### Eldorado Middle School Chosen For Pilot Effort

The Eldorado Middle School has been selected to participate in an innovative state-sponsored partnership venture. Only 82 schools in the State of Texas were selected for this honor. Although the Middle school was chosen, Eldorado High School was also a finalist in the selection process.

According to the director of Region XV Education Service Center, schools were chosen for their leadership, commitment and willingness to change.

According to Lionel Meno, Texas Commissioner of Education, this program was designed to encourage schools to develop their own ideas and to help students achieve academically.

The Middle School wants to teach a second language to both teachers and students. Innovative ideas for agricultural studies are being considered. Ideas for new school calendars are being discussed, but nothing definite has been decided.

According to the Schleicher County Independent School Board, a public hearing would be held before major schedule changes were made.

Said School superintendent Larry Blair, "This is quite an honor for

Schleicher County ISD. We have known for a long time that we have a good school system here in Eldorado. It is nice that the State of Texas has recognized what we have known all along. As an honored school, we are being asked to share what is that enables us to excel. For the next three to five years we will be developing ideas that hopefully will be used throughout the state in the future."

Middle school principal Scott Barton was quoted in the Standard-Times newspaper as saying, "I think we were chosen for our leadership ability and for being on the cutting edge of instruction." Barton also said that the Middle school teachers want to develop a math lab and send students from that lab to work with elementary students.

Last year, the Middle school was chosen as received the Governors Excellence in Education award.

Dear Mr. Smith,

Much misinformation seems to be going around concerning the Partnership Schools Initiative. First, the Board of Trustees has not adopted a school calendar for the 1992-93 school year and will not adopt one until many people have had an opportunity to give input. The Board did vote to support the Middle School in its recognition by the State of Texas through the Partnership Schools Initiative.

The Partnership Schools Initiative was created by the Texas Education Agency. Campuses that had proven to be outstanding educational institutions were to be identified and be recognized formally. A part of that recognition was the right to try something new as an award for being good. Each campus chosen as a finalist was given 9 days (December 1 to December 10) to develop a "wish" list of things it might want to do should it be chosen. Both Eldorado High School and Eldorado Middle School were notified on December 1 that each had been selected as a finalist.

The principal and faculty at each school went to work developing possible ideas that might be tried should the campus be selected as a "partnership school." One of the five ideas developed by the middle school was a modified school calendar in which the students would attend school for 165 days as opposed to 180 days and teachers would attend an additional 15 days of required training on instructional methodologies. There never was nor has there ever been an agreement that such a calendar would ever be used in Eldorado -

-it was simply one of five ideas put forth.

The perception that the Board voted to adopt a "year-round" calendar last Thursday is false. What the Board did vote to do was support the middle school's selection as a Partnership School because an honors banquet will be held in Austin on Sunday, January 26 for the recipients and SCISD needed to confirm that it was going to accept or reject the honor.

It is ironic that Eldorado has worked hard to gain a reputation as a good school district and then, when the rest of the State recognizes it, turmoil breaks out because of it. Our schools have achieved because our principals, teachers and students have worked hard. I personally am proud that they are being identified as exceptional. I do not believe that this misunderstanding should take from that effort because of misconceptions about going to school all year. We can accept the praise and not change the traditional calendar if that is what the community wants.

Be assured that the community has been heard. When the time comes to adopt a calendar it will be heard again. Also, think about letting those that worked so hard to excel know that you appreciate the fact that they did.

Dear Parents and Teachers of Eldorado,

On January 9, because of concern I had over rumors of a year round school schedule, I spoke to Dr. Blair about my concern. I was assured that it was just a rumor and that if any such action was taken, the parents and community would be informed well in advance before such action would be

taken. On Thursday, January 16, 1992, school board members, Phil McCormick, Dobs Lively, Mrs. Green, Mrs. Williams, Tip Finley and Chris McCravey voted to participate in the Partnership School Program. Scott McGregor voted to abstain. Needless to say when I heard of this I was very concerned.

