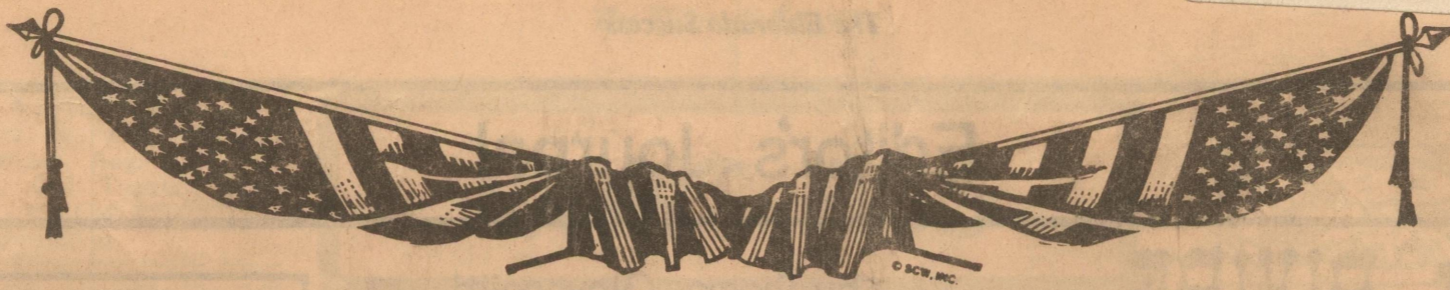

Time to Register Brands

Cattlemen and stock-farmers who own cattle, sheep, goats or hogs and have registered brands must re-register or record their brands or earmarks every 10 years with the county clerk's office of the county in which the animals are located or usually range, according to Schleicher county Clerk Helen Blakeway.

Brands were last registered on August 30, 1981, so it is time for the owner to secure that same brand if they wish to do so, she said.

According to Article 144.041 of the Agriculture Code, the owner of the brand has six months from August 30, 1991 to claim his brand by re-registering it. After that six-month period, anyone may register the brand and the owner stands a chance of losing it, she cautioned.

Helen said county clerks all over Texas will begin registering brands on August 30. The fee for registering or recording a brand is \$5 per brand per location on the animal.

Peaslee Honored

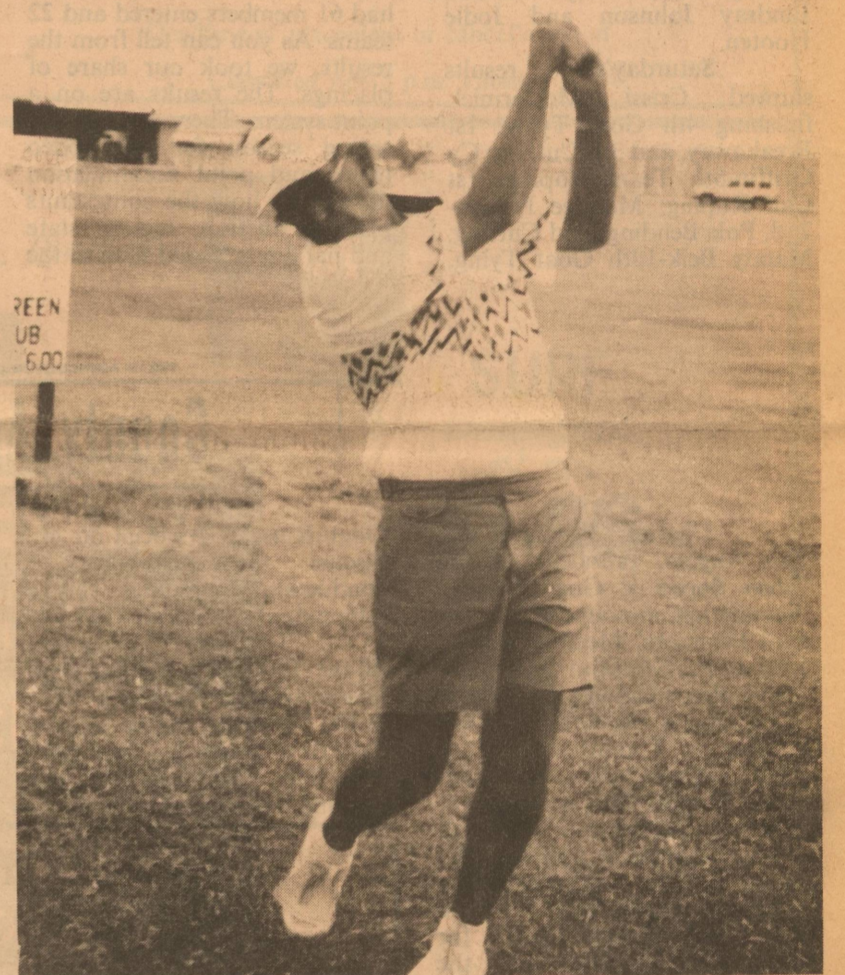
Deborah G. Peaslee, MD, of Eldorado, Texas, was recently elected to fellowship in the American Academy of Pediatrics.


