## To The Citizens of Eldorado:

The City has recently completed repairs on our wastewater plant facility under a \$247,500 emergency grant. Good progress is being made to bring the plant into compliance with Texas Water Commission codes. How successful we are depends largely on you - the user of the utility.

Citizens are reminded that under no circumstances can petroleum products be discharged into the sewer system. This is most commonly done by using abandoned and unplugged sewer services, typically left after a mobile home has been moved. Also, tainted runoff water can enter the system through an improperly plugged line. It is the landowner's responsibility to cap or plug any exposed pipe which is no longer in service. If you have questions, you may call the City for assistance.

Petroleum and petroleum products kill the bacteria necessary for the plant to operate efficiently, and subsequently, puts the plant out of compliance with TWC regulations. Cleanup of the plant can cost many thousands of dollars and affect all of our pocketbooks as the cost would be passed along to the citizens of Eldorado.

The Texas Water Commission can and has fined non-complying users up to \$10,000 per day. It is illegal by Federal, state and City statutes to dispose of petroleum products into a municipal sewage system. At a minimum, violators will be deprived of any City services and could be held liable for damages to the system. For reckless endangerment to the community and the environment, the violator would also be subject to State and Federal prosecution.

Please help the City help you.

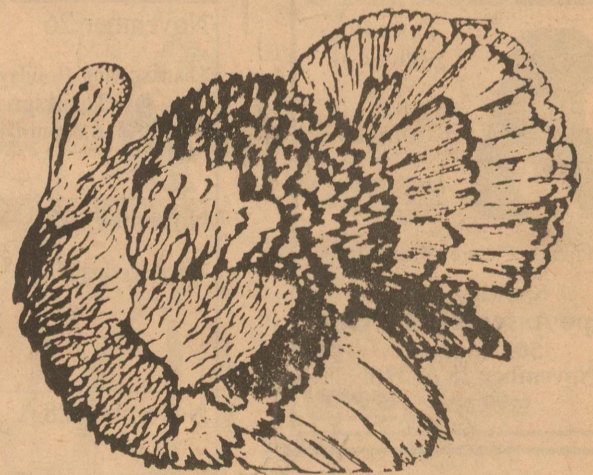

### Thanksgiving Is American Holiday

Of the dozen or more holidays which are quite universally observed, Thanksgiving Day is one that is altogether American in concept and observance. It ranks with the Fourth of July in this respect and in national importance.

A day set aside for giving thanks was the first holiday instituted on the American continent. Each year our thoughts go back to that intrepid little band of Pilgrims who, having survived the rigors of a bleak New England winter and reaped the results of their summer toil, gathered to thank God for the bountiful harvest.

We have strayed somewhat from the significance given to the day by those God-fearing ancestors of ours, and are inclined to emphasize the delights of a well-laden table, family reunions and the festivity of modern sports.

It is altogether fitting that Thanksgiving should be one of the happiest days of the year, but its true significance should be ever-present in our thoughts.

In November of each year, we give thanks for blessings received, let us remember that among them is a system of personal initiatives which these Pilgrim Fathers instituted and which became the basis of American free enterprise.

They tried the communal method of putting all their stores into a single warehouse and rationing out supplies and service - and they didn't like it. It was then that they set up a system in which each man was free to reap the rewards of his own enterprise. Each family was given its own plot of land and made dependent on its own work to provide food and clothing.

Governor Bradford noted in his diary that under the new system each family succeeded in supplying its own wants, and some had a surplus to sell. There were no more famines in the colony.

Having found that the free enterprise system worked best, the Pilgrims stuck to it. They handed it down to their children, who left it to each succeeding generation as an American heritage.

Beset as we were by the confusion of today's alien ideologies, let us, on this Thanksgiving Day, remember well our Pilgrim legacy.

## County Agents Report

December course offerings at the Texas A&M Computer Training and Education Center will include courses for those interested in record keeping and those users of computer spreadsheets who want to be able to automate their work. Both courses are for more advanced computer users. Introductory courses will be taught at the center in early 1993.

