

## County Agents Report

Jerry Swift - Schleicher County Extension Agent

Beef producers should be aware of the proper amount of cottonseed products that can be fed safely depending on the type of animal.

Cottonseed products have been used for more than 100 years as nutritional supplements to improve cattle production. Millions of tons of cottonseed products are fed annually to U.S. livestock.

Concern cottonseed stems from its level of gossypol, a naturally occurring substance that can be toxic to some animals.

"Ruminant animals can tolerate much greater quantities of free gossypol than can monogastric animals. Preruminant calves, under 8 weeks of age, should not be fed

gossypol-containing products," says a report just released at Texas A&M University.

The source of gossypol and type of diet also affect the levels of gossypol tolerated by

Gossypol has been widely studied for its toxicity to some animals. But gossypol may affect ow reproductive capabilities in cattle. These are the recommendations for feeding cattle:

\* Beef cows and range

bulls: 2 pounds per head per day of direct solvent extracted; 4 pounds/head/day of expander processed; 4 pounds/head/day of screw-press processed meal; or 4-6 pounds/head/day of whole cottonseed.

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#### Our Invisible Helping Hand: The Ministerial Alliance Fund

disbursed money goes for aid to travelers in the form of gasoline and emergency repairs. However, an even larger percentage (24% of the total) goes toward the support of the youth of our community, for example, the Senior Banquets and in the past, the Eagle's Point. Other categories of assistance, in order, include food for travelers and residents, 18%; emergency shelter for travelers and residents, 15%; utility aid for county residents, 12%; medical aid for county residents, 7%; clothing assistance, 1%. It is a very satisfying feeling to know that our dollars are being used to meet the basic human need of people that we may never meet. We can all take pride in the work of our EMF!!!

#### Health News

Many people ask me how long do you have to go to Chiropractic School to become a Chiropractic Doctor. My answer is that it is a four year program after undergraduate similar to Medical

School. I am also asked what classes you have to take to Chiropractic Physician. The same basic science courses are required as are required in Medical School which include Cell biology, Embryology, Histology, Human Anatomy, Physiology, Bio-chemistry, Microbiology, Public Health, Pathology, and Neuroanatomy. Clinical sciences are then taken, which include eight different classes in Radiology, Physical Diagnosis, Differential Diagnosis, Lab Diagnosis, Visceral Diagnosis, Clinical Neurology, Clinical Orthopedics, Pharmacology/ Toxicology, Pediatrics, Obstetrics, Bynecology, Geriatrics, Dermatology, Eye-Ear-Nose and Throat, and Clinical Nutrition. 10 class in Chiropractic Technique and two classes in Physical Therapy are

Before required. graduation, each student must also undergo about a year and a half o internship. State and National Chiropractic Board Exams must be passed before a license to practice Chiropractic Medicine is issued

The main difference between Medical School and Chiropractic School is that Medical School students take more drug related classes, and Chiropractic School students Chiropractic more

manipulation classes. I am also asked why I didn't go to Medical School if it is basically the same. The main reason is that, in my opinion, the Chiropractic profession is another speciality of the Medical profession; Chiropractic Doctors treatments are manipulation, physical therapy, nutritional supplements and not drugs, in most cases, because drugs many times have side effects that give people other problems.

Chiropractors are not opposed to referring their patients to a Medical Doctor when they feel their treatment is not in the patients best interest.

\* Young bulls being grown or developed for breeding: Whole cottonseed should be limited to 15 percent to 20 percent of the total diet for most cattle and to 10 percent or less for young developing bulls. High free gossypol meal (0.3 percent or 3,000 parts per million) should be limited to 5 percent of the total diet. Screw press and expander process meal containing less than 0.1 percent or 1,000 parts per million can be used at up to 15 percent of the

If using a mixture of cotton products, the combined concentration of gossypol will need to be considered.

\* Embryo transfer: Producers with embryo transfer programs in which large sums of money are involved per animal may wish to use a conservative approach since other protein sources are available.

\* Pre-ruminant calves (under 8 weeks to be safe): These

animals, especially dairy calves, should not be fed gossypol containing products until ongoing research establishes safe feeding levels.

Cattle raisers also should know that the method of oil extraction used on the cottonseed impacts the gossypol levels in the product. The expander process exposes the cottonseed to greater heat which in turn reduces the amount of free gossypol content to about one-third of the level in the old direct solvent method. More than 95 percent of the cottonseed processed in Texas and Oklahoma today are from expander or screw-press operations.

Also, with roughage or forage diets where slower passage takes place, cattle may be able to tolerate higher levels of gossypol. Cottonseed hull-based diets may be an exception, however, because of their rapid rate of passage.

#### WTU - Lower Costs

Customers of West Texas Utilities Co. have some good news in the form of lower costs for electricity beginning with October bills. The lower costs are produced by a one-time credit and a reduction in the fuel cost portion of the bill.

