



Late February or early March are the best times to prune roses for most of Texas. Hybrid Teas, Floribundas and Grandifloras are usually pruned heavily at this time (up to 18 or 24 inches from the ground). Miniatures are also pruned to a few inches above the ground in late winter. Removal of weak growth and crossed canes, as well display for many varieties. as some general thinning can best

be accomplished at this time. Some rose growers prefer a less drastic approach to annual pruning. Shaping the plant and cutting vigorous canes back to one-quarter or one-third their length can result in a more attractive plant, especially for old shrub-type roses. Care should be taken to prune most climbers and one-time bloomers after they flower in spring so as not to reduce their seasonal show.

Keep in mind that most old garden roses are attractive landscape plants with a pleasing,

natural form, and that this form should still be apparent after pruning. In addition to pruning in late winter, some rosarians moderately cut their plants back in mid-August. This practice, along with a light application of fertilizer and thorough watering (if needed), can promote an excellent fall floral

Cutting flowers. Improper cutting of flowers can injure the plant and decrease its vigor. It is best to cut few, if any, flowers during the first blooming season. By removing only the flowers and no stem, the plants will develop into larger bushes by fall, at which time some flowers may be cut. Early removal of foliage and long stems reduces both the foodmanufacturing capacity of the plant and subsequent flower yield.

Late afternoon is the best time to cut roses. When cutting, use sharp shears or a knife just above the topmost leaf. Allow at least two leaves to remain between the cut and the main stem. Roses that are cut just before the petals begin to unfold will open normally and will remain in good condition for a longer period.

Immediately plunge the stems into warm water (about 1000 F). Recut the stems an inch or so from the base while they are in the water. For maximum life, add floral preservatives according to label instructions. Research has shown that floral preservatives often double the useful life of roses and many other cut flowers. Floral preservatives can be purchased from retail florists or from floral

concessions in super-markets. An equal mixture of 7-Up (not the diet drink) and water is also an effective preservative. Let the mixture stand long enough for most of the air bubbles to disseminate.

A good, pure water source is equally as important as the use of preservatives in maintaining flower life. Rain water or distilled water should be used when arranging flowers since sodium and other minerals present in most tap water can shorten the useful life of roses and other cut flowers.

Place the flowers in a cool, draft-free area until ready to use. High temperatures and direct sunlight quickly take their toll on cut flowers.

Often the most convenient shortcake is a store-bought pound or angel food cake. But to some, the ultimate foundation is a sweet, rich biscuit warm from the oven.

Try Martha White's favorite Strawberry Shortcake recipe that follows. You can use the biscuit base and vary the fresh fruit as others come into season.

Traditional Strawberry Shortcake

- 2 cups sifted Martha White Self-Rising Flour
- 3 tablespoons sugar 6 tablespoons butter or
- margarine, slightly softened 1 cup whipping cream
- 2 quarts strawberries, hulled, sliced and sweetened to taste

1 cup whipping cream, whipped with 1 tablespoon sugar, if desired

Preheat oven to 425°F. Lightly grease baking sheet. Combine flour and sugar in mixing bowl. Cut butter into flour with pastry blender or two knives until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add 1 cup whipping cream and stir with a fork only until dough leaves sides of bowl. Turn dough out onto lightly floured board or pastry cloth; knead gently just until smooth. Roll out to 1/2-inch

Cut into rounds with large (21/2-inches) floured cutter. Place about an inch apart on prepared baking sheet. Bake 10 to 12 minutes or until golden brown. To serve, pull biscuits apart and place bottom halves on individual serving plates; spoon on half the strawberries and whipped cream. Cover with biscuit tops; spoon on remaining strawberries and whipped cream. Makes 12 shortcakes

LAKE FOREST, IL — America's brightest high school students recently showed their support for the troops who fought in Operation Desert Storm in the 22nd Annual Survev of High Achievers, conducted among 1,800 A and B students by Who's Who Among American High School Students. The troops who fought in the Persian Gulf were the overwhelming choice as the students' hero/heroine for the 1990's with almost 52 percent of the students voting for

Trailing the troops overall were General Norman Schwarzkopf with 12 percent of the vote and President Bush with 7 percent. The first non-Gulf figure to finish in the hero/heroine ranking was Sister Mother Teresa, who garnered 6 percent of the vote. General Colin Powell, the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs, was the second leading choice among African-American students with 10 percent of their vote supporting him.

More than three-quarters of the students say they had a lot of classroom discussion about the war in the Persian Gulf, and 79 percent say they felt the media covered the war responsibly. As a result of the Gulf War, the students say they gained respect for President Bush (70 percent), U.S. technology (65 percent), workers in the U.S.

defense industry (54 percent), the United Nations (50 percent), and Israel (43 percent). Once again, not surprisingly, students say they gained the most respect for the U.S. armed forces in the Gulf with 82 percent expressing this sentiment. "This is in striking contrast to the results of the 1971 Who's Who survey in which fully 85 percent said respect for America had suffered due to our participation in the Vietnam War and less than one-third favored U.S. military

involvement in that war," stated Paul

Krouse, publisher of Who's Who Among

American High School Students. The students' unequivocal support of the troops who served in the Gulf does not correspond to any personal commitment on their part to the armed forces. Although most of the students surveyed (95 percent) feel the United States should continue to have all-volunteer armed forces, more than 40 percent say there are absolutely no circumstances under which they would volunteer for the armed forces. More than half, however, did say they would volunteer if another country threatened the safety of the
