## Eldorado To Be Honored By Keep Texas Beautiful Officials

The City of Eldorado will be honored by Keep Texas Beautiful officials at a special ceremony in which Eldorado will be presented "Keep Texas Beautiful Proud Community" steel roadway signs to honor the community's efforts in environmental improvement.

Su Ann Wade-Crouse, Staff President of Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc. will present Mayor Nikolauk, and city and county officials with the signs to be mounted on the population signs in Eldorado. The signs were provided through support from the

Steel Can Recycling Institute and will be installed and maintained by the Texas Department of Transportation.

The presentation ceremony will be held Friday, October 9 at 10:00 a.m. It will be held outside the Courthouse on the steps facing the flags and historical marker.

The community of Eldorado should be very proud of their efforts in setting a standard for other communities to follow in their beautification and litter prevention in and around the city. The month of October is

a very important month for Eldorado with this ceremony and also the grand opening of the County Resource Center which will be held October 27.

The Chamber Pride Committee asks everyone to continue mowing along streets and highways going into and out of town as well as in your own streets and neighborhoods. Also, they urge everyone to continue using the recycling bins downtown and cleaning up trash on streets citywide.

The Chamber Pride Committee applied for the Proud Community status

through Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc. Eldorado was awarded this designation at the Keep Texas Beautiful Convention in July. The KTB Proud Community Program was designed to establish a standard for annual approval and recognition of Texas Communities whose ongoing litter prevention and community beautification efforts are representative of the goals designed by Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc.

Everyone in the community is urged to attend this special ceremony on Friday, October 9.

## Rodeo Team Hosts High School Rodeo

October 2nd and 3rd, Saturday and Sunday, the Eldorado High School Rodeo Team will host the Texas High Rodeo Association's fourth rodeo of the year. These rodeos are held in different towns throughout the Region II area and are hosted by that town's local team.

The performances will begin Saturday afternoon at 5:00 p.m. and resume on Sunday at 9:00 a.m. with church services. The events will begin at 10:00 a.m.

The Eldorado Rodeo Club, which is self-supported, was organized in 19883. Each student pays their own membership dues, entry fees, and expenses to and from the rodeos. The school sponsor, who helped organize the local club, is Bill Wells, high school art teacher. The school presents a letter jacket to a student when he or she has earned 30 points. These points can be earned in 4 years or less. These letter jackets are to represent that rodeo has been accepted by the school system as being a

sport. Being accepted by the school means the same rules apply - no pass, no play.

A rodeo team must have 4 members per team and the points they earn are based on a team point system. The six members with the highest points in the region get to go to the state finals in Abilene. The top four point earners go from State to the Nationals.

In the history of the Eldorado Rodeo Club we have had two qualifiers to go to the nationals and have had qualifiers for state finals the last six years.

The following students are signed up this year for the Eldorado High School Rodeo Club. They are: Lindsay Johnson, Jodi Hooten, Stoney Harris, Mandy Belk, Jaime Belk, Rusty Criswell, Erika Pina, Isis Pina, and Patrick Harriman. These members, along with their parents and supporting friends, will be putting on the rodeo this week-end. 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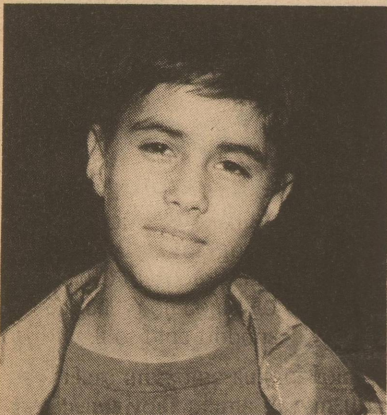

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## QMB Program Available In Schleicher County

The Qualified Medicare Beneficiaries program or QMB program is administered by the Texas Department of Human Services.

To be eligible for QMB, a person must be enrolled in Medicare Part A, be at least 65 years of age or disabled as determined by the Social Security Administration, or have Chronic Renal Disease.

Maximum gross monthly income for an individual must be less than \$588.00 per month or \$788.00 for a couple.

Income includes Social Security benefits, Railroad Retirement benefits, state or local retirement benefits, interest or dividends, gifts or

contributions, civil service annuities, veterans benefits, private pension benefits, royalty or rental payments and earnings or wages.

The maximum countable resources must be less than \$4,000.00 for an individual or \$6,000.00 for a couple.

Resources include bank accounts and CD's, real property, life insurance policies, burial plots and funds, stocks and bonds, oil, gas, and mineral rights, jewelry and antiques, cars and other vehicles.

