Robles Graduates With Honors

It happened back in March.

All that day Henry Robles had the feeling that he would receive some big news. He didn't know if it would be good or bad -- just that it would be news. Maybe in the mail.

But when he got home there was no letter waiting for him. No postcard. And there were no messages on the answering machine.

Later that night he tried calling his parents twice but no one was home, so he called his sister. After the usual exchange of "how-are-yous," his sister gave him the news he was waiting for.

"A package arrived for you today," she said. "From Harvard."

"Oh?"

"You've been accepted to Harvard Law School," she said.

It was the third time within a month that Henry, a 1987 EHS graduate and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Enrique P. Robles, had a reason to celebrate.

"In January I got a call at work telling me I was accepted to UT Law School," Henry said. "Then about two weeks later I got a letter from Stanford Law School. They had accepted me, too. Getting into Harvard was dessert."

Henry was graduated magna cum laude from the University of Texas at Austin May 18 with a bachelor of arts degree. He was enrolled in the Plan II Honors Program, a rigorous, humanities-centered course of study recognized in academic circles nationwide for its Ivy League-inspired curriculum.

As if making it through Plan II with honors were not impressive enough, Henry was also elected to Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's oldest and most prestigious honor society, and was chosen by the dean of the College of Liberal Arts as a Dean's Distinguished Graduate, one of only 12 students so recognized from the more than 1,200 graduates at spring commencement exercises.

"I was floored when I received the letter telling me I was a Dean's Distinguished Graduate," Henry said. "I didn't know anything about it, and if I had known, I wouldn't have expected to be chosen."

So what's a distinguished honors graduate to do with his oh-so-bright future?

"I've decided to go to Stanford," Henry said. "But not

right away. They've granted me a deferral so I can enroll next year instead of this year. In the meantime, I plan to participate in a special program called Teach For America.

"The way this program works is that college graduates from around the country apply to be a part of a corps of teachers-- comparable to a domestic Peace Corps. During the summer after their graduation from college, the corps members undergo six weeks of training at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles.

"Then in the fall they are placed as teachers in areas which suffer from perennial teacher shortages, mostly inner-city areas like New York or Miami and rural areas such as rural Georgia or rural Arkansas, for example."

Henry has been placed as an elementary school teacher in Los Angeles, Calif. He will be working primarily with bilingual children and children whose first or only language is Spanish.

Those with a taste for the romantic might say that he's going back to his roots. Henry grew up speaking only Spanish and knew very little English when he entered school. His parents speak only Spanish.

But he does not romanticize about teaching disadvantaged children.

"I'm not going into [teaching] thinking I'm gonna be

like Jaime Escalante in the movie *Stand And Deliver*," he said. "But I do have faith in my abilities as a leader and a communicator, and it would be a shame for me not to use those talents to do at least a little public good. I think everybody has a responsibility to those who are less fortunate."

Henry attended UT on a prestigious scholarship funded by the Ex-Student's Association at the University. The scholarship - a Texas Excellence Award for Scholarship and Leadership - is awarded to eight students chosen every year from a field of more than 1,400 applicants.

Once enrolled at UT, the honors did not stop finding Henry. He was a regular on the Dean's List, was named an exemplary college scholar, and he earned membership in the honor societies of Golden Key, Alpha Lambda Delta and Phi Eta Sigma.

As for monetary rewards, he was a three-time National Hispanic Scholar, the winner of the Schumacher Memorial Award on Plan II, and the recipient of the coveted William Negley Endowed Presidential Scholarship in Plan II.

When Henry was not busy studying or participating in campus activities, he worked as the assistant to the Director of Journalism for the University Interscholastic League (U.I.L.)

The Young Riders, a talented group of youngsters, will perform at the beginning of each of the night performances. This group placed second in the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo parade in San Angelo this year.

When I joined the Chamber I was of the belief that the Chamber was in business to promote the community. The argument for the Chamber's position seems to be that people are going to bring coolers full of beer to the arena

anyway, why not get a license and sell the stuff. I can think of several reasons why not. The rodeo arena is on County property. The parking for the arena is on School property. However well intentioned the Chamber's actions may be, there is a real possibility of legal action that could impact negatively on all taxpayers. Liability questions

aside, however, I don't think it is proper for a civic organization to engage in this type business. What message does this send to our youngsters? When a group with the reputation and prestige of the Schleicher County Chamber of Commerce puts it's stamp of approval on the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages, how are we as individuals supposed to tell our children that it isn't acceptable

behavior? What will be the reaction of the Chamber's board when the first alcohol related traffic accident occurs? "Part of the cost of doing business?" How much profit will offset the death of even one person? Let's not delude ourselves into thinking that it can't happen here. Even some of the major

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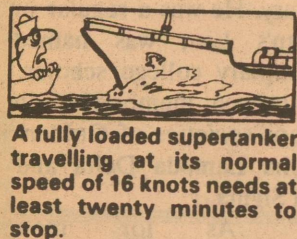

County Agent's Report

Homeowners are likely to have problems with blossom drop and poor fruit set of tomatoes anytime during the growing season in Texas. The problem may be exhibited as a total or partial failure of flowers to develop into fruit, or abnormal fruits which may be misshapen or catfaced.