following the coffee at the 5th Street House.

Labor Day Deaths Predicted

The Texas Department of Public Safety estimates that as many as 31 persons could lose their lives on the state's roadways during the upcoming 78-hour Labor Day holiday period.

"Labor Day is the last holiday of summer and we want them to be around for future holidays," said DPS Assistant Director Lt. Colonel James R. Wilson. "The way to have a safe Labor Day on the roadway is to avoid drinking and driving, drive inside the speed limits and wear your safety belt."

Last year, 33 persons died during the 78-hour Labor Day holiday, with late-reported deaths and deaths due to injuries bringing the final count to 40. Of those deaths, 25 (63 percent) were attributed to either excessive speed or DWI, Wilson said.

This year's Labor Day period, designated by the National Safety Council, is from 6 p.m. Friday, August 30 to midnight Monday, September 2.

"As part of our Operation Motorcade program, we will have all available Troopers on the roadways over the Labor Day weekend to assist motorists and to try to hold

down the traffic violations that can lead to fatal accidents," Wilson said.

One of the violations Troopers will be keeping an eye out for is failure to wear safety belt or use a child restraint. Last year, of the 32 fatalities in which seat belts could have made a difference, 88 per cent of those killed were not restrained, according to the DPS Statistical Services Section.

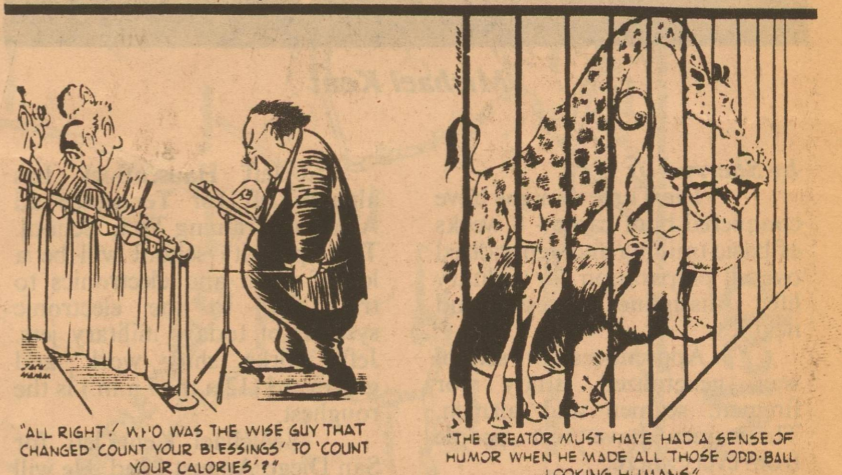
"If you do need help this Labor Day, or any time you are travelling in rural areas of the state, please remember the DPS maintains a toll-free telephone number -- 1-800-525-5555," Wilson said. "Use this number to report accidents, road hazards, suspected drunk drivers or other emergencies."

