Rodeo Team To Compete At State

I'm honored to present the awards to the Rodeo Team of Eldorado High School. Eldorado has again this year worked hard to be the Region II Champions and for the first time in many years the entire team has qualified in his or her event to participate in the State Finals on June 9th-15th in Abilene. We are in high hopes that our talented kids will then qualify to move on to the National Finals in Shawnee, Ok. on July 22nd-28th.

Cy Griffin placed 1st, earning a Region II Belt Buckle, in Calf Roping. He placed 8th or above in 72% of this years rodeos. Only entering the fall rodeos, Cy placed 8th or better in 67% of the Steer Wrestling event. He finished the year in 7th place.

In team roping, with partner Jamey Belk, it was down to the last rodeos, as in many events, that the places were won or lost. Cy and Jamey were fortunate enough to rope like the champions they are to place 5th overall.

Jamey will also be representing us in Saddle Bronc by placing 4th in this event. Jamey only picked this event up in the Spring rodeos and we are looking forward to more good years in this event for him.

Our only Senior this year, Justin Paxton, will be riding Bulls again at State by placing 3rd or better in 75% of completed rides giving him a 6th place standing. Justin also picked up an event for the Spring rodeos and finished the year 3rd in Bareback Riding. Justin has represented us well and we hate to see him leave our team.

The next two students were, as they say, "one out of the money" last year and didn't go to Abilene But I believe they were determined to make the trip this summer.

Traci Paxton, with an O.K. fall season in Barrels came back after Christmas and placed 4th or above in 50% of the rodeos. As the points added up to the last rodeo, Traci placed 6th, qualifying for State. If she can keep her horse, Baldy, from

any more self inflicted injuries, she will be competing in Goat Tying with her placing of 8th overall. Traci will also honor us and Region II in the Queen's Contest. These girls go to Abilene two days early and are judged on their knowledge of the Texas High School Rodeo Association rule book, riding skills, modeling and speech. We hope Traci will be going to Oklahoma as State Queen.

Stoney Hariman told me at the first of the year he wanted to go to State and I believe he meant it. By placing 1st or 2nd in 88% of his completed rides, he finished 4th for the year in Bull Riding. Stoney also picked up the Saddle Bronc event in the spring rodeos and placed 3rd overall. I believe Stoney will give Region II some tough competition in these events his Senior year.

Crissi McCormick, as bad as I hate to say it, had first place in Barrels going into the last rodeo week-end, but a little hard luck moved her into 2nd place. She placed 4th or better in 66% of her Barrel runs. Crissi place 5th in Pole Bending by running 72% of the time in the top nine places. Goat Tying is one of the 5 events Crissi participated in. She finished the year in 5th place. I'm always amazed at Crissi's flying hands when she ties a goat. Placing 7th in Breakaway Roping, Crissi will be competing at State against

times of under 3 seconds. We know she will give the rest of the State a run for their money. This was Crissi's first year to participate in the Cutting competition, although there were some who didn't think she could make it to the arena one or two hours earlier on Sunday mornings in her usual style. Crissi was not only on time, but placed 4th in Region II.

Last, but not least, is Mondee Nelson. Mondee kept her 2nd place standing in the Cutting competition by scoring 3rd or better in 69% of the rodeos entered. Mondee was also in the same position as some of her team mates, coming into the last week-end's competition in the 2nd place standing that she had held through the Spring Rodeos with less than a 6 point difference in 2nd through 8th places. There were ties for 3rd, 5th and 6th places. Mondee was 8th or better in 88% of this years Pole Bending, and placed 4th when all was said and done, only losing her 2nd place position by 2 points.

The High School Rodeo Team would like to recognize Bill Wells as their sponsor, and thank him for supporting our team.

All right, I'm through bragging about these kids, but they have earned their way to the State Finals and I know you are as proud of them as I am!

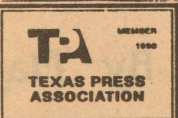

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Why Does The Medicare Program Cost So Much?

In recent years the Medicare program has suffered budget cuts, as part of the federal government's effort to control its spending. The Medicare program today costs much more to support than was anticipated at the outset, more than 25 years ago. There are at least five reasons which contribute to this.

ADVANCED TECHNOLOGY: Thanks to advances in medical research, we have more health care available today than then. For example, we have several ways of looking into the body which did not exist then. There was the Computerized Axial Tomography (CAT) scanner which enables the radiologist to study "slices" made through the body with x-rays. Then there was the Magnetic

Resonance Imager (MRI) which uses magnetic waves instead of x-rays to make pictures of what is inside the body. Now there is the Positron Emission Tomography (PET) scanner which makes pictures by measuring the emission of positrons from the body to make its "slices". Each of these represents a tremendous advance in medical technology. Each one is limited in its applications: you won't see PET replacing conventional x-rays for most diagnostic studies. And each one is MUCH more expensive than the one before it.