I had spoken with parents, teachers and students who were totally against any change of schedule. We prepared a plan of action, starting with a petition to stop any further action on this proposal. Before we started getting signatures, I felt I should try for more information. I spoke to several school personnel who knew absolutely nothing of the vote Thursday, some who flatly denied that the board had taken the action, so I spoke to Phil McCormick for a straight and informative answer.

Mr. McCormick told me that the board did vote to participate in the Partnership School Program. This program will affect the amount of days

the middle school students will attend. They will attend 165 days instead of the 180 days now required. There will be longer breaks (days off) between learning sessions during the year and a shorter summer holiday of approximately 2 months. The problem is that the elementary and high school must use the same schedule and still incorporate 10 to 15 days into their schedule.

I was assured there will be town meetings to work out a suitable schedule. There are a lot of problems that must be worked out such as:

1. What do you do with a middle school child when his or her older siblings are in school and he or she is not? Parent's jobs, baby-sitters, family plans all need to be taken into consideration here.
2. Sport schedules will fall within time off days and our children will have to be at school anyway for practice and games.
3. Do we really want the state using our kids in an

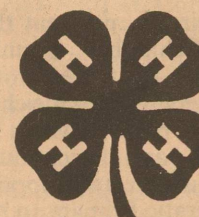

Volunteer efforts at constructing public parks, a major festival and a special "eye catcher" such as a small mountain of fools gold or sidewalks with fool's gold in them. This would encourage a theme of "City of Gold" which could motivate people to stop and spend time and money for services, gasoline and food in Eldorado. This year Paul noted an appearance of prosperity in the city, as he earlier saw new businesses, upgrading of existing buildings, repair and clean-up effort in evidence. His main exhortation this year was for the community to provide support

for the existing businesses enabling them to expand and hire more employees. He felt this effort was far more effective and efficient for the city than trying to find outside businesses to lure into our area. Due to the continued depressed economic climate of both the State of Texas and the Nation, too many

attractive offers are being made all over the country to prospective businesses. Paul was complimentary of the city and of the work of the Chamber of Commerce.

experimental program? Our school was picked not for its failure but its success. If it's not broke, don't fix it. Why tinker with success?

I'm sure the above questions are just the tip of the iceberg that people would like to have answered.

My initial and present reaction to this vote is that I resent the fact that the school board took this action with no input from community, parents or teachers. The fifth graders in middle school took a vote on whether or not they'd like this program before their parents were consulted. Consulting the parents is still something at the time of this letter that has not been done. I was totally amazed at the number of teachers and school administration who knew nothing of this vote.

From the beginning of the school year, we as parents were told, "Parents, we want your involvement, concern, input, and help, but when it all comes down, they don't give a flip what we think or want. We as parents and community have received no information at all on the content of the program, so how can we know if this is a worthwhile program. One school board member after the meeting expressed his opinion of us to a parent at the meeting. He said most of the community were too ignorant of these concepts to make an intelligent decision. I hope this is not the opinion of all school board members.

We have a highly rated, successful school. This is an experimental program and our kids are the guinea pigs as well as our personal family lives. So far I've heard only negative reactions to this plan, but we cannot make intelligent, informed opinions until we receive the full information we need.

Our school board is elected to represent us, not rule us or think for us. They also have an obligation to inform us of major changes that affect our lives, our children's lives and education before they vote them into effect.

This letter is my protest to the manner in which this proposal has been accepted. If you don't have time to write your view on this matter, pick up the phone and call your school board. I will personally take your comments on the proposal and present it to the school board at the next meeting. Call 853-3349 or 853-3116, I must have your name with your comment.

The Concerned Parents investigating the Partnership School Program plan to be on the agenda at the school board meeting January 23, 1992. Be there if you are concerned. I realize this letter will come out the morning of the meeting, so get the word out to other parents and members of the community.

To the school board, I make this appeal: Give us the information on this program and how far we have actually committed to it I have already heard talk of a recall petition, picketing the school, and refusing to send kids to school. Our school and town does not need that kind of publicity. Give us the information we need, the whole community, not just the privileged few, to make intelligent opinions, and decisions. Or maybe, you don't think we are capable of making those decisions. After all, we, the people, elected you.

