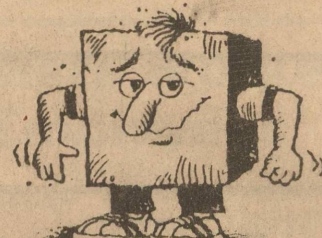

Public Forum Held

Forty people attended a public forum on Wednesday, July 7th in Eldorado. The Texas Health and Human Services commissioner, a state senator and the county judge were all present to show support for the HHS Pilot Project which has brought public services to a central location.

In his opening remarks, HHS Commissioner Richard Ladd praised the Schleicher County program, and said it was a good example for the rest of the state. Ladd added that Schleicher County is way ahead of the other two pilot projects in the cities of Lubbock and Dallas.

The pilot projects were created last year by House Bill 7 in three areas to demonstrate how state and local agencies could work together to be user-friendly and cut costs over a two-year period.

Eldorado opened the Community Resource Center to provide a central location for agencies like the Texas Employment Commission and the San Angelo Council of Alcohol and Drug Abuse to come to the county and be

accessible to the area residents.

Sen. Bill Sims said in his opening remarks he would like to see the pilot project expanded to include youth alcohol prevention programs, hoping to break the cycle of having to treat adult alcohol abusers.

County Judge Johnny Griffin said the pilot program has been successful for the people and the agencies represented at the Community Resource Center.

Several Schleicher County residents were present to show their support.

After the forum, Sims, a member of the Senate Finance Committee, said he could almost guarantee the program would be funded beyond 1994 because of the success of the Schleicher County program.

Ladd said he couldn't guarantee the program would receive the same level of funding in the future but he said the program should continue.

He added HHS will wait until funding is received from the Legislature next year before considering expanding the program.

Building Bridges Accepting Applications

Building Bridges is now accepting applications for persons wanting to participate in our volunteer training program to be offered in the fall. Hospice of San Angelo sponsors this unique program that began two years ago.

Building Bridges was designed specifically to address the needs of children in grief. It offers understanding and support for any child in the community grades K-12 who has lost a significant loved one to death. The children come for six consecutive weeks on Monday nights beginning October 11 and are facilitated in small groups by trained volunteers. This is not therapy, but rather a time of skilled and directed listening to children.

CIDC Aid For Children

Do you know a child who needs physician care, medications, surgery, medical supplies or equipment?

The Chronically Ill and Disabled Children's Services (CIDC) with the Texas Department of Health may be able to help that child receive the service he or she needs and deserves.

"The program was legislated several years ago to address the medical needs of Texas children who were chronically ill or disabled," comments Oscar Latham, CIDC Social Worker in San Angelo. "The program assists the child's family by arranging, and paying for the medical care."

A child is eligible for CIDC services if he or she is a resident of Texas, has a medical condition that the program covers, is under age 21, and the family meets the program income and asset limits. However, families that have incomes over the limits may still be able to qualify for CIDC services.

Some of the medical conditions covered by the CIDC program include: HIV and AIDS; bone, muscle and joint problems; severe burns, cancer, heart problems; Cerebral Palsy and other neurological disorders; cleft lip and palate; craniofacial anomalies; diabetes; epilepsy (seizures); stomach and bowel problems that a child was born with; certain ear and eye problems; certain blood problems such as Hemophilia and Sickle Cell

disease; certain metabolic and genetic disorders; Spina Bifida; and Cystic Fibrosis (for all ages).

"CIDC is not the same as Medicaid," says Latham. "A child can be eligible for CIDC and have Medicaid, private insurance, or no insurance at all."

Groundwater Testing Available

Contrary to popular belief, groundwater is never pure. That is to say, that it contains only one part oxygen and two parts hydrogen. As water percolates downward through soil and rock, it picks up minerals, chemicals and microorganisms. Some of these can become dissolved or suspended in water and may or may not have a detrimental effect to the quality of the water. Minute concentrations of sulfur in water can give water a "rotten egg" smell and unpleasant taste. Decayed crustaceans can add an oily, shiny film to the surface of water.

In the fall of 1992 the Plateau Underground Water Conservation and Supply District received a grant from the Texas Water Development

Board to purchase laboratory equipment. The lab is set up in the District office which is located in the County Annex Building. Currently, the District has the capability of running tests to assure safe drinking water. Parameters most commonly checked on are: chlorides, iron, total dissolved solids, nitrates, sulfates, conductivity, alkalinity, hardness, pH and coliform bacteria.

Once tests have been run, the owner can be reasonably sure that the water he drinks and provides for his family is safe. Or, if a problem is detected, steps to find and correct the situation can be implemented.

MET Assists Workers and Employees

submitted by the Community Resource Center

During the 1992-93 fiscal year, the Governor's Office on Immigration and Refugee Affairs (GOIRA) received monies from the Federal Government to undertake a campaign in Texas to educate workers and social service providers about IRCA (the Immigration Reform and Control Act) anti-discrimination provisions. MET, Inc. (Motivational Education and Training), a non-profit organization, has been selected to carry out this project throughout South and Central Texas. MET has had extensive experience in assisting farmworkers through employment and training programs, and this campaign is a natural extension of its current work.

Since the institutionalization of employer sanctions with IRCA in 1986, independent reports have found a widespread occurrence of discrimination based on national origin and citizenship status. Our educational campaign hopes to minimize the incidence of employment discrimination

against persons who may look or sound "foreign" but have the authorization to work in the United States. The project's time frame is October 1, 1992 through September 30, 1993.

Roshani Kothari, as Community Outreach and Education Specialist, educates and informs workers and agencies of the anti-discrimination provisions and options available under IRCA, as well as those included in Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act. To accomplish this, and to educate people on which immigration documents are sufficient and valid to fulfill legal employment requirements, a series of workshops will be held in San Antonio and 13 surrounding counties. Kothari will also be networking with agencies which can assist and outreach, contacts, participate in trainings or provide workshop sites and facilities.

A training will be held at the Community Resource Center in Eldorado on Tuesday, July 27, 1993 from 1:00-2:00 p.m. If you are interested in attending or would like further information, please call 853-2574.