Some items which can be excluded in determining eligibility include the homestead where the individual or his spouse

reside or a homestead to which they intend to return; life insurance if the face value is \$1,500.00 or less, burial funds of \$1,500.00 (less any excluded life insurance); car worth less than \$4,500.00 or more if needed for medical transportation; and burial spaces for the individual, spouse and close relatives.

The benefits of the QMB program include payment of the Medicare premiums. The part B premium for 1992 is normally \$31.80 which is deducted from a person's gross Social Security Benefit. Other benefits of the program include payment of deductibles and CO-insurance fees for Medicare-covered services. As a QMB, an individual does not receive regular Medicaid benefits.

Each month the department sends the QMB special identification card which should be presented to the QMB's medical providers.

## Mammograms Detect Breast Cancer Early

Breast cancer cannot be prevented, but early detection can save many lives. Breast cancer will strike one in nine American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 44,000 women will die of breast cancer this year.

Experts estimate that if every woman had regular mammograms according to guidelines established by the American Cancer Society, nearly a third of the women who die of breast cancer would survive. The guidelines are: A) begin mammography by age 40; B) age 40-49 mammogram every 1-2 years; C) over age 50 annual mammogram; D) monthly breast self-examination; E) regular breast exams by a physician. Mammography is the best means for early detection of breast cancer.

Transamerican Diagnostic Services has been accredited by the American College of Radiology since 1989. The American College of Radiology program is voluntary and designed to insure women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The accredita-

tion is done through evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, (technologist, radiologist, and physicist), equipment, quality control, quality assurance, image quality, and breast dose. Transamerican diagnostic services is also approved by the Texas Department of Health to accept self referred patients and is approved by Medicare as a provider to the Medicare Mammography Program.

Transamerican Diagnostic Services, recently has been contracted by the Texas Department of Health to be an official provider for low income women. Transamerican Diagnostic Services will have a Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit available to local women on Thursday, October 1st. The unit will be parked at Schleicher County Medical Center, 400 West Murchison, Eldorado, Texas. Appointments may be made by calling 853-2507.

## ASU Adult And Continuing Education

Medical Spanish, computers for kids, etiquette, managing multiple priorities and becoming a winner are some of the new areas being presented this fall through Angelo State University's Division of Adult and Continuing Education.

"Medical Spanish" is a seven-week course designed to achieve essential communication between a patient and the medical staff. After learning the mechanics and pronunciation of the Spanish language, participants can practice giving instructions to patients, asking patients questions, medical terminology, key words, medications and illnesses.

Participants in "Medical Spanish" will meet from 6 to 9 p.m. on Tuesdays, Sept. 29 through Nov. 10. Claudia Barua, a native Spanish speaker, will instruct the class. Cost is \$63.

Youth ages eight through 14 can learn how a computer works and what it can and cannot do during "Computers for Kids." Students will participate in group activities and computer demonstrations while using computer games to brush up on their academic skills. Each student will work on a computer in one of the University's microcomputer labs.

"Computers for Kids" will be held from 10 a.m. to noon on Saturdays, Oct. 3-24. Cost is \$48. The course will be taught by Dwain Gilliam, a computer expert who has a special interest in exposing youth to the world of computer science.

Community members have an opportunity to participate in up to three shortcourses designed to

enhance their professional skills. "Professional Etiquette" will be held Sept. 28 and Oct. 5 (Mondays) from 6 to 9 p.m. cost is \$19, and Dana Lofties is course instructor. "Packaging and Presenting Yourself as a Winner," taught by Noram Parry, is scheduled for Mondays, Oct. 12-26, from 6 to 9 P.m. cost is \$29. Also scheduled from 6 to 9 p.m. on Mondays, "Managing Multiple Priorities" will meet Nov. 9-23. Cost is \$29; Susan Brooks will conduct the course.

"Professional Etiquette" explores the world of manners from business situations to

personal etiquette. Participants will discuss verbal and written communication skills, gifts, telephone etiquette, grooming, wardrobe, travel tips, table manners, making introductions, having or being a house guest and entertaining.

Topics to be explored during "Packaging and Presenting Yourself as a Winner" include what colors work best for you, dressing styles, identifying your style, dressing effectively and accessorizing. Tips presented in the course can help make

you a more polished professional.

In today's workplace, handling multiple assignments and demands from several people including bosses, project managers, and CO-workers is the rule, not the exception. The three-day "Managing Multiple Priorities" class can help you find answers to the dilemma of accomplishing multiple workloads in a limited time.

