## Pioneer Families Honored

One of the highlights of Schleicher County Days every year is the honoring of pioneer families in the county. The Schleicher County Chamber of Commerce recognizes two family members of early day residents who are selected by the Historical Society. The representatives this year are Bob Bradley and the Bradley Family and Elizabeth Graves Bradley

and the Graves Family.

Bradley Family  
Frank McDonald  
Bradley and Agnes "Aggie"  
Blythe Finley were married  
December 10, 1910, in Dallas  
County Texas.

Frank and Aggie lived  
in Fife the first years of their  
marriage, and two daughters  
were born here, Elizabeth and  
Margaret.

The family moved to

Sutton County in 1915 where  
Mr. Bradley worked on the Sam  
McKnight Ranch. Later that  
year a move to Schleicher  
County was made by the family,  
and Frank McDonald Jr.  
"Pancho" was born here. Two  
more boys were born to the  
Bradleys in Eldorado, Robert  
Kay "Bob" and Thomas  
Duncan "Tom."

Mr. Bradley worked for  
A.A. Bush Ford Motor Co. for  
years. He was a civic leader, he  
served on Schleicher County  
Fair Association, Lions Club,  
and he was a life Mason. He  
also served as County Judge  
from 1931 to 1934. He died  
September 1, 1950.

Mrs. Bradley "Aggie"  
was only 4'11" tall, but a very  
active, lively person. Among her  
hobbies was collecting and  
making Raggedy Ann and Andy  
dolls. Many relatives and friends  
have cherished these dolls given  
to them by Mrs. Bradley. She  
died December 31, 1978 at the  
age of 90. Mr. and Mrs. Bradley  
are buried in the Eldorado  
Cemetery.

Bob grew up in  
Eldorado attending school here.  
He was a popular, fun loving  
boy with many friends. He  
participated in sports and was  
class officer. He graduated EHS  
in 1939, and after serving in  
WWII, he attended UCLA in  
California and Texas Tech  
University. He received a degree  
in Geology from Texas Tech  
and after graduating worked for  
Texaco and Pure Oil  
Companies. Today he operates  
a geological consulting business  
in Eldorado.

Bob married Elizabeth  
"Liz" Graves on November 28,

1946. Two children were born to  
this union, Elizabeth Kay and  
Charles Robert.

Charles Augusta  
Graves and Maud Lee Sutton  
were married January 19, 1904  
in Menard, Texas. The young  
couple lived on a stock farm the  
first years of their marriage  
where three sons were born,  
Hubert Victor, Clyde Milton,  
and Webster Haynes. In 1911  
the family moved to Schleicher  
County on the Lee Knight  
Ranch located in the "Toe Nail  
Trail" area. The family later  
moved to the Jackson Ranch. A  
daughter was born during this  
time, her name was Gusta  
Valentine, born on Valentines  
Day.

to Eldorado where Sarah  
Elizabeth "Liz" was born.

Mr. Graves served as  
deputy sheriff for Orville  
Conner. He also served as  
County Commissioner in 1943.  
During the time Mr. Graves  
served as Schleicher County  
Commissioner he was paid \$5 a  
day for five days a month. Each  
Commissioner was expected to  
oversee all work in his precinct  
personally - this took more than  
five days a month!

Mr. Graves died  
February 12, 1958, and Mrs.  
Graves died August 25, 1960.

Liz grew up in  
Eldorado attending EHS. These  
days were memorable times with  
her friends and family. Liz's  
hobby was photography and her  
ambition was to be a nurse. She  
served as class officer, Talon

Queen, pep squad, 4 years.  
Choral Club - 4 years, H.E.  
Club - 3 years, dramatics - 2  
years, Textette Press Club - 3  
years, and Eagle Scratches. Liz  
attended college, after  
graduation in 1943, in San  
Angelo, graduating from San  
Angelo Business College.

WHEREAS, each  
member of the Board of  
Trustees of the Schleicher  
County Independent School  
District has sworn an Oath of  
Office stating that he or she will  
"... preserve, protect, and defend  
the Constitution and the laws of  
the United States of this  
State..." and

WHEREAS, the Board  
of Trustees collectively and  
individually do not wish to  
breach that Oath, violate any  
law or take any action which  
could be considered a civil  
disobedience; and

WHEREAS, liability  
coverage for CED trustees is not  
readily available; and

WHEREAS, the future  
of our state and of our young

people have been placed in  
jeopardy and the quality of our  
educational system is being  
leveled down by the mandates of  
Senate Bill 351; and

WHEREAS, the  
constitutionality of Senate Bill  
351 is being challenged in the  
Court which has yet to render a  
decision; and

NOW THEREFORE  
BE IT RESOLVED BY the  
Board of Trustees of the  
Schleicher County Independent  
School District that active  
participation in the County  
Education District #9 is not  
possible until the issues of  
trustee liability and the  
constitutionality of Senate Bill  
351 have been resolved; and

BE IT RESOLVED  
that we will seek to oppose the  
re-election of any Legislator  
who voted in favor of or  
continues to support Senate Bill  
351.

