Special music will include a fatherdaughter duet on cello and piano, by Walter Osadchuk, cellist for the Midland-Odessa Symphony Orchestra, and his daughter Elecia.

The installation service will take place in the church sanctuary, followed by light refreshments downstairs in the Fellowship Hall. Everyone in the community is warmly invited to attend.

Guidlines For National School Lunch Program

The Schleicher County Independent School District serves meals each school day. Students in grades K-3 may buy lunch for \$1.00; grades 4-6 for \$1.10; grades 7-12 for \$1.20 and adult visitors for \$3.45. Students may buy breakfast for 50 cents and adults for 75 cents. If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster

to an end for my school children much sooner than it did last year. The State in its wisdom has mandated a few more school days and in an effort to finish school by May 25 my children will start school August 19. That is my understanding anyway. As for me I have little

complaint with the early start. My children have been helpful but I just cannot come up with enough work for them to keep them busy all day.

Our schools are air conditioned so the comfort level should be fairly tolerable. In

fact, I wouldn't mind if they went to school a few more days than they are now required to go. I'm pretty sure that the teachers could find more information to give the kids.

I read where the schools in Oregon (I think?) will be open quite a few more days than in any other state. It seems they have completely revamped their educational system so that through junior high the children will attend regular classroom instruction and about the ninth grade they will test the students and only those doing very well academically will be allowed to finish high school. The others will be routed into trade schools. I realize that some

people might get a little upset if their child did not make it into high school since it would pretty much end their chances of going on to college. In fact, a few colleges might not like the system since it could very well reduce the number of eligible enrollees who could pay tuition. Because testing can sometimes be quite culturally biased, there is a genuine fear that such a system will reduce the ability of minority students to get accepted into the academic tract. Any major overhaul of our schools would cause

We do need to do something and our schools can surely be a part of it but maybe, just maybe, their education needs to begin at home.



child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all the children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your; eligibility may be checked at anyl time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You also may ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing:

Reporting Charges: If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases' or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because they get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell

the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, like a decrease in household income, an increase in size, become household unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, complete an application then.

Igo Family Reunion Held


The family of George and Winnie Igo gathered in Kerrville at the Sands Motel for their annual reunion on July 19-21. Seventyone descendants were there.

Before you leave for an extended vacation, a housing specialist says there are a number of things you can do to secure your home and save

energy Dr. Susan Quiring with Agricultural Texas the Extension Service recommends following these tips before going on vacation:

*Unplug small electrical appliances, computers, televisions, and microwaves. Pulling the plug prevents fires and short-circuits that can result from electrical surges during lightening storms. *Turn off the electric

hot water heater to save energy and electricity. Most gas water heaters have a "vacation" setting, so you don't have to turn them off. This saves having to relight the pilot.

*If possible, use timers on lamps so that lights come on periodically. Manual timers are inexpensive; electronic ones cost a little more.

*Raise the thermostat on air conditioner units to about 85 degrees. This keeps the from refrigerator and freezer

*Leave names and phone numbers of trusted repair firms -- plumbing, electrical and others -- with the person who will be checking your home and watering the plants.

*Set off bug bombs, if needed, before you leave. *Check

exterior security lights. If you have motion detectors, pass your hand in front of lights or walk by them to make sure the switch is on.

*Put your mail on hold and pay all bills that may be due before you return home. Utility companies normally have you estimate an amount on the high side and credit the difference to the following month's bill. When paying bills this way, be sure to write the month on your check that the payment is for.

*Cancel

vour newspaper during the days you will be gone or have a neighbor pick it up. However, make sure that the neighbor does not stack papers at the back door or inside the house piled up with the mail in plain view through a window

*Make sure that your yard is maintained -- have someone cut the grass regularly, and if you have a swimming pool, arrange care for equipment and other necessary maintenance.

*Arrange to have pets boarded at a kennel or make arrangements for someone to care for them.

*Hide valuables such as guns and jewelry or place with someone else if possible.

*Inventory your personal belongings such as jewelry, china, art work, television and video and stereo equipment in advance in case of theft. This includes writing down brands, serial and model numbers, and taking pictures.

*Allow enough time to secure all windows, sliding glass doors and other doors.

'It's also a good idea to leave information on where you can be reached with neighbors and police, and let them know the dates you will be gone," Quiring said. "And don't broadcast to everyone that you will be going on vacation. Tell

them about it after you return.



injury, you should have a doctor examine it even if you don't feel bad because internal head injuries don't always cause pain. A medical or chiropractic physician should be consulted in these cases.

Depression headaches can be seen in any age or sex and are usually worse upon arising. The headache is accompanied by depression and counseling and antidepressant drugs may help the problem.

Sinus headaches are caused by chronic sinusitis when there is a history of sinus attacks. They are experienced as a persistent frontal and facial

pain. Antihistamines, decongestants, and chiropractic treatment can provide relief.

Eyestrain headaches can cause pain in the forehead. They can be triggered by uncorrected astigmatism, faulty vision, close work in poor light, or using a computer terminal for long periods of time without rest. If you get new bifocals and headaches start and don't go away, your optometrist should check them to be certain that they are divided at the right level. If the headache is not corrected by a new optical prescription, then a medical or chiropractic physician should be consulted.

headaches Caffeine usually occur in the morning when getting up or whenever the customary coffee is skipped. Caffeine consumption should be

eliminated, but it should be done gradually so that withdrawal symptoms can be avoided.

Monosodium glumate (MSG) headaches provoke throbbing in the temples and forehead and cause pressure and tightness in the face. MSG is a food enhancer used particularly in Chinese food (soy sauce) and many packaged food products. If headaches occur after eating, food labels should be reviewed for the presence of MSG. People who experience MSG headaches eliminate should MSGcontaining foods from their diet.

Carbon monoxide headaches cause throbbing pain, dizziness, weakness and nausea. If there is exposure to carbon monoxide in the home, a whole family may develop headache. This may be due to a defective gas furnace. Leaky exhaustpipes in cars may also be responsible.

Temporamandibular (TMU) joint syndrome headaches are characterized by pain in the jaw brought on by chewing and malalignment of the jaw. There is tenderness over the joint just in front of the ear and a click in the TMU produced by movement can be heard. Gum chewing should be Dental or chiropractic treatments can be useful in providing relief.

if your headache wakens you at night, is accompanied by a stiff neck, is caused by a blow to your head, and is worse than usual and does not get better. You should numbness, memory loss, loss of balance, or trouble talking.
