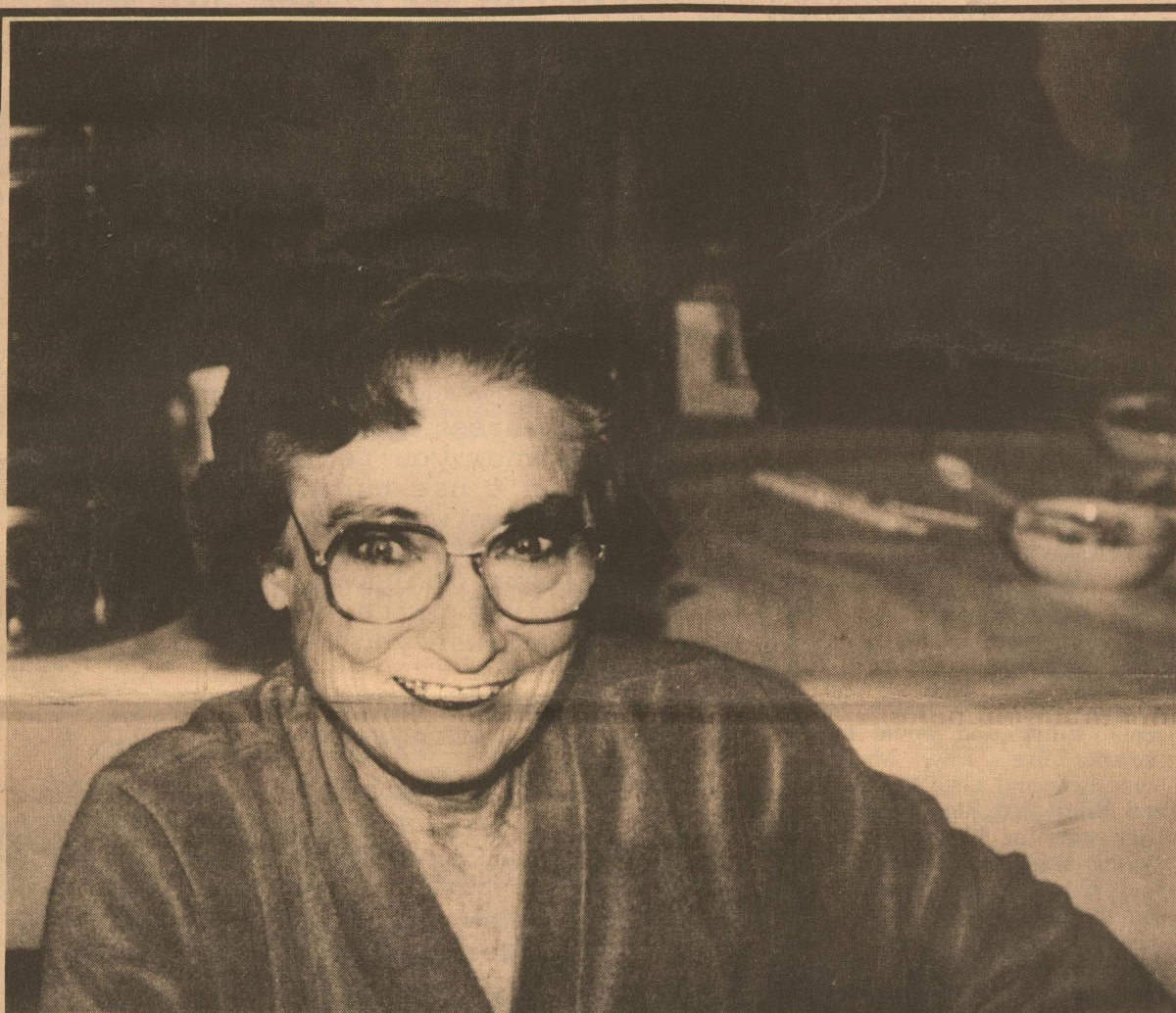

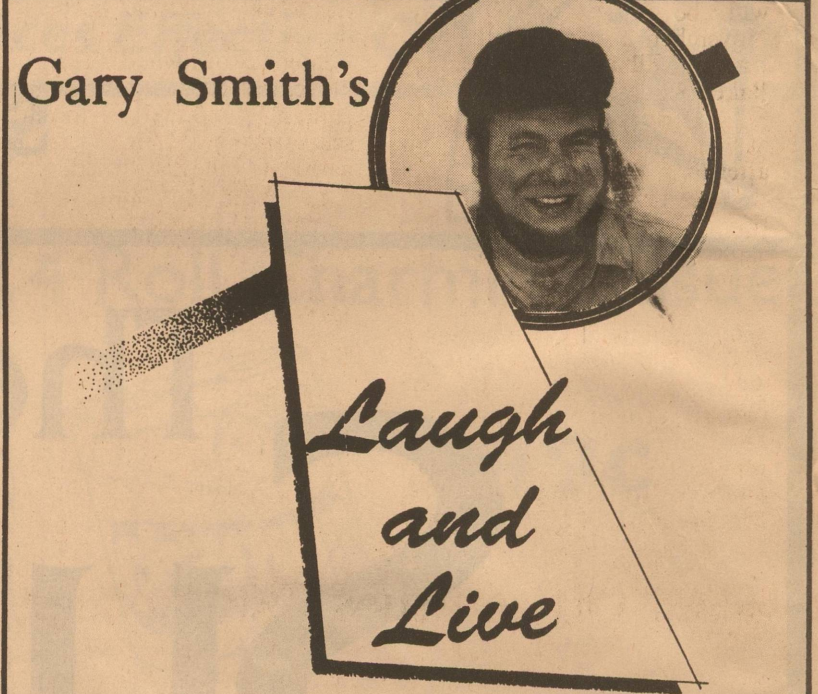
Letter To The Editor

ASCS Office Issues CRP Payments

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) annual rental payments have been issued to fourteen producers according to Ronnie Mittel, local ASCS Director. Some 2,180 acres of Schleicher County cropland has been removed from Agriculture production and has been seeded to permanent grasses. The

average annual rental payment on this acreage is \$37.28.

Most of this acreage has a good grass cover and is providing a good habitat for deer, turkey and quail. This acreage cannot be grazed for a period of ten years. The 12th CRP sign-up period will be June 15 - 26, 1992.

just the same as ours. I had at that time never had the privilege of living in an area where the water always tastes like you just washed your socks in it. Having spent the last 25 or so years in places like Midland and Houston, I have learned to appreciate what those strangers were talking about.

We, here in Schleicher County are fortunate enough to have an underground aquifer that is as pure and plentiful as any in Texas; or in most of the U.S. for that matter. These qualities, however, make it easy for us to take it for granted. We assume that it will always be there when we want it and pure when we get it. In recent years, new developments such as secondary and tertiary hydrocarbon recovery projects in neighboring counties and increased demands and supply shortages in metropolitan areas such as San Antonio have made this assumption a luxury which we can no longer afford.

Less than 5% of the water in our world is fresh. A very large portion of that has become in recent years too polluted for consumption without serious chemical treatments. In several Arab countries today you can buy a gallon of gas for 40 cents but a gallon of fresh water costs almost \$5.00. This last summer

in California they were considering purchasing water from Canada and importing it in super tankers. We have a resource in our County which has the potential in the next few decades of being worth more than all the oil and gas which we have or will produce. That is, if we take care of it and use it wisely. Our aquifer is so pure that we could suffer salt water contamination of 10 times our original chloride concentration before any of us with uncalibrated tongues could taste the difference. By that time, it would be too late. It is almost impossible to clean up an aquifer such as ours after it has been polluted.

