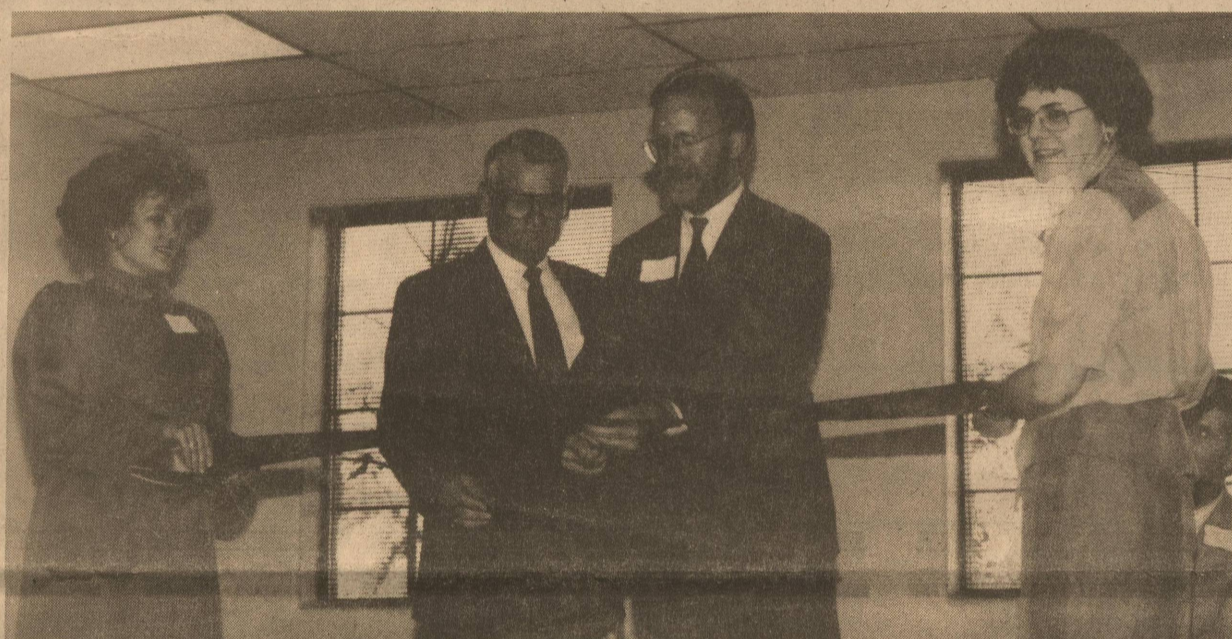

The Eldorado Eagles still have a good chance for a district play-off spot thanks to a strong team effort and an outstanding win at Stanton this past Friday night.

Matt Peters played an intense game, receiving two passes for 113 yards, rushing for 36 yards and making one interception and two touchdowns. It appeared that the team's performance was solid in all areas with the offensive team and defensive team both playing well. The Eagles also demonstrated a very solid kicking game.

Said Coach Doug Kuhlmann, "This was a good win at an opponents field and it keeps our play-off hopes alive."

Interceptions were also made by Jamey Belk and Farley Dakan. Fumbles were recovered by Reagan Bownds and Casey Triplett.

In the first quarter, Matt Peters made a 64 yard touchdown from a pass from Farley Dakan. T.C. Willis kicked the PAT.

In the second quarter, Eric McGinnes made the first touchdown of his Varsity career on a 36 yard touchdown from a reception from Farley Dakan. Dakan then made a run for the 2-point conversion. Jamey Belk made a 40 yard touchdown from an interception. T.C. Willis made good on his PAT effort. T.C. Willis then kicked a 37 yard field goal to bring the Eagles to 25 points in the first half.

In the third quarter, Reagan Bownds had a 46 yard touchdown from a reception from Dakan. Willis again kicked the PAT. Casey Triplett and the rest of the team's punt defense scored a safety.

In the fourth quarter,

Matt Peters had a 39 yard touchdown reception from Dakan. The PAT was kicked by T.C. Willis, bringing the final score to 41 Eldorado-13 Stanton.

in Schleicher County, the association can serve as a voice concerned with laws and regulations that deal with these resources.

## SCISD Board Presents Alternate Election Plan

On September 14, 1992, the Schleicher County Independent School District School Board voted to initiate a change in the school board election procedure. In order to comply with the federal Voting Rights Act, the district will seek a change from the current at-large election system to a seven single-member district system. The board hired the Austin law firm Bickerstaff, Heath, and Smiley to draw the plans for the seven future election districts.