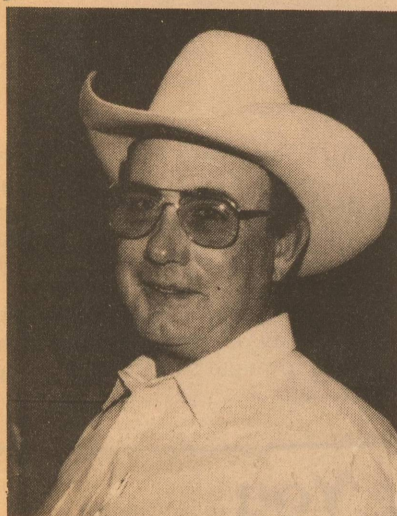

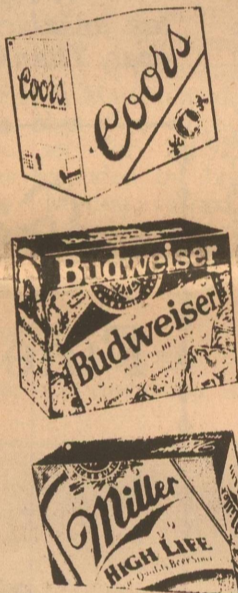

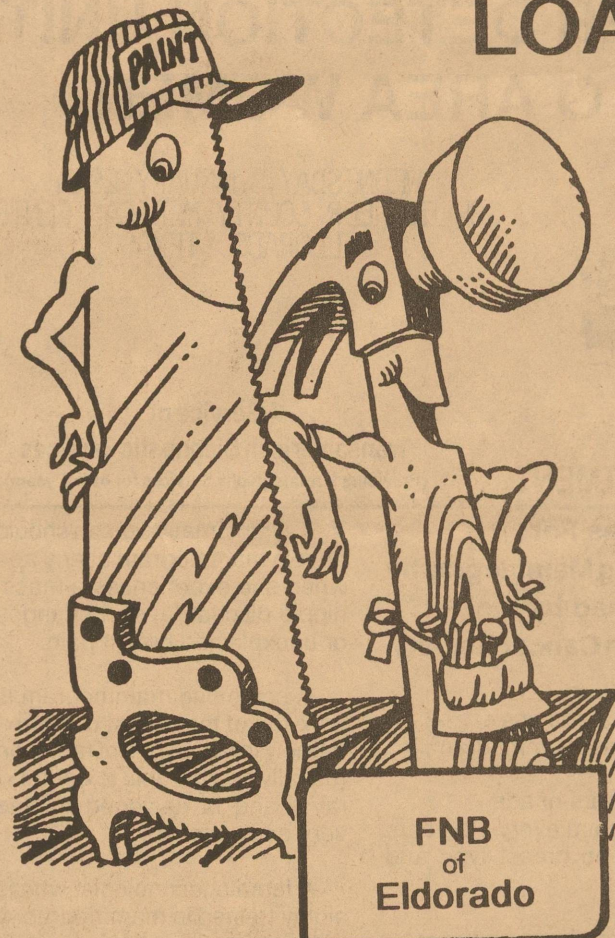

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## SCISD Board Meets

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County Independent School District was held on January 13, 1992, at 6:00 p.m. in the Administration Building.

Eldorado Elementary School Principal Harold Steele reported on recent happenings at the elementary campus. During the month of November, the Veteran's Day Program was held. Second graders performed the play "The Lonesome Scarecrows." Thanksgiving Programs and the Second Six Weeks Awards Assembly were also held during November. During December, third and fourth graders went to the San Angelo Mall to present a music program, and students up through second grade presented Merry Christmas USA. Also a music program for the Senior Citizens' Center and the Nursing Home was given.

The Third Six Weeks Awards Assembly will be held during January. Students and teachers are beginning to practice and prepare for achievement test to be taken in April, and students are beginning preparation for UIL competition. Mr. Steele reported that the new carpet that was installed during the Christmas break is "great." He also reported that six new computers have been added to kindergarten and first grade classrooms.

