Eagles Buffalo Bulldogs

The Eldorado Eagles defeated the Eden Bulldogs in their season opener in Eden last Friday night, 14-6.

Eden scored early with a drive that was set up by a slant pass play to an Eden receiver. With over eight minutes remaining in the first quarter, the bulldogs were able to score. The 6-0 score held through three quarters with both teams appearing rusty. Penalties were plentiful with Menard collecting 8 for 105 yards and Eldorado 6 for 40 yards.

In the fourth quarter, Reagan Bownds took a fake punt 65 yards for the touchdown. T.C. Willis made the important point after the touchdown to bring the Eagles to the forefront 7-6. This seemed to rally the team and Bownds was able to score again with a 25 yard run.

Quarterback Farley

Dakan completed one pass to Chris Meador for 27 yards.

Eldorado had 11 first downs with 208 rushing yards and 27 passing yards compared to Eden's 7 first downs with 48 rushing yards and 60 passing yards.

The Eldorado punting average was a low 15 yard average for 6 punts, but the Eagles held on to the ball and had no fumbles during this game.

Said Coach Doug Kuhlmann, "We did not play enthusiastically until the touchdown off the fake punt." Kuhlmann commented that the play was sloppy, but "a win is a win."

This Friday night the Eagles meet a strong Menard team here. The Yellowjackets will be coming off of a high, after their defeat of the 3A Ingram team last Friday.

Hamilton Honored At JTPA Assembly

On August 20, 1992 Loraine Hamilton was honored at the first annual JTPA (Job Training Partnership Act) Alumni Awards Assembly. Ms. Hamilton, as well as sixteen other organizations and successful clients from the Concho Valley region were recognized.

Loraine Hamilton and fellow JTPA Alumni were honored at an awards assembly at the Holiday Inn Convention Center in San Angelo, Texas. The event was part of "National JTPA Alumni Month," a nationwide salute to America's job training successes.

Mrs. Hamilton has been working with the JTPA programs for more than a decade. She has acted as the supervisor for the clerical

assistants at the Schleicher County Courthouse hired through the youth work programs sponsored by the Concho Valley Council of Governments. Ms. Hamilton has been responsible for providing quality skills training to the participants as well as counseling regarding future educational options.

Since 1982, programs funded by JTPA have assisted over 4 million Americans, over 771 last year in the Concho Valley alone, in gaining the necessary skills to find and keep jobs. The act provides federal funds to state and local agencies for a vast array of programs that train and employ youths, underskilled adults, dislocated workers, welfare recipients and others who face serious barriers to employment.

p.m. Anyone who wants to file a claim for benefits, get information, or transact other business with the Social Security Administration may contact him at this time.

Friday Declared 9-1-1 Day

Governor Ann Richards will proclaim Friday, September 11, 1992 as 9-1-1 Emergency Number Day in Texas and urges appropriate recognition.

The implementation and use of the 9-1-1 emergency number allows citizens to summon help quickly in emergency situations.

The three-digit number has replaced thousands of seven-digit emergency numbers across our state and nation. The growing use of the 9-1-1 emergency number has simplified the task of reporting emergencies.

Approximately 50 to 60 percent of the American people have access to the 9-1-1 service. The National Emergency Number Association's goal of "One Nation - One Number" will make requesting emergency services identical anywhere in the nation.

The 9-1-1 emergency telephone system increases public confidence in the accessibility of prompt and efficient emergency services.

The people of Texas should be encouraged to recognize the positive impact 9-1-1 service has had on so many of their lives. We are all grateful for the efforts of everyone involved in establishing and maintaining this vital service.

Second and Third graders are making posters to be displayed at the PSAP (Public Safety Answering Point) to recognize the important role telecommunicators play in linking citizens with police, fire or emergency medical services in time of an emergency. Every individual participating will receive a certificate from the Concho Valley Council of Governments.

