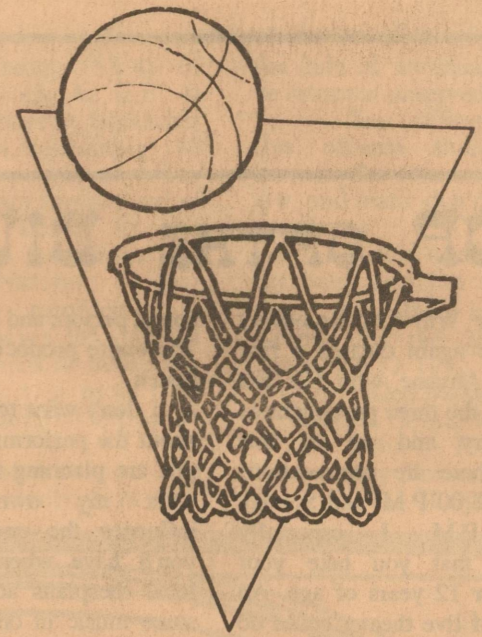

Whitten-8, Erin Meador-5, Tara Hunley-4, Erica Pina-4, and Jamie Hardy-3.

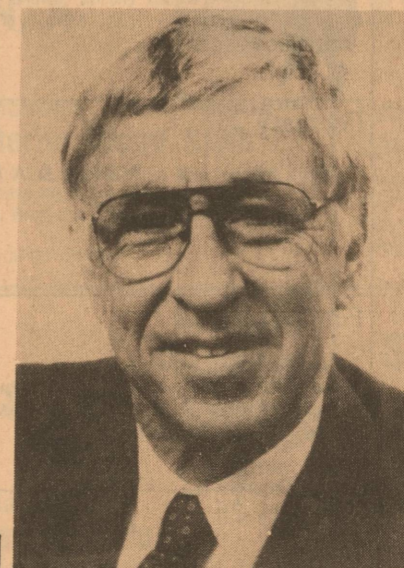

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TEXAS AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION SERVICE

County Agent's Report

Late February or early March are the best times to prune roses for most of Texas. Hybrid Teas, Floribundas and Grandifloras are usually pruned heavily at this time (up to 18 or 24 inches from the ground). Miniatures are also pruned to a few inches above the ground in late winter. Removal of weak growth and crossed canes, as well as some general thinning can best be accomplished at this time.

Some rose growers prefer a less drastic approach to annual pruning. Shaping the plant and cutting vigorous canes back to one-quarter or one-third their length can result in a more attractive plant, especially for old shrub-type roses. Care should be taken to prune most climbers and one-time bloomers after they flower in spring so as not to reduce their seasonal show.

Keep in mind that most old garden roses are attractive landscape plants with a pleasing,

natural form, and that this form should still be apparent after pruning. In addition to pruning in late winter, some rosarians moderately cut their plants back in mid-August. This practice, along with a light application of fertilizer and thorough watering (if needed), can promote an excellent fall floral display for many varieties.

Cutting flowers. Improper cutting of flowers can injure the plant and decrease its vigor. It is best to cut few, if any, flowers during the first blooming season. By removing only the flowers and no stem, the plants will develop into larger bushes by fall, at which time some flowers may be cut. Early removal of foliage and long stems reduces both the food-manufacturing capacity of the plant and subsequent flower yield.

Late afternoon is the best time to cut roses. When cutting, use

sharp shears or a knife just above the topmost leaf. Allow at least two leaves to remain between the cut and the main stem. Roses that are cut just before the petals begin to unfold will open normally and will remain in good condition for a longer period.

Immediately plunge the stems into warm water (about 100o F). Recut the stems an inch or so from the base while they are in the water. For maximum life, add floral preservatives according to label instructions. Research has shown that floral preservatives often double the useful life of roses and many other cut flowers. Floral preservatives can be purchased from retail florists or from floral

concessions in super-markets. An equal mixture of 7-Up (not the diet drink) and water is also an effective preservative. Let the mixture stand long enough for most of the air bubbles to disseminate.

A good, pure water source is equally as important as the use of preservatives in maintaining flower life. Rain water or distilled water should be used when arranging flowers since sodium and other minerals present in most tap water can shorten the useful life of roses and other cut flowers.

Place the flowers in a cool, draft-free area until ready to use. High temperatures and direct sunlight quickly take their toll on cut flowers.

A Short Lesson about Shortcake

The variations, combinations and possibilities for shortcake are endless. But one thing is certain, there are always three components to this summer favorite—the shortcake, the fruit and the cream.

- The cream is whipped.
- The fruit is whatever happens to be in season like fresh strawberries or sliced fragrant peaches.
- The shortcake depends upon personal taste and family history.

Often the most convenient shortcake is a store-bought pound or angel food cake. But to some, the ultimate foundation is a sweet, rich biscuit warm from the oven.

Try Martha White's favorite Strawberry Shortcake recipe that follows. You can use the biscuit base and vary the fresh fruit as others come into season.

