M Fire School and that tuition be paid by the City, as budgeted. It was agreed that firemen requesting funds submit their pre-registration so a City check could be issued up to the budgeted funds. Balance was noted at \$800.00 due to Roger Powell already having pre-registered.

Mr. Jones further reported approximately 300 people in attendance at the Firemen's Convention in April and thanked the Council for the City's assistance with preparations.

A Mutual Aid Agreement with Menard was reviewed, and after unanimous approval by the Council, Mayor Preston executed his portion so that the Agreement could be forwarded to Judge Griffin for further approval.

## RAY LEWIS BALLEW (SCAD):

Ray Lewis Ballew met with the Council to update them on properties sold at the Tax Sale and to advise them of procedures to expedite sale of other properties. He presented a Quit Claim Deed for Lots 8-10, Block 4M, Christian Addition which was sold to Jose Espinosa. Mayor Preston executed the Deed which was to be forwarded to the School and County for execution. Other properties will be disposed of shortly and returned to the tax rolls as new owners take possession.

Several questions were asked regarding the new County Education District and its effect on taxation.

## APRIL MINUTES, TAX REPORT, FINANCIAL REPORTS & BILLINGS:

Minutes of the May 9 meeting were reviewed and motion was made by Debbie Ballew and seconded by John Nikolauk that they be approved. Motion carried.

The April Tax Report was circulated for initialling. The April Financial Reports were distributed and discussion was held concerning need to amend the Budget in various areas. After discussion, motion was made by John Nikolauk and seconded by Barbara Jackson that Amendment #2 be approved, summarized as follows: \$500.00 to Utility Employee Training/Certification from

Unemployment Expense, \$1000.00 from Sanitation Truck Maintenance to Utility Equipment Maintenance, \$962.26 from Landfill Maintenance to Miscellaneous Utility Supplies, and \$300.00 from Office Equipment Purchases, \$800.00 from Unemployment Expense, and \$400.00 from Building Maintenance to Animal Control Expense (total \$1500.00). Motion carried.

Current bills were reviewed, and motion was made by Barbara Jackson and seconded by John Callison that they be approved for payment. Motion carried.

## TRUCK BYPASS:

Due to failure to receive any response to the City's letter to Tony Cain of City Concrete, further pursuit of the property for the bypass was tabled.

## PERSONNEL POLICY UPDATE:

The Secretary distributed a draft of the proposed Personnel Policy with changes incorporated and marked. Each Councilmember was asked to review the material and be prepared to discuss it prior to action at the next meeting.

## AMENDMENT #4, UTILITY ORDINANCE #101-89:

Proposed Amendment #4 to the Utility Ordinance was reviewed. The Amendment proposes to raise water tapping fees in order to recover costs involved in making water taps 1" and larger. After review, motion was made by Debbie Ballew and seconded by Barbara Jackson that a hearing be called for the next meeting of the Council. Motion carried. Hearing will be called and published in the local newspaper.

## DRUG TESTING/DRUG ABUSE POLICY:

The Secretary reported that she had received the TWCC Drug Abuse information but had not received information checklist from the RRC. Supt. Dean stated that he had requested an extension for another 90 days (July 15) for adoption of the policy. Other items from the Safety Evaluation are due May 20. As the appropriate information is available, the policies/procedures will be revised for Council consideration.

## MUNICIPAL COURT UPDATE:

The Secretary reported that the Municipal Court had processed two complaints filed for dumping within the City Limits. It was reported that individuals had filed the complaints and that the fines had been set between \$100 and \$500, with both complaints processed and fines and court costs collected.

## PETITION/RESOLUTION - TCDP/TDOC:

A copy of a petition drafted by Gary R. Traylor & Associates in opposition to HB 1700 and HB 2842 was distributed to the Councilmembers. John Nikolauk updated the Council on his understanding of the impact of the legislation and his subsequent action in calling and writing Hildebran, Sims and Governor Richards. No further action was taken by the Council as a unit.

Concerning the TCDP grant project for 1989 (Water Tower), the Secretary pointed out that another person would need to be appointed to the signature card. Motion was made by Barbara Jackson and seconded by Dora Bosmans that Debbie Ballew replace Barbara Jackson in the Resolution. Motion carried.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:

Jack Dean reported continuing problems with compliance of the Wastewater Plant. He stated that the new wastewater plant operator (Steve Hill) was performing well, and he had verbal confirmation that he had passed his "D" certification, although the paperwork from Austin had not been received. He recommended that Mr. Hill receive a merit increase in salary. After discussion, the Council recommended that the matter be placed on the agenda for the next meeting, at which time Mr. Hill will have completed his 90-day probation period.

Jack Dean and John Nikolauk reported on their recent attendance at a 2-day seminar in Austin on Recycling. They gave highlights of the meeting. It was reported that the Extension Service had held a meeting on May 1 to review options for Schleicher County.

