Still The Hero - A Tribute To Dad

I could not sleep that night. The thought of tomorrow's events would not allow my mind to enter that quiet, peaceful state of dreams. Instead my mind was an endless whirlwind of things to come with tomorrow's sunrise. It was the excitement of youth, those feelings we have in the early stages of our life that rarely, if ever, are recaptured. Perhaps it is a road never before traveled that generates such keen anticipation. In time the roads all seem too familiar to provide the thrill of a first youthful experience. So it was for me, a young boy going fishing for the first time with my dad. I had often watched as he rowed the boat out onto the lake in search of the elusive large mouth bass. Now it was my turn to be initiated into the great brotherhood of fishermen and I could not bear the wait. As I think back now, of that time long ago, I realize it was not the

beauty of the lake, or the fish, or even the initiation that excited me so greatly. More than anything else it was the chance to be with my dad.

I suppose there are many young boys who looked upon their fathers as I did in my youth. To me he was, quite simply, the smartest, bravest, wisest man who ever lived. If, by some chance, there was something he did not know then I knew it was not worth knowing. My father never gave me occasion to be anything but proud of him. In an era when right and wrong became difficult to define for some my father saw things very simply. There were things which were right and there were things which were wrong. Right and wrong were as simple to define in his world as black and white, without the odd shade of gray that seemed so prevalent in the world around me. I remember quite clearly on one occasion when my father was offered a raise and a

promotion with the stipulation that he abandon a few of his principles. Though the financial opportunity was attractive my father did not waiver. The odd shade of gray the world had adopted was still not acceptable to a man of conviction. Time passed and the young boy who saw his father as hero and protector became a young man.

As with all young men I came to the inevitable realization that I suddenly knew everything about life there was to know. It was amazing how quickly the scales had dropped from my eyes and all of life's revelations had become so apparent. While everyone around me groped in darkness, I alone possessed the light that uncovered all of life's mysteries. Of course in time it dawned upon me that this was a common malady among teens, but for that brief period of my life I truly felt as if I had become some omniscient being. Without a doubt I still loved my father

and in a condescending way still respected his beliefs, but I now realized his principles were a thing of the past. I felt that, like so many other things, my father's convictions were simply a part of his generation. Time would pass, history would change, and my father's ideas would be molded to fit into a society whose one constant was an ever changing system of values and attitudes. Time did pass, but unlike most of the world my father's sense of morality did not shift with the sands of time. The convictions remained firm, a belief in God, the golden rule, and the Ten Commandments were not subject to a new social consciousness or whatever new belief was in vogue. Time had passed for me also, and with it came the realization of how little I knew or understood about the world around me.

Drugs, war, poverty and hate made no sense and yet they were an every day fact of life. The once all-knowing teenager had become a disillusioned young man looking for answers in a world that seemed condemned to a constant state of confusion. I knew the answers many sought only brought a new set of problems and a greater state of confusion, yet I wondered if these apparent invitations to disaster were indeed the only options available. Then, like a ship sailing through a mist of confusion, came the memory of my father's life. It was not so much a particular saying or some all encompassing revelation but rather his life itself that provided my answer.

My father's dignity in himself and the people around him had never changed. It was a dignity founded on a Godly caring for others and a conviction that a respect for others was an inevitable consequence of a respect for self. The old ship had been assailed many times yet it remained strong and unchanging as it moved to complete its journey. I found myself adopting my father's principles, not because they were his, but because time and life itself had proven them worthy. It seemed as if my life had come full circle. The young boy waiting to go fishing with his dad had become a man and discovered in the end, that his father was indeed, still the hero.

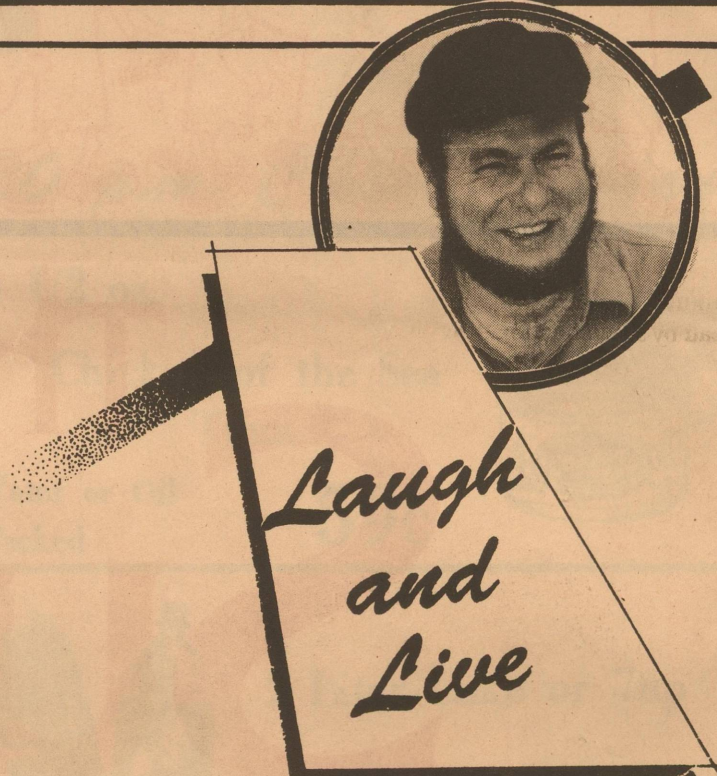
Courtney is the daughter of Hyman and Gina Sauer. She will be in the 1st grade. Courtney has one brother, Andrew.

Recycle Eldorado

The Recycling committee of Eldorado met with the City Council on June 11th, 1991, to present ideas on recycling and waste management for Schleicher County. Upon suggestion of the committee, the City Council is looking into buying a chipper/shredder to reduce the brush load at the local landfill.

Also, the council was very receptive to the committee's idea of setting up recycling barrels at different locations in town. Materials to be collected for recycling are: aluminum cans, metal ("tin")

cans, and glass. A separate paper recycling site will also be established (see article elsewhere in this paper). The committee is trying to keep the local landfill (and the county) from drowning in its own trash and greatly appreciates the City Council's wholehearted support.

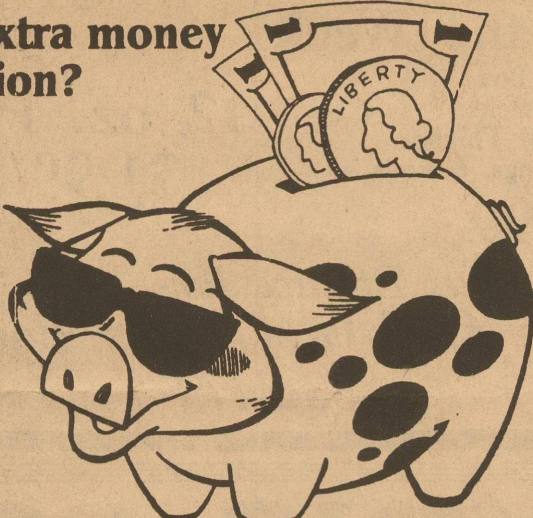

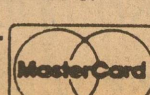

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION
AUGUST 10, 1991

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."