Traditional Strawberry Shortcake

- 2 cups sifted Martha White Self-Rising Flour
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 6 tablespoons butter or margarine, slightly softened
- 1 cup whipping cream
- 2 quarts strawberries, hulled, sliced and sweetened to taste

1 cup whipping cream, whipped with 1 tablespoon sugar, if desired

Preheat oven to 425°F. Lightly grease baking sheet. Combine flour and sugar in mixing bowl. Cut butter into flour with pastry blender or two knives until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add 1 cup whipping cream and stir with a fork only until dough leaves sides of bowl. Turn dough out onto lightly floured board or pastry cloth; knead gently just until smooth. Roll out to 1/2-inch thickness.

Cut into rounds with large (2 1/2-inch) floured cutter. Place about an inch apart on prepared baking sheet. Bake 10 to 12 minutes or until golden brown. To serve, pull biscuits apart and place bottom halves on individual serving plates; spoon on half the strawberries and whipped cream. Cover with biscuit tops; spoon on remaining strawberries and whipped cream. Makes 12 shortcakes.

At our February 12 meeting Cindy Cawley of the Plateau Underground Water District presented an interesting and informative program about our water supply in this county.

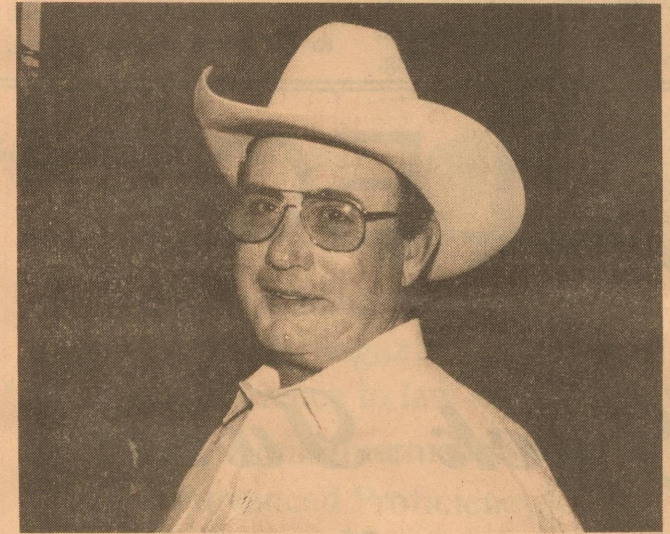
February 19, 1992 was our monthly business meeting with a short presentation by Mr. Jim

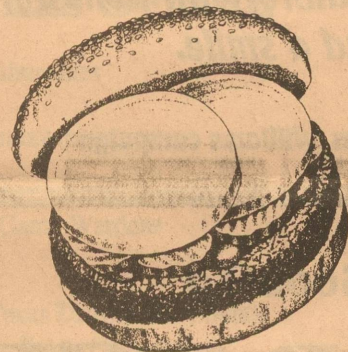

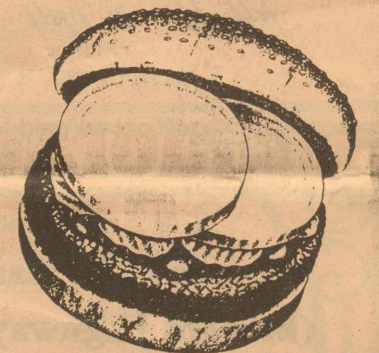

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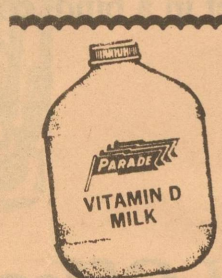

Unofficial City Council Minutes

A Regular Meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held Tuesday, February 4, 1992, at 8:00 P.M. Meeting was called to order by Mayor Nikolauk.

PUBLIC HEARING:

Public Hearing was opened with approximately 25 citizens present in response to proposed Ordinance #104-91 (Overgrown Lots), Ordinance #105-91 (Abandoned/sunked Vehicles) and Ordinance #106-91 (Livestock). Following comments from citizens present, motion was made by Debbie Ballew and seconded by Jeri Whitten that the Ordinances be passed as proposed to be effective immediately. Motion carried. (Copies of Ordinances are attached and made a part of these Minutes) **ISD REQUEST TO CLOSE PORTION OF N. WEST STREET:** Dr. Larry Blair reviewed the School Board's tentative plans for

new gymnasium. Also discussed was need for additional fire hydrants, play area for middle school children, utility and emergency access to facilities, parking, and utilization of current facilities. Participating in the discussion were Fire Marshal Roger Powell, Fire Chief Jerry Jones, James Mack Holley, and C. R. Sproul. After close of discussion, motion was made by Jeri Whitten that Public Hearing be called for the next meeting of the City Council. Motion carried. Portion proposed for closure is from alley between W. Callender and W. Hill and W. Fields Avenue.