Community Resource Center

The Schleicher County Commissioner's Court, Texas Department of Health, Texas Department of Human Services and Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation have recently signed a contract with the Health and Human Commission for the implementation of a client access package as mandated by HB7. The County has signed a lease to rent a building at 105 W. Callender for the purposes of housing the Community Resource Center. The Community Resource Center is a result of two of the components of HB7 - co-location and collaboration. Services provided through the Community Resource Center are targeted for residents of Schleicher County. Non-residents will have access to information and referral. Renovations necessary to comply with The Americans

with Disabilities Act are expected to be complete by September 15 after which time caseworkers currently providing services in Schleicher County will begin to use this new facility. Furniture is expected to begin arriving September 8.

Services to be provided at the Community Resource Center include, but are not limited to the following:

Medical Indigent Care; Food Stamps/AFOC/Medicaid; Services to the elderly; Services to persons with disabilities; WIC; Immunizations; TDH - Case Management; JTPA; Substance Abuse; Family Shelter; Family Planning; Primary Health Care; Mental Health Community Services; Social Security; Commodity Foods/ HUD; Texas Employment Commission - Unemployment claims & workshop; Information and referral; Medicaid for aged and

disabled.

Access to services will begin with either a telephone call or walking into the Community Resource Center. In either case they will be greeted by a casework assistant who will be trained in determining the need to be met. The casework assistant will be able to collect the basic data, make referrals to the correct agencies, provide information on documentation needed for an interview, and schedule an appointment with the service provider.

Grand opening of the facility is scheduled for October 27, 1992. Any inquiries about the program should be directed to Lorain Hamilton at the Schleicher County Court House. She may be contacted at (915) 853-2766.

The Texas Employment Commission representative will be in Eldorado every

September 3, 1992, from 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon. This representative will accept claims for unemployment insurance and answer questions concerning filing for unemployment. This is the same representative that serves Ozona. Residents of Sonora, Menard, Junction and Ozona that miss the representative in Ozona may come to Eldorado, saving a trip into San Angelo.

The Texas Employment Commission offers a free service to help you perfect your job hunting skills. Applications will be taken on those interested in relocating. They will assist you in successful resume preparation, applications, interviewing skills and referrals to open jobs in the San Angelo area. The first seminar is to be held October 2, 1992 from 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. at the Community Resource Center, 105 W. Callendar, Eldorado, Texas.

Alta Stevens Cain passed away Saturday, September 5, 1992, at her ranch home outside of Eldorado at the age of 81.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church of Eldorado, Tuesday, September 8, at 2:00 p.m.

She was born on June 21, 1911, in Harper, Texas to Mr. and Mrs. A.J. Stevens. Her family moved to Schleicher County in 1922. She was married to Peyton Cain in 1930.

After they married, Mr.

and Mrs. Cain moved to Comstock, Texas, where she coached girls basketball for two years. They then moved to Alpine where Mrs. Cain attended Sul Ross. She graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in 1937. She also had additional hours toward her masters degree.

During World War II, she and her husband bought an interest in Alpine Drug Store. She became bookkeeper of this store until she purchased land in Schleicher County in 1944, where she ranched until Mr. Cain's return from military service

in 1946.

In 1948, Mr. and Mrs. Cain returned to Alpine where he was superintendent of schools for 14 years. Mrs. Cain taught fifth grade in Alpine Central School. After Mr. Cain's retirement, they returned to Eldorado where Mrs. Cain continued her teaching career at the sixth grade level for another 16 years. She retired from teaching in Schleicher County ISD in 1976.

She is survived by her husband of 62 years; her son and daughter-in-law, Bedford Peyton "Beep" Cain III and Sara Cain of San Angelo; her

daughter and son-in-law, Jane and James A. Kosub of San Antonio; four grandchildren, Kate Kosub, Channon Cain, Meredith Cain and Wes Cochran; her sister, Mrs. Colleen Swatzell of Eldorado; and nieces and nephews.

She was preceded in death by her grandson, Nicholas Anthony Kosub this past October.

Health News

Children that cannot sit still, have a short attention span, or poor concentration may have just too much energy or may have Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD). ADD is also known as hyperactivity. ADD is a syndrome that we do not know the cause of. Children with ADD usually show symptoms by seven years old. The teacher or the parents may notice that the child has a short attention span, is impulsive, squirms and fidgets in their seat. You may also observe that the child is poorly organized, they don't complete their homework or other tasks that they start on. The teacher will notice the child constantly blurts out answers without being called on, or they may get out of their chair and roam around the classroom.

