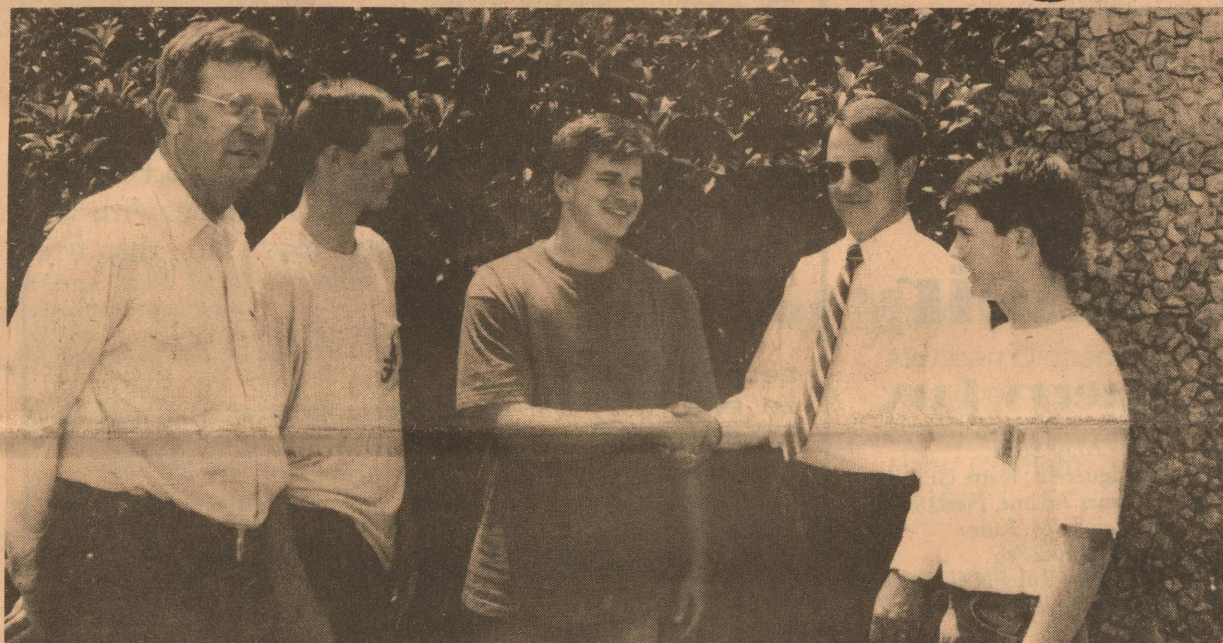

## County Agents Report

The webworms have invaded again. "Mild winters are pleasant as long as they last but we sure seem to pay the price the next year" says Jerry Swift, County Extension Agent in Schleicher County. "It looks like we will have 3 or 4 generations of webworms again this summer." These worms, if not controlled, can completely defoliate trees, especially fruitless mulberry and boxelder trees. They can feast on over 100 different kinds of trees.

The fall webworm passes the winter as a brown pupa in leaves, under bark or in trash at the base of trees. The adult stage, a white moth with black markings, emerges in early spring, mates and lays clusters of eggs on green leaves in the tree. Tiny worms hatch from the eggs and begin to feed and make webs on the leaves.

"This is the stage that can be controlled easily and effectively"

says Swift. "Once the worms get an inch long and the web gets well-formed, they are very difficult to kill." Since the small worms eat a lot of foliage, they can be effectively controlled with insecticides which act as stomach poisons such as the biological worm sprays containing bacteria (Dipel, Bio-worm Spray, etc.) or formulations containing Sevin. However, once the worms are over an inch in length, they do not feed much, so a contact insecticide must be used for effective control.

Insecticides which homeowners can use on mulberry, boxelder and other ornamental trees include the biological insecticides such as Dipel or Bio-worm Spray, Sevin, Orthene, diazinon or Dursban. Licensed pest control operators can use these plus products such as Mavrik Aquaflo or Tempo 2. The biological insecticides should be considered in areas around swimming pools, fish

ponds and other areas very sensitive to chemical insecticides since they are not toxic to humans, pets or fish. These products are effective if used before the worms are one-half inch in length and if good coverage is obtained

Another alternative to insecticide sprays is the use of Acecap 97. Acecaps are tree implants containing a systemic insecticide that is absorbed into the tree. Holes are drilled into the tree

and the implants are tapped into the holes. The number of implants depends on the size of the trees. Acecap 97 implants are not 100% effective but they do appear to help. You may still see a few worms in the implanted trees but defoliation is unlikely.

