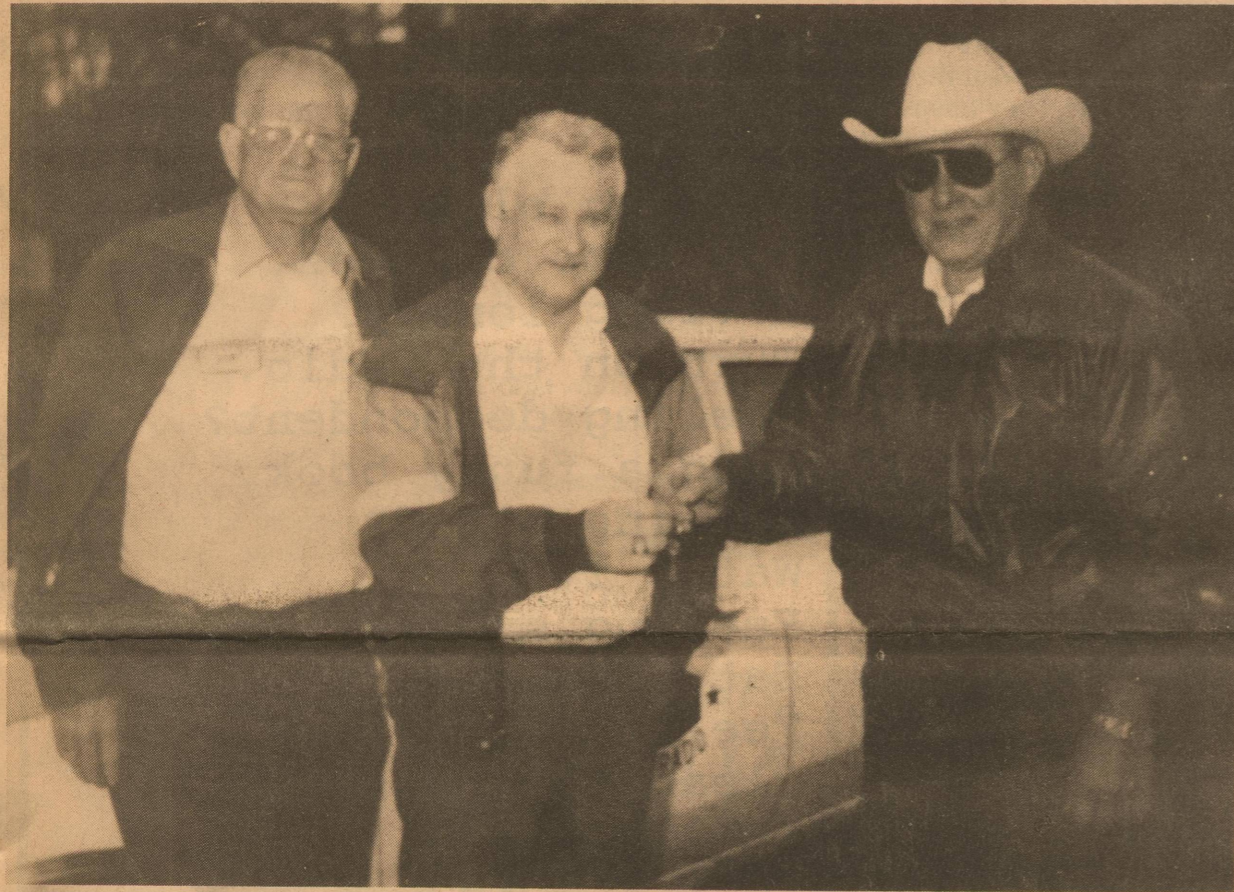

An Open Letter

The "Fair Share Plan" was developed in an attempt to garner support for a constitutional amendment that would legalize recapture. Recapture simply stated is sending our tax money to another school district in the state. The "Fair Share Plan" would cause the largest property tax hike in Texas history and at the same time result in a drastic reduction in state aid for our students. The "Fair Share Plan" is a classic case of passing the buck from the state to the local districts, but the bucks will come from the pockets of local property taxpayers.

In essence, the local property tax continues to be the cash cow of public education because of state policy. This policy has been declared unconstitutional on three successive occasions and cannot be made right by a constitutional amendment, which this plan proposes.

The state leadership demands "world class education" for the children of Texas but is only committed to provide "Third World Funding." Texas ranks 36th out of 50 in the amount of money it spends on our children's education.

