Washington**

Miss Betty Harbin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Harbin, of Muleshoe has just returned from a twelve day visit to Washington, D. C. She represented Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association of Muleshoe. The trip was sponsored by the Texas Electric Cooperatives, Inc.

Eighty-one Texas boys and girls left Waxahachie, Texas, June 12 and returned June 23. The bus trip took three days. In these three days, the kids became well acquainted with one another, which was the purpose of taking the bus instead of flying.

In Washington, they toured the historical monuments, most of them at night because of their beauty after dark. They spent one day in the Smithsonian Institution and visited Mount Vernon, the Washington, Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the Wax Museum and the Archives, At the White House, William Anders, one of the Apollo crewmen, spoke to them. They then toured the White House.

The young Texans hosted a reception for their U.S. Senators and Representatives at the new Sam Rayburn Building, where they met their congressmen.

The delegation attended Rural Youth Day, which was sponsored by the National Rural Electrification Cooperative Association. It was attended also by all the other state delegations that were present. The program was held at the Marriott Motel where the Texas delegation and several other state delegations stayed during their visit.

They enjoyed a cruise on the Potomac River, watched the Marine Corps Honor Ceremony at the Iwo Jima Memorial and watched the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. A tour of the Capital Building included a visit to a session of the House of Representatives.

The Texas delegation traditionally lays a wreath on the grave of President John F. Kennedy in Arlington National Cemetery. A boy and girl are chosen each time to represent the delegation. This time, a former Muleshoe girl, Miss Jill Marie Wheeler, now of Floydada, laid the wreath on the grave.

On the way home, after a very eventful trip, the delegation stopped in Chattanooga, Tennessee, for a devotional service atop Lookout Mountain. Their last night was spent in Texarkana, where they held a goodbye party and a tacky contest before returning to Waxahachie where their parents and sponsors met them.

The purpose of this program is to provide young people a look at their government in action. These youths represent the rural youth of America.

Miss Harbin said the most interesting point to her was the pollution problem. She had not realized the extent of pollution in this country. She said almost every river and lake she passed was marked; polluted. Living in Muleshoe, she had never been exposed to the problem America is facing with pollution.

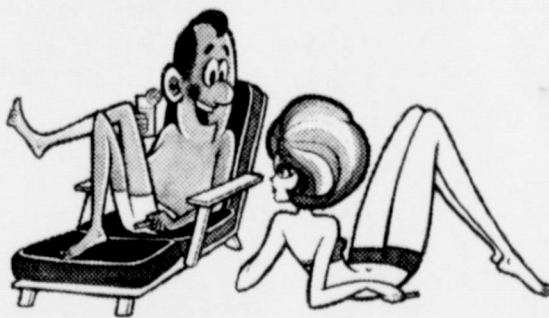

## Homemakers Attend Canning And Freezing Demonstrations

Nineteen homemakers attended the two canning and freezing demonstrations in the kitchen of the Catholic Center, June 19 and 23. Conducting the classes were Mrs. Robin Taylor, Bailey County Home Demonstration Agent and Mrs. Pete Jesko, former Farmer County Home Demonstration Agent.

Highlights of the demonstrations were: canning by the one step, cold pack method for low acid vegetables in the pressure canner and the boiling water bath for tomatoes and fruits.

A special canning and pickling salt was used for canning the vegetables to prevent cloudiness of the liquid. Jar lids were checked for a ringing sound, a test of a good

seal. To get a good seal on pickles and chow-chow, a short boiling water bath was used.

Mrs. Jesko showed how fresh fruit may be frozen in pies or cobbler, wrapped and stored in the freezer. They are a time saver for quick desserts weeks and months later. Other fruits were dry sugar packed with ascorbic acid powder and frozen in moisture vapor proof containers.

Vegetables were blanched according to time and directions, cooled, drained, packaged in moisture vapor proof bags; filled bags were submerged in warm water, closed, and stored in the freezer.

Last year the Post Office handled about 82 billion pieces of mail. In another 10 years the figure will reach almost 110 billion pieces. Unless something drastic is done now, just imagine what the operating deficit will be in coming years.  
For the past 14 months the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee has been laboring over postal reform. The product of their deliberations was the Postal Reorganization and Salary Adjustment Act of 1970. The Act will provide many meaningful and economic reforms in our national postal system. The Act converts the Post Office Department into an independent establishment in the Executive Branch of Government. It frees the Department from political pressures. Finally, and most importantly, it provides the means by which a truly superior mail service can be developed on a business-like basis.

My main reservation about the legislation centered on my strong opposition to a provision which would have legalized the union shop in the Post Office Department. As badly as Post Office reform is needed, I would have voted against the reform package had the final version contained the union shop.

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clause. No person should be forced to join a union as a precondition to working for his government. Besides, I felt if this were allowed it would set a dangerous precedent, and unions would have made a giant step toward their stated goal of unionizing public employees at all levels of government. Fortunately, many other Members believed as I did; and together, we were able to remove the offensive provision from the Act.