A public hearing, intended to record comments by the Hispanic community concerning the proposed plan, was held on October 26, 1992. At this hearing, the Hispanic citizens

prefaced their comments with the remark that the Schleicher County school system was superior to most others, or as Victor Belman stated, "second to none," but that they also thought it was important that Hispanics be on the School Board so Hispanic parents would feel more at ease in voicing their concerns.

The Concerned Citizens group expressed disapproval of the presented plan because the majority of voting-age citizens in the two predominantly Hispanic districts would be 63% and 65%, while the percentage of voting-age Anglo citizens in the other five districts was about 79%. The group asked the Board to postpone the adoption of the plan

so this problem could be worked out.

David Mendez, legal advisor of the Board, explained to the Concerned Citizens that the proposed plan incorporated the changes requested by their legal advisor, Jose Garza, who was unable to attend the meeting. Mendez invited the group to Austin to work on his computer to help change the plan, an offer which the Concerned Citizens accepted.

The Board will consider adoption of the revised plan at their next regular board meeting. The Board hopes to have the new election system in place by May 1993.

Dear Voters of Schleicher County

Each candidate is appealing to our emotions and telling us what we want to hear with the hope that we will cast a vote in their direction.

A "Read My Lips" campaign or campaign based on promises may tell us what we want to hear, but not what we need to hear. We must weigh all the facts. Reality sometimes hurts - even though it is necessary to deny a request or

cut back on services due to economically hard times. When someone is elected they are elected to serve the best interests of the majority of the citizens and if we as voters can't ask questions and voice our opinions, we must tolerate the results.

It is our duty to check out all folks seeking office - whether on the federal, state or local level. 

## County Agents Report

The weather outside is still warm, and protecting your house from heat loss and cold air gain may be the last thing on your mind. But cold winter weather will be here before you know it so why not take advantage of the pleasant autumn temperatures to make your house snug for the winter? The Texas Energy Extension Service offers the following energy saving tips.

Survey your house for ways to save energy by checking for air leaks. Start with windows and doors, but also check for some less obvious but potential leak sites such as wall outlets, switch plates, recessed ceiling fixtures and attic doors.

Although closing up air leaks will help control air going in and out of your house, you need to make sure your attic has proper ventilation. In other words, do not block or close off turbine ventilators with plastic

bags or plugs. This is important because proper ventilation is necessary for adequate moisture control in the attic where the insulation must stay dry. Blocking or closing off turbine ventilators has not been shown to significantly reduce heat loss when an attic's ceiling is adequately insulated.

Next, check your heating equipment. Arrange for a maintenance check of your heating equipment by a heating and cooling contractor or repair service. In addition, your air filter should be changed once a month regardless of the season to ensure the most efficient operation.

For more ideas on how to save energy in the winter, call the Texas Energy Hotline at 1-800-643-SAVE. The hotline is operated by the Texas Energy Extension Service, which is a public service program of the Governor's Energy Office.

Independent Ross Perot will be the next president according to the mock election held at Eldorado High School last Friday. He won over Republican George Bush and Democrat Bill Clinton with 83 of the 206 votes cast.

President Bush came in second with 57, followed closely by Governor Clinton 56. The Libertarian candidate Andre Marrou received two votes, one from the freshman class and one from the junior class.

Mr. Perot won in every class except the junior class who chose Governor Clinton by two votes over the Dallas businessman.

Other offices listed on the ballot included: U.S. Representative, State Senator, Schleicher County Attorney, and Eldorado Constable.

Republican Lamar Smith was re-elected to his post in the House of Representatives by a landslide. The student body gave

him 132 of 206 possible votes. Democrat James Gaddy and Independent William Grisham received 14 and 32 votes respectively. Twenty-three students abstained from voting for one of the three candidates.

The choice for State Senator, District 25, went overwhelmingly to Dem. Bill Sims with 143 votes over Rep. Troy Fraser with 46. Thirteen students abstained.

In local elections, Thomas Giovannitti was re-elected as County Attorney, and George Arispe was elected Constable.

The ballot also contained four issues for students to decide: health care, education, the economy, and voter participation.

Concerning health care, a majority of the student body believed that the federal government should guarantee health insurance to all working Americans.

The majority decided that it was "undecided" on the

education issue included on the ballot: whether money now spent on public education should be used to give parents the choice of sending their children to public, private, or religious schools. Fifty-two students opposed this idea.

Raising taxes on the wealthiest citizens is the way to help balance the budget said 88 members of the student body. Fifty-four voted to pass a balanced budget amendment, and 41 believed in cutting the capital

gains tax to spur growth.

