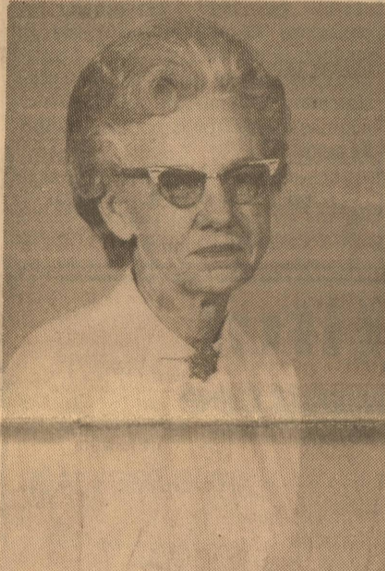

### Pioneer Families Honored At Schleicher County Days

The highlight of the Schleicher County Days celebration every August is the recognition of pioneer families. Each year two family members of an early day Schleicher County settler is selected to represent their family. This year the Historical Society has elected Jessie McAngus Sudduth and William H. Pat Joiner to represent their families. These nominees will ride in the Saturday Aug. 14 parade in Bill Dakan's buckboard. They will also be presented a special plaque from the Chamber of Commerce in honor of their pioneer heritage.

The following are Jessie and Pats stories:

#### Jessie McAngus Sudduth

Jessie McAngus Sudduth was born to Will and Elizabeth Ross McAngus February 8, 1908 in Travis County on a farm. Jessie had two brothers, Ross and Marvin, and a sister Crystelle.

The McAngus Family made the long trip to Schleicher County in 1924. The trip took several days in a Model T Ford and wagon and teams. Will had traveled to Schleicher County a few months earlier and bought a stock farm four miles west of Eldorado. The family lived on the farm until 1929 when they bought the old Rex McCormick house in town.

Jessie attended Eldorado schools and made friends with many class mates. Some of her class mates were Hollis McCormick, Ethel Enochs, Morris Whitten, Oran Enochs, Elizabeth Bradley, Charlotte Tisdale, Lois Sharp, Jack Elder and Joe Muller Christian.

On December 2, 1927, Jessie married Charles B. Sudduth from Eden, TX. They lived on Bailey Ranch on the W.T. Sudduth Sr. stock farm. They later bought this place.

One son was born to this union, Charles Wayne. He was born November 3, 1931, and attended Bailey Ranch School, later transferring to Eldorado High School, graduating in 1949.

Charles Wayne married Irene Childress. Five children were born to this union: Charm, Chuck, Rick, Candy, and Larry.

Charlie and Jessie celebrated their 50th Wedding anniversary December 2, 1977 living on the same ranch they moved to when they married. Today Jessie lives in the Schleicher County Nursing home, her parents, husband, and son have all passed on.

William H. "Pat" Joiner was born to Buck and Kate Joiner in Lampasas on April 12, 1910 in a log cabin. Pat has a twin brother, Wallace and a sister, Doy Joiner Mittel.

Pat's family moved to Schleicher County in the fall of 1924 and ran a grocery store south of Eldorado, near the Sutton County Line. Later this place became known as "Brushy Top."

Pat related during the depression years his family moved to Coke County for five years and worked on a ranch. They later moved back to Schleicher County and bought the Boyer Place.

Pat and his twin brother Wallace, volunteered for the World War II service on the same day; however they were separated after their entry. Both boys served in England and North Africa and were able to get together on a few occasions.

In the summer of 1954, Pat married Ila Ruth Alexander of Eldorado. Pat lived on his stock farm on Depot Road south of Eldorado until 1992 when he moved to the Schleicher County Nursing Home.

### Rural Address System Developed For 9-1-1 Service

A Rural Addressing System is currently being developed for Schleicher County to be used with the 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System. The 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Number is a dedicated nationwide emergency number for sheriff, fire, and emergency medical services which provides major life saving advantages to citizens and public safety agencies.

The Schleicher County Commissioner's Court has contracted with Jedco-Design Inc. to design and develop this addressing system. Jedco will use the guidelines as outlined by the state of Texas Advisory Commission on State Emergency Communications. A "street type" address will be assigned to every occupied and unoccupied structure where people may reside, for work or use for recreational purposes. Jedco will be traveling every county road and private road where a structure is found. Also, Jedco will be visiting with the

residents of these homes in Schleicher County to make sure that the name and phone number is with the correct house in the addressing system.