Children with ADD do best in a well structured environment with individual attention from their teachers

and parents. A child with ADD may appear disobedient, but their actions are usually involuntary. Children with ADD usually respond well to special education, individual tutoring, and psychological counseling. Parents may want to join a support group to see how other parents are dealing with the situation.

Sugar, chocolate, and food preservatives have been

linked to ADD. Usually as the child grows older the symptoms will disappear, but sometimes adolescents and adults will have the symptoms of ADD.

The parents and teachers need to work together if they suspect that a child has ADD, so that it can be recognized early. ADD is a syndrome not a disease so people with ADD can live a normal life.

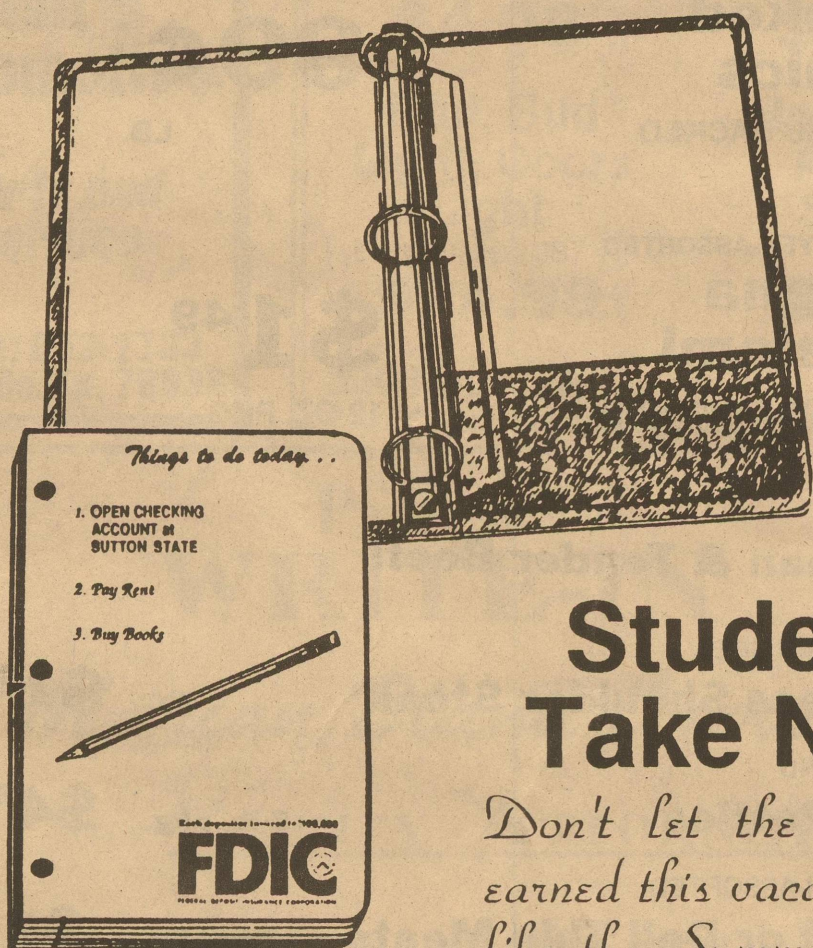

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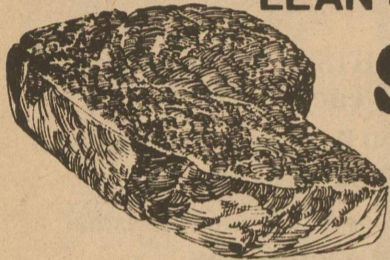

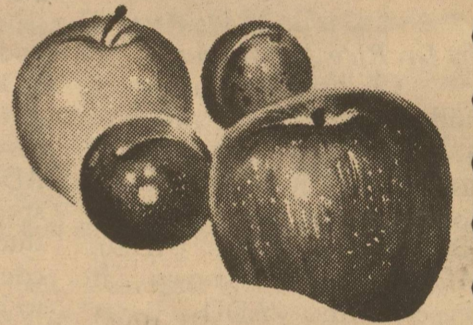

After a month's hard practice, the first game was played in Eldorado. The opponent was Sonora. This was Eldorado's first football game, and many people turned out to see it.