Periodically throughout the Labor Day holiday, the DPS will be reporting on the number of traffic fatalities occurring across the state.

"We never make these fatality estimates to show how accurate we can be," Wilson said. "We always hope the estimate is high. The more wrong we are, in this case, the more pleased I'll be. Please drive carefully."

Health Alert

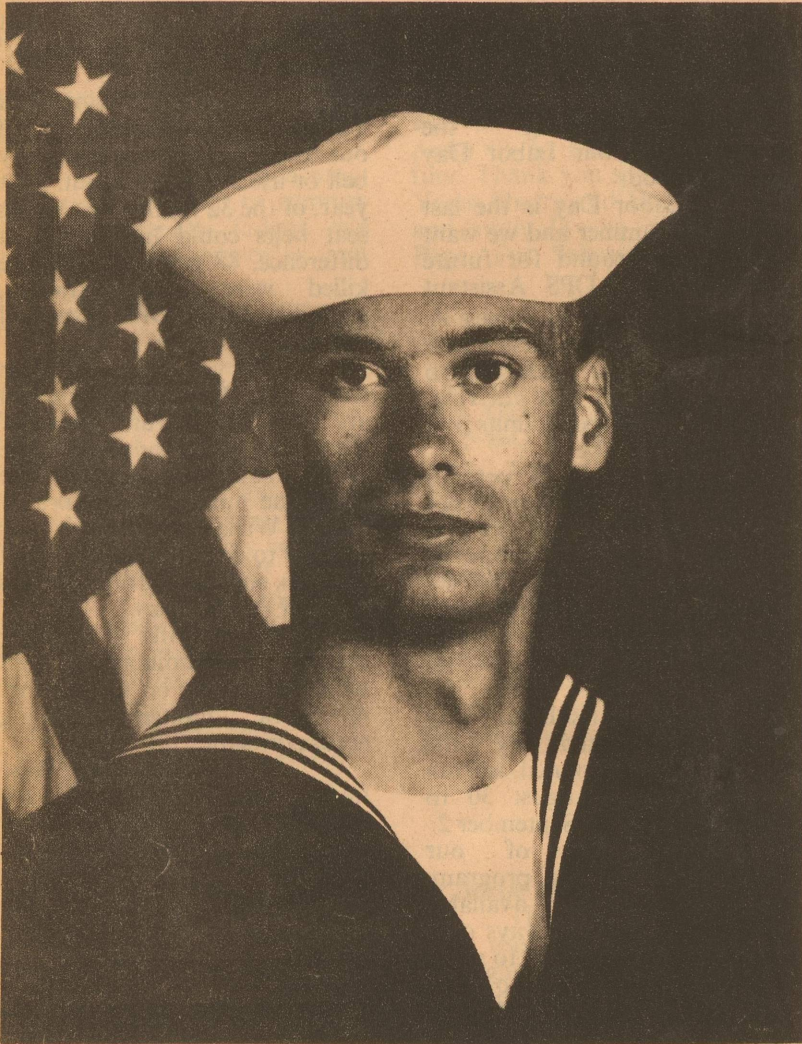

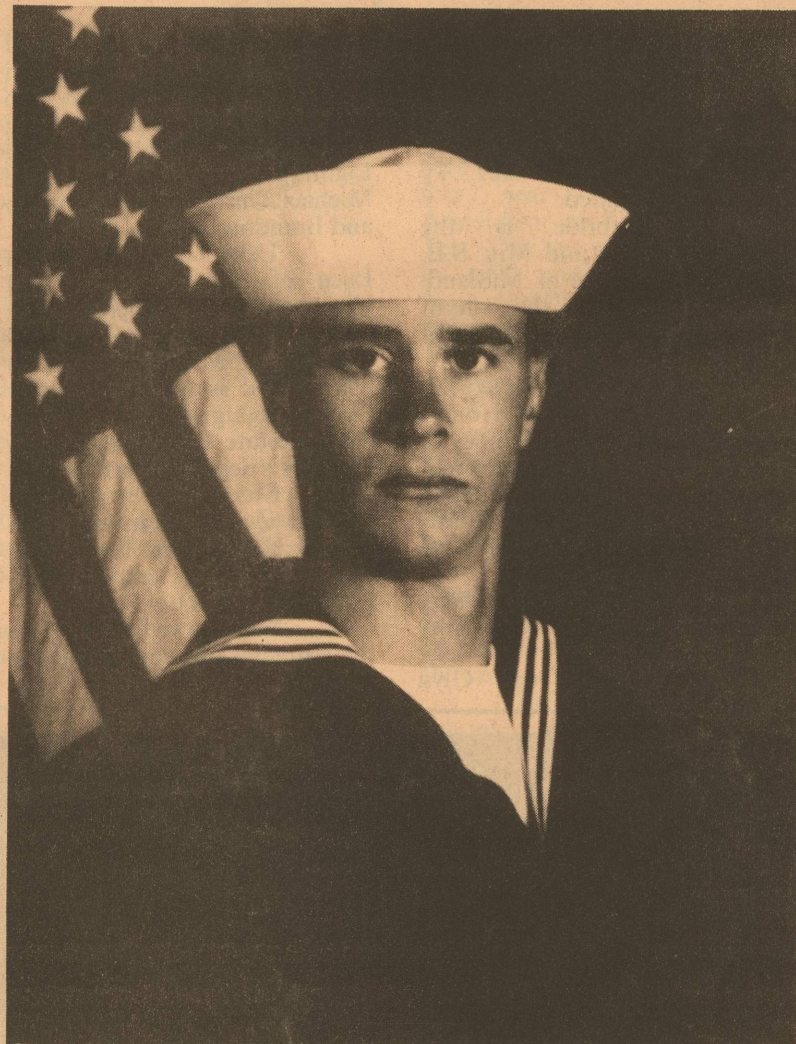

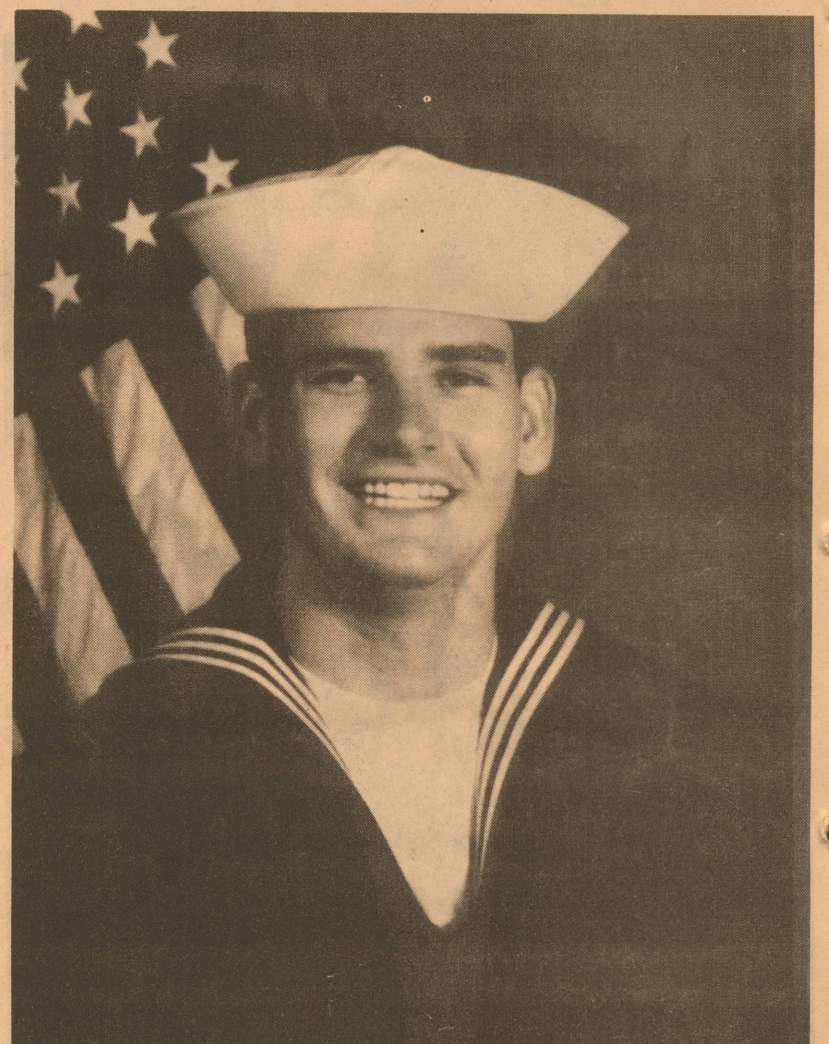
Kent, Hausenfluck and Pfluger Complete Basic Training

