SCMC Receives Grant

The Schleicher County Medical Center has received approval for a state grant for the replacement of energy inefficient heating and air conditioning units.

In April, 1991, the hospital participated in a technical assistance study. An architectural firm came to Schleicher County and determined that certain things could be changed at Schleicher County Medical Center to reduce the amount of energy usage. A proposal was

submitted to the Texas Department of Energy and a grant was approved.

This is a matching funds grant with SCMC paying for half of the cost and the State of Texas paying the other half. The grant is good for up to \$52,462.

In order to qualify for a grant of this type, the improvements must have a total payback time of less than ten years. By replacing the old roof units that the hospital is now using, with the matching grant, the hospital should save as much

as \$26,000 over the next ten years.

According to hospital administrator Jim Blum, the hospital would be unable to make these renovations without the grant. Blum also indicated that over \$2000 has been spent in the past 6 months in repairs to the current system.

Said Blum, "Much credit should be given to our hospital board and to the hospital staff. Many people are working very hard to bring quality medical services to Schleicher County."

Handbell Clinic Set

This Sunday, February 2, there will be a special handbell training clinic at the First Presbyterian Church from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. The guest clinician is Mr. Les Ackerman of Midland, currently Director of Music and organist at the First Presbyterian Church of Midland, and leader of several handbell choirs junior high through adult.

Les is a graduate of Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey, and has done graduate studies including a Master of Music in Organ Performance from Southern Methodist University, and a Master of Sacred Music from Perkins School of Theology in Dallas. He hails from a small

town in south central Pennsylvania.

Mr. Ackerman is currently on the faculty of Midland College where he is instructor of organ and piano. He is Dean of the West Texas Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, and belongs to the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia.

We are fortunate to be able to host Mr. Ackerman here in Eldorado. This is a hands-on working clinic dealing with handbell techniques, damping, tower swings, care of handbells, mallets, timing, etc.

Public Health Week - February 2-8

February 2-8, 1992 has been proclaimed as Public Health Week in Texas. Public health focuses on preventive health care strategies including, education, surveillance, and intervention when necessary.

The Texas Department of Health has been providing these services in our community for many years. The health department has programs for environmental health, dental treatment and education, nutrition education, communicable diseases control, Chronically ill and Disabled Children, Emergency Medical Services, health education, medical facility licensure and certification, and nursing services.

The Sonora Field Office is an important provider of valuable public health services for the community. Some of the services provided include child and adult health, family planning, maternity care, nutrition and education

programs for women, infants and children (WIC), sexually transmitted disease testing and counseling, education, and vision, hearing and speech testing.

Citizens Meet With SCISD Board

Approximately 100 Schleicher County citizens met with the Schleicher County Independent School Board last Thursday night.

School superintendent Larry Blair presented a time chart indicating the times at which he had been informed by State officials that the Middle School had been selected to participate in an honors program.

Scott Barton, middle school principal, presented a 5 point "wish list" that had been written by a panel of middle school teachers. This list had been presented to the selection committee of the Partner Schools Incentive Program. This list, according to Barton was what the middle school would like to do if they were not bound by traditional limitations.

School board president, Phil McCormick informed those present that no school calendar had been set and that the board had tried to inform the public as quickly as possible, to the events that have taken place regarding the Partnership in Schools program. He also stated that public hearings would be held before major changes to the school calendar would be made.

Many comments were made by citizens. These comments ranged from praise to the middle school for excellent work, to requests to the school board to send notes home with all students informing parents of school board decisions.

Curtis Griffin stated

that the only complaint that he had heard about the Partnership in Schools program was the calendar.

Randy Mankin commented that he thought that it was a problem of communication. That it appeared as if the board was hiding something.

Phil McCormick reiterated that school board meetings, by law, were open to the public.

Very positive comments were made by Hyman Sauer and Chris Graham. Sauer commented that the school board had a thankless job and that he, for one, thought that they were doing fine. Graham said that a sign should be erected taking note of the middle school's achievements. He further stated that if a sign was not erected in the school yard, then one would be erected in the front yard of the baptist parsonage.

Debbie Clark wanted to present the board with an agenda item that would mandate the school board to hold a public meeting within one month of January 23 to allow all registered voters in Schleicher county to decide whether or not to allow the Middle school to be involved with the Partnership school program.

County judge, Johnny Griffin stated to the school board that they were elected by the people and that the board needs to make decisions without public voting on issues. He

further stated that if people don't like actions of school board members, then the citizens should vote them out of office.

Elsa Williams commented that the purpose of the school system was to educate our children, not to act as a baby-sitting service. Williams went on to say that quality education was more important than scheduling inconveniences.

Thelma Bosman expressed a sense of pride in the school system and stated that she was proud to have gone to school here and that she is proud to be from Eldorado.

Karen Holley stated that she had been led to believe that the school was "glued to" the plans that the middle school had presented to the Partnership

Schools committee and was relieved to find out that that was not the case.

Glenda Harris said that she thought every one was proud of the school's accomplishments and that she thought that the problem had come from a lack of information.

McCormick agreed that there had been a communication problem. He stated that the problem in communication had been created by politics at the state level. The state, according to McCormick, had first told the school that the program could be announced, then that it could not, and then again that it could be announced.