"Using your computer to keep records is the best justification for owning a computer," says Dr. Jackie Smith, Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist and management specialist here at Lubbock and instructor for the course. "What-iffing with the use of spreadsheets is another powerful use of the computer," continued Smith. "These two courses will

cover both aspects of computer use."  
 An advanced course in Quicken will be taught December 3-4. This two day course will feature the latest version of Quicken, version 6. The course will begin with a review of Quicken basics, highlighting entering, memorizing and splitting transactions, and the use of accounts, categories and classes. Reconciling problems, payroll, year-end procedures and new features in Quicken 6 will also be discussed. In addition, the reporting features of Quicken will be covered in detail. Participants in the course need to be familiar with the Quicken software and be comfortable with transaction entry.

A review of range names, and the development of keyboard and command macros. Participants must have some experience with Lotus to fully utilize the information in this course.  
 The cost for each course is \$100. This fee includes workshop materials and catered lunches each day. Couples are encouraged to attend. Only one fee will be charged if they share a

computer. Registration for each course is limited to 14 to allow hands-on experience.  
 The training center is located in the Moody Building at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station facility, 14 miles west of Plainview on U.S. Hwy. 70. For more information, or to register for a course, contact your local county extension agent or telephone Jackie Smith at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Lubbock, (806) 746-6101.

weather you may encounter.

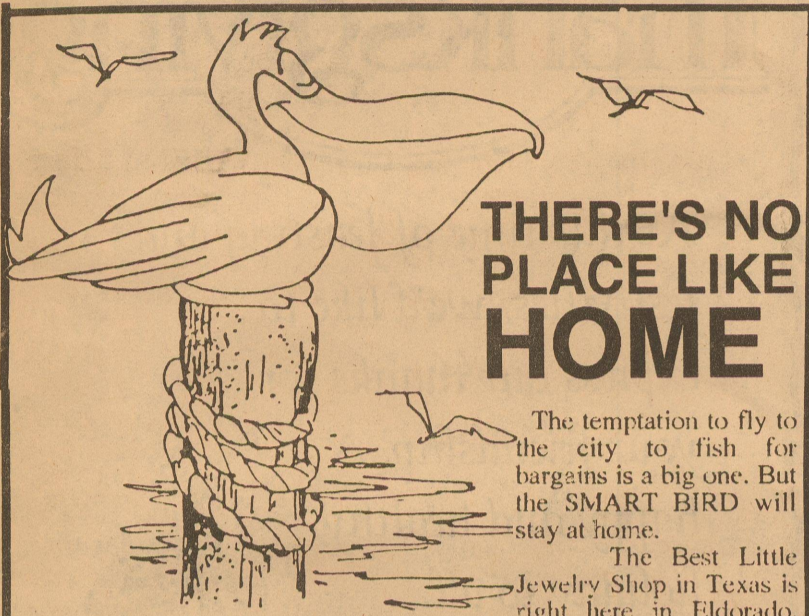

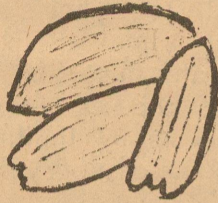

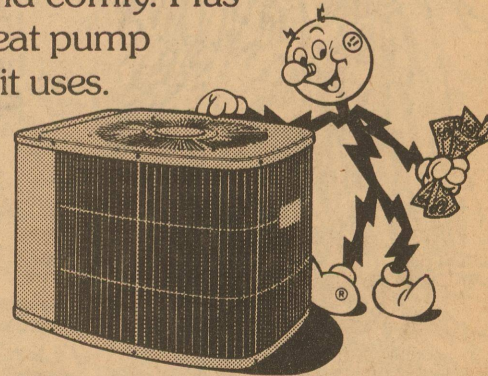

# The Fair Share Plan

If typical Texas parents and taxpayers could design a public education system for the state, what would they want it to look like?

It's not difficult to imagine. They would want all Texas schoolchildren to have access to quality schools. They would want well-paid teachers and a lean, efficient bureaucracy. The system would reward excellence and

provide financial incentives to schools for student achievement. And long-term stability would be essential.

As easy as these qualities are to imagine, it has been difficult to say the least, to develop a plan that achieves these goals in a satisfactory fashion. Until now.

The Fair Share Plan -- a

school finance plan we will ask the Legislature to consider when they meet in Special Session -- includes these common sense objectives in a comprehensive proposal on the thorny issue of public school finance.

The plan is proposed as a Constitutional Amendment that gives Texas voters the opportunity to ratify this historic document and offer future generations of Texas schoolchildren, a stable, predictable, and equitable public education system.