Along with the addressing of Schleicher County homes, the county will be putting up road signs for all the county roads, marking each road at every point where the county roads cross each other. The county roads will be numbered or named. The marking of the county roads is required so that someone who is unfamiliar with Schleicher County can get to any given location.

Article 1432f, of the Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, authorized the establishment of the Advisory Commission of State Emergency Communications and the implementation of Enhanced 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Systems in Texas.

### Illegal Use Of Dumpsters

Illegal use of dumpsters is punishable by a fine of up to \$500/incident plus court costs. "Illegal use" includes placing trash in dumpsters for which you are not paying service fees, and placing non-acceptable materials in the dumpsters.

The problems experienced in Eldorado are not exclusive. A recent article in the San Angelo Standard-Times stated that Brady was having to "crack down" on illegal dumpster usage due to persons who live outside the City Limits bringing their garbage into town and using dumpsters that are being paid for by City customers. It is common knowledge that this occurs in Eldorado, causing inconvenience for the customer and creating volume problems - besides being a "theft of service" punishable by law.

With the new federal and state regulations, trash disposal is not cheap, and some people are taking advantage of the services paid for by others. Citizens are encouraged to report illegal dumping by recording license plate numbers or retaining "prima facie" evidence obtained from the dumpster. This evidence may be as simple as mail with the

offender's name printed on it. Any citizen reports will be investigated and complaints will be filed in Municipal Court.

The City Council has ordered a new trash truck, and dumpster repairs will be made or replacements will be purchased when possible. All these improvements are necessary and quite costly (\$62,000 for the truck and approximately \$80,000 for the dumpster repairs/replacements). The trash pickup system is solely supported by monthly sanitation fees, and with anticipated rate increases, it is important that out-of-City residents/businesses make the short trip to the landfill. There is no fee charged to local persons using the landfill.

The Schleicher County Commissioners have verbally agreed to assist the City with increased expenses at the Landfill, which will necessitate the purchase of a compactor (approximately \$110,000) in he near future and any necessary additional labor/equipment expenses. At a Town Meeting in May, new state and federal mandates regarding municipal solid waste were discussed. Those citizens present indicated strong support for keeping our landfill open, even in light of obvious increased costs.

Building Bridges

Building Bridges is now accepting applications for persons wanting to participate in our volunteer training program to be offered in the fall. Hospice of San Angelo sponsors this unique program that began two years ago.

Building Bridges was designed specifically to address the needs of children in grief. It offers understanding and support for any child in the community grades K-12 who has lost a significant loved one to death. The children come for six consecutive weeks on Monday nights beginning October 11 and are facilitated in small groups by trained volunteers. This is not therapy, but rather a time of skilled and directed listening to children.