Dear Editor,

GOOD SAMARITANS EXIST!!! Let me explain. I am a physician in the small town of Sterling City, Texas northwest of San Angelo. Another doctor and I alternate. We work 24 hours a day one week on and one week off.

I attended our son's wedding in a San Antonio suburb early Saturday afternoon, July 27th. I left about 5 PM to drive 250 miles back to Sterling City to replace the other doctor Sunday. On Interstate 10 near Comfort in my 8 year old automobile; a large radiator hose ruptured catastrophically about 5:30 PM. Two minutes

later my GOOD SAMARITAN stopped to help.

He drove me to Comfort. All auto parts stores were closed. In a sprawling salvage yard he found a hose. We returned to my car, and he installed the hose. He suggested I drive to Sterling City via Eldorado, Texas, near San Angelo, which is his home on weekends. Events proved how wise he was. His plan was to follow me all the way.

Just southeast of Kerrville my engine overheated badly. We limped into Kerrville. It was after sunset. At an auto parts store that was open we got everything needed to change the

thermostat, which he did underneath the car. I held the flashlight. His task was not an easy one, especially in an old car.

By 10 PM we were back on Interstate 10. My car ran well but with an elevated temperature. Almost to Junction my engine died suddenly and totally with electrical failure, an overheat light, and it could not even turn over. In addition we were in a vigorous thunderstorm with heavy rain. Ever ingenious, he said, "I'll tow you." Three and one half hours later after 167 miles of towing and one stoppage by a state trooper (the trooper let us go), we were at the clinic inn Sterling City. It was 3

o'clock Sunday morning.

Good Samaritans Exist!!! This man is Martin Belman of San Antonio and of Eldorado, Texas. He is a disabled veteran in his mid-forties. He lives in San Antonio 5 1/2 days a week and attends San Antonio College in the computer science program. He goes home to Eldorado to spend Saturday night and Sunday with his wife and 9 year old son. To me he is an angel in disguise whose unstinting helpfulness to his fellow man is beyond compare.