Unfortunately politics has found its way into public education. The leadership of the state continues to exercise control over local school districts by setting policy without providing adequate funding. This leadership has not been able to live up to promises made through legislation. Rather than accept the responsibility for their actions, they choose to attack public education in an attempt to further erode public confidence in education and fortify their position. This political tactic is not in the best interest of the students of our state.

The teachers of this school district are committed to a "world class education" for our children and continue to walk the extra mile by spending countless hours in preparation in order to give our children every advantage. I submit that it is time for state leadership to put aside politics and address this problem realistically. It is time for a major restructuring in the current tax system...for our future...for our children.

December Is "3D Month"

"Texans Don't Let Friends Drive Drunk"

That's the slogan for this year's Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention Month. The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) joins other organizations as a sponsor of the "3D Month" campaign.

"We are taking part in this effort to emphasize the consequences of impaired driving and encourage ways to reduce the number of alcohol-related crashes," said Arnold Oliver, TxDOT executive director.

A decade of combined efforts by TxDOT, news media and other organizations proved impaired-driving prevention campaigns can be effective. In Texas, there has been a 7 percent reduction in alcohol-related crashes in the past five years.

In proclaiming December as 3D Month, Governor Ann Richards called on all citizens, public and private organizations, and schools to learn the causes of driver impairment.

The 3D Month campaign recommends:
* educating motorists that driver-impairment begins

at any level of blood-alcohol concentration

* reducing the legal blood-alcohol concentration to .08 for drivers older than 21 years and zero tolerance for use-lose laws for younger drivers

* allowing police to immediately confiscate a driver's license if the driver's blood-alcohol content exceeds the legal limit or if the driver refuses to take a blood-alcohol content test

* community leaders provide balanced information about the health and safety consequences of alcohol use by youth.

Eight in ten Americans suffer from back pain. According to the Texas Chiropractic Association, the leading cause of back pain is strains from daily life and work - not accidents, trauma, illness or disease.

competed well in a real strong tournament."