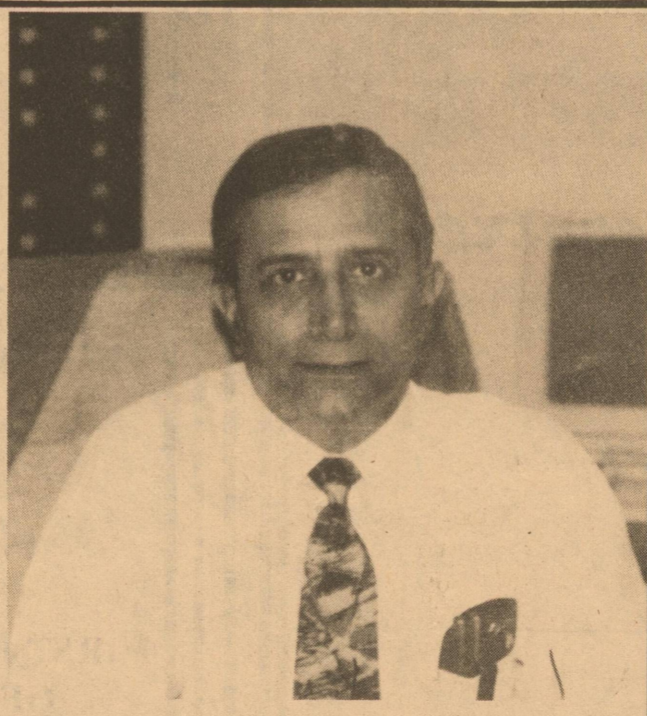

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# October 4-10 - Fire Prevention Week

The Texas Commission on Fire Protection challenges all Texans to ask themselves, "How fire safe is MY home?" during Fire Prevention Week October 4-10. By focusing on home fire prevention, the commission is striving to continue a four-year trend of reduced fires in the state.

Statistics from fire departments across the state show that reported fires decreased from 103,000 in 1988 to 88,000 in 1991. "That means Texas had 8,000 fires per 1 million people in 1988, but only 7,000 fires per 1 million people in 1991," said Michael E. Hines, commission executive director.

"The decrease was primarily in outdoor fires," he added. "To continue the trend in reducing all fires, every Texan must help prevent fire in the home."

The Texas Fire Incident Reporting System reported that although the number of outdoor fires went down almost 7,000 in 1991, building fires increased by about 300 and vehicle fires went up about 100. The fire reporting system collected data from 373 fire departments protecting 72 percent of the state's population.

Other statistics for 1991 showed that: \* Seventy-five percent of all structure fires occurred in residences.

\* 179 people died and 1,583 people were injured in home fires.

\* The leading causes of residential fires were careless cooking, heating equipment, arson, and careless smoking.

Because home fires continue to account for the largest number of structure fires and fire casualties, state Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson encouraged families to focus on home fire safety. All family members can help check for fire hazards, such as

unsafe cooking and smoking habits, improper use of heating equipment, and improper storage of flammable liquids.

"Every home should have enough smoke alarms, and all smoke alarms should be tested each month," Emerson said.

Hines explained that because fire occurrence is influenced by so many factors it is impossible to pinpoint specific reasons for the trend in fire reduction.

"Economic conditions, weather, changes in

demographics and public awareness all influence fire occurrence," he said.

"However, it is certain that the human factor is a key to preventing fires. It is time for all Texans to realize that fire prevention is every individual's responsibility. By focusing on home fire safety this Fire Prevention Week, Texans can help reduce fires in an area that continues to cause a tragic waste of lives, energy and resources."

Fire Prevention Week is traditionally observed during the week of October 9, the

anniversary of the 1871 "Great Chicago Fire" that killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings valued at the time at \$168 million. Even the best fire suppression capabilities were unable to contain the fire. As a result, the public and the fire service began thinking in terms of fire prevention.

## How Fire Safe Is YOUR Home?

### Texas Commission on Fire Protection Home Inspection Checklist

Make fire safety a "family business" by involving the entire family in a fire safety inspection. Here's a comprehensive checklist to use as a guide.

#### FIRE HAZARDS:

Check for fire hazards in your home. Correct any problems NOW.