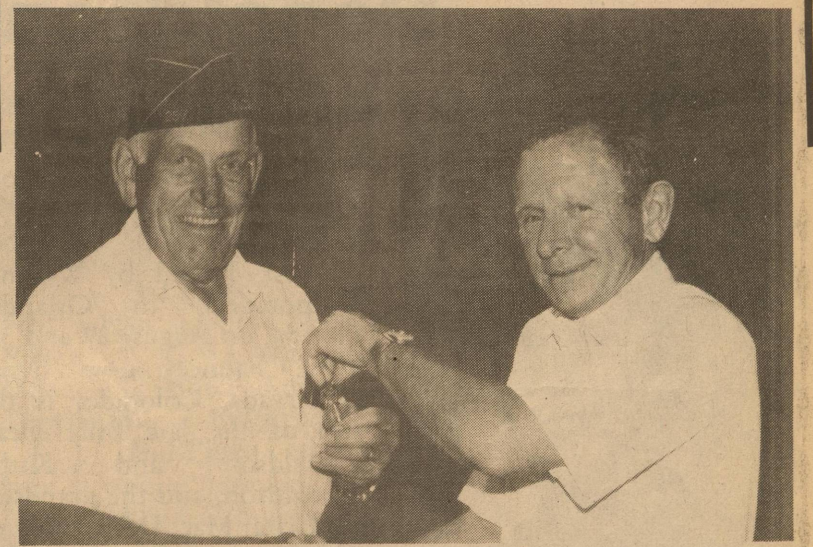
The following Saturday, a game was played with Ozona at Eldorado. The next

ASCS Crop Loss Fund Update

President George Bush announced an additional \$755 million in emergency funds for crop losses incurred in 1990, 1991 and 1992. This is in addition to the \$955 million disaster assistance for 1990-91 crops announced by

RECYCLING PROGRAM FACTORS

Communities that want to recycle can usually find a business or two that will take most recyclables. The application period for disaster claims on fall-seeded program crops planted in 1991 and harvested in 1992 will begin September 8th and end October 2nd, Harris said. This application period for producers with losses on other 1992 crops, and for producers with losses from 1990 or 1991 crops who did not previously receive disaster payments for those losses, will begin on October 13 and end February 12, 1993.

"Disaster assistance is available on a per-farm basis for any two years of 1990, 1991 or 1992," Harris said. "The original program provided \$955 million for either 1990 or 1991. Now,

relief will also be provided for fall-seeded program crops planted in 1991 for harvest in 1992.

"Producers will be eligible to apply for assistance on 1990, 1991 or 1992 crop losses; however, if producers received assistance for any of those years they may not receive further assistance for that crop year. Producers who receive payments for fall-seeded program crops will only be eligible for assistance for 1992 crop losses."

Producers with qualifying gross revenues of less than \$2 million per year may file claims for losses of participating and nonparticipating program and nonprogram crops. "Producers with crop insurance must have had

losses greater than 35 percent," Harris said. "Producers without crop insurance must have had losses greater than 40 percent. Producers with 1992 crop losses are required, under certain conditions, to purchase crop insurance for 1993."

Harris said producers intending to file for assistance should begin to assemble their records now, so they will be ready when the official application period opens and they should contact their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service officer for additional information.

