Overstreet Seeks Office Of County Attorney

Local attorney, Marian Bland Overstreet, has announced that she will be an independent write-in candidate in the general election in November for the position of County Attorney.

Ms. Overstreet opened her law practice in Eldorado in December of 1991. She is a graduate of Eldorado High

School and a graduate of Baylor Law School where she was a member of the Harvey M. Ritchie Moot Court Society. She was an officer in the Delta Theta Phi Law Fraternity and an officer of the Student Bar Association. She also was an intern for the U.S. Attorney's office and the U.S. Bankruptcy Court.

According to Ms. Overstreet, she is running for this office because she feels that she would make a good County Attorney and would like to work for the people of Schleicher County.

Said Marian, "Having grown up here, I think I understand the views and lifestyles of the people of our county. I am certain that I will be able to bring assistance to the citizens of Schleicher County, if I am elected."

"I believe strongly in our justice system," Ms.

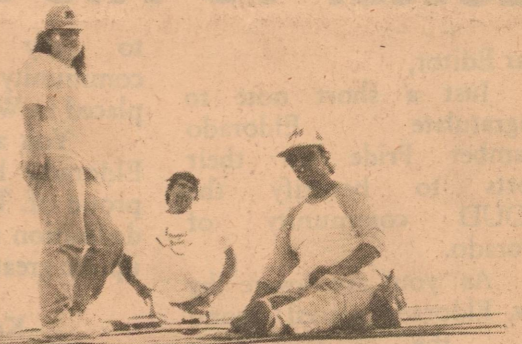
Overstreet continued, "I think that people who break the law need to be prosecuted."

Eldorado V.F.D. Warns About Firework Safety

Using fireworks safely can reduce the number of fires and injuries caused by fireworks. Listed below are some safety precautions from the Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department:

1. Purchase fireworks only from a vendor that displays a State Fire Marshal's Office retail fireworks permit.
2. Remember that many cities and communities regulate the possession and use of fireworks. Contact the local fire department or law enforcement authorities for rules in your community.
3. Never let children use fireworks. Always designate a responsible, sober adult to ignite the fireworks.
4. Use fireworks outdoors only, in a clear area away from houses and flammable materials, such as grass, trees, gasoline cans or wooden decks. Be sure that the fireworks, especially aerial fireworks, will not contact or land on potentially dangerous objects, such as power lines or automobiles.
5. Keep a bucket of water nearby while setting off

fireworks. Use the water to douse any malfunctioning fireworks or accidental fires and to immerse minor burns. Also use this bucket of water for disposing of used sparklers.

6. Keep everyone, especially children under 15 years old, a safe distance away from the area where the fireworks are ignited.

7. Read and follow the directions exactly.

8. Never touch a firework after it has been lit. If the firework malfunctions, do not try to relight it or pick it up. Carefully douse all used fireworks with water.

9. Never experiment with fireworks. Don't take fireworks apart or mix anything with the contents. Never make fireworks at home. Don't set off fireworks in metal, glass or other types of containers.

10. After you have finished lighting fireworks, cool the remains with water. Then collect all used fireworks materials and put them in a metal container. Cover with water again to reduce the chance of an accidental fire.

Health News

Sciatica is usually described as sharp shooting pain low the back of the thigh and can go down to the foot.

The sciatic nerve is the longest nerve in the body. It starts in the lower spine, splits and goes all the way down both legs. It controls the muscles and sensation in the lower extremities.

Sciatica will often produce tingling, burning, and stinging sensations down one or both legs and is usually worse at night. Following the problems in the leg or legs, the back will start to hurt, and can be muscle weakness in the legs.

Sciatica can be caused by incorrect lifting techniques, sitting for long periods of time, or an accident involving the low back, which can cause an intervertebral disc problem, an inflamed sciatic nerve, a muscle spasm in the buttock, region, a spinal misalignment, or all of the above.

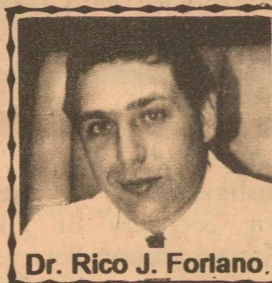
Sciatica can last from a few days to months. If it lasts

for months it can lead to wasting away of the muscles in the legs.

Solid Waste Education & Training Workshop Held

Community leaders from 7 cities in West Texas met in Big Lake, Texas, Friday, June 26, for Keep Texas Beautiful's second Solid Waste Education and Training workshop. The half-day workshop, funded by a grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, is designed to educate and train Texas communities about solid waste disposal

options and assist them in developing local solutions to waste and litter issues. Representatives from Big Lake, Eldorado, Iraan, Mertzon, Rankin, Barnhart and Sonora attended the workshop at the Reagan County Activity Center in Big Lake. The attendees included representatives from city and county governments, civic organizations, business and

industry leaders, educators, and law enforcement agencies. The workshop is part of the statewide Texas Communities Solid Waste Education and Training Program, funded primarily by a one-year grant to Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc., (KTB) from the U.S. EPA, Region 6, in the amount of \$97,982 (94.8% of total program funding). The overall goals of the training workshops are,

over the course of one year, to provide public education, technical assistance, and training services - promoting the best local integrated solid waste management options - to 40 communities of all sizes, in all parts of Texas, and to motivate those communities to take action on those options. "Keep Texas Beautiful works to find grassroots solutions to local solid waste

and litter issues," said KTB Chairman Bill Yenne. "By bringing in a diverse coalition of community leaders from each of these cities and training them on solid waste issues and options, we hope to help all Texas communities better manage their waste and give them a blueprint for local community improvement."

KTB has trained six regional representatives to conduct these workshops throughout the state. Sharla Hotchkiss of Keep Midland Beautiful, a Keep Texas Beautiful Affiliate Community, lead this workshop. Nick Harrison of Texas Forestry Service also presented information about Tree Grants. Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc., the non-profit state affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, Inc., provides grassroots solutions to Texas' solid waste and litter issues. KTB is celebrating 25 years of grassroots environmental leadership July 7-10 in San Antonio at the Annual KTB Convention.