Forty-nine students believed that allowing a "none of the above" choice on the ballot would encourage voter participation. Forty-five believed that offering a tax credit for voter participation would work. Abolishing the electoral college was the choice of 37 students.

The mock election was sponsored by the government classes aided by the journalism class.

Council, Randy's sense of responsibility enabled him to make the tough decisions necessary to lower taxes.



## Mental Exercise Helps Slow Memory Loss

Memory loss is often associated with growing older, but with "mental exercise," the memory can be better at age 60 than at age 16.

"Many people mistakenly believe that memory loss is a normal part of aging," said Dr. Francis Pirozzolo, a neuropsychologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "There does tend to be some short-term memory loss as we age, but we have found that most people can improve memory with mental exercises."

Pirozzolo's work with the elderly and people with Alzheimer's disease includes several exercises that most people can use to improve memory capacity.

"People who worry about losing their memory are not able to concentrate on remembering a name or a shopping list, because they are anxious," said Pirozzolo.

Pirozzolo helps people to develop good attention habits such as relaxation and concentration. He advises stepping away from the mental stress and anxiety by focusing on the items or tasks to be memorized.

Once attention is improved, several techniques can be helpful in memorizing

information, or even just remembering the last place the car keys were set down.

**MEMORY LOCATION:** Designate a specific drawer or table for hard-to-remember items like keys, reading glasses or appointment books.

**SCAFFOLDING:** Organize information to be memorized in a logical sequence. If a grocery list needs to be remembered, group the apples and pears under a mental heading of fruit. Place butter, yogurt and milk under dairy. Think of paper to recall that napkins and toilet paper are on the list. Make a habit of practicing with short lists on trips to the store and scaffolding will become easier for other tasks.

**IMAGERY:** Use emotion to remember words. To remember the word "man", think of a very old man sitting alone on a park bench. When memorizing "car", think of a favorite car from the past -- anything that evokes an emotion associated with that word.

**PNEUMONICS:** Use a series of letters or sounds that spell a word to remember items on a list. If you have four errands to run -- get gasoline, pick up laundry, buy apples, make a deposit at the bank -- remember them with the word GLAD

(Gasoline, Laundry, Apples, Deposit).

**SEQUENCE:** Remember things in sequence. If you can easily visualize and remember neighbors' homes, then memorize a list in the order of the houses. Go down the block and visualize each house to trigger a certain item on a list.

**SPACE PRACTICE:** It is better to learn or memorize something over a long period of time. Ten minutes a day for six days is more effective than one hour for one day.

**ALTERNATING CONCENTRATION:** Learn to concentrate more effectively by practicing in difficult situations. Read a book for 10 minutes with the television on very loud. Then put down the book and look at the television for 10 minutes. Repeat this several times to develop the ability to block out distractions.

studies have shown that, on average, most people can memorize between five and nine items of information as a group.

"The phone company recognized the limits of most

people's memories by limiting phone numbers to seven digits," said Pirozzolo. "It is important that when exercising the memory, the individual recognize these limits as well. Do not try to memorize too much or the exercises will become more frustrating than helpful."

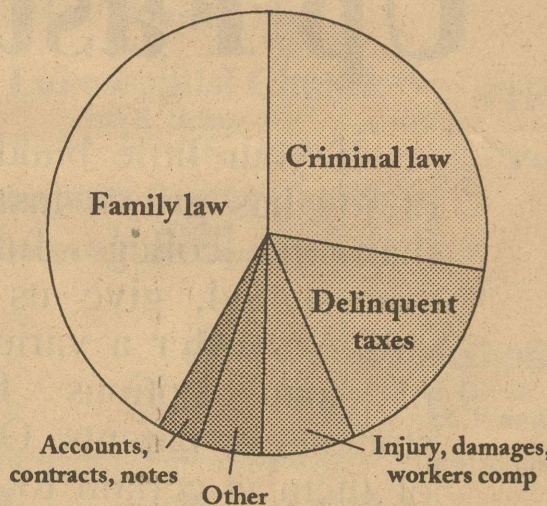

### Practice Halloween Safety

Halloween is a time of fun and great excitement for youngsters of all ages. Unfortunately, each year, it results in injury and, occasionally, death for some. Lieutenant Robert Andrews, Sub-District Commander of Highway Patrol District of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said, "If parents will do some planning and closely supervise their children's activities on Halloween night, many of these injuries could be avoided."

