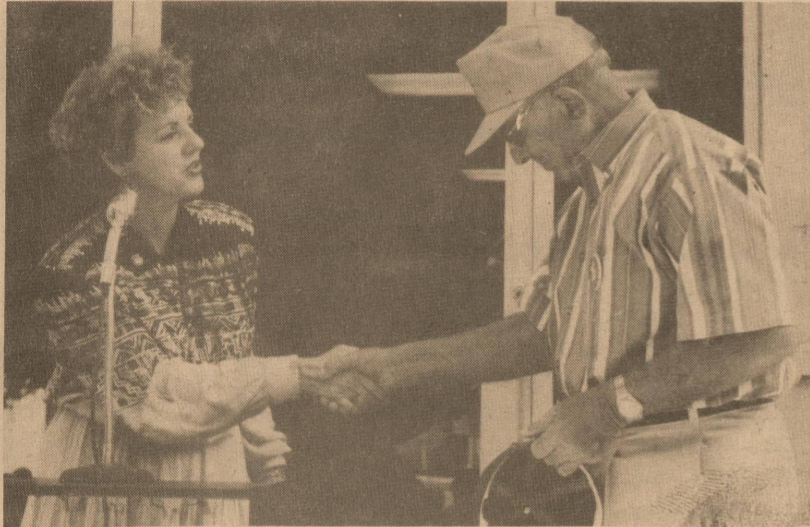

It was a difficult evening for the Eldorado Eagles as they faced a solid Rankin team this past Friday night. Though penalties plagued both teams, the Eagles seemed to experience penalties at crucial times.

Eldorado's Reagan Bownds scored the two touchdowns for the Eagles. The first touchdown came off of an 8 yard run in the first quarter and the second from a 7 yard run with 2:55 remaining in the game. Bownds had a total of 160 yards.

100 yards and rushing 9 times for 49 yards. Casey Triplett had 6 rushes for 23 yards and Jorge Arispe had 4 rushes for 7 yards.

Bownds had 3 receptions for 65 yards. Matt Peters had 1 reception for 13 yards and Hunter Preston had a long 40 yard reception.

Defensively, tackles were led by Chris Meador, Reagan Bownds and Hunter Preston.

"Say Yes to Parenting" is a new program designed to help parents of adolescents and teens deal with today's tough questions. Consider the following statistics!

A survey of 11,000 8th and 10th graders by the National Institute of Drug Abuse reveals:

\* 77% of 8th graders have tried alcohol, with 55% beginning in the 6th grade.

\* 34% of 8th graders are regular users.

\* 53% of 10th graders are regular users.

\* 35% of 10th graders have used THC, 9% cocaine, and 21% have employed inhalants.

\* Nearly 700,000 American students try cocaine each year, and some 223,000 use it weekly or daily.

When we entered, the smoke was so thick that I had to take her to the house immediately and bathe the smoke odor out of her clothing and hair. Needless to say, we did not make a purchase at that time because we couldn't breathe.

A number of residents of Eldorado have voiced their concerns to me as the representative of the American Cancer Society for Schleicher County. They have stated that they now shop in other cities to avoid exposure to the smoke. The only things they purchase in Eldorado are items they forgot to purchase elsewhere.

I for one enjoy the convenience of shopping in Eldorado and believe in supporting Eldorado merchants. But we, as a family, decided that day to shop in San Angelo or Abilene.

There are many residents in Eldorado who depend on Oxygen Therapy 95% of the time. It's a shame that they are unable to shop in their home-town and must rely on someone to shop for them or make a needless trip to San Angelo for items available here.

Most towns and cities have an ordinance banning smoking in public places. This includes sport stadiums.

I hope this letter will bring this about in Eldorado.

Until you have seen what cancer, emphysema, asthma or other respirator illnesses do to a child or an adult, until you recognize the fact that a large number of medical bills and missed school days and work days can be avoided by not allowing your children or yourselves to be exposed to second-hand smoke, you can't

realize what is being stressed in this letter.