DEFENSIVE MEDICINE: Sometimes these new machines can actually save money, by enabling the doctor to diagnose a problem without having to do exploratory surgery. But often these machines are used, just because they are there, to "rule out" a condition that the doctor

is pretty sure isn't there anyway. This is called defensive medicine, and it just adds to the cost of modern medicine. Defensive medicine has become necessary, to some extent, because our society has become so willing to sue the doctor or hospital when there is a "negative outcome". On the outside chance that a doctor has made a mistake, he knows he can be held liable if a test was available which he did not use, which would have enabled him to correct his mistake before any damage resulted. Therefore, many doctors have learned to protect themselves by running tests which may actually be unnecessary. When the test is a CAT scan or an MRI, this is expensive insurance, and it isn't the doctor who pays for it, it is your insurance, it is the one who pays your insurance premium, ultimately, it is you who pays for

it"
SUPPLY AND DEMAND: While there are more nurses, doctors and allied health personnel available now, the demand has increased even more than the supply. Due to the law of supply and demand, these health personnel are able to require greater pay than they did when medicare was first invented. Also contributing to the fact that the supply of personnel has not kept up with the demand is the fact that many other career paths are now available to women who otherwise would have gone into nursing or other health related careers.

People are living longer: Thanks to advances in modern medicine, people live longer today than they did 25 years ago. This is sometimes called "the graying of America". When President Johnson signed Medicare into law, most Americans did not live long enough to ever get onto the Medicare rolls. In fact, the

COMPOST

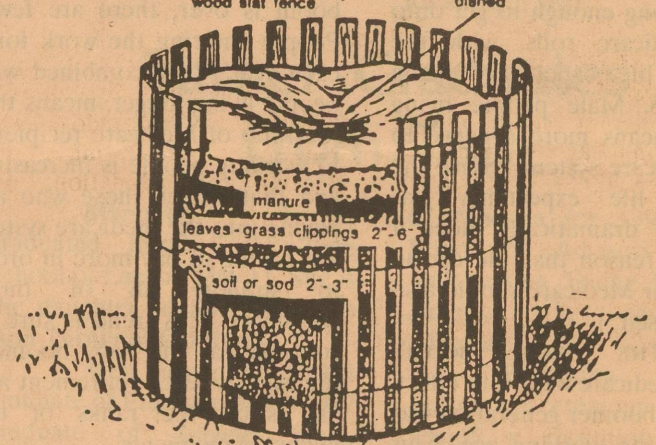
A KEY TO GARDENING

With fall at hand and leaf drop just around the corner, now is the time to start a compost pile for next year's garden.

Compost is defined as a mixture of soil- and partly decayed organic matter that is used to improve garden or potting soil, and is produced in piles or pits to which waste materials such as leaves, grass clippings, table scraps and manure are added. Compost can be used as a top dressing for

lawns, as a mulch around growing plants, or mixed into the soil for growing flowers and vegetables. When properly prepared, it is free from weeds or odor and is very rich in plant nutrients.

Compost piles should be located in an area receiving plenty of sunlight and sufficient air. While the compost is making, it should be kept moist, but not soggy wet. The top of the pile should be kept dish-shaped to catch natural rainfall and to help when wetting is necessary.

The warmth of sunshine invites many of us outside for recreation and chores. But don't let that sunshine soothe you into ignoring electric safety rules. Always observe the following:

- If yard work is the task for the day, be sure all appliance and extension cords are in good repair and sized and grounded properly.

- If you have a backyard swimming pool, or even a wading pool for the kids, never allow electric appliances near the water. You should also avoid handling electric appliances if you are wet.

- Fly kites only in open fields free of electric lines. Overhead electric lines are not insulated and are extremely dangerous.

- Make certain any "climbing" trees are also clear of electric lines as the branches can conduct electricity, creating a deadly hazard for the climber.

- If you like sailing, keep it enjoyable by always looking up to be sure there are no power lines in the area when stepping masts. And when out on the water, avoid areas where overhead power lines are present.

- Camping and outdoor cooking also present potential hazards. Be sure all electric cords are in good repair and properly grounded. And check location of overhead lines when setting up tents, television antennas, etc.

Sunshine and electricity can be good companions — but only if you take the time to be safe.

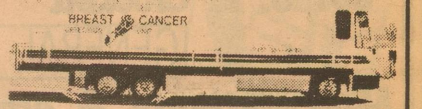

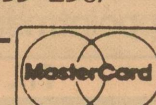

average life expectancy was about 62. Now most Americans do live long enough to get onto the Medicare rolls, with the average life expectancy being about 76. Male people living longer means more expense to the Medicare system. (Since the average life expectancy has increased dramatically, does it stand to reason that the age to qualify for Medicare should also be increased?)

THE "BABY BOOM": When Medicare went into effect, the baby boomer generation was approaching working age. This means that the ratio of Medicare

recipients to working people was relatively low. Now that the baby boom is over, there are fewer people entering the work force each year. This, combined with people living longer, means that the ratio of Medicare recipients to working people is increasing, and that means those who are paying into the medicare system are having to pay more in order to support all of those recipients. This trend is sure to continue, as the baby boomers themselves reach retirement age and swell the ranks of the medicare recipients.