The users of pesticides are always responsible for their proper use. Check pesticide labels to make sure the product is labeled for the site which will be treated.

## Health News

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### Increase Root Kill On Mesquite

Summer has arrived...mesquite trees are leafed out, and some ranchers have begun to consider mesquite control.

The most common treatment for dense stands of mesquite mixed with pricklypear the past few years has been the aerial application of 1/4 lb. rate of Reclaim (chlopyralid) mixed with a 1/4 lb. rate of Grazon PC (picloram). Rates of kill have varied greatly among treated areas. However, through continued research since Reclaim's introduction several years ago, it has been found that soil temperature is an important key to an effective root kill on mesquite. With this in mind, it is recommended that the usual mix of Reclaim and Grazon PC be used only when soil temperature at 12 inches is 75 degrees or greater.

There are other factors to consider in timing of mesquite spraying. Stage of leaf growth and degree of leaf damage are critical to the efficiency of the application.

Translocation of the chemical to the roots occurs when the leaves are mature and plant growth other than root growth has stopped. At this

time carbohydrates being transferred to the roots act as a transport of the chemical to the roots. Care must be taken to inspect trees before spraying. Approximately 42 days, following budbreak, is required for leaves to reach a state of maturity susceptible to absorbing the chemical.

Optimum times for spraying, considering soil temperature and carbohydrate movement, are from 42 to 63 days and 72 to 84 days following bud break when soil temperature has reached 75 degrees at 12 inches deep.

Leaf maturity can be delayed or altered by late freezes and significant amounts of rainfall causing periods of new leaf growth. Spraying needs to be delayed until the leaves reach the proper maturity. At this stage the leaf is a dull dark green color. This stage will last for about 45 days until the leaves become shiny with a waxy covering, reducing the ability for most chemicals to penetrate.

Decreased surface area, due to leaf damage, decreases the ability of the plant to absorb enough chemical to kill it. Insects and hail storms are the major causes for leaf

damage.

Another important period to avoid application is during flowering and bean elongation. It is at this time that the carbohydrates are being transferred from the roots to the upper parts of the tree to produce this growth. Remember the chemical needs to be applied when this transfer will be going to the roots, otherwise you may kill only the leaves or tops of the trees.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has been

conducting research the past couple of years on a new mixture which has proven to be successful in herbicide trials in this area. Reclaim plus Grazon ET (trichlopyr), used at the 1/8 lb., 1/8 lb. rate has been found to achieve about the same mortality rate as Reclaim and Grazon PC but with only slightly higher than half the cost. It should be noted that both of the aforementioned treatments have only minimal effect on liveoak.

When applying chemical by

aerial application, volume per acre should be carefully considered. A volume range of 2 - 4 gallons per acre of mixture is recommended. However, the distribution pattern of the chemical will be changed with the varied range. The 2 gallon rate yields a larger droplet size than the 4 gallon rate, however the 2 gallon rate yields less droplets per acre. With the 4 gallon rate, more droplets per acre will get a better distribution. The drawback with the 4 gallon rate is the smaller

droplet size being more susceptible to drift. However, if applied under the right climatic conditions, drift should not be a factor. Also, the cost of application will probably be higher for the 4 gallon rate. The difference in cost may not be a factor when you can improve your percent kill.

For specific application procedures for any of the above treatments, contact the Soil Conservation Service personnel in Eldorado.

### Pecan Case Bearer Control

May 22nd-29th is the time to spray for Pecan Case Bearer Control.

This year is a little different from our average year. We will probably have a couple of generations of Case Bearers. Hence, to insure control, spray now and

again in two weeks. The second spraying is to catch the second generation.

The pesticide to use is Malathion - 50% EC or Diazinon 50%wp - 485Ec.

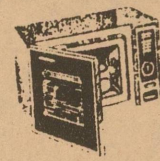

### It All Adds up to Safety

A user's guide to the electrically safe operation of household appliances

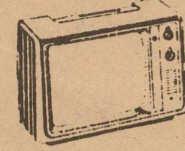
The wrong combination of household appliances can dangerously overload a circuit. Fire, electrical shock and damage to the circuit and the appliance may result. Before you add another appliance to the circuit, be sure that circuit can handle the load.

Step 1: Check your breaker panel to determine the amperage each circuit can handle. The size of the breaker (15 amp, 20 amp, etc.) is the limit of the load a circuit can carry.



Step 2: A breaker or a fuse is designed to stop the flow of current if a circuit is overloaded. Use only fuses and breakers rated for the circuit; never use a 20 amp fuse on a 15 amp circuit.