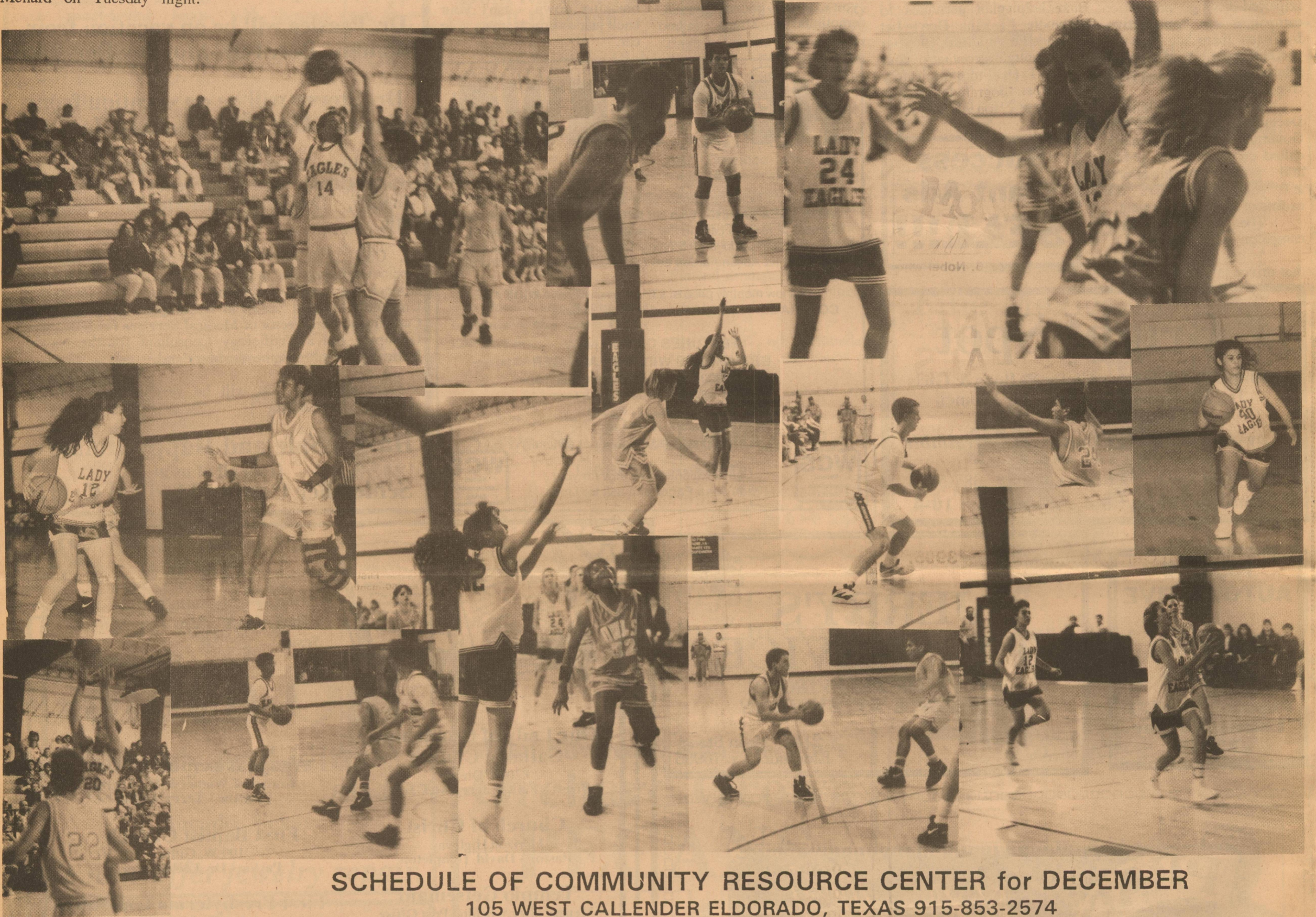

SCHEDULE OF COMMUNITY RESOURCE CENTER for DECEMBER

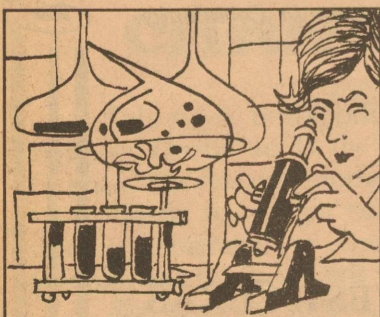

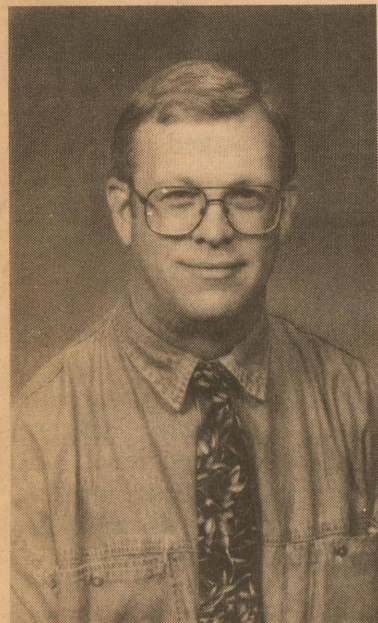

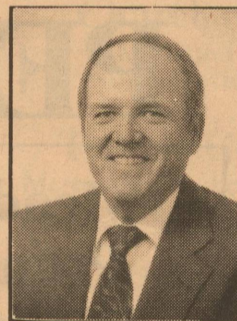

GTE's intraexchange DS1 Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through concurrence with GTE's interLATA access tariff rates which are lower. Contel's intraexchange DS1/DDS Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through Contel's current private line tariff rates. Existing customers with DS1/DDS Services will not be affected by these rate changes. DS1 1.544 Megabits per second (Mbps) Service and Digital Data Service (DDS) will normally be used for the transmission of data communications or large volumes of voice communications between two locations. These services are optional and will not affect the existing rates of customers who do not order these services. The estimated annual effect on GTE-SW's revenues in the first year is \$1,080,567. DS1 Service

DS1 Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Digital Data Service

Digital Data Service (DDS) is an intraLATA Private Line service which supports synchronous, full-duplex transmission between the CDL and the SWC or the point of connection with another telephone company at transmission speeds of 2.4, 4.8, 9.6, 19.2 and 56 kilobits per second (Kbps). DDS provides a transmission path for digital data signals within the same LATA.

DDS Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DDS Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two CDLs or between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider.

Children and Sugar

by Lynn Foltin - Children's Nutrition Research Center

At Christmas, visions of sugarplums may dance in children's heads but sugar in their diets should be kept to a moderate level, says a nutritionist at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston.

"There is a place for sugar in children's diets. They need sugar, vitamins, and minerals for energy. But parents should watch for 'hidden sugars' in foods," said Janice Stuff, a research instructor at Baylor College of Medicine. "Moderation is the key."

Children who learn to prefer sweet-tasting foods may face problems down the line, she said.

For example, a high-calorie diet can lead to weight gain in some youngsters. Although most children burn the extra calories received from sugar through daily activity, some do not and may eventually end up overweight, said Stuff.

Also, dental problems such as tooth decay and unhealthy gums can be reduced by limiting sugar in the diet.

Stuff warns that food manufacturers often add sugar to their snack products,

especially microwavable foods.