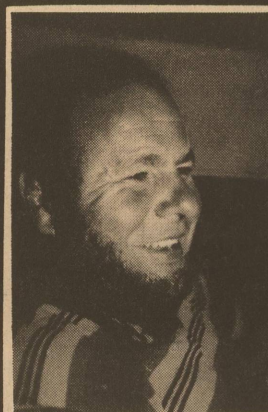

## Exchange Students Needed

"Qualified high school students are offered a unique opportunity to spend an academic year or summer holiday in Scandinavia, Estonia, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Germany, France, Italy, Switzerland, Britain, Holland, Spain, Mexico, Australia, New Zealand or Canada (French or English speaking) as part of the ASSE International Student Exchange Program," announced Andrea Johnson, Southern Regional Director of ASSE.

ASSE also provides international opportunities for families to host students from Scandinavia, Germany, France, Switzerland, Britain, Czechoslovakia, Estonia, Poland, Italy, Holland, Mexico, Spain, Portugal, Australia, New Zealand, Canada and Japan. These select students are 15 to 18 years old and will attend the local school for an academic year.

## Health News

Calluses are lumps of dead skin that can turn into corns if left untreated. Corns are caused by friction from poor fitting shoes, postural misalignment, or from neuropathies from diabetes.

If you have corns there are some easy ways to get rid of them. Make sure the shoes or boots you have are not too tight; if they are you should have them stretched or buy new ones.

You can put your feet in hot Epsom salts or in hot-cold contrast baths.

You can put creams on that contain aspirin and wrap that area in plastic overnight; the next morning scrub the

corn, you may need to repeat this several times.

Women with corns should stay out of high heels because this will also make them worse.

You should not try to cut them away with a knife because this can cause an infection or nerve damage. If you want them cut away you should let your doctor do it.

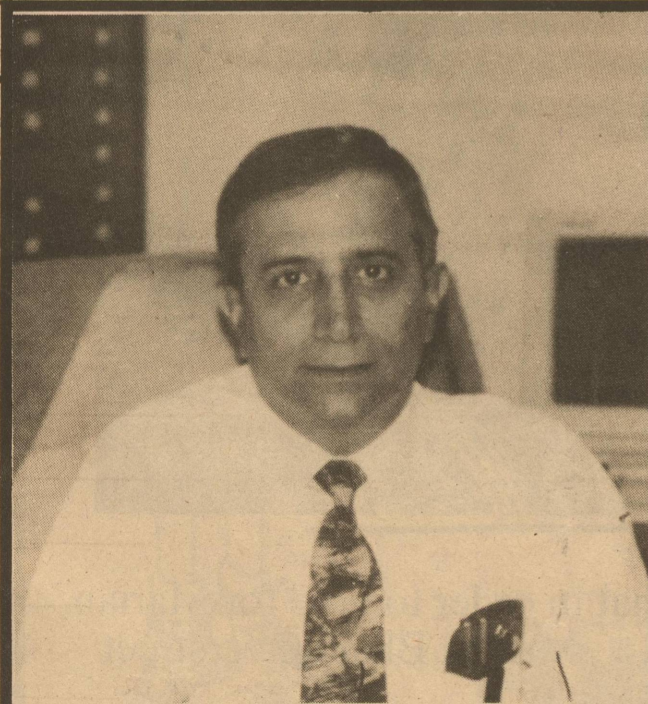

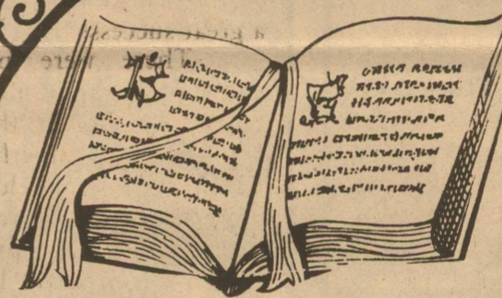

Last month I attended a seminar on Texas Guardianship. The use of guardianships is implemented for all kinds of reasons such as failing health, financial, mental condition and caring for the special interests of minors or adults. As one would assume, there are a number of guardianships which are unique to a particular persons problem or need.