In the final analysis, the Postal Reform Act is the biggest overhaul of the U.S. postal system since its inception. I am proud to be a member of the Administration's team that worked to bring the idea of postal reform to fruition. Once, the Act has passed Congress, however, it is up to Post Office officials to make it work. For several years Congress has been told the mail service would be greatly improved by certain reforms. The 91st Congress, under President Nixon's guidance has substantially enacted these reforms. Only time will tell if the performance of the new post office meets our expectation.

The president, Nolan Harlan, gave a short talk on what had been accomplished by Farmers Union in the past four years and what is happening now. All of the officers were present for the meeting.

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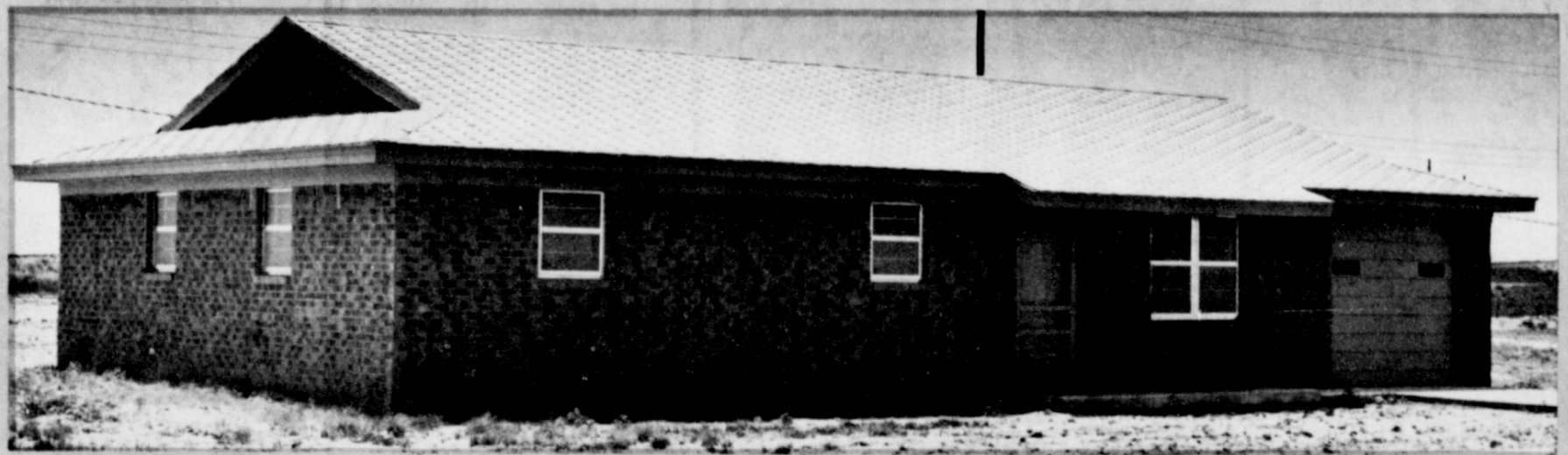

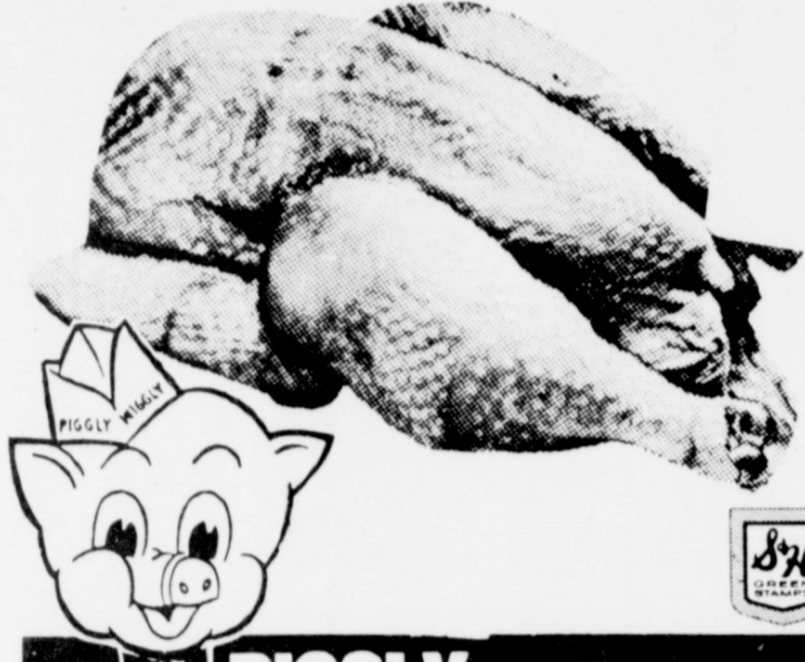