"Our continuing efforts to lower boiler fuel costs and related transportation costs were successful and prompted the reduction," said, Leroy Reeves, WTU's area manager. Those efforts include renegotiation of supply and transportation agreements, construction of a gas pipeline to the Fort Phantom power station near Abilene to provide better access to suppliers, and improvements in the efficiency of some plants so they burn less fuel to make

electricity.

The credit will be issued on customer's electric bills during the billing month of October. An average residential

customer using 660 kilowatt hours of electricity will see a reduction of \$13.17 on the bill that month. The actual reduction for each customer is based on their previous month's use of electricity.

The reduction in the fuel portion of the electric bill will be in effect for all upcoming months. According to Leroy, it will mean an average 3.5 percent reduction from costs last year.

The Public Commission of Texas (PUCT) recently granted the company's request to reconcile fuel costs for April 1987 through December 1990 and adjust the fuel portion of the bill to recover projected fuel costs. WTU filed the request last February.

#### Mobile Breast Cancer **Detection Unit**

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, Texas, which services Eldorado, Texas today received the certification of the American Radiology of Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an xray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts sec as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The Process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that a dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Breast cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer recommends women do monthly breast selfexams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule:

baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39.

A mammogram every one or two years between age 40



front-wheeldrive, four-door sedans have similar aerodynamic styling, performance, comfort, exceptional quietness and prices. The LeSabre is available now, while the ES 300 hits showrooms a week from Friday.

The conclusion, after testing both: Buick has an edge over Lexus under U.S. motoring conditions-especially congested areas such as ours.

Both cars noteworthy backgrounds. For instance, the LeSabre is among

the new crop of 1990s General Motors autos intended to make people forget GM's mediocre, look-alike 1980s near-luxury models. It replaces a boxy LeSabre and looks like a smaller version of Buick's more upscale Park Avenue.

The ES 300 replaces the boxy ES 250, which was a dated car Lexus sold as a stopgap model to fill out the lower price end of its lineup until the ES 300 was ready. The ES 250 was just a disguised old Toyota Camry. Ironically, the revamped 1992 Camry is a cheaper version of the ES 300, which looks like a smaller version of the \$39,000, Mercedes-and BMW-beating Lexus LS 400. Here's how the 

Price. The ES 300's price hasn't been released, but Lexus says it'll be in the mid-

LeSabre and ES 300

\$25,000 range. The LeSabre Limited stickers at \$20,775, but my test Limited cost \$24,998 with popular options, such as power seats and door locks and cruise control. That should be a typical price for the upscale Limited, expected to account for many LeSabre sales. The base LeSabre Custom stickers at \$18,695, but easily tops \$20,000 with options.

Performance. Japanese sophistication wins the battle, but loses the war. The ES 300's 3-liter, 185-horsepower V-6 has an ultra-modern design, with double overhead camshafts and four valves per cylinder. The design of Buick's 3.8-liter, 170horsepower V-6 could date to the 1950s, with old-fashioned pushrods instead of overhead cams and only two valves per

The ES 300 does 0-60 m.p.h. in 8.8 seconds, compared with 10 for the Buick. But the LeSabre's bigger V-6 is more responsive during typical driving and is about as smooth as the high-LeSabre's, European-style Lexus V-6. Both are smooth, quiet highway cruisers. One shouldn't hesitate to take either for a comfortable Chicago-to-Los Angeles trip.

The LeSabre, which comes only with automatic transmission, would win a LeSabre's-economy contest on such a trip, delivering an EPAestimated 18 m.p.g. in the city and 28 on the highway. The ES 300 delivers 15 and 24 with an

optional (about automatic and 19 and 26 with the standard five-speed manual transmission, which ising popular in near-luxury autos.

LeSabre has an LeSabre's smooth ride, eating up nasty roads without ruffling occupants. The ES 300 has a ruffling nice ride, but it's not up to that of the Buick because its European-style ride allows smaller bumps to be felt.



### Brush Management Demonstration

The Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District will sponsor a Brush Management Demonstration on Monday, October 7, 1991, 1:30 p.m. at Oran Enochs Ranch on Hwy 277 North. (Approximately 4 1/2 miles north on 277, turn west cattleguard, signs will be posted.) Stewart Herring, of Ford Tractor, San Angelo will be on hand to demonstrate the Brush Boss.

The Brush Boss has been tested through Texas A&M University. Studies have found that the Brush Boss has the ability to pull up, roots and all, 55 mesquites/hour and 141 red berry junipers/hour. Average cost would be .10/plant for a 40-HP tractor and 13.4 cents/plant for a 75-HP tractor. Mesquites up to 5 inches basal trunk diameter can be grubbed with a 40 HP tractor.