Steve Williams and several other concerned citizens along with Cindy Cawley are gearing up the Plateau Underground Water Conservation and Supply District to study and monitor our aquifer. They will be asking for a tax increase to finance the work. I am as tired of tax increases as anyone else, especially when I see how most of our tax dollars are spent, but I don't believe we can afford to not pay this one.

By the way, Jack Etheredge was right. We do have the best water in the world right here in Eldorado. Let's do everything we can to keep it that way.

County Agents Report

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is launching a pilot project to enhance the quality of life of Hispanic families in Texas.

The Una Vida Mejor (A Better Life) project is being funded by a \$1.4 million grant from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, Mich. Una Vida Mejor will help Hispanic families assess their needs and acquire knowledge and skills to meet them. The grant will be used to help Hispanics improve their quality of life by enhancing leadership, education, parenting skills, diet, money management and community environments.

The pilot project will be conducted initially in Hidalgo, Cameron and Webb counties in South Texas.

"Texas has an Hispanic population that is growing at twice the rate of the overall population," said Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, Extension Service director. "This puts the Extension Service in a unique position to address model programming for Hispanics that will have application throughout Texas and across the nation."

The Una Vida Mejor project will place special emphasis on identifying approaches to help young people stay in school, resulting in a lower dropout rate. The project also will seek to increase the leadership skills of limited-resource Hispanics so they can attain greater self-sufficiency and function from their own strengths.

The Extension Service was selected for the grant

because of its strong record of education and genuine commitment to work with Hispanic audiences, Carpenter said.

"The Extension Service has a wealth of information and educational programs that are of interest to Hispanic audiences. These resources will be adapted to better meet specific needs, and additional programs will be tested during the pilot project," he said.

The Kellogg grant will be used to employ technical assistants who will recruit and train volunteers. The volunteers will teach families and youth and support local neighborhood groups with leadership and educational experiences.

"The Extension Service is in a position to foster relationships with other institutions, agencies and industries skilled in and committed to working with Hispanic audiences," Carpenter said. "We will be cooperating with these groups to provide new opportunities, change existing services and help secure additional resources to try to meet the needs of Hispanic families."

Project results will measure the increased leadership of Hispanics, school participation of young people from targeted areas, effectiveness of educational programs, and increased ability of the Extension Service to work with Hispanic audiences, Carpenter said. Based on project results, Una Vida Mejor will be replicated across the state and, ultimately, around the country.

Sciatica is the inflammation of the sciatic nerve. The sciatic nerve is the longest nerve in the body.

Sciatica usually causes pain down the back of one leg, although in some cases it causes pain down both legs. Sciatica can cause the feeling of numbness, prickling, tingling, pins and needles, burning, tenderness, and sharp pain in the back of the thigh, calf and foot. In a few cases, it can cause pain in the front of the leg. The pain may be dull, throbbing, or stabbing like a knife. Sciatica can make bending, standing, walking, sitting, and sleeping almost impossible.

It can be caused by trauma which causes spinal misalignment, arthritis, diabetes,

a tumor, an irritated disk, or spasm of the piriformis muscle. There is usually no quick fix for sciatica but, spinal adjustments, physical therapy, and muscle relaxers can help help to relieve the symptoms.

Unofficial City Council Minutes

A Regular Meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held Tuesday, October 8, 1991, at 7:30 P.M. at the City Hall. All Councilmembers were present with the exception of Mayor Nikolauk, who arrived during the meeting. Meeting was called to order by Mayor Pro Tem Randy Mankin. Approximately 13 citizens were present.

PUBLIC HEARING AMENDMENT #6 TO UTILITY ORDINANCE #101-89:

Public Hearing on proposed Amendment #6 to the Utility Ordinance #101-89 was opened by Mayor Pro Tem Mankin. Following response to questions regarding the need for the Amendment, motion was made by Debbie Ballew and seconded by Jeri Whitten that the Amendment #6 be approved. Motion carried. The Amendment assesses charges for damages to City-owned water and gas valves, addresses lighting of gas pilots and running leak surveys, establishes non-acceptable items in dumpsters, and prohibits non-authorized use of the City dumpsters.