Also, six new computers, one each to third and fourth grade classrooms, have been installed. Further, Mr. Steele reported that the Saxon Math curriculum has been well received and is excellent and that the Texas Power Writing Curriculum is being considered by the elementary teachers.

Dr. Blair reported that Partnership Schools selection was originally scheduled for January 3rd, but has been postponed by TEA until January 15th.

Dr. Blair presented a copy of the TAAS information sent to the Eldorado Success for publication. Reports showed all SCISD grade levels tested to have exceeded state and regional averages for the percentage of students mastering objectives in reading, writing, and math.

As of Wednesday, January 8, 1992, enrollment for SCISD totaled 774, with 324 in elementary, 232 in middle school, and 218 in high school.

In action items, the Board approved the financial report as presented for the month of December, voted unanimously to pursue a building program to decide what facilities to build and how to fund the facilities, and approved honors course applications to be presented to the Texas Education Agency for English II Honors and English IV Honors.

The meeting was recessed at 8:28 p.m. to be reconvened at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, January 16th to

continue consideration of the building program.

The meeting was reconvened at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, January 16, 1992. All members were present. Board members voted to undertake a building program contingent upon the availability of adequate funding.

A motion carried to build a multi-purpose gym and enlarge the present cafeteria at a cost not to exceed \$700,000 to be funded with a combination of lease purchase and fund balance dollars.

Dr. Blair informed the board that on January 15th the Texas Education Agency awarded the Eldorado Middle School the honor of being selected as a Partnership School. This honor will allow the middle school to be released from some of TEA's present rules and regulations in order to do a better job of educating students. Adjustments to the regular school calendar will be necessary in order to allow for additional teacher inservice days and fewer student instructional days as mandated by the Partnership Schools Program. Board members voted to support the middle school as it participates in the Partnership Schools Program. A 1992-93 school calendar was not adopted. The Board agreed that the public will be included in the development of the 1992-93 calendar.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:50 P.M.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of nine women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

**Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.**

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

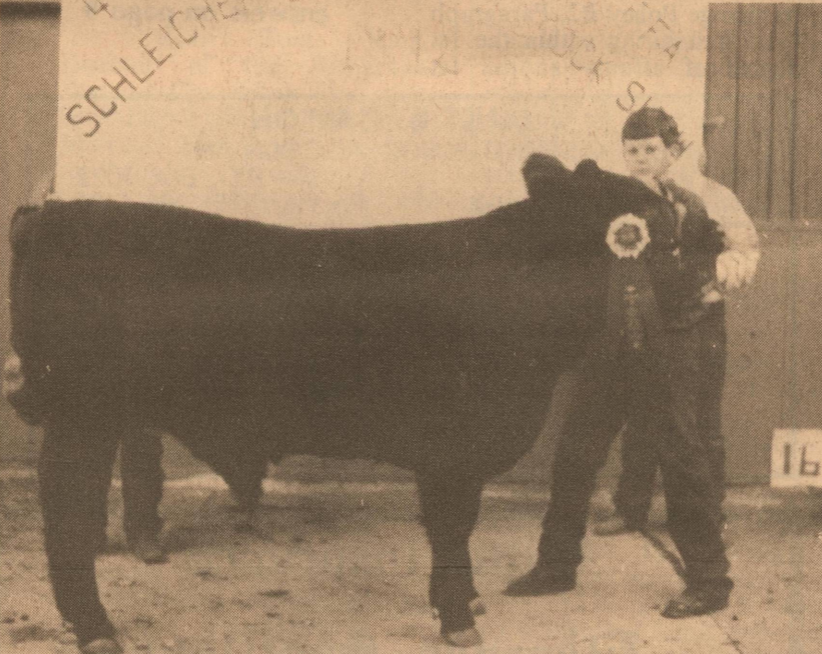

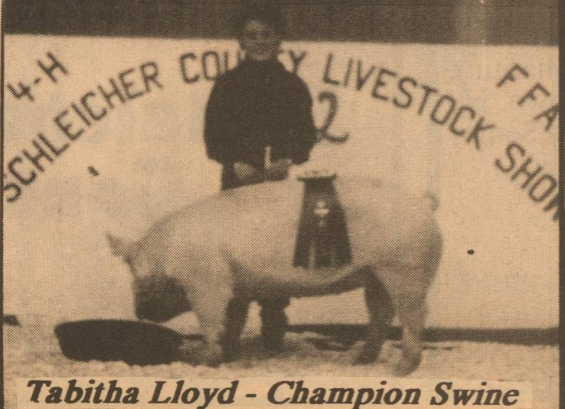

# Unofficial City Council Minutes

A Regular Meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held Tuesday, January 7, 1992, at 7:30 p.m. at the City Hall, with all Councilmembers present with the exception of Debbie Ballew. Meeting was called to order by Mayor Nikolauk.

### TODD ENGINEERING:

Gary McKay, representing Todd Engineering, met with the Council to advise them of the results of the 4:00 P.M. bid opening. Bidding on the 1989 TCDP Urgent Need Project (Wastewater Facility Improvements) were Rhode Construction \$227,349 and Reece Albert, Inc. \$197,400. Clearance from TDOC had been received for the apparent low bidder, Reece Albert, Inc. Mr. McKay stated that the bid included moving of the irrigation inlet and four metering devices to measure influent, effluent, recirculation, and irrigation fluids in addition to the repairs to Pond #2, and he recommended the Council pass Resolution accepting the bid. Motion was made by Randy Mankin that the Resolution approving the Reece Albert bid of \$197,400 be passed; motion was seconded by Jay Ray Holley; motion carried. Mr. McKay stated that work was scheduled to begin within 30 days and should be completed within 120 days of start-up, weather permitting. Discussion was held concerning sources of clay.

Concerning the 1989 TCDP water tower project, Mr. Kay and Jim Allen reported on the results of the millscale tests, explained the character of millscale, and the plan for correction of problems with welds and paint spots on Friday, 1/10/92.

The written proposal from Todd Engineering to assist with study of compliance problems at the wastewater plant was briefly discussed, and motion was made by Jeri Whitten and seconded by Jay Ray Holley. Motion carried, and the Mayor executed a copy of the proposal for return to Todd's office.

### CITIZENS PRESENT:

Fr. Jerry McCarthy, representing Old Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church, and Dr. Larry Blair, representing the Schleicher County ISD, updated the Council on history and results of

two applications for Head Start programs in Schleicher County. Via a letter, the Catholic Church requested \$1000 per year to offset expenses connected with the CAC's use of their Educational Building. Following discussion, the Secretary was asked to contact the CAC to obtain copy of their budget and relay the Council's concerns regarding curriculum coordination with the ISD who did not receive approval to expand their current program.

Dr. Blair also brought the Council up-to-date on Public Hearing held to receive community input regarding the ISD's plan to expand cafeteria and snackbar facilities and to construct new gymnasium within the street area in N. West St. if street could be closed for such expansion.

### DECEMBER MINUTES/TAX REPORT/FINANCIAL REPORTS/BILLINGS:

Following review, motion was made by Randy Mankin and seconded by Dora Bosmans that the Minutes of the December 10 meeting be approved. Motion carried.

The Secretary circulated the December Tax Report for initialing and distributed the December Financial Reports, making explanations as needed. The current billings were circulated for review, and motion was made by Jeri Whitten and seconded by Dora Bosmans that the billings be paid as presented. Motion carried.

As a followup to citizen concern, the Secretary was asked to draft a letter to a resident stating need to remove speed bumps placed in City right-of-way. Other hazards were identified and action approved to provide visual warnings or take corrective action as necessary.

### PROPOSED ORDINANCES #104-91, #105-91, & #106-91:

Regarding proposed ordinances, following discussion, Randy Mankin made the motion that the Public Hearing be set for 2/4/92. Motion was seconded by Jay Ray Holley. Motion carried. The position of Municipal Court Judge will be added to the agenda for February 4 for discussion.