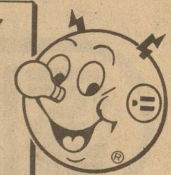

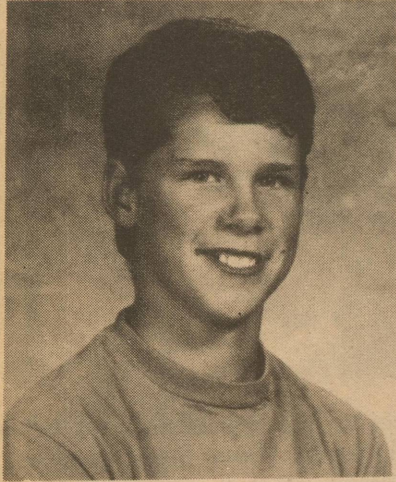

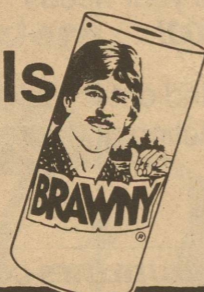

Tire Recycling Information

After years of research, STDC designed and constructed the most efficient waste tire processing system in existence today. Our facility is capable of processing over 1,500 tires per hour into small chips that can then be utilized for a variety of recycling uses. These facilities employ over 30 people and provide disposal services on a statewide basis.

STDC has taken the difficult solid waste problem of used tire disposal and provided a solution by converting the material into a useful product. Here's how it works. Tires are logged into our facility by weight. The tires are off-loaded onto conveyor belts that transport the tires into the shredding system. The shredding system reduces the tire material into

chips approximately 2" in diameter. The chips are then sorted to assure that each chip meets strict environmental standards. If a chip is too large, it is recirculated through the shredding system until it meets the size requirement. All processed material is then weighed before being conveyed out of the facility and deposited in a holding area.

STDC is proud to be a part of the solution to this serious health and environmental problem. We worked to pass one of the most progressive tire recycling laws in this country. The law establishes a fund which is administered by the State. Each time you buy a new tire, a fee is collected for the disposal of your old tire. This money is earmarked for use in eliminating illegal tire

dumping sites. In order for a permitted waste tire facility to be paid from the fund, it must demonstrate: that a portion of the tires processed come from an illegal dump site; that it offers statewide pickup and delivery service; and that it provides these services at no additional tipping fee to the tire dealer.

The processed tire chips can then be used to provide a variety of recycled products. They have a BTU value greater than coal and are being utilized as fuel supplements in various applications. Further

reduction of these chips creates a wire and fiber free crumb rubber which can be used in the manufacture of molded rubber goods. Research is on-going for added rubber to asphalt to create a more durable paving product, thus extending the road life of our highways. Of all recyclables in our waste stream today, tires have the potential to be 100% reused!

A total of 1475 tires have been collected so far in the van at City Hall. An empty van is on hand and ready for any more tires that need to be disposed of.

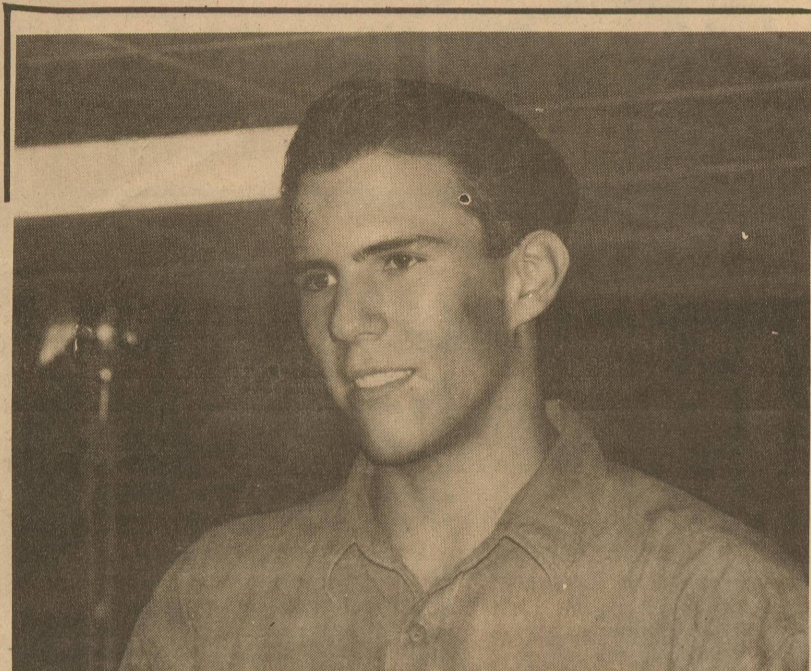
