Eagles Clobber Coahoma

It was a banner night for Reagen Bownds as he led the Eldorado Eagles in rushing yards in their defeat of the Coahoma Bulldogs this past Friday night. October 2nd was a night that the Eagles strutted their stuff in Coahoma.

With 397 rushing yards the Eldorado team conquered a testy Coahoma squad. Bownds had 17 carries for 231 yards. Casey Triplet had 13 carries for 106 yards, followed by Jorge Arispe with 8 for 25, Farley Dakan with 4 for 32

and Landon Neal with 2 for 3.

Farley Dakan completed 7 of 14 passes for a total of 84 yards. Matt Peters had 4 receptions for 47 yards, followed by Hunter Preston with 2 receptions for 28 yards and Chris Meador with 1 reception for 9.

According to Coach Doug Kuhlmann, this game was "A great tribute to our offense line."

The offensive line is made up of... Tackles - Joe Sanchez, T.C. Willis, Trent

Manning and Joel Martinez; Guards - Carlos Estrada, Jamie Sanchez, Jamey Belk and Robert Sanchez and Center - Julian Martinez.

Coach Kuhlmann also commended his defensive team. "Defense played will setting up touchdowns for the offense and holding Coahoma's rushing attack."

This was an important win for the Eagles to stay in the district race.

"We must continue to play well, but reduce mistakes, to make a legitimate run for

the play-offs," stated Kuhlmann.

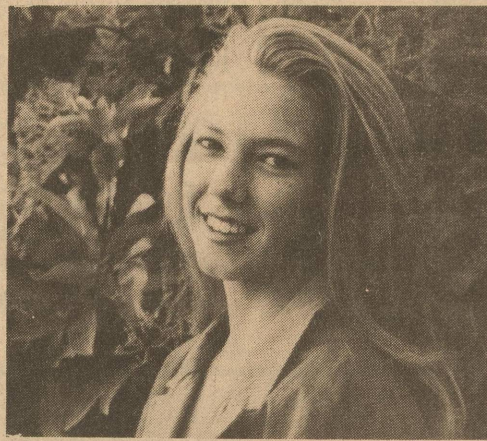

The Schleicher county Medical Center in Eldorado will be hosting the Health Fair on Thursday, October 22nd from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Memorial Building.

The Annual Health Fair is a valuable public service provided by the hospital which catches problems that otherwise would go undetected and raises awareness of various health services available in the area.

As this goes to press we do not have all the confirmed participants but we are hoping for the following services: Cholesterol and Blood Sugar check

United Blood Services - blood donors and blood typing

Beltone - to conduct hearing tests

Girling, Hospice, T.L.C. Home Health Displays

Schleicher County Medical Center Auxiliary

Schleicher County Pilot Team - which includes The Department of Human and Health Services, Mental Health and Mental Retardation Department.

The Schleicher County Medical Center will give flu shots for \$4.00. The National Center for Disease Control is recommending that those particularly at risk for flu get their shots as soon as possible. The vaccine takes about 2 weeks to take effect.

People at high risk for flu complication are those over age 65 and people with

heart and lung diseases, diabetes, kidney disorders, chronic anemia and immune system disorders.

While the vaccine will not always prevent a person from getting the flu, it helps reduce serious complications,

such as pneumonia, which can be fatal.

Flu vaccine is also available at Br. Peaslee's and Dr. Storey's offices for \$5.00.

TOP OF THE DIVIDE by Thomas Giovannitti

If you have not been to the courthouse you need to take a walk over here. The Monarch Butterflies are gathering here in our trees awaiting the next part of their trip to Mexico. They look so neat as they rest, hanging off the tree limbs like so many dry autumn leaves. A breeze or a passer by may send a few scurrying in the air like leaves too light to fall.

A friend of mine who is also a pilot told me he

encountered Monarch at 15,000 feet when he was flying back from Missouri. He also says they rest in the trees on his farm in Missouri also.

Considering that they migrate from Canada and are going into Mexico they probably need to rest every so often. These insects travel incredible distances just to have their young and avoid the harsh winter, of course. What gets me is that they are pretty small, not like ducks or

geese or some of the other migratory birds.

At a distance they look uniformly the same. Not being a devoted student of these Monarchs (I don't even know if the are butterflies or moths) they may in fact be as different from each other as snowflakes but their appearance seems to belie that fact. When I look up into the trees here it is often quite difficult to see them as individual creatures or even

creatures at all. At rest their wings don't seem to be quite so bright an orange as they are in flight. Probably this is camouflage from whatever predators eat bugs. On the other hand it may merely be that at rest, with their wings not extended they appear more dusty.

None of this may seem very important but just come and take a look at these amazing creatures and decide then if it is not so important.