CHAMBER PRIDE COMMITTEE

Members of the Chamber Pride Committee and representatives of Beta Sigma Phi Sorority met with the Council to encourage adoption of policies to enforce lot cleanup and removal of junked and/or abandoned vehicles. Pat Sykes and Mary Jo Hill reviewed procedures incorporated into example ordinances from Huntington, Big Lake, and other cities. After discussion, Mayor Pro Tem Mankin appointed a Committee composed of Pat Sykes, Jo Ann Sproul, Jay Ray Holley, Lewis Whitten, himself and the Secretary to prepare drafts for Council review.

BILL HODGES:

Bill Hodges met with the Council to review a drainage problem in Glendale Addition. He stated that although he had met with the Council previously, the City has not followed through to take necessary measures to keep runoff water out of his and his neighbors' homes. He proposed that the Council install a curb and underground drainage to Hwy. 277. Jack Dean, Utilities Superintendent, stated that an engineering firm had reviewed the situation and made their recommendation to install a drainage ditch and a dike at the edge of Glendale in adjacent pastureland on the North. After discussion, Mr. Dean was instructed to make an estimate of costs for the curb, working with Mr. Hodges to determine the locations needed. Following installation of the curb, if approved by the Council, underground drainage could be pursued if needed. Mr. Dean was asked to speak with Dr. Brame about placing a dike on his property.

SAFETY TRAINING:

Pat Ragsdale outlined his proposed Safety Training Program, including documentation necessary to meet TWCC requirements, film library offerings, and presentation time and costs. He proposed \$25.00/hr. for his time to prepare, present and document. The current billings were reviewed, and motion was made by Dora Bosmans and seconded by Jay Ray Holley that they be approved for payment. Motion carried.

SANITATION RATE/ PROCEDURES UPDATE:

The Secretary distributed breakdown of commercial sanitation rates and reviewed the costs proposed by Seton for additional dumpster stickers. After discussion, it was unanimous that the stickers not be pursued. Each Councilmember was asked to review the breakdowns and be prepared to discuss the issue further at the next meeting to determine commercial rates.

SELF-INSURANCE (W/COMP) UPDATE:

The Secretary distributed report showing funds received and disbursed from the Self-Insurance fund since it was established 1/1/91 in lieu of continuing coverage under a workers' compensation insurance policy. Anticipated expenses with regard to Claude Spencer's injury were outlined. It

was reported that Mr. Spencer had returned to work; however, not all the billings had been received for submittal to Fidelity Security Insurance for reimbursement.

LEGAL OPINIONS:

It was reported by the Secretary that she had visited with the City's attorney and the status of the Nix sewer line has been determined by the existence of written policy governing extensions. Concerning the landfill road ownership question, ownership had been previously determined in favor of the City. Discussion was held about the upcoming COG Regional Solid Waste Meeting to be held October 22 in San Angelo and two meetings on October 24 and 25. More information will be obtained to determine participation in the meetings. Future status of the landfill was briefly discussed, as well as Sub-Title D implications.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:

Mr. Dean reported that the treatment of the wastewater plant had resulted in test results, after one month, much lower (BOD 44, TSS 56, pH 9.1). Mr. Dean reported that the irrigation pump needed additional repairs and that he had obtained a substitute pump and switch box from the Texas Surplus Property Agency for less money than the repairs to the pump.

1991 TAX LEVY:

Pursuant to Tax Code 26.09, motion was made by Jay

Ray Holley and seconded by Dora Bosmans that the 1991 tax levy be approved. Taxable value is \$21,126,660 with tax levy of \$163,963.17 (\$100,575.55 M & O and \$63,387.62 I & S).