Auto Insurance Required

Beginning September 1, Texans will be required to show proof of financial responsibility before they can get a driver's license, renew a license or have their motor vehicle inspected, according to DPS Director Col. Joe E. Milner.

"This may seem like an inconvenience to law-abiding Texans, but in the long run, this new law should help protect all motorists by increasing the number of persons who have the legally required auto liability insurance," Milner said.

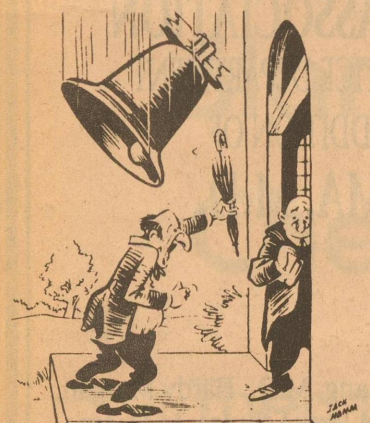
Texas motorists have been required since 1981 to have auto liability insurance, but only about 75 per cent of the state's drivers have valid policies in force.

Also effective September 1, the fine for not having liability insurance will be

increased from \$75 to \$175-\$350. Repeat offenders will have to pay \$350 to \$1,000 and face the possibility of having their vehicle impounded for 180 days.

"Starting September 1, anyone wishing to renew his driver's license, get a license for the first time or needing to get a motor vehicle inspected will be required to show proof of financial responsibility at our Driver License offices or Motor Vehicle Inspection Stations," Milner said. "For most Texans, it will be a simple matter of showing a wallet card issued by their insurance company."

The new law also requires a person to have proof of financial responsibility before obtaining vehicle licence plates, which are made available through the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation.



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Health News

Breast cancer is the most common type of cancer in women, and is the number one death cause from cancer in women in the U.S.A. One out of eleven American women will develop breast cancer. The chance of getting breast cancer doubles if your mother or sister has had it, and triples if both your mother and sister have had it. If you have had cancer in one breast, the chance of getting cancer in the other breast increases four to five times. Women who started their menstrual cycle before 12 years of age, or go through menopause after 50 are at

greater risk of getting breast cancer. Women who do not have a baby until they are 35, or never have had a baby are also at slightly greater risk of breast cancer.

The current guidelines of the American Cancer Society are:

- 1) Self breast examination once a month beginning at age 20, looking for a single, non tender, firm to hard mass with ill-defined margins.
- 2) Baseline mammograms between the ages of 35 and 40.
- 3) Mammograms every other year between the ages of 40 and 49.

4) Yearly mammograms after the age of 50.

5) Women with a personal or family history of breast cancer should consult their physician about the need for earlier and more frequent exams.

Although the average

age women get breast cancer is about 61, women in their early twenties can also get it. Following these guidelines, and consulting with your physician, can lead to early detection of breast cancer which could determine if you can fight the cancer successfully or not.

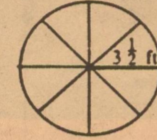

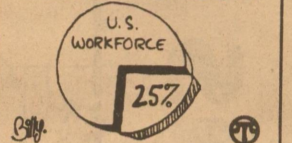

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

He volunteers for the ambulance services for Schleicher County.
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
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
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