The meeting ended at about 10:20.

Health News

BONING UP ON CALCIUM

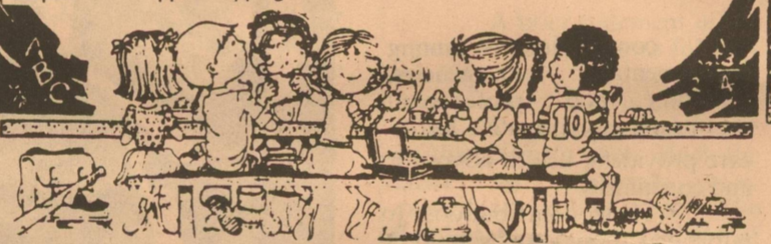
Osteoporosis, a condition that weakens bones by depleting bone density, affects nearly 25 million Americans. Recent studies by the human Nutrition research Center at Tufts University found that exercise and calcium prevented bone loss and increased bone density; but both work independently of one another.

Exercise helped prevent bone loss at the spine, whereas calcium strengthened the thigh bone, near the hip.

Best sources of calcium in foods are skim milk-based yogurt, skim milk, buttermilk, and mozzarella cheese.

Other excellent sources include salmon, bokchoy, kale, pinto and kidney beans, and broccoli. Spinach, although high in calcium, contains oxalic acid which negates the positive effect of calcium.

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SCISD Board Meets

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County Independent School District was held on January 23, 1992, at 6:00 p.m. in the Administration Building.

The meeting was called to order by Phil McCormick, President of the Board.

Board members interviewed two groups of prospective architects: Gary Keep and Gerald Jordon with SHW Group Inc. and Frank Callahan and Mitch Hinsic representing Callahan and Associates and "Speed Fab-Crete." Each group explained the process and fees they would use if they were selected as architects for the building of the new gym and cafeteria expansion. The next meeting with architects interested in the project is tentatively scheduled for February 6th. The Board will not act until several firms have been interviewed.

Dr. Blair then explained to the audience the Partnership Schools concept and the time restrictions that the school staff and board members had been under in dealing with the issue. Blair said that schools were selected on the basis of their past record for academic achievement (good test scores) and innovation (special programs they used to help students learn). Schools who had shown that they were successful would be made Partnership Schools with the Texas Education Agency and allowed to "free wheel" and come up with new ideas to do an even better job of helping students to learn. TEA rules and regulations will be relaxed on those campuses.

Because of the TEA time schedule imposed on the district, staff members had been given only ten days to create a "wish list" of innovative ideas that they would like to use on their campus if that campus were selected as a Partnership School. It was explained that being named as a Partnership School is a tremendous honor since out of 5000 campuses in the state of Texas only 84 were selected.

Then, Middle School Principal Scott Barton explained the five components of the plan that the Middle School had presented during the interview portion of the Partnership Schools selection process. The components were as follows: 1) A biosphere (something similar to a greenhouse) would be used for teaching a hands-on integrated science program. 2) Academic teaming would be used for middle school students. Groups of three to five teachers would be responsible for a given group of students. They would schedule and teach the students according to the students needs on a weekly basis. A student might need two hours of math per day for a week to help him/her over a difficult concept. Then the next week they might spend more time on science, etc. 3) A math lab would be created where students learned math

through hands-on experience and training. Those students would then in turn teach/tutor elementary students. The idea behind this is that you learn best what you have to teach. 4) A multi-culture program of language training would be taught to both students and teachers. A program would be developed to give teachers and students on the campus instruction in a second language. 5) A flexible calendar would be used to give students more frequent breaks during the school year to improve student motivation and retention. This calendar as proposed would have 165 days of classroom instruction as compared to the 180 days now interspersed throughout the school year. The sample calendar started school on August 3rd and ended it on June 3rd. Also, the calendar included several three-day weekends. A summer school would be held in July for students that had not mastered their work during the regular school year.

Dr. Blair and Mr.

Barton made it very clear that it is not necessary for the district to adopt any of the proposed components of the plan in order to be a Partnership School. Those components are simply a "pie in the sky" wish list. Each component would have to be studied thoroughly before it was actually adopted. For example, before a school calendar can be adopted, the needs of both the high school and elementary campuses would have to be considered (scheduling for athletics and band, etc.)

Board President Phil McCormick noted that the calendar is normally adopted around May of each year and much input from the school staff and the public will be needed during calendar hearings.

Many questions were answered concerning the Partnership Schools program and much support was shown for the fine job that the Middle School has done in order to achieve the award.

The meeting adjourned at 10:20 P.M.

Many early day residents of Schleicher County were said to have known Herman Lehmann. The book is an interesting account of Indians of this era and region.

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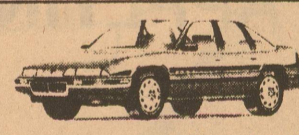
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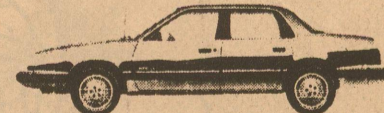
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1st Half Of Basketball Season Comes To An End