### COMMERCIAL SANITATION RATES:

After brief discussion, it

was agreed that further discussion of adjusting commercial sanitation rates would be tabled.

### AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT:

The Secretary reported that she had been unsuccessful in clarifying requirements of the Act, and she would continue to seek contact with persons qualified to advise the City and report back to the Council at a future date.

### EXECUTIVE SESSION:

The posted Executive Session was determined to be unnecessary at the present time.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:

Jack Dean reported that Myrl Sudduth was scheduled to make survey of alley in Block 4U (Christian Addition) and the newly acquired truck bypass property with work to begin as soon as weather permits.

Mr. Dean further reported on sewer plant testing and trouble-shooting.

Mr. Dean reported that three employees still lacked their CDL and he was currently seeking personnel for vacancies.

### SAFETY TRAINING:

The Secretary reported that the films for use in training employees and supervisors would be available January 28. It was agreed that the Council would view the films prior to the next regularly scheduled meeting on February 4. Employee viewing will also be scheduled.

### PERSONNEL

**POLICY/SALARY REVIEW:**  
The Council reviewed several specific points in the Personnel Policy for possible amendment. After discussion, it was agreed that any employees who current job description included driving would be required to meet the CDL standard. Other employees not currently allowed to drive City units would be "grandfathered". Motion was made by Dora Bosmans and seconded by Randy Mankin that the CDL exception only be allowed for office personnel (Policy #2, Paragraphs 2 and 9). Motion carried.

Concerning the nepotism policy, the need for adjustment was discussed to allow for more flexibility in hiring. After discussion, motion was made by Randy Mankin and seconded by Jay Ray Holley that the Council alter the policy to change Policy #2, Paragraph 7 to limit hiring within the 1st degree of affinity at the 1st

degree of consanguinity rather than 2nd and 3rd, respectively. Motion carried.

Concerning employee benefits, it was noted that in Policy #4, Paragraph 5, the Policy should reflect 11 rather than 5 uniforms as the Unifirst contract allows. Employee costs for 50% of the uniforms was reviewed, as well as budget allowances for salary increases. After discussion, motion was made by Jay Ray Holley that full cost of uniforms be absorbed by the City and that employees receive a 5% increase, both effective 2/1/92. Office personnel not receiving uniforms will receive additional increase comparable to City's expense for uniforms. Motion was seconded by Jeri Whitten. Motion carried. Budget Amendment will be prepared to shift funds as needed.

### SECTION 8 HOUSING ASSISTANCE PROGRAM:

The Secretary reported on conversation with Genaro Chavez with the Texas Department of Community Affairs who outlined duties of Local Operator and requested the name of personnel available to handle duties required to implement the program.

Following discussion, motion was made by Randy Mankin and seconded by Jay Ray Holley that the Secretary's name be submitted, with instructions that she maintain record of time involved and option allowed to transfer duties or receive compensation (based on City's fee receipts) as necessitated. Motion carried.

### OFFICE CHANGES:

The Secretary requested the Council's consideration to

allow for the purchase of used or new furniture (2 desks) to improve the office work stations. Price quotes for new furniture were discussed, and with Council agreement, Mayor Nikolauk offered to help locate and acquire the desks as requested.

### HEALTH CARE COSTS:

Councilmember Randy Mankin reported on his and the Secretary's conversation with Jim Blum, Medical Center Administrator, on options available to the City to offset health care insurance expense. After discussion, Mr. Mankin stated that he would continue to seek out options and report back to the Council.

With no further business, meeting adjourned at 12:20 a.m.