Step 3: Determine what kind of load your appliances are putting on the circuit. The wattage of the appliance should be listed somewhere on the appliance. Divide the wattage of the appliance by the voltage required (either 110 volts or 220 volts) to get the amperage required to operate the appliances.



Example - a microwave oven uses 1500 watts of energy and requires 110 volts to operate.

$$\begin{aligned} \text{amps} &= \text{watts/volts} \\ &= 1500/110 \\ &= 13.64 \text{ amps} \end{aligned}$$



Step 4: Add up the amperages required for each appliance on a circuit. If the total is greater than the load limit of the circuit, remove appliances from the circuit until the total is less than the limit.

### Response To Closed School Policy by TGSLC

Response to the Closed School Policy initiated by the Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Corporation has been overwhelming this past year with more than \$1 million in loans forgiven to qualified students, TGSLC Acting President Dan Pearson has announced.

The program offers guaranteed student loan borrowers who attended a school which ceased to provide educational services during the student's loan period the opportunity to have a portion of the loan forgiven.

TGSLC has forgiven an average of 58% of the full loan amount on 766 affected loans.

The student loan corporation works closely with the Texas Education Agency in identifying students who may qualify for the program. The policy has been in effect since May, 1989. Students are notified via postcard and information is also given to students whenever a school closes.

The Closed School Policy is the first program to offer some assistance to students victimized by school owners who enrolled students and then closed their institutions - often with no advance warning - leaving the student responsible for the student loan debt. School owners are required by law to refund loan amounts to students, however, many owners fled the state or filed bankruptcy, leaving students without recourse.

Until the U.S. Department of Education adopted this policy, TGSLC was required to pursue students for repayment of the full amount.

"We encourage any student caught in this situation to call us toll-free at 1-800-TG-LOANS. We have a staff of customer assistance representatives who can help you determine if you qualify," TGSLC Director of Public Affairs Cathy Flautt said. "We are attempting to contact individual borrowers, but don't wait for us to contact you if you received a guaranteed student loan to attend a school but were unable to complete the program because the school closed."

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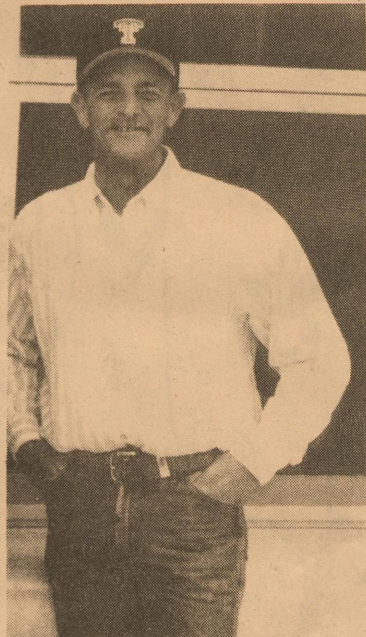

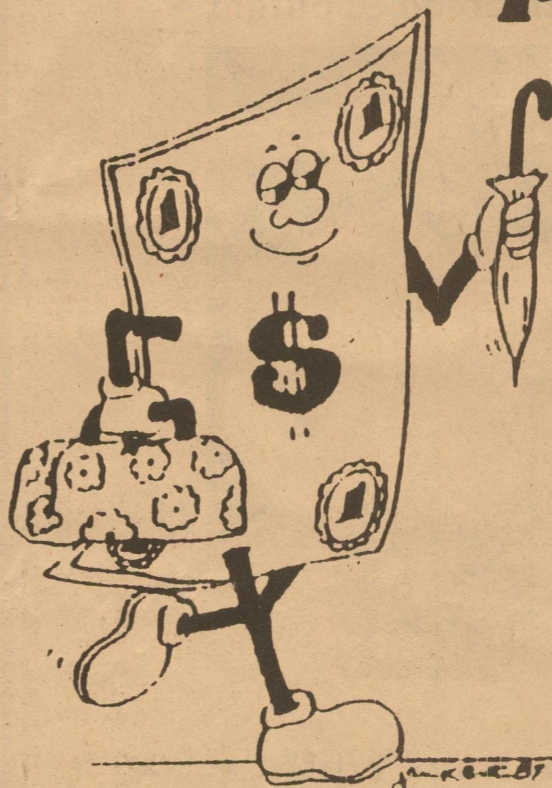

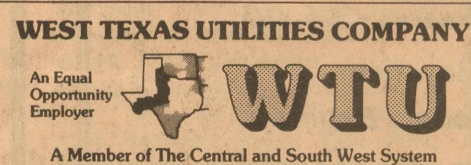