Mr. Dean requested the Council's input regarding need for loader for streetwork. He stated that he had one located one in San Angelo but had not had an opportunity to check out its condition, etc. Funds for purchase of equipment was briefly discussed.

Councilmember John Callison asked for clarification of problem encountered, with odorization of the gas. His request was in response to complaints he had received about the apparent over-odorization causing reported illnesses.

Mr. Dean responded that there had been an apparent malfunction of the odorization equipment. The need to publish a notice to customers was discussed, with the Secretary to prepare a statement for the newspaper.

## TEXAS HOSPITAL WEEK:

Mayor Preston proclaimed the week of May 12-18 as Texas Hospital Week, and executed a Proclamation stating so for publication.

## MAY 4 ELECTION:

Election documents were reviewed by the Councilmembers and after review, motion was made by John Callison and seconded by Barbara Jackson that the Order Declaring the Official Returns be executed. Motion carried. Official results were Barbara Jackson 73 votes and John Nikolauk 94 votes for Mayor. For Council (2 places), Edwin M. (Rooster) Jackson, Jr. 73 votes, Randy Mankin 115 votes, and Jeraldine (Jeri) Whitten 118 votes. Total voters: 207.

Pre-Oath Statement was executed by Mayor-Elect John Nikolauk. Statements had been previously executed by Councilmembers-Elect Mankin and Whitten. When receipt has been returned by the Secretary of State's Office, Oaths of Office will be administered.

With no further business, meeting adjourned at 10:35 P.M.

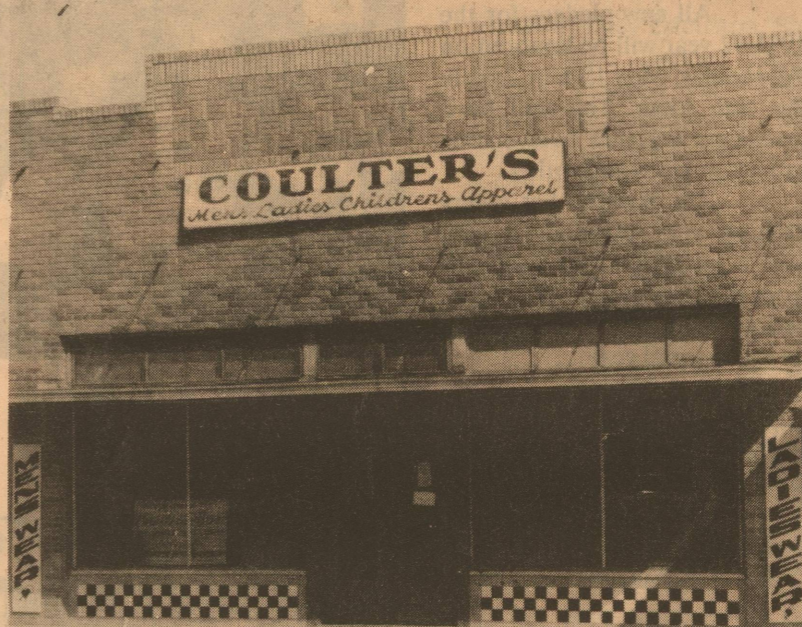

# A Touch Of History



Coulter's Clothing Store

In the years 1928-29 Eldorado progressed in economical development more than the preceding twenty years. The town was incorporated in 1929, and the first city officers were elected. They were: Fred Green, Mayor; Grady Parker, F.M. Bradley, Sr., Joe Williams, J.N. Davis, and H.W. Wiedenmann, Aldermen. West Texas Utilities constructed a high voltage line into town supplying an abundance of electrical power. Street lights were installed and the water works were extended. Many new brick and rock business and modern homes were built.

One reason for this economical "boom" was the first showing of gas and oil in the county. Investors could see a rich little city in the making and took advantage of the time. Lark McClary was the contractor for several of the brick buildings that are still in use on Main Street today. One

of these buildings is the Eldorado Success office. The first business in this structure was Duncan Bros. Cafe, Bob, Bruce and Lee. In the early thirties, Lark and Maxine McClary ran the cafe.

The next business housed in this structure was Coulter's Clothing Store, furnishing children, ladies, and men's wear.

In the sixties, Fred Gunstead moved his newspaper business into the building, and after his retirement in 1977, Ed Meador bought the business,

with Jim McWilliams as the editor.

In 1978, Terry Neill, president of Permian Basin Publishing Co. bought the business, but later that year, Robert J. Awrey took over the newspaper. He renamed it "Schleicher County Leader," Nell Edmiston was the Editor.

In 1982, Finnis Bracher took over the paper and ran it until his accidental death on May 9, 1986.

In 1986, Terry Neill bought the business for the second time. He changed the name of it back to "The Eldorado Success."

Gary Smith bought the newspaper in 1989, moving to a new location. In 1991, Gary and Cathy Smith moved the business back into the same building that housed it so many years.