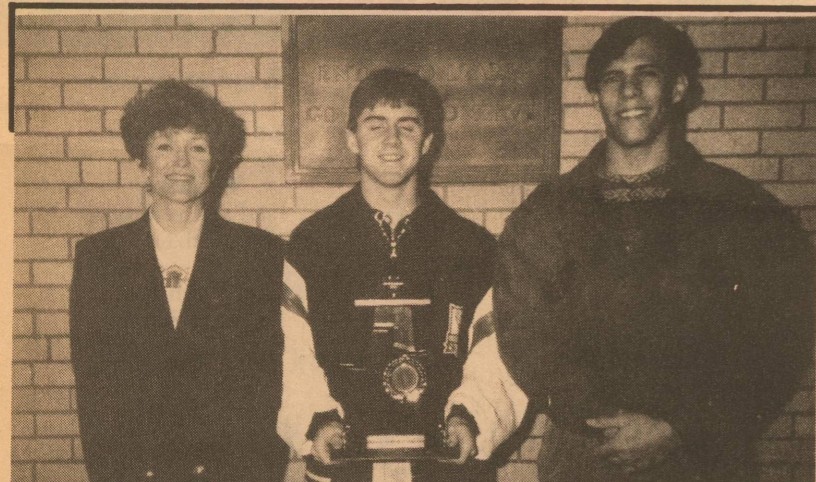

## Concho Valley Nursing Home Ombudsmen Task Force

The Concho Valley Council of Governments received a portion of a special appropriation under Title III-B of the Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended, through the Texas Department on Aging for fiscal year 1992. The Department on Aging's Board authorized the use of these funds to increase designated staff ombudsman time at the Area Agency on Aging.

During the ensuing fiscal year, the Area Agency on Aging will be recruiting possible Task Force members, focusing initially in its rural counties. The newly hired Assistant Staff Ombudsman, Stephanie Salyards, will be meeting with area nursing facility staff and residents to discuss the Ombudsman's role in long-term care facilities.

The Ombudsman program, established in 1978 by the Texas Department on Aging in cooperation with the Texas Department of Health, was designed to assist residents of long-term care facilities and their families with problems which might arise due to the need for institutional care.

Texas Department on Aging's goal is to place a certified Ombudsman in each facility throughout the state or Texas; the Concho Valley Area Agency on Aging has also adopted this goal for its thirteen-county service area.

According to the Texas Department on Aging, approximately 5,400 complaints in Texas were handled by the Ombudsman program; an additional 12,000 complaints were investigated by the Texas Department on Health on behalf of nursing facility residents. As many as 60% of individuals residing in long term care facilities go unvisited with 50% having no family member contact.

With the senior population growing rapidly, the role of the Ombudsman is becoming increasingly important to help residents, family and staff achieve the highest possible quality of care when an institutionalized setting in the best alternative for an individual.

The Ombudsman program provides ongoing education through quarterly training for its volunteers and is

available for in-service meetings for nursing facility staff. It also serves as an excellent resource for families and individuals considering nursing facility placement; the program recently completed publication of

"Choosing A Nursing Home - Resources for Residents and Families" which is available at no charge by contacting Sue Fielder or Stephanie Salyards at the Concho Valley Area Agency on Aging, 915/944-9666.

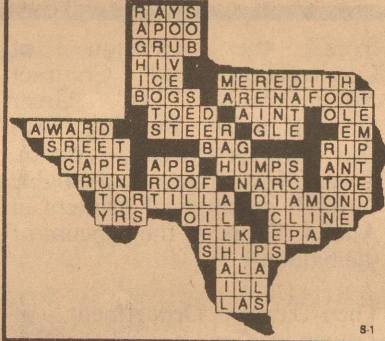

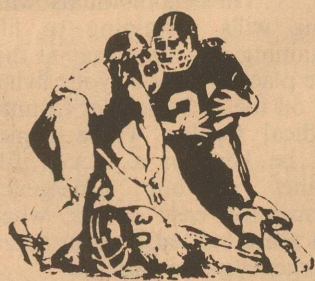

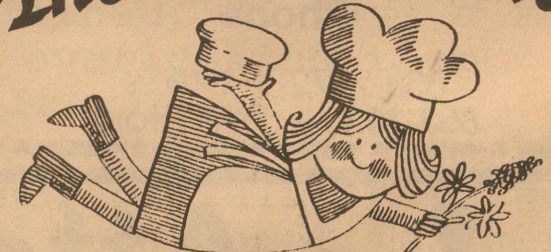