JANUARY MINUTES, TAX REPORT, FINANCIAL REPORTS, CURRENT BILLINGS:

Minutes of the January 10 meeting were reviewed and

approved in motion by Jeri Whitten and second by Dora Bosmans. Motion carried. The January Tax Report was circulated for initialing, and the Secretary reported that the Financial Reports for January and YTD would be distributed shortly. Current bills were reviewed, and motion was made by Randy Mankin that they be approved. Motion was seconded by Debbie Ballew, and motion carried. Amendment #1 to the Budget was discussed, and motion was made by Jay Ray Holley and seconded by Debbie Ballew that the Amendment be approved. Motion carried. Said Amendment allowed for transfer of budgeted salary expense to cover 100% uniform expense and transfer of water supply funds to new water meter expense.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: The Secretary reported that the RRC had approved the Drug/Alcohol Abuse Policy with minor additions. Also, the Fire Department personnel had completed the roof survey as required by the State Dept. of Insurance. Other areas of action which would lower insurance rates is completed were reviewed.

The upcoming Americans With Disabilities Act of 1991 seminar to be held in New Braunfels on March 4 was discussed. It was reported that additional information on ADA has been requested from the Governor's office.

Regarding health insurance, White & Zesch has advised that the Anniversary Date for the group

policy may be changed from November 1 to September 1 which would facilitate budget preparation. Motion was made by Randy Mankin and seconded by Debbie Ballew that a request to make the change be forwarded to Blue Cross/Blue Shield. Motion carried. Alternative plans will be explored. Response to the HMO questionnaire has been sparse thus far.

With regard to the Section 8 Housing, training and further information has not been made available; therefore, no action has been taken in order to accept applications, etc.

Mayor Nikolauk made explanation to the Council regarding nomination to the Private Industry Council and local representation on the Council of Governments Executive Committee. The local Chamber of Commerce has agreed to nominate Mayor Nikolauk to the PIC to allow Schleicher County representation on that committee.

Concerning the Headstart Program being administered by the CAC at the Catholic Church facility, the Mayor updated the Council on investigation regarding expenses and curriculum. No action

was taken by the City Council to assist with this program at this time.

Update and legal opinion concerning private easement in North Town Addition was given. No further action by the City was required.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:

Jack Dean reported that installation of a meter to measure pumpage at the City Hall well was complete with plans to make a similar installation at the South well. Costs were discussed. Mr. Dean reported some infiltration from private property continue to be a problem in the wastewater system.

Regarding the CDL requirement for employees, motion was made by Randy Mankin and seconded by Jay Ray Holley that the CDL requirement be reinforced with final warning being given as necessary, allowing the subject employee one week of compensatory time to complete the requirement. Motion carried.

It was announced that the Preconstruction Conference with Reece Albert, Inc. for the Urgent Needs Grant is scheduled for 11:00 AM on Friday, February 7, at the City Hall.

Memo regarding work and inspection on the water tower project was circulated to the Councilmembers.

EXECUTIVE SESSION:

Proposed Employee Evaluation Forms were distributed for Council consideration, and as authorized under Section 2 (g) of the Open Meetings Act, Executive Session of the Council was held starting at 10:30 PM and ending 11:05 PM for the purpose of evaluating personnel. Session was recorded and sealed as required by the Act.

Open Session of the Council required no action by the Council.

NEW BUSINESS:

The Secretary reviewed deadlines for the May 2 election.

Regarding the policy requiring payment for City maps, incident was discussed and it was the unanimous decision of the Council that the parties involved be billed for purchase of City maps at the regular price.

With no further business, meeting adjourned at 11:30 PM.

REAL AMERICAN HEROES: THE GULF WAR VETS

LAKE FOREST, IL — America's brightest high school students recently showed their support for the troops who fought in Operation Desert Storm in the 22nd Annual Survey of High Achievers, conducted among 1,800 A and B students by Who's Who Among American High School Students. The troops who fought in the Persian Gulf were the overwhelming choice as the students' hero/heroine for the 1990's with almost 52 percent of the students voting for them.

Trailing the troops overall were General Norman Schwarzkopf with 12 percent of the vote and President Bush with 7 percent. The first non-Gulf figure to finish in the hero/heroine ranking was Sister Mother Teresa, who garnered 6 percent of the vote. General Colin Powell, the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs, was the second leading choice among African-American students with 10 percent of their vote supporting him.

More than three-quarters of the students say they had a lot of classroom discussion about the war in the Persian Gulf, and 79 percent say they felt the media covered the war responsibly. As a result of the Gulf War, the students say they gained respect for President Bush (70 percent), U.S. technology (65 percent), workers in the U.S.

defense industry (54 percent), the United Nations (50 percent), and Israel (43 percent). Once again, not surprisingly, students say they gained the most respect for the U.S. armed forces in the Gulf with 82 percent expressing this sentiment. "This is in striking contrast to the results of the 1971 Who's Who survey in which fully 85 percent said respect for America had suffered due to our participation in the Vietnam War and less than one-third favored U.S. military involvement in that war," stated Paul Krouse, publisher of Who's Who Among American High School Students.

The students' unequivocal support of the troops who served in the Gulf does not correspond to any personal commitment on their part to the armed forces. Although most of the students surveyed (95 percent) feel the United States should continue to have all-volunteer armed forces, more than 40 percent say there are absolutely no circumstances under which they would volunteer for the armed forces. More than half, however, did say they would volunteer if another country threatened the safety of the United States.