ARSON ORDINANCE:

Proposed Ordinance #103-91 revising Arson Reward from \$100.00 to \$250.00 was reviewed. In addition to passage of the Ordinance and posting of placards offering the reward, a Fire Dept. survey of roof types would further reduce the insurance key rate in Eldorado. Motion was made by Randy Mankin and seconded by Jeri Whitten that Ordinance #103-91 be approved. Motion carried.

RAYTHEON SANITATION:

After review, motion was made by Debbie Ballew and seconded by Dora Bosmans that the proposal to Raytheon for sanitation pickup at the Pave Paws facility be raised from \$910/month to \$960/month effective with the period beginning October 1, 1991, and ending September 30, 1992. Motion carried.

BLUE CROSS/BLUE SHIELD:

Proposals for group coverage were circulated; however, any savings from raising the deductibles to \$250 and \$500 were minimal. The Secretary reported that supplemental coverage could be included in the City's cafeteria plan and further information would be forwarded by White & Zesch's office prior to the November 1 renewal date.

ANIMAL CONTROL/ NIGHT WATCH:

Summary of animal control activity from January 1, 1991, until September 30, 1991, was distributed for the Council's review. The report showed 60 dogs picked up along with 38 cats for a total cost of \$1086.00 in euthanasia and lodging fees.

Mr. Dean reported that the nightwatch operation was continuing without problems.

ON CALL PROCEDURES:

The current on-call procedures were discussed. No changes were proposed at the present time, with the Council to further review the matter at a later date as necessary.

TRUCK BYPASS:

Due to failure to receive a response from Concho Concrete since the 2/6/91 offer, Mayor Nikolauk instructed the Secretary to write Mr. Cain that the Council is still very much

interested in the property for a truck bypass, and should the Council's offer not be responded to within 30 days, condemnation procedures will be instigated in order to obtain the property.

COUNCIL PROJECT DELEGATION:

As a follow-up to the Council orientation, each Councilmember was asked to pick an area which they would learn more about during the upcoming year. The following areas were selected: Landfill - Randy Mankin; Streets - Jeri Whitten; Gas Dept. - Jay Ray Holley; Sewer Dept. - John Nikolauk; Office - Dora Bosmans; Water Dept. - Debbie Ballew; Public Relations - John Nikolauk.

With no further business, meeting adjourned at 12:40 A.M.

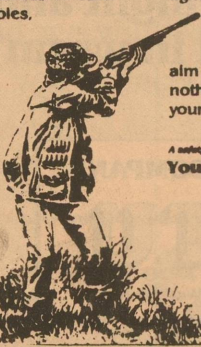

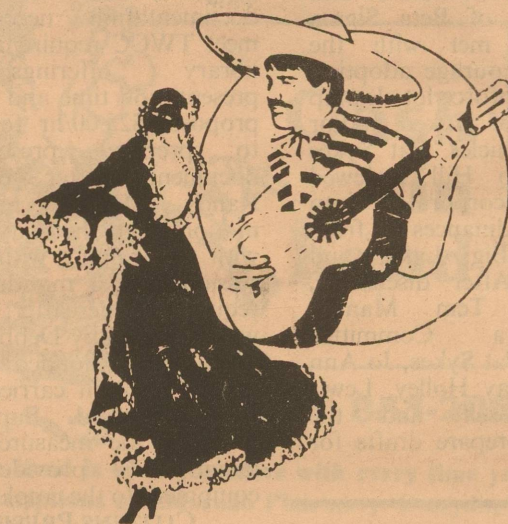

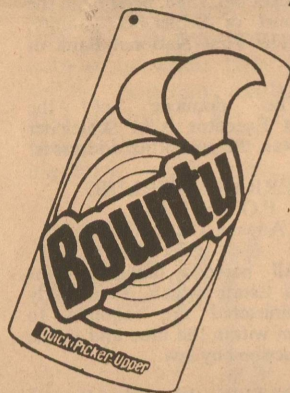