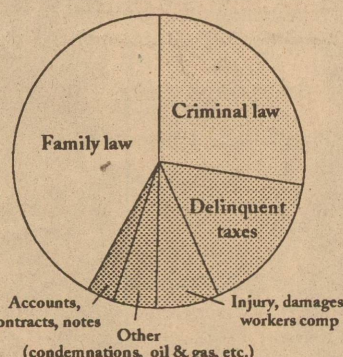

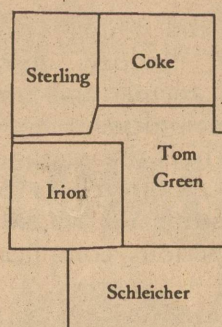

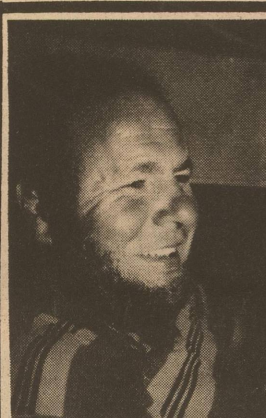

LINKS Inter-Agency Meeting Held

State and local agencies were well represented at the second inter-agency meeting in Sonora hosted by Hope Lamb, Case Manager with LINKS-Options for Independent Living program.

Christy Wright, with Kimble County Community Service Center along with Maria Carrasco, RN, representing Texas Department of Health and Carol Thorp, Director, Sutton County Senior Center were on the program along with Ms. Lamb.

Producers applying for U.S. Department of Agriculture disaster payments under Phase II and Phase III of the Disaster Assistance Program will be able to receive payments in a more timely manner. President George Bush had the USDA extend the disaster sign-up and ensure that producers who qualify for benefits under Phase II and Phase III of the Disaster Assistance Program will receive a payment rate of 50.04 percent of the payments for crop

losses approved for coverage.

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm said "This streamlined approach will immediately provide funds for losses suffered in recent years. This will enable producers to meet current obligations and prepare for the new crop year. The continued stability of agriculture is important to every American."

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is extending the period for producers to file for benefits under Phase II of the program to February 12, 1993, for those crops planted in 1991 for harvest in 1992. The original deadlines were October 2nd Payment of benefits up to 50.04 percent will be made to producers as soon as they have furnished the required documentation and the application is approved by their local ASCS Committee. The extended sign-up period does not change the requirement for producers to purchase crop insurance on the same crop

for 1993 if this year's crop loss was more than 65 percent, as required by the 1990 farm bill. The extension gives producers adequate time to file their claims under the disaster program.

Jerry D. Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee said, "Today's announcement shows this Administration's desire to improve program delivery and help American agriculture. This will help eliminate hardships on family farms caused by 1992 crop losses and add stability to Texas agriculture."

The payment rate is the same used to determine disaster payments under USDA's 1990-1991 disaster program announced April 13. Applications will be processed and checks mailed to qualifying producers as soon as possible. Producers desiring more information on the Disaster Assistance Program should contact their local office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

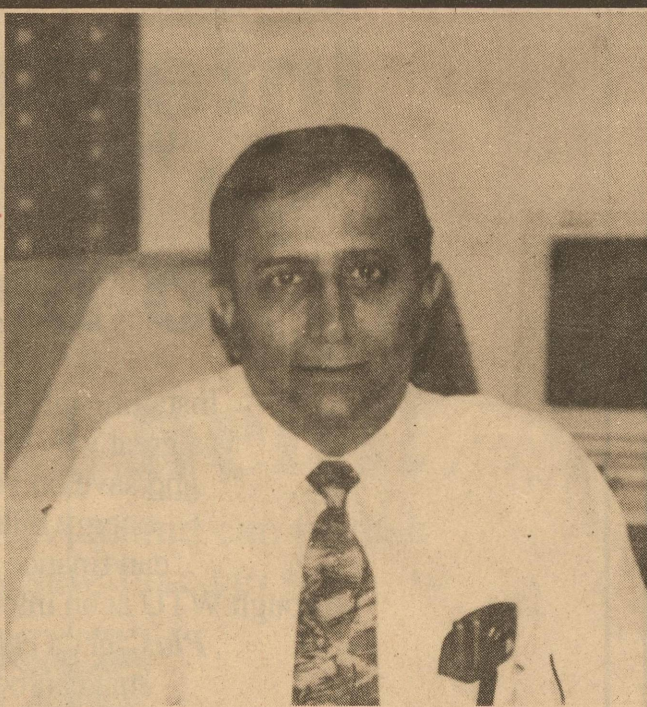

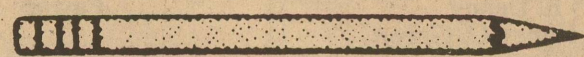

the hospital's R.N.'s will start working toward being ACLS (Advanced Cardiac Life Support) certified. Since 1975, many ACLS courses have been provided across the country; and the value of ACLS training is recognized in Emergency Cardiac Care. Certification will mean our nurses will have competence at various levels of life support which is definitely a plus her in our rural hospital setting.