Under a temporary guardianship, the scope of authority is limited by the counts to necessary activities

to protect the ward from imminent danger alleged. Under normal circumstances, the duration of time of a temporary guardianship may not exceed 60 days, at which time the authority may expire.

The limited guardianship, as the name implies, is restricted to the adult ward who is incapacitated. A number of individuals can be appointed under the limited guardianship to act in various capacities such as estate planning and medical needs.

The guardian for the purpose of receiving government funds is restricted to receiving government funds such as Veterans Administration or Social Security. This type of

guardianship is not considered as a general guardian of the estate or person of the ward.

If one or none of the previously mentioned guardianships is not appropriate it may be necessary to request a permanent guardianship, which are available to minors, incompetent persons and persons of unsound mind.

The purpose in the article is to educate the reader on the many types of guardianship available. With the responsibility of being a guardian are the responsibility of ethical considerations. When making decisions under a guardianship one must always ask themselves, how would the person want me to handle the situation.

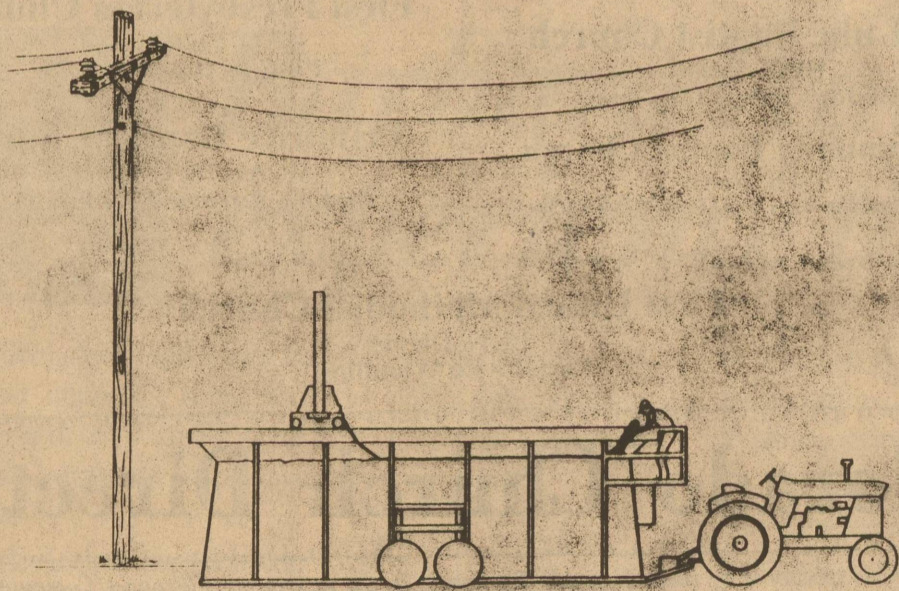

### A Touch Of History

The Schleicher County Historical Society met on October 6th at the Museum with Fort McKavett State Historical Park superintendent David Bischofhausen. David is asking for volunteer workers from the four counties surrounding the Fort. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission is reducing the operations of the Park to weekends, and without volunteer help, the park could be closed. Plans were also discussed to form an area committee to organize volunteer services.

Fort McKavett has played an important role in the history of this frontier area of Texas. Founded in 1852 as a deterrent to Indian raids and to provide protection for travelers on the upper El Paso Road, Fort McKavett was built overlooking the head waters of the San Saba River.

The Post was named in honor of Captain Henry McKavett, 8th Infantry, who was killed in the Battle of Monterrey during the war

with Mexico.

Fort McKavett was abandoned in March of 1859, and reestablished in March of 1868, due to increased Indian activity in the area. The Fort was closed on June 30, 1883. Nearby settlers moved into the vacant buildings and organized the nucleus of the village of Fort McKavett. Constant use and maintenance of these structures kept them in near original condition. The old Infantry Post was designated a State Historical Site on May 17, 1968. It consists of fifteen restored buildings and is one of the prettiest posts in Texas.