The Fair Share Plan guarantees every school district in Texas a better than average return on its tax rate. To ensure that kind of equity, the plan asks a little over 11 percent of the state's wealthiest districts, containing only 6 1/2 percent of Texas schoolchildren, to share some of their good fortune with the state.

Specifically, these ultra-wealthy districts are asked to help fund the state's Teacher Retirement System; that's only fair since richer districts are a greater cost to the Teacher Retirement

System with their higher salaries and lower student-teacher ratios.

In return, the Fair Share Plan allows wealthy districts, willing to raise taxes or cut bureaucracy, to maintain their current programs.

In addition to providing equal access to funds, the plan also:

- \* Abolishes the unpopular County Education Districts;
- \* Provides state assistance in the construction of facilities;
- \* Restores budget certainty and stability by ending the annual shortfalls in state aid known as proration;
- \* Promotes performance by establishing clear goals and rewarding schools that make progress towards them; and
- \* Focuses funds on students by limiting the amount of money that can be spent on school bureaucracy and requiring districts to spend 60 percent of their budget on instructional costs largely teachers' salaries.

Finally, the Fair Share Plan -- unlike previous attempts to reform school finance -- does not require new state taxes. Quite simply, it does not make promises it cannot keep.

In a democracy, no government policy is going to be unanimously embraced; there will always be some who will oppose whatever is presented. Those who pick fault with this plan must step forward with an alternative

that is drawn within the same constraints of equity and affordability.

We are convinced the Fair Share Plan will make significant strides toward educational excellence -- and ensure what no Texas school district will ever again be called "poor."

What's more, it will let all those "typical" parents and taxpayers out there know that we are doing what's right for our children. And that's what counts.

Preparations are being made to have a nother drawing in December for a hunting rifle. Take heart men - we haven't forgotten about you! Look for further details at a later date.

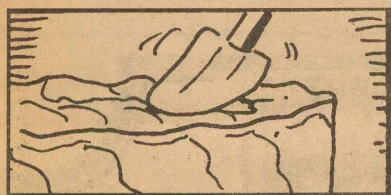
The next item of discussion was the Christmas Party. It will be held on December 16th at 6:30 p.m. at the home of Glenda Harris.

The continuation of the public school audits was requested by Governor Ann Richards, Lt. Governor Bob Bullock, and Speaker Gib Lewis.

State Auditor Larry Alwin said, "The leadership of Texas wants the citizens to

know they are searching for savings at every level, and our Office intends to continue to assist them." He said auditors will be looking for the school districts which have implemented cost-saving ideas that can be passed on to other districts as well as pointing out school districts who are not doing the best job possible.

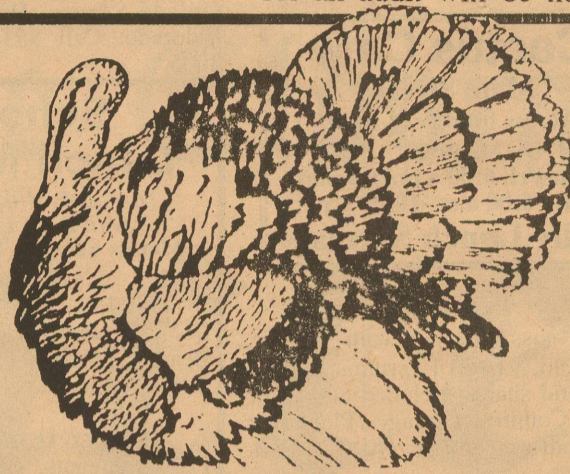
"The order in which school districts will be audited has not been determined as yet; however, each school district selected for an audit will be notified

when the schedule has been completed," said Alwin. A proposal for MAPS an, outlining the continuation of the project, will be presented to the Legislative Audit Committee in the next few weeks.

Last week the State Auditor's Office issued their report, *Making the Most of our Education Dollars*, which covered audits of 55 school districts. The report

recommended changes to the public education system in Texas and projected savings to the State of \$640 million annually by 1997. Results of individual audits of school districts were included.

**DS1 Service**  
DS1 Service is an intraLATA Private Line Service which provides a dedicated, high capacity channel which may be used for simultaneous two-way transmission of voice data or other digitally encoded customer information signals. DS1 Service provides a transmission speed of 1.544 Mbps and is designed to provide an average performance of at least 95 percent error-free seconds of transmission over a continuous 24-hour period.

DS1 Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL) between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

**DS1 Local Loop**  
This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed.