Recently, thrombolytic

therapy with Activase has rapidly gained acceptance as an effective thrombolytic agent in the successful management of the patient experiencing an acute M.I. 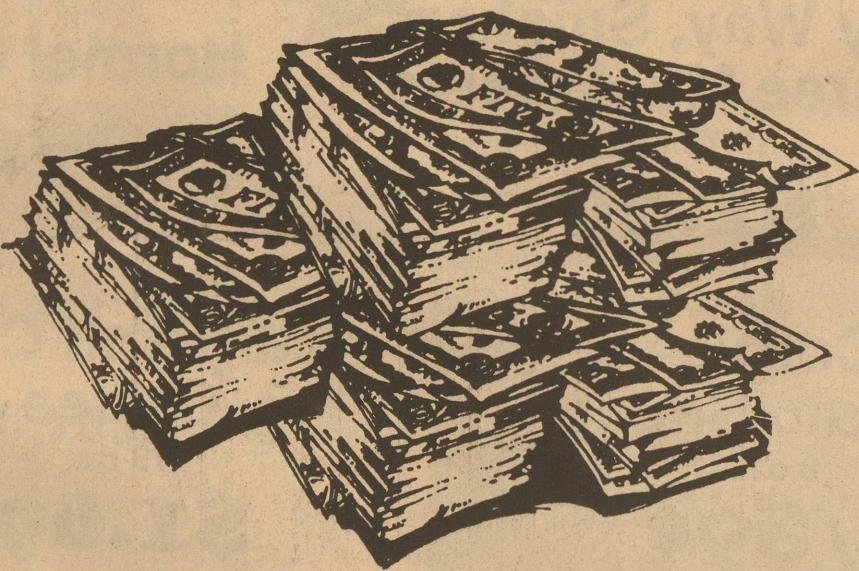

Time to Prepare for Flu Season

Seven in ten older Americans are leaving themselves open to a physical assault that could put them flat on their backs, or even kill them.

Influenza, a contagious lung disease which effects more than 5 million seniors annually, can lead to serious health problems and sometimes death. Unfortunately, only 30 percent of those non-institutionalized older adults take the vaccine to ward off this potentially life-threatening disease.

Lung disease is the third leading cause of death in America, and flu is a significant reason why. With money raised from its Christmas Seal campaign, the American Lung Association of Texas is mounting a major

flu prevention drive this year.

"We want everyone to know that the optimal period to receive a flu shot is between October 15 and November 15, before the peak of the season," said Samuel Kuna, M.D., president for the Texas Thoracic Society, the medical section of the American Lung Association of Texas. "Despite common misperception, the vaccine is safe and does not cause a mild case of influenza."

When they finally appear, symptoms include fever, chills, weakness, loss of appetite, body aches, sneezing, and coughing. The disease, which starts in the respiratory system, caused 106.8 million cases in 1990, resulting in 216.9 million sick bed days. Seniors accounted for 5.7 million cases of the flu in

1990.

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) and American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) are co-sponsoring the Lung Association's annual flu campaign this year. More than 1,000 sites will receive flu information kits in early October.

Dr. Robert D. Cryder, M.S., M.P.A., Director, Immunization Division of the TDH said, "This year TDH is very pleased to provide free influenza vaccinations to over 66,000 Medicaid covered nursing home residents. In the near future, we hope the federal government will extend this life saving service to our Medicare population."

The AARP is also concerned about the upcoming flu season AARP endorses influenza inoculations for their 1.9 million members in Texas. John Lione M.D., Medical spokesman for AARP said, "Since our constituents are all over 50 years old, they are considered in the high risk

category."

Besides senior citizens, others at high risk from the flu are those with chronic heart or lung disease, including children with asthma. Health care workers and other employees of hospitals, chronic-care settings, and outpatient facilities who have contact with patients are also at high risk for getting and transmitting the flu. Those with an allergy to eggs should not take a flu shot since the vaccine is made of inactivated influenza virus derived from eggs. Others with acute feverish illnesses should not be vaccinated until their symptoms have subsided.

Important Flu Facts

1. Flu is HIGHLY CONTAGIOUS. What's more, you are MOST CONTAGIOUS AND MOST LIKELY TO GIVE IT TO OTHERS BEFORE YOU EVEN KNOW YOU ARE SICK.

2. The flu shot does not make your medicines stop

working NOR does it make your current illnesses worse.

3. The flu vaccine is safe and effective. The vaccine does not include active flu viruses, so it cannot cause influenza.

4. Flu shots must be taken once a year since the virus strains change annually and its protective effects begin to decline after approximately four to six months.

5. In 1990, the 106.8 million reported cases of influenza were responsible for 383.4 million restricted activity days and 216.9 million sick bed days.

6. Influenza is a MAJOR ILLNESS WITH POTENTIAL LIFE THREATENING COMPLICATIONS. Each year, many older persons, or persons with major illnesses, simply do not recover from influenza. In 1989, pneumonia and influenza combined to be the sixth leading cause of death nationwide, and the

fifth leading cause of death in those over the age of 65.

7. The U.S. Public Health Service, the American Lung Association, and most doctors STRONGLY RECOMMEND that you get a flu shot if you are 65 years old or older, if you have any chronic lung disease or other chronic diseases, or if you are a health care worker.

8. During the 11 influenza seasons from 1977 through 1988, more than 10,000 excess deaths attributed to pneumonia and influenza were reported during each of seven seasons, and approximately 45,000 deaths were reported during each of two seasons.

9. Influenza vaccines are covered by Medicaid.

10. The influenza vaccine should not be given to those with allergy or sensitivity to eggs. Please contact your doctor if you have this allergy.