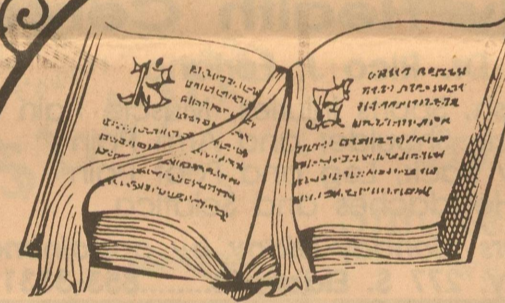

In 1930, T.K. Jones contracted Mr. Chidester of Menard to build a unique structure to house a modern theatre. Eldorado had outgrown the "Owl Theatre" two local teenagers, Dick Bearce and Palmer West, had opened in 1920. These boys rolled the reels by hand, as there was no electricity. Audiences sat on wooden benches to watch Charlie Chaplin thrillers.

The new Jones theater had a pianist who played during the silent movies. The tunes were not always in the tempo of the picture, sometimes a Sousa's March blasted during a tender love scene, or Indian Love Call was played when a lively battle was in progress. However, everyone seemed to have a good time and felt lucky to have a

modern picture show.

Hicks Hall and employees operated the theater for many years. It was later run by Sonora Theater. Two small offices on each side of the theater entrance contained other businesses. On one side, at one time, Pancho Bradley had a shoe shine parlor, later Sproul Communication and Insurance had an office. The other side housed a small cafe. Some of the proprietors over the years were: Mary Martin, Howard Belcher, D.C. Royster, Rose Holland and Bob Duncan.

The Old Theater was closed for some time, and later remodeled to accommodate Ratliff Insurance. Raymond Mittel bought the Insurance business from Ratliff in the 1980's. Winnie Helen Ratliff owns the building.

The most widely consumed behaviorally active drug in the world, caffeine, is consumed by about 87% of Americans.

Researchers think even small amounts of coffee, tea, soft drinks, chocolate, over the counter cold remedies, and diet pills may cause severe withdrawal symptoms. People

who quit "cold turkey" on a cup of strong coffee or a couple of cokes a day, may suffer symptoms ranging from headaches, muscle pain, fuzzy thinking, fatigue, mood changes, and nausea.

When breaking the caffeine habit, it should be done gradually to prevent the withdrawal symptoms.

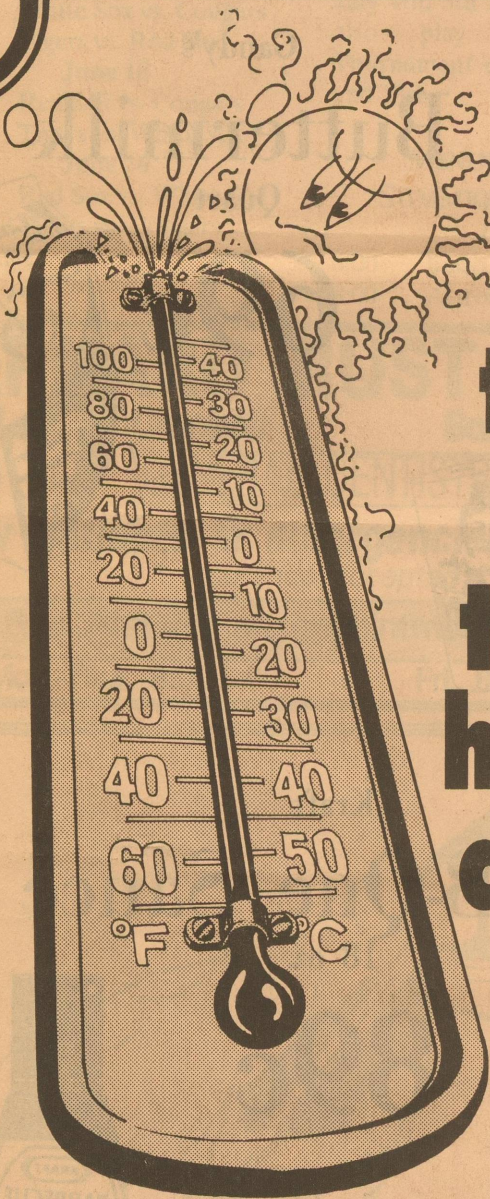

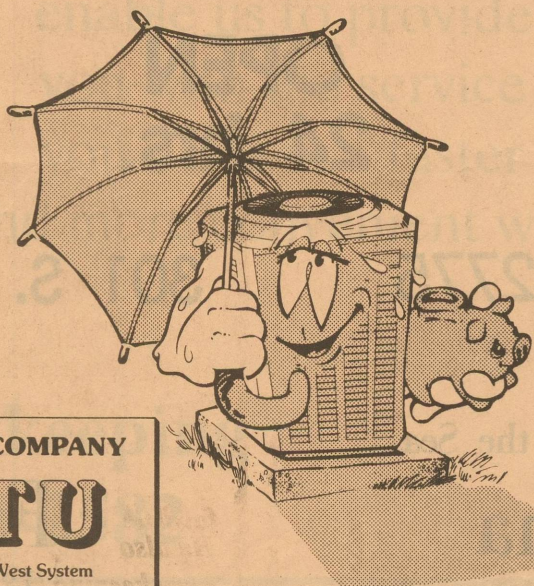

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