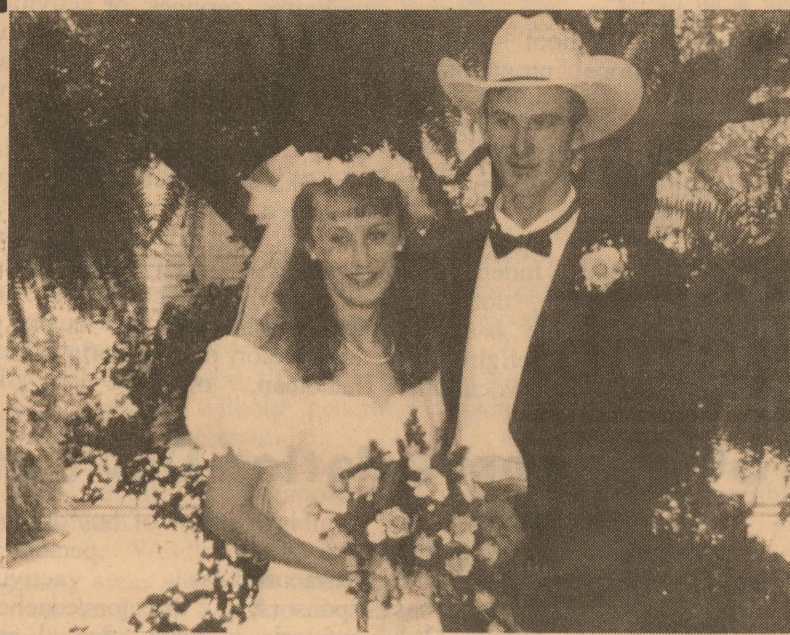

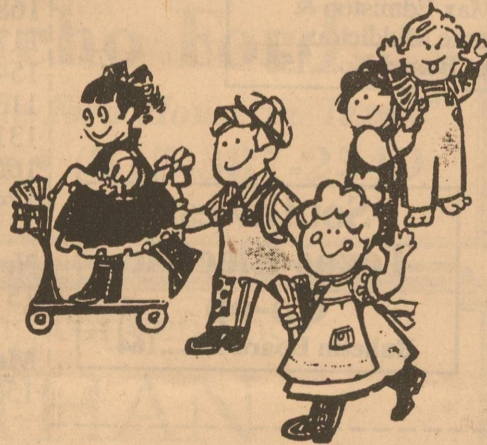
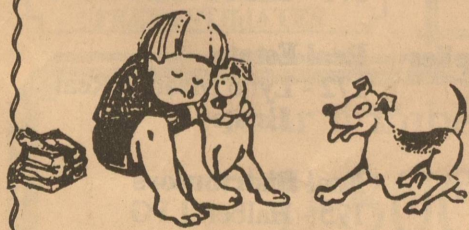

## School Lunch Procedures

Lunch prices for the 1993-94 school year will be as follows: Pre-K-4th Grade - \$1.10, 5th-8th Grade - \$1.20, 9th-12th Grade - \$1.30, Adults - \$1.75, Guests - \$3.45. Reduced lunches will be 40¢.

Breakfast prices will be: Students - 50¢ and Adults - 75¢. Reduced breakfast will be 25¢.

Lunches need to be paid in the cafeteria in the morning from 7:30 a.m. until 9:00 a.m.

If you are sending money with a child, a simple method is to place your money in an envelope with the child's or children's name(s), grade(s),

teacher(s) name and the amount for each child. The child should bring the envelope to the cafeteria as soon as they arrive at school. One check will be accepted for more than one child, but please state the amount for each child separately, as prices are different for different grades. This saves time, and keeps the children from having to stand in line to wait.

Please try to abide by the time frame as indicated above. This allows time for the money to be recorded and balanced before we start serving lunch at 10:45.

Due to the extreme drought conditions over much of our rangeland and the danger of serious wildfires, here are a few comments from the Schleicher County Extension Office on range wildfires.

1. Prescribed summer burns are an experimental, not a recommended procedure, and this is not a good time to be experimenting without general moisture improvement.

2. Outdoor burning of trash should be completely prohibited.

3. Welding activity in grassy areas should be carefully monitored. A 5-gallon bucket with a lid and a wet tow sack should be minimum equipment to have handy.

4. Grading of fireguards along fences sometimes helps to

stop fires, and they serve as ranch roads for hunters, fence repair crews, and for detection of predator activity.

5. Ranch sprayers should be kept handy and ready to go. The first stages of fire control are the most important in getting it stopped.

6. Some guidelines for follow-up of wildfires on rangeland follow:

A. Take care of livestock. Remove them from pasture as soon as possible. Although cattle could get along well for a week or so on scorched pricklypear, they should be removed until the grass has recovered. Make immediate adjustments in livestock numbers to balance your stocking rate with your range's current carrying

capacity. Lease additional grazing or purchase hay until dispersal decisions can be made.

B. Take care of fences. Where a small portion of a large pasture is burned, it is desirable to fence off the burned portion until the grass has recovered. Otherwise livestock will "camp" on the burned area nibbling new growth into the ground. Repair fences so that grazing can be resumed when green-up growth is adequate.

C. Take care of wildlife. Don't block deer off from water. Avoid activity in the pasture which might add to stress on animals with meager forage and inadequate escape and loafing cover.

D. Take care of range. Wildfire, even under the hottest circumstances, seldom kills plant roots. Grasses, brush and pricklypear usually start resprouting soon after the burn if moisture is available. To get an excellent kill on pricklypear and tasajillo, spray the burn the following April with 1/8 to 1/4 lb.

Grazon PC per acre. This will also give excellent control on broad-leaved weeds which may be stimulated by the fire.

Spraying of woody plants should be delayed until adequate leaf surface has grown back to get good control from the herbicide. This may require several years. Grazing of the grasses, browse and forbs should be delayed until it can be done without further damage to the range resource. Usually 60 to 90 days is long enough when moisture is adequate, but some rangeland may require one to several years of rest if the burn was severe or if moisture conditions are unfavorable.

E. Take care of voluntary fire fighters. Do what you can to support local fire fighters through donations and access to water in the future. Graded firelines and roads, like levees on the Mississippi, aid in preventing severe damage, but natural forces like fire and flood are almost impossible to prevent absolutely.