He said, "First, the trick or treaters should be dressed in white or light-colored clothing. Don't put a child out on the streets in a black or dark-colored costume unless it has reflective tape on it. The children should be instructed not to sample any of the candy until they return home. The treats should be carefully inspected to insure, as best you can, that it is safe to eat. If you have any doubts about any of it,

should be discarded, wash all fruit and slice it into small sections to insure nothing has been embedded into it."

Lieutenant Andrews strongly urged parents to remind their children of all the pedestrian safety rules they should observe while trick or treating and to furnish them a flashlight to use. He also suggested to use facial makeup instead of having them wear a mask since a mask

severely reduces their ability to see.

He suggested to go only to homes where the porch light is on and where you, as parents, know they are welcome. "If we confine a child's trick or treating activity to our own neighborhood, where we know the residents, we would know the treats are safe."

"Driver's have a special problem on Halloween night, also," Lieutenant Andrews said.

"They have to be alert for trick or treaters and remember, in a child's excitement, they are likely to forget to look before crossing streets. If drivers would drive as if their child was out trick or treating, we could avoid the vehicle-pedestrian accidents on Halloween."

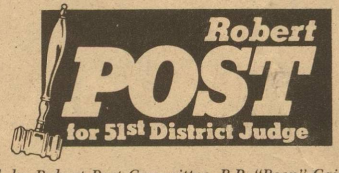

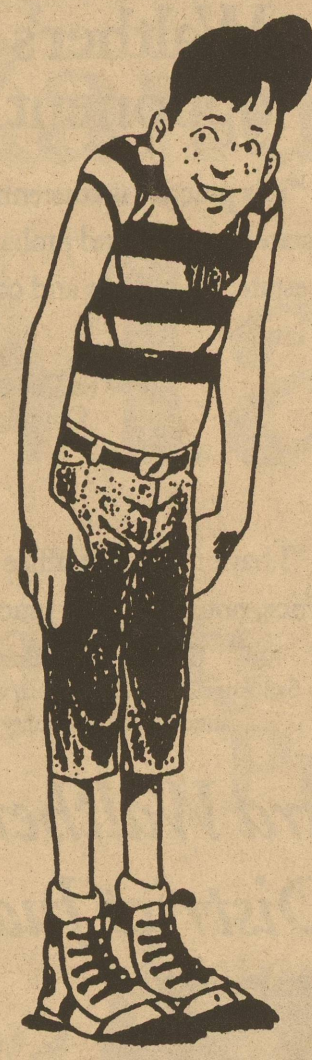

### 512 Area Code Splits November 1st

On November 1, 1992, the 512 area code will split into two area codes -- 512 and 210. Austin, Corpus Christi and surrounding areas will remain in the 512 area code, while San Antonio, Brownsville and surrounding areas will acquire the new 210 area code.

The new area code was established due to an almost-exhausted supply of possible telephone prefixes within the 512 area code.

Everyone in both the 512 and new 210 area codes will keep the same seven-digit telephone number that they currently have. The change won't affect long-distance rates, although there may be some necessary changes in long-distance dialing.

The new area code is being established to allow more telephone numbers to be assigned in the areas around San Antonio, Lyford, Marble Falls, Nixon, Poth, Raymondville, Rio Grande City, Roma, Round Mountain, Santa Rosa, Smiley, Somerset,

Stonewall, Sutherland Springs, Weslaco and Willow City.

These GTE exchanges will retain the 512 area code: Agua Dulce, Aransas Pass, Bertram, Bishop, Blessing, Bloomington, Briggs, Buchanan Dam, Buda, Burnet, Coupland, Dale, Dripping Springs, Falfurrias, Fentress, George West, Georgetown, Granger, Ingleside, Jarrell, Ryle, Lytton Springs, Martindale, McDade, Odem, Orange Grove, Paige, Palacios, Point Comfort, Port O'Connor, Austin.

The changeover will take place in two stages. Telephone companies will provide a six-month "permissive" dialing period from November 1, 1992, until May 2, 1993. During this permissive period, calls incorrectly dialed to the 512 area code automatically will be switched to the correct number in the 210 area code.

The six-month permissive period will give callers more time to become adjusted to

the new area code. For a few weeks after the adjustment period ends, callers still using 512 when dialing numbers in the new 210 area code will hear a recorded message instructing them to dial the new code. Although these transition periods have been established to help callers who forget to dial the new 210 area code, callers should begin using the 210 area code for all numbers Portland-Gregory, Port Lavaca, Robstown, San Gabriel, Seadrift, Taft, Thorndale-Thrall, Three Rivers, Tivoli-Austwell, Vanderbilt, Waelder and Wimberly.
