time of 13:53. Other runners for Eldorado were: Lou Ann Peaslee-12th, Christi Rodriguez-16th, and Cory Barton-18th.

The Girls J.V. also ran in this meet. Their results are as follows: Tamra Robledo-1st, 14:33; Suyen Hernandez-2nd, 14:58; Mary Ann Rodriguez-4th, 15:24; Catharina Gower-6th, 16:03.

The first runner for the boys was Hele Sanchez. He placed 3rd with a time of 16:59. Homero Hernandez placed 9th with a time of 17:49. Other

runners for the boys were: Felix Ochoa-20th, 18:37; Joaquin Covarrubiaz-21st, 18:39; and Daniel Hernandez-29th, 19:30.

Coach Harvey Wink said that the Girls team has a good chance to go to the State Meet. According to Coach Wink the Boys team could do very well if they are able to win over Ozona.

The Regional Meet will be held in Lubbock, this Saturday. The Meet begins at 9:00 at Maye-Simmons Park, on the corner of Quirt and 19th Streets.

STUDY FINDS LIVE OAKS USING MORE WATER ON RANGELANDS THAN CEDARS

Researchers are finding that the stately live oak trees that are usually prized on rangelands tend to consume more water than those scrubby-looking junipers.

"Many people have thought that juniper, or cedar, used most of the available water on a rangeland, prevented grass growth and, in this area, reduced water flowing underground into the Edwards Aquifer," said Dr. Keith Owens, a range scientist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Uvalde.

"The study indicates that, during times of high or adequate rainfall, less water is available to grasses or shrubs on oak dominated rangeland than in juniper-dominated areas," Owens said.

Also, in a direct comparison made over a two-year period, cedar trees used about 50 percent less water than oak trees.

Live oaks are usually valued on Texas rangelands for shade and forage. Cedar, on the other hand, is often considered the "bad guy" in rangeland management.

In a three-year study, conducted on the Ahnandale Ranch in northern Uvalde

County, researchers found that juniper uses relatively small amounts of water consistently, while oak trees vary their consumption according to the amount of water available.

The scientists found that the cedar trees photosynthesized at the same rate all the time, no matter how much or how little rain they received. The oak trees increased their rate of photosynthesis as water availability increased.

In times of extreme drought, the juniper maintained almost the same water use as

other times, while the live oak tree decreased water use slightly.

The scientists worked on plots between the Dry Frio and Frio Rivers on the watershed of the Edwards Aquifer, studying the impact of brush control on the availability of water for forage production and aquifer recharge.

"Water is becoming a limited resource, and this project was designed to calculate how water yield is influenced by these two native trees," the predominant species in the watershed, he said. The project is not complete, but scientists

have compiled significant data on the trees' water use.

Comparisons were made by measuring water use by six trees of each species similar in height, diameter and leaf area.

The gas exchange between the leaf and air was measured with an infrared gas analyzer. Water use and growth was estimated by measuring the physiological activity of the leaves of both trees. The measurements varied by such factors as the size of the leaf, amount of light, leaf temperature and relative

owens acknowledged that the cedar may send down a deeper tap root, drawing water at deeper levels than the oak.

"We haven't been able to test that because of the extremely rocky soils," he said.

In another aspect of the study, the researchers sought to determine how much trees increased their water use after neighboring trees and brush had been removed.

The researchers found that the distribution of remaining trees after clearing brush greatly affects water availability. When 20 trees are left scattered on 20 acres, they will harvest water over the whole area. If they are left in small groups, the more limited spread of their roots will affect a smaller area.

"I think the pattern of trees left after a brush management program is going to be a major factor in determining water availability from rangeland," Owens said.

"Our research indicates that oak-dominated rangelands may not be the most water efficient landscape. The question is: how can you leave trees to benefit you, your range, or your wildlife and livestock?" Clumps or strips of trees need to be worked into management plans, he said.

"It's not ecologically or environmentally feasible to remove all of the trees from land."

The AARP sponsored free income tax counseling service, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service, needs volunteers to establish a Counseling Site in Eldorado to help taxpayers with their returns. This service provides free tax preparation assistance and counseling to the Elderly, Retired and dny other persons in need of help in completing non-complex 1040, 1040A & 1040EZ federal income tax returns. This service also offers information regarding tax credits for child care and elderly.

Training of volunteers for this very important public service will be provided by IRS & AARP instructors. Training

sessions will be held at the O.C. Fisher Federal Bldg. in San Angelo beginning Monday Jan. 6 and end on Thursday Jan 9. Lodging and food expenses will be reimbursed by AARP as appropriate.

Upon completion of Training a Counselor will be required to offer this tax-aid service one half day per week from February 3 thru April 15, 1992.