The first category is the fruit set or blossom drop experienced most commonly in Texas. It is most common in tomatoes in plantings which bloom late. Generally, the usual cause for poor fruit set is high temperature during the day or night. Optimum nighttime temperatures for fruit set in tomatoes is about 68 to 70 degrees F. Nighttime temperatures above 72 degrees F. in combination with daytime temperatures above 90 degrees F. often results in heavy blossom drop in tomatoes. These conditions usually occur during June, July and August in most areas of Texas. Under these temperature conditions, fruit set may be very light but may change dramatically with the onset of more favorable nighttime temperatures (below 72 degrees). A somewhat similar condition may occur during extended periods of cold weather. However, under cold weather conditions, the problem may show up as blossom drop,

but it may also be combined with abnormalities in those fruits which do not abort (misshapen, catfaced, etc.)

There are many other causes for lack of fruit set or the development of malformed fruit in tomatoes. These include:

1. Unbalanced nutrition - including excess or deficiency of some of the major or minor elements. Most often this is associated with high preplant applications of nitrogen.
2. Extended periods of warm, windy weather with low humidity.
3. Extended periods of showery, cool, overcast weather during early spring.
4. Insects and diseases.

The problem of poor fruit set due to high temperatures is most prevalent in the large slicing types commonly produced in home gardens. Some of the large type tomatoes which do not have an ability to set under somewhat higher temperature conditions include: Early Giant, Spring Giant, Spring Set and Improved Summertime. The Cherry and Paste types of tomatoes do not exhibit the fruit set problem to the degree shown by the large types. Some of the better varieties of this type include Small Fry, Red Cherry, Roma and the Texas A&M Experiment Station release, Saladette.

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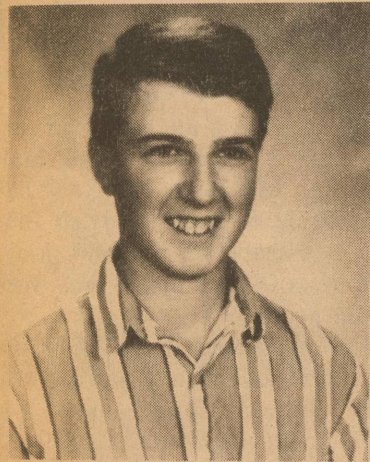

Safety Under The Sun

The warmth of sunshine invites many of us outside for recreation and chores. But don't let that sunshine soothe you into ignoring electric safety rules. Always observe the following:

- If yard work is the task for the day, be sure all appliance and extension cords are in good repair and sized and grounded properly.
- If you have a backyard swimming pool, or even a wading pool for the kids, never allow electric appliances near the water. You should also avoid handling electric appliances if you are wet.
- Fly kites only in open fields free of electric lines. Overhead electric lines are not insulated and are extremely dangerous.
- Make certain any "climbing" trees are also clear of electric lines as the branches can conduct electricity, creating a deadly hazard for the climber.
- If you like sailing, keep it enjoyable by always looking up to be sure there are no power lines in the area when stepping masts. And when out on the water, avoid areas where overhead power lines are present.
- Camping and outdoor cooking also present potential hazards. Be sure all electric cords are in good repair and properly grounded. And check location of overhead lines when setting up tents, television antennas, etc.

Sunshine and electricity can be good companions — but only if you take the time to be safe.

The election will be held by mail ballot. Ballots will be provided to all eligible voters of record not later than 15- days prior to the election. 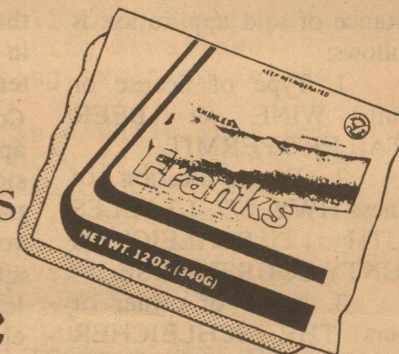