### Free Shade Trees

Ten free shade trees will be given to each person who joins The National Arbor Day Foundation during October 1992.

The free trees are part of the nonprofit Foundation's efforts to encourage tree planting throughout America.

The ten shade trees are Red Oak, weeping willow, Sugar Maple, Green Ash, Thornless Honeylocust, Pin Oak, River Birch, Tuliptree, Silver Maple, and Red Maple.

"These trees were selected to provide shade and beauty, and a variety of forms, leaf shapes, and spectacular fall colors," John Rosenow, the Foundation's executive director, said.

instructions. The six to twelve inch trees are guaranteed to grow, or they will be replaced free of charge.

### County Agents Report

Prescribed burning can be an effective tool for managing rangelands and forests, but good planning is absolutely necessary to achieve maximum benefits.

Prescribed burning can reduce the potential for catastrophic wildfires, improve forages, encourage ecological diversity, and enhance water quality and quantity, said Dr. Jake Landers, a range specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"When properly used, fire creates little risk to life or

property and can be an environmentally safe management tool," Landers said.

Prescribed burning in Texas is usually scheduled for January, February or March, with the exact timing dependent on weather, ranch operations and the purpose of the burn. Because burning is most effectively used in conjunction with other management techniques such as chaining, bulldozing, or spraying, it is wise to plan ahead for such a combination, he said.

"One of the most difficult things to accept is that it takes a lot of dry grass for an effective burn. We have grown up believing dry grass on the ground is better than hay in the barn. To see grass go up in flames in the middle of winter is hard to take," he said.

However, no other vegetation works as well as grass as a source of fuel, and ranchers need to have adequate grass fuel at the right time.

On ranges in good condition, waiting until the last half of the growing season in an average year may be adequate to provide fuel. On ranges in fair or poor condition, especially those in low production sites, the growth of several years may not be adequate to accumulate enough fuel.

About 3,000 pounds per acre of grass fuel (air-dry) is desirable for prescribed burning, but in some situations, half that amount will produce satisfactory results.

Additionally, ranchers should arrange for appropriate control of the fire.

"Pumpers and other equipment need to be in working order, firelanes cut, access roads checked out, fire retardant chemicals arranged for, and communication equipment lined up," he said.

Firelane construction should wait until after frost and until the rancher is fairly certain that a burn will be carried out.

And don't forget about adequate insurance coverage, Landers said, because the rancher may be found liable for a fire that gets out of control.

One way to reduce control risks is to enlist neighbors as part of the fire crew, so ask them early on.

Landers suggested that ranchers learn about prescribed burning at a workshop and assist someone else before trying one themselves.

"Examine the results of burning on range sites similar

to your own to get some idea of the results you can expect," he said. "Because each burn is different, as are growing seasons following a burn, results can be very different from year to year on the same range site, even with similar fuel conditions."

Landers offered these other suggestions:

\* Notify local authorities of your intentions and to arrange for communications during the day of the burn.

\* Call the Texas Department of Public Safety when scheduling a burn next to a highway or close enough that smoke could be easily visible (about one mile). The rancher is responsible for providing personnel to flag traffic if smoke is expected to cross the road. A sign indicating that a prescribed

burn is in progress helps inform concerned passersby.

"A traffic fatality or serious injury caused by smoke from a burn is a risk that should be taken quite seriously," he said.

\* Check National Weather Service information the day before and the day of the burn to get estimates of wind direction and velocity, temperatures, and pressure and relative humidity.

\* Additionally, make sure to provide for drinking water for the crew, water or fire retardant in the pumpers, diesel fuel and gas for the drip torches, lunch for the crew, a first-aid kit, keys or combinations for locked gates, wire cutters, contingency plans for an escape, water locations for refilling pumpers; and radios in working order.