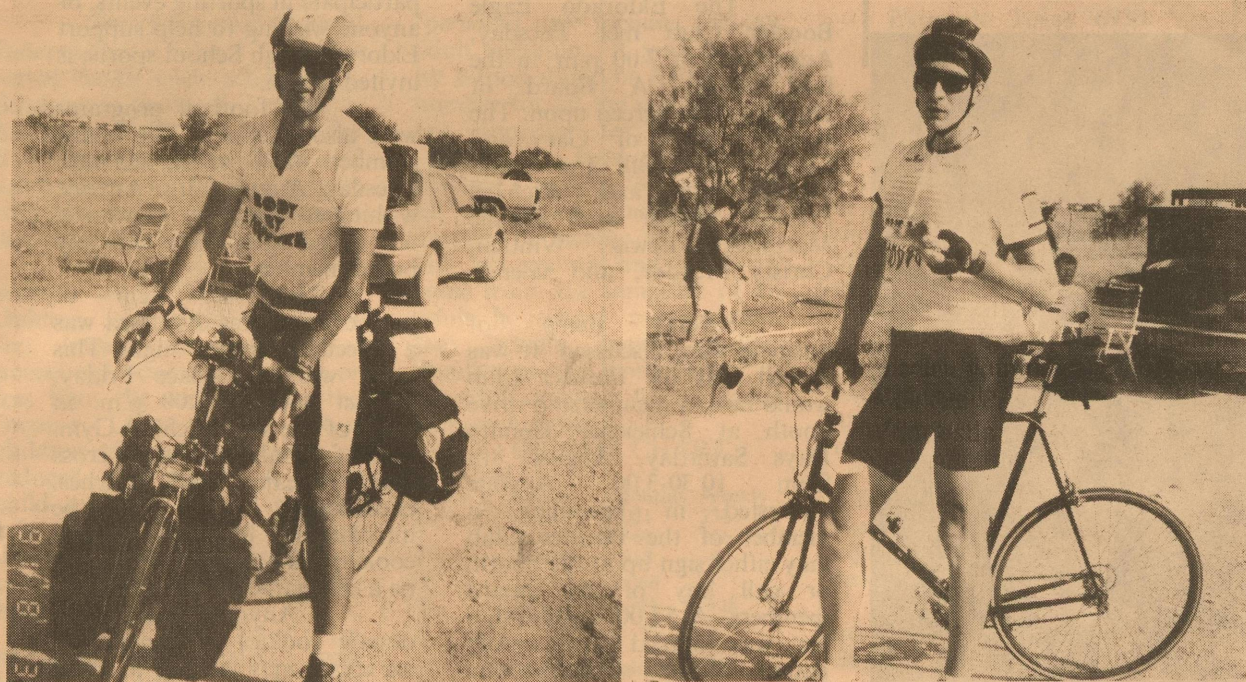

## Health News

The shoulder is a very complex structure which is very easily injured; only the low back causes more problems than the shoulder.

Shoulder pain often affects arms and hands because the shoulder is so closely related to the spinal nerves that originate in the neck. When you fall or strain your shoulder, the resulting pulling and pushing forces injure the shoulder as well as the neck by displacing the neck and shoulder bones. The bones being displaced can exert pressure on nerves and blood

vessels and cause the muscles to become unbalanced. If left untreated this can lead to tendonitis, an extremely painful and limiting condition. If the shoulder is displaced it can cause tingling and numbness in the shoulder, arm, wrist, and hand.

If you have fallen or have hit your shoulder or do a lot of lifting and you are experiencing shoulder pain or any of the symptoms associated with shoulder in you should have a neck and shoulder exam performed.

Doctors of Chiropractic Medicine are experts in treating

neck and shoulder pain; they are nerve, muscle, and joint specialist. In the cases when the

chiropractor can not relieve your symptoms he will refer you to the proper specialist.

## Dr. Albert Forlano Is Radio Program Guest Speaker

Dr. Albert J. Forlano, Ph.D., pharmacologist and preventive medicine specialist, was invited to be the guest speaker on a Toledo, Ohio radio broadcast on Monday, July 29.

During the hour-long program, Dr. Forlano discussed an exciting new area in preventive medicine, "the use of antioxidant substances." These substances which are found in select foods and supplements can reduce the incidence of heart disease, strokes, high blood pressure, Parkinsons disease, problems of the immune system, arthritis, cataracts, and other eye problems. They can also reduce the destruction of heart muscle and brain after a heart attack or stroke has occurred. Antioxidant substances may also be beneficial in the

prevention of the ravages of diabetes.

Dr. Forlano noted that we are at the crossroads of a new era of preventing disease. Rather than treating disease after it becomes manifested, it can be prevented from occurring.

Dr. Forlano is a nationally known lecturer in the area of preventive medicine and an American Chemical Society Tour Speaker.

## County Agent's Report

### COTTON APHIDS

Cotton aphids are still a problem in most fields. Preliminary test results aren't good. Bidrin is the only material giving somewhat satisfactory control.

I think the best thing we can do now is to not treat and hope populations will crash (which many times does happen for some unknown reason), or that beneficials will reduce the numbers.

If we go in now with Bidrin and spray just for aphids, there is a strong possibility Bidrin will not work later on. Later on when the cotton starts to open, aphids could really hurt us because the honey dew will drop on the lint. Sticky lint does not sell very well. Therefore, lets hold off as long as possible.

If you must treat for bollworms and you choose a pyrethroid, then mix Bidrin with it. If you do not have worm problems and do have weevil problems then use Guthion, Vydate C, Vydate C-LV or methyl parathion. Please don't use a pyrethroid for weevil control just because it eases you mind or because you think you have worms. Make sure you have worms before you treat for worms.

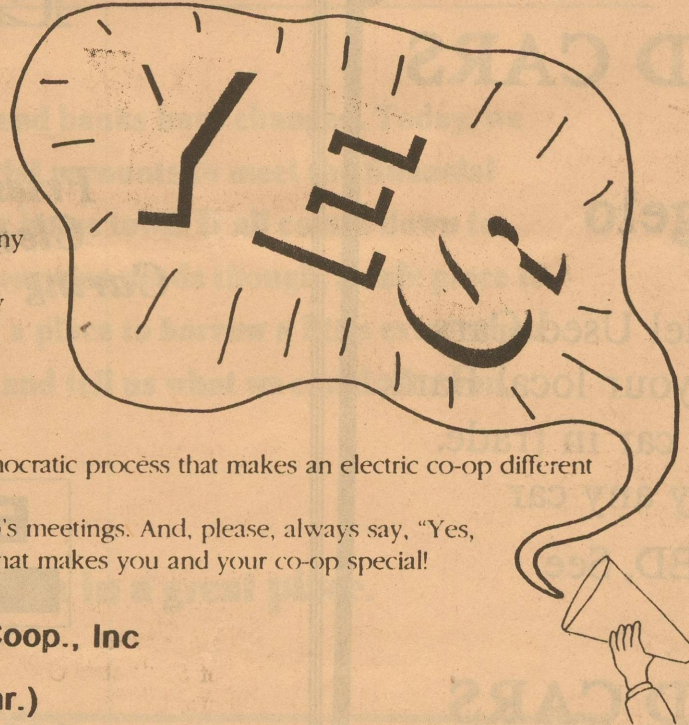

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County Independent School District was held on July 30, 1991, at 6:00 P.M. in the Administration Building.