#### Kitchen

- Matches stored out of reach of children
- No overloaded outlets or extension cords
- No curtains or towel racks close to the range.
- Flammable liquids (cleaning fluids, contact adhesives, etc.) or aerosols stored away from the range or other heat source (Remember, even a pilot light can set vapors on fire.)
- No attractive or frequently used items stored above the range where someone could get burned reaching for them (especially small children in search of cookies or other goodies)
- No worn or frayed appliance or extension cords

#### Living Room, Family Room, Den, Bedrooms

- Matches and lighters stored out of reach of children
- Use only large ashtrays (small ashtrays are too dangerous)
- Empty ashtrays frequently (when all signs of heat and burning are gone)
- Fireplace kept screened and cleaned regularly.
- Replace worn or frayed extension cords or other electrical cords
- No extension cords run under rugs or carpets or looped over nails or other sharp objects that could cause them to fray
- Sufficient air space around TV, stereo and other electronic equipment to avoid overheating

#### Basement, Garage, Storage Areas

- Heating equipment kept three feet away from curtains, furniture, and papers
- No overloaded outlets or extension cords
- No newspapers or other rubbish stored near furnace, water heater, or other heat source
- No oily, greasy rags stored, except when kept in labeled and sealed non-glass containers (preferably metal)
- No overloaded outlets or extension cords

- All fuses of the correct size
- No gasoline stored in the house or basement (It should be stored away from the house in an outbuilding and only in safety cans that have flame arresters and pressure-relief valves.)
- No flammable liquids stored near workbench or pilot light or in anything other than labeled, sealed metal containers (This includes varnish, paint remover, paint thinner, contact adhesives, cleaning fluids.)

#### DANGEROUS ACTIONS:

- Do you allow unsafe habits? These guidelines may help your family become more safety aware.
- Wear close-fitting sleeves while cooking (No loose sleeves, shirts, blouses or skirts that may catch fire.)
  - Never leaving cooking unattended
  - Never play with matches or lighters
  - Never use gasoline to start a fire in the grill or add lighter fluid to an already-started fire
  - No smoking in bed, or in a chair or on the sofa when tired, drinking or taking medication
  - Never spray aerosols while smoking or near a space heater, range or other ignition source
  - No smoking while using a cleaning fluid, paint thinner or other flammable liquid
  - Never use a cigarette lighter after spilling flammable fluid on your hands or clothing
  - Never reach over a range or climb onto a range to get something stored above it
  - Never lean against a range for warmth or stand too close to a heater or fireplace
  - Never let a small child to blow out a match
  - Never use a lighted match, lighter or candle to illuminate a dark area, such as a closet

#### SAFETY MEASURES:

- Do you have these safety items in your home?
- Working smoke detectors on all levels and outside sleeping areas (each story or wing, basement, etc.) Have you tested the detector in the last month? Changed the batteries within the last year?
  - ABC or ABCD fire extinguisher in the kitchen and/or workshop
  - Emergency exit plan, with two ways out from each room and a meeting place outdoors

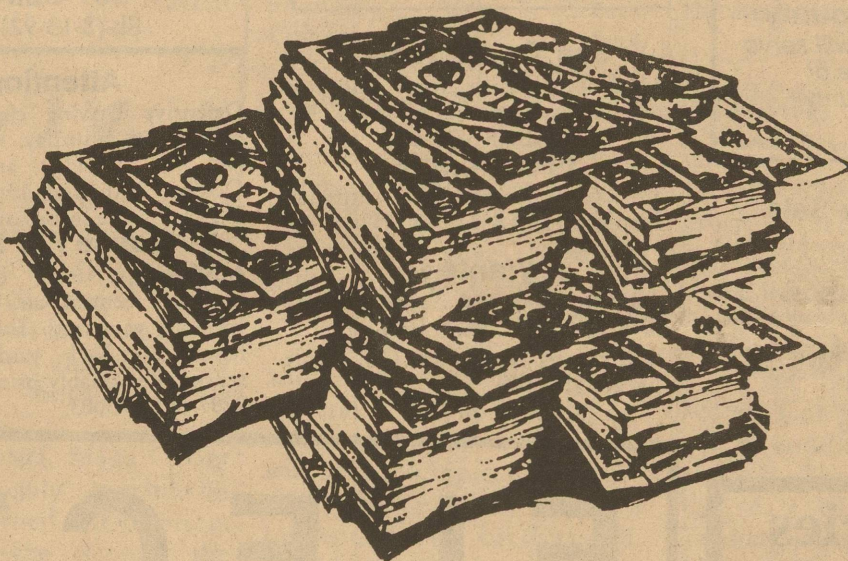
