To the strains of the traditional "Pomp and Circumstance" march, the seventy-ninth graduating class will begin its last activity as high school students.

May 24 forty-one seniors will receive a symbol for which they have worked thirteen years - their high school diploma. This is the reward seniors receive for going the distance with nothing given to them free.

Until this year, the class of 1980 held the record for the most senior year honor graduates with twelve and the most four year honor graduates with nine.

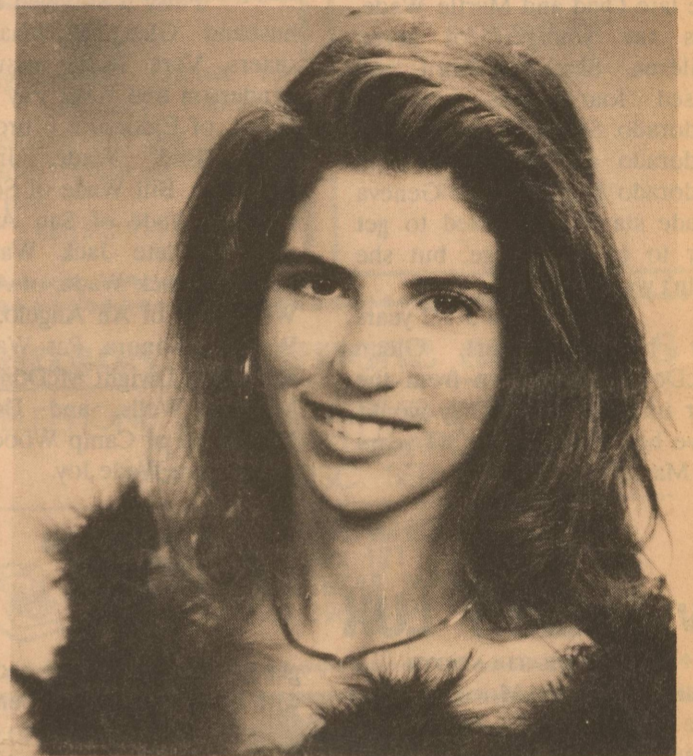
But this year's class will graduate with a tying number of nine four year honor graduates.

Pecan Nut Casebearer Spray Dates Predicted

The 1991 predicted spray dates for the pecan nut casebearer for Schleicher County are May 20-May 30.

Spray materials to use to control the pecan nut casebearer are: Dipel - two talbespoons; Malathion 50% EC - two and one-half teaspoons per one gallon of water; Guthron 12% EC

-one and one-third talbespoon per one gallon of water; Sevin 50% WP - two talbespoons per one gallon of water per one gallon of water; Diazinon 25% EC - two teaspoons per one gallon of water.

A media crew composed of television and newspaper reporters, in Alabama was summoned by a despondent, drunken, unemployed man who indicated that he was going to set himself ablaze.

A photographer and sound technician responded to the call, and had to select between two roles once the fire began. They could fulfill a media role by recording the incident as impassive observers, or they could fulfill a humanitarian role by smothering the flames. For some thirty-seven seconds the team chose the former.

They taped this man burning for the six o'clock news and did nothing to save him. By the time one of the individuals changed his role and began battling at the flames it was nearly too late. Fortunately, a volunteer fireman was able to extinguish the flames and save the man.

I thought about this incident this week while I was trying to decide whether or not I should write anything about Friday night's "LOCK-IN."

I could easily remain silent--and safe. I wanted to, and almost did. This newspaper has nothing to gain by taking a stand that will be controversial to some people. We do, however have a responsibility to be true to ourselves, true to our community and true to our children.

This week-end some of our children will have some very difficult decisions to make. Not only will they have difficult decisions this week-end, they will have difficult decisions for the rest of their lives.

Friday night, a Drug-Free/Alcohol-Free party is being held for High School Students. The students will have to choose whether they will attend this event or celebrate someplace else. It makes no difference where these young people celebrate. The difficult decision is not WHERE they will celebrate, but HOW. We can celebrate in a variety of ways. HOW to celebrate will be a difficult choice for some of these students.

The media has taught our children that they need to drink to have more fun.. They have been taught that celebration involves drinking. Fun time = Miller time.

Never mind that it's illegal for minors to drink. Never mind that it's against the law for adults to serve or provide alcoholic beverages to minors. Forget that alcohol is the drug that destroys more of our young people than any other drug. To celebrate is to drink.

I am very proud of those young people who have decided that they can have a good time without drugs. I am proud of those who can celebrate sober.

Silent, safe reporting of the news is easy. But, if there is even one young person who is strong enough to stand up for her beliefs... if there is one young person who can bear being laughed at and called names and still keep standing, then by all I know, I won't let him stand alone.

Each year she would start making candy and decorations for Christmas the day after Thanksgiving. Her six nephews and niece thought no one could cook like Aunt Patsy. Glenn always washed the dishes - no one could please him. He would stay up late washing pots and pans after Patsy cooked candy and cookies.