The resignations of Lessa Albin as middle school science instructor and Bobby Helmers as middle school English instructor/coach were accepted.

In further action, the

board voted to employ Kay Creek as middle school English instructor/coach, Jerrilyn Miller as middle school science instructor, and George Spinks as part-time middle school industrial technology instructor.

The board then spent the balance of the meeting discussing the newly mandated County Education District and its possible impact on Schleicher County ISD.

## Tourette Syndrome

There is plenty about Tourette syndrome that makes it a disagreeable -- and frequently life-crippling -- disease. But one of the biggest problems is how often effective treatment is delayed because Tourette is diagnosed as some other condition.

"Many physicians are unfamiliar with all aspects of Tourette, and, as a result, many misdiagnoses occur," said Dr. Joseph Jankovic, professor of neurology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Jankovic estimates that as many as 60 percent of cases of Tourette syndrome, which usually starts between the ages of 5 and 8 and is more common in boys, are diagnosed by parents after watching such TV shows as "L.A. Law" and "Gerald," both of which have featured the disease.

Jankovic said the symptoms of Tourette, a central nervous system disorder, can range from excessive blinking to coprolalia, uncontrolled outbursts of obscenities.

"Physicians may misdiagnose the condition because they believe that the early, relatively mild symptoms are just mannerisms peculiar to a specific patient when in fact they are early signs of Tourette," Jankovic said.

Jankovic and colleagues at Baylor are seeking to locate the gene responsible for Tourette in families. Once that is located, all kinds of doors may eventually be opened to the prevention of the affliction.

"The chief feature of all Tourette symptoms," Jankovic said, "is 'disinhibition.' Patients are unable at times to stop themselves from acting out certain behaviors."

Motor and vocal tics are the most obvious signs of

Tourette, a hereditary condition, that can affect family members in different ways, said Jankovic, who heads the Movement Disorders Clinic at Baylor and The Methodist Hospital.

Vocal tics may include excessive throat clearing, sniffing, grunting and repetition of words and sentences. Motor tics include repetitious eye blinking, shoulder shrugging and head jerking.

The uninhibited behavior of some Tourette patients frequently leads to the assumption, even by physicians, that the children are hyperactive.

"And that can result in the use of Ritalin, a drug that can help hyperactive people but aggravate the condition of those with Tourette."

More disabling symptoms include obsessive/compulsive behavior, panic attacks and short attention span.

Such symptoms can lead to the mistaken assumption that patients are lacking in intelligence when, in fact, they are generally of normal intelligence, Jankovic said. Many are musically talented; Wolfgang Mozart is believed to have suffered from Tourette syndrome.

Currently, medication can be used to control many symptoms of Tourette or at least to bring them under control. The use of such prescribed drugs can allow patients to enjoy lives less frequently complicated by such factors as excessive tics and coprolalia.

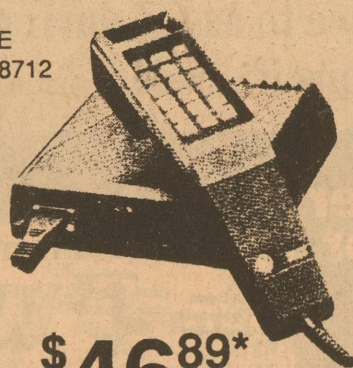

### Guidlines For National School Lunch Program

The Schleicher County Independent School District serves meals each school day. Students in grades K-3 may buy lunch for \$1.00; grades 4-6 for \$1.10; grades 7-12 for \$1.20 and adult visitors for \$3.45. Students may buy breakfast for 50 cents and adults for 75 cents.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40 cents for lunch and 25 cents for breakfast.

**TO GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. FEDERAL LAW WILL NOT ALLOW US TO APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.**

**HOW TO APPLY**

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's

"personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all the children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

**Verification:** Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

**Reporting Charges:** If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because they get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

**Confidentiality:** School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

**Reapplication:** You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, complete an application then.