"Parents can promote healthier snacks and decrease sugar intake by making snacks at home," said Stuff.

She offers the following suggestions to reduce sugar:

* Drink unsweetened fruit juices and avoid soft drinks containing sugar. Read the labels. Words such as "punch", "fruit drinks", and "10% juice" mean the drink has a high sugar content.

* When preparing juice from concentrate, dilute the juice with additional water to cut the sweetness.

* Use fresh fruit purees with chopped fruit to add natural sweetness to baked goods or low-fat plain yogurt.

* Make your own frozen fruit bars by freezing juice (orange juice is especially good).

* Flavor pancakes, waffles, muffins, and hot cereals with spices such as cinnamon or nutmeg, or with extracts -- vanilla, almond, orange, or maple.

* Use 2/3 to 3/4 of the sugar called for in recipes.

* Replace cocoa with carob powder in baked goods. This will decrease sugar by 25%.

* Pack lunches with individual servings of

unsweetened applesauce or fruit in water-packed or light syrup.

* Devise a plan with your child to limit candy or candybars to once or twice a week.

"These guidelines can be used in the battle against high-calorie diets," she said. "promoting a healthy diet is one of the greatest gifts you can give your child during the holidays and throughout the new year."

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

TPWD Deer Pilot Program

from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has approved a pilot program allowing some landowners to take antlerless white-tailed deer under a deer herd management tag system during the 1992-93 open deer season.

The experimental tag program, to end in February, is designed to provide landowners an additional means to avert habitat destruction by deer whose population size, through department review, has been determined to be in excess of the carrying capacity of the habitat, said Dr. Rudy Rosen, director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's fisheries and wildlife division.

"We need to test the concept of this management tool," he said. "This proposal is designed to gain an understanding of the acceptability of the tag to landowners."

The tag system will be limited to 20 landowners this year and will be re-evaluated before possible implementation next year. Issuance of antlerless deer herd management tags will be determined through investigations by department wildlife biologists or certified wildlife biologists with plan review by TPWD biologists.

The program will cost landowners \$750 for an application fee and \$5 per tag. Rosen said the fees are set to recover estimated costs of administering the program. Harvested deer must be processed and delivered to a charitable organization.

A qualifying landowner must allow at least 40 antlerless deer or 20 percent of the harvest target, whichever is greater, to be taken by regularly licensed hunters. "This limits the program to areas in need of extensive deer removal," he said. "It maintains the integrity of the herd management tag as a specialized management tool."

The property must be evaluated by a wildlife biologist and a harvest recommendation made. The harvest quota is designed to reduce the deer population to a level in balance with food supplies. One provision added at the request of the commission's regulations committee was intended to ensure that the tag not be used solely to reduce the deer herd below carrying capacity to produce trophy deer or solely to balance the sex ration of the deer herd.

In exchange for possible lost public hunting opportunities, the landowner has the option of providing a quality deer hunt in 1993-94, purchasing a quality deer hunt on another property,

providing a youth hunt for at least 10 youths or providing another proposal of equivalent cost that must be approved by the executive director.

"The object of this tag is to bring deer herds into balance with the habitat," Rosen said. "This program is to deal with habitat and the need to control deer populations within the habitat's capability to support them."

Landowners interested in applying for the program should contact TPWD for application forms. A wildlife management plan is required. In addition, the wildlife

management plan needs to recommend an antlerless deer harvest in excess of 40 animals in order to be eligible for deer herd management tags.

Those landowners not currently under a management plan can obtain assistance from the department. Applications for deer herd management tags cannot be accepted by TPWD before December 1st.

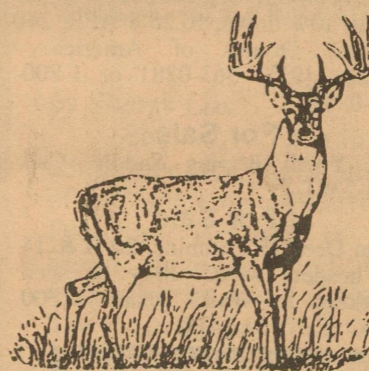

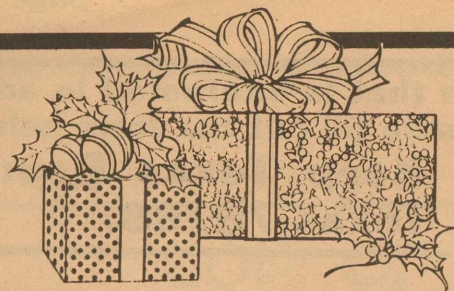