County Agent's Report

by Jerry Swift County Extension Agent - Schleicher County

The fertility and efficient utilization of fertilizer physical condition of soils can be greatly improved by the incorporation of organic matter. Spring is an excellent time to collect unused organic materials from the garden and kitchen and return them to the soil. These include lawn clippings, leaf rakings, kitchen wastes and other plant matter that is free of disease and nematodes as it will all aid in building up the organic content of the soil.
 Plant nutrients and other minerals, required for plant growth, are contained in the blackened plant remains and other organic wastes. To obtain complete decomposition, add about 2 pounds of a complete fertilizer per 100 square feet of bed area as the bacteria and other organisms must have nitrogen to do a good job of decomposing the organic matter. These elements, vital for healthy plant life, are released to the new plants once the organic matter is decomposed and are thus released and recycled.
 A compost pile is a good way to utilize organic wastes. The partially digested compost, or homemade humus, is high in organic matter. Use this when transplanting trees and shrubs, or as a top dressing in preparing garden beds.
 Organic matter improves the physical properties of the soil by increasing pore volume, improving moisture retention and allowing more

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SCISD Board Of Trustees Meet

MAY 19, 1991

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County Independent School District was held on May 19, 1991, at 1:00 p.m. in the Administration Building.

The following officers were elected to serve for the next year: Phil McCormick, President; Terry Green, Vice-president; Judy Blair was approved as secretary.

Suzanne Johnson spoke on behalf of the Band-Aide members and officers. She gave Board members copies of comment sheets from judges at the band contest. She wanted to share the judges' very positive comments with the board.

Due to increased enrollment, there has been some discussion concerning making facilities improvements. Board members were asked to make a decision concerning the direction they wished to take concerning this problem. Larry Blair, Lynn Williams, and Chris McCravy were appointed as a committee to do a feasibility study and to make recommendations so that if funds become available, action may be taken.

Board members approved for another year SCISD's emphasis and focus on preparation for the TAAS test, and approved an Open Forum Policy and adopted TASB Localized Policy Update 39.

The 1991-92 school calendar was adopted as presented, and the financial report for the month of April was approved, with Scott McGregor being appointed to review the financial reports during the 1991-92 school year.

Board members also approved a revised proposal for the Compensatory Education/Chapter 1 program for 1991-92 as presented.

Resignations from Robin Konop, Stan Anderson, and Debbie P. Griffin were accepted with Debbie Griffin

being granted a leave of absence. GERALYN BEACH was employed as an elementary teacher and JIMMY HEATH as a secondary math teacher.

Middle School Principal Scott Barton reported that those students with perfect attendance and no tardies for the 5th six weeks were treated to hot dogs in the park. UIL participants also had a party in the park. The annual Spring Fling was held for students who had stayed out of trouble for the year, and the 8th graders had a picnic at Clear Creek.

Mr. Barton reported that the middle school teachers have been involved in remediating students who failed one or more sections of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test given last fall. Barton indicated and prioritized as follows the need for vocational courses in 7th and 8th grade and for a computer lab to aid with regular classroom instruction. He also informed the Board that because of increased numbers, a special education aide may be needed. Barton further reported that eighth graders will no longer be in the high school band and fifth graders will have music theory until around Christmas when they will begin actual band. Art and theater arts classes will be added to the middle school curriculum, and plans are being made for summer school for middle school students. Some students have already begun to sign up for those classes.

Board members were provided with a "Summary of Finances" from the State. According to this report the district will receive a \$162,089 increase in revenue for the 1990-91 school year due to an increase in the district's average daily attendance.

In preparation for the budgeting process, board members agreed to have a salaries/budget workshop on Monday, May 27, at 7:00

P.M.

Board members were informed that the Second Annual School Decision-Makers Seminar will be held in San Angelo in June. They were asked to express their intentions concerning attendance of that seminar.

Terry Green was approved as Delegate and Tip Finley as Alternate to the Texas Association of School Boards' Delegate Assembly for the 1991-92 school year.

Board members voted to relinquish the school's rights to Lot 9, Block 105 of the original town site so that the city may have that property, designated Phil McCormick as the signee for the sale of property that has been foreclosed on and then sold for the taxes against the property.

A bid of \$100 from Hal Whitten was accepted for the purchase and removal of the storage building next to the tennis courts.

Members approved the application as presented for participation in the regional education service center program for media commitment (films, videos, etc.) during the 1991-92 school year, and Larry Blair was approved as the Regional Advisory Committee Member to the Education Service Center from Schleicher County ISD.

The Board received a thank you note from the Blair family for the memorial contribution sent in memory of Sybil Blair. They also received a thank you note from Bill Helwig for supporting him in his candidacy for the Education Service Center's board of trustees.

The Board received a letter from the Chamber of Commerce informing them that the Chamber has applied for a liquor license to sell liquor at the concession stand of the rodeo grounds. Action will be taken at the May 27th meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:12 P.M.
