Emergency Care Attendant Class Offered

An ambulance is needed, you grab the phone and dial 911. What takes place during those first few minutes? The Sheriff's Office Dispatcher sets off a paging tone all over town, and ambulance volunteers carrying pagers are alerted to the call. Three to five of the ambulance people drop whatever they are doing and respond to the EMS building. Average time to man the ambulance is approximately four minutes. Not bad when you consider the volunteer could be mowing the lawn, cooking a meal, be at a school event with their children, or live on the edge of town.

Calling these people volunteers can be misleading. All of them have spent long hours studying and many more hours practicing their skills. Nearly all started out

with the 40 hour Emergency Care Attendant (ECA) course and most have earned their Emergency Medical technician (EMT) license.

Twelve hour shifts are set up with 5 man crews to maintain constant service to Schleicher County and Eldorado. Schleicher County Emergency Medical Service has furnished each member with a pager to provide more efficient services. This enables the ambulance crew on duty to go about their lives without having to stay at the EMS building when on call.

These volunteers do not receive any pay for time spent on actual runs or any other service to the community. The reason most volunteer their time is they are dedicated to helping others and working on the ambulance gives them that chance. It also enables

personnel to hold other permanent jobs and still pursue the medical field.

There is a need for more people to maintain the high level of service we now have in our community. Talk to some of the ambulance crew and get a closer view. It might be right up your alley.

Schleicher County Emergency Medical Service will tentatively sponsor an Emergency Care Attendant

(ECA) course starting July 27, 1992 on Monday and Thursday nights, 6:00 p.m.-10:00 p.m. The class should end around the first of September 1992. There will be one class on a Saturday for about 6 hours.

Health News

We all know that smoking is bad for our heart and lungs, but now there is a connection between smoking and low back pain.

Daily smoking has been shown to increase the risk of low back pain, especially for those under 45 years of age. The chances of having a prolapsed lumbar disc increases if you have smoked within the last year. There has been a link between smoking and osteoporosis in the spine.

Smoking can cause chronic coughing which increases the pressure in the disc which leads to a disc protrusion or disc prolapse. The nicotine from tobacco has been shown to decrease the blood flow to the vertebral bones of the back; the disc receives its nutrients from the vertebrae. These are probably the two main reasons smoking causes low back pain.

A study has shown smokers have a lower success rate with low back surgery. The study showed that non-

smokers had a 92% success rate while smokers only had a 60% success rate after surgery.

Because of all the side effects of smoking, it is to ones advantage to quit. If you want to quit smoking, you can quit cold turkey or you can use the latest way, which is the nicotine patch. The patches have had pretty good results. If you want to get the patches to quit smoking you should contact your medical doctor.

County Agents Report

Heavy winter and spring rains across much of Texas have created extra parasite problems for livestock producers.

Horn fly control has always been important for most ranchers, but this year it is even more so, said Dr. Allen Knutson, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Dallas.

These blood-sucking flies reduce weight gains and milk production in mother cows with calves, Knutson said. Weight gains worth \$2 to \$8 have been measured in experiments for every \$1 invested in horn fly control, he added.

Horn flies spend most of their time on the cow, the females leaving only for the few minutes it takes to lay eggs in freshly deposited manure. A single fly may feed up to 20 times a day.

Horn flies can be

successfully controlled with insecticides because the flies spend so much time on the cow and are soon exposed to a lethal dose. Insecticides can be applied with self-treatment devices such as dust bags, back rubbers, the LiquiDuster, and ear tags, or by using sprays, boluses, and feed supplements.

Ear tags have been commonly used because they combine an effective insecticide, a pyrethroid, with the ear tag, which is a slow release device. The result is several months of control.

"However, these very factors that make the tag so effective have led to their widespread use, and the increased resistance to pyrethroids in horn flies," he said.

Resistance occurs as season-long use of the same insecticide kills the

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WTU Offers \$25 Million of 7-3/4% First Mortgage Bonds

West Texas Utilities Co. sold \$25 million of 7-3/4% first mortgage bonds due June 1, 2007 to underwriters in a negotiated offering. The proceeds from the sale of the bonds will be used to refund \$25 million of 9-7/8% bonds due May 1, 2009.

According to Paul Douty, WTU's vice president of finance, this transaction will produce over \$2.5 million

of total savings for WTU which will help keep the company's costs down.

Morgan Stanley & Co. Incorporated is lead manager for the offering with Smith Barney, Harris Upham & Co. Incorporated as co-manager. The bonds are offered to the public at 99.329 % to yield 7.826% to maturity. The proceeds to WTU were 98.579%, resulting in a cost of money of 7.913%. The new

bonds are rated Aa2 by Moody's, AA- by Standard & Poor's and AA by Duff & Phelps' bond rating services.

WTU provides electric service to approximately 179,000 customers in a 53,000 square-mile area of central and west Texas. The company is a wholly owned subsidiary of Central and South West Corp., which is a public utility holding company based in Dallas.

susceptible horn flies, leaving only resistant pests to reproduce, he said. Soon, the resistant flies are dominant and the insecticide is no longer effective, he said.

There are several practices ranchers can follow to delay horn fly resistance, Knutson said.

Producers can rotate the pyrethroid tag with an organophosphate tag every one to three years. Resistance to organophosphate tags has not been documented in Texas.

Ranchers should apply tags or treat with insecticides only when horn fly numbers reach 200 to 300 per head. Research has indicated that fewer than 250 flies per animal rarely cause economic losses, he said.

Depleted tags should be

removed at the end of the horn fly season.

An organophosphate insecticide spray, dust or bolus may be used to kill pyrethroid-resistant flies.

"These practices allow some susceptible flies to survive and reproduce in the spring and fall, helping to dilute the resistant genes in the population. Tolerating a few horn flies actually helps slow resistance, making insecticides like pyrethroid ear tags effective when they are most needed," he said.

Certain insecticides in feed additives and boluses also control horn flies, he said. The active ingredient is an insect growth regulator called methoprene. It passes through the cow into the manure and kills the developing horn fly larvae, or

maggots.

Methoprene is neither a organophosphate or pyrethroid and therefore is effective in managing horn fly resistance by rotating insecticide doses, he said.

Boluses are applied once at the start of the fly season, and an insecticide spray can be used to kill adult flies present at the time boluses are administered.

"Animals should be observed after dosing to ensure that if boluses are regurgitated, the animal is treated again," he said.

Flies migrate between herds, so fly control in bolus-treated herds is improved if horn flies are controlled in adjacent herds. Knutson reminded producers to use unlined, rubber gloves when applying ear tags.

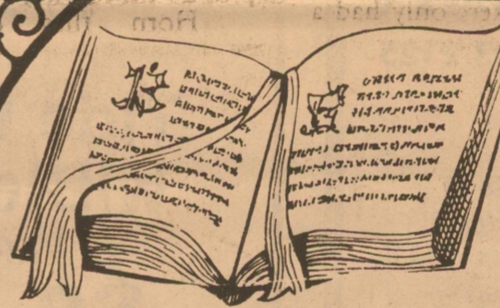

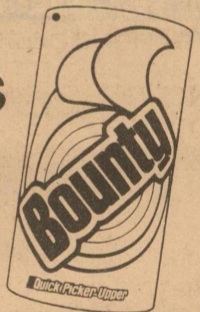