## Wool & Mohair Support Prices

USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service invites wool and mohair growers and the public to submit comments on the methods for calculating price support for wool on unshorn lambs (pulled wool) and mohair for 1993.

The Schleicher County ASCS office said the written remarks must be received in Washington, D.C., on or before August 13, to be considered.

In accordance with the National Wool Act of 1954, pulled wool must be supported at a level in relationship to the support price for shorn wool, that will maintain normal marketing practices for pulled wool. Pulled wool is the wool removed from the pelt of a

slaughtered sheep. In the past, this provision has been implemented through payments based on the hundredweight of live, unshorn lambs marketed.

"Mohair must be supported at about the same percentage of parity as shorn wool, plus or minus 15 percent," the ASCS official said. The shorn wool support price is based on a formula prescribed in the National Wool Act. Based on current USDA data, the 1993 shorn wool support price will be \$2.04 per pound (grease basis).

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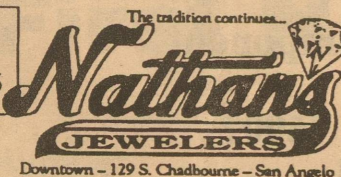
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# Schleicher County Days -

The land-law of 1901 was designed to help settlers acquire small amounts of land to farm, ranch and build homes. The alternate or even-numbered sections of school land, located in specified counties including Schleicher, were placed on the market at an average price of \$1 per acre with forty years to pay for it at 3% interest. The maximum amount that one man could buy was four sections.

Instead of filing an application for purchase of the land with the Commissioner of the General Land Office at Austin, as under the former laws, the application was to be filed with the county clerk of the county where the land was located. The clerk was to advertise that the land would come on the market at a certain date, and the man who first filed

an application for the track of land, paid one-fortieth of the purchase price of the land and the interest for one year, was awarded the land. This law instituted land "rushes" in West Texas.

200 sections of land, with a few scattered windmills and one camp house, would, if settled, give homes to fifty families. Land rushes attracted many settlers to Schleicher County.

Some of the settlers that filed on school land during the land rushes failed to live on the land for three years and lost the property, but a greater number stayed. These land rushes were from 1901-1905, when the law was changed.

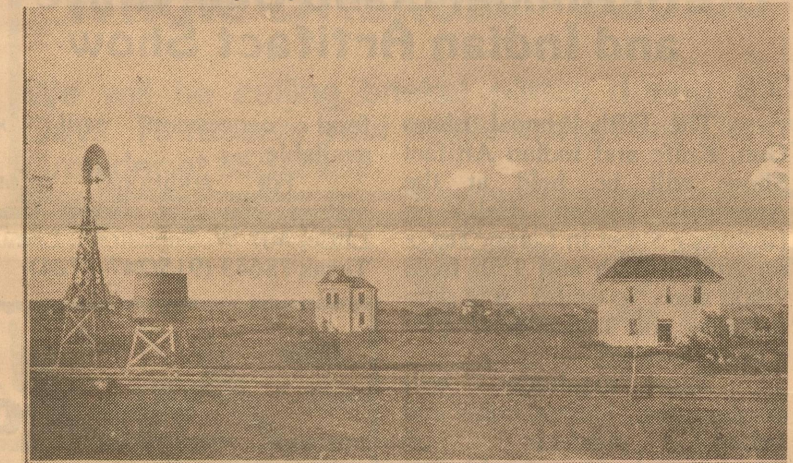
These land rush days were responsible for a large number of people moving to Schleicher County.

In 1895 W.B. Silliman surveyed and established the town of Eldorado and gave free lots to the citizens of Verand, Schleicher County's first town. Eldorado's first large store was owned by Silliman, Gray and McCartney. C.C. Lamb had a small store and livery stable. A.B. Priour moved his ranch house to Eldorado, added on to it and turned it into the town's first hotel. The population of the county in 1890 was 155, but by 1900 it had reached 515.

The same water works location has been in existence since 1902. W.B. Silliman drilled the town's first water well in 1902 to provide water for the fifty shade trees around the courthouse square, which were planted by Silliman in February of 1903.

In 1909, Eldorado developed the water works system and it was privately owned until 1929 when the city was incorporated.

The election for

Incorporation of Eldorado was set for March 16, 1929. There were 99 votes cast, 84 being for the incorporation and 15 against.

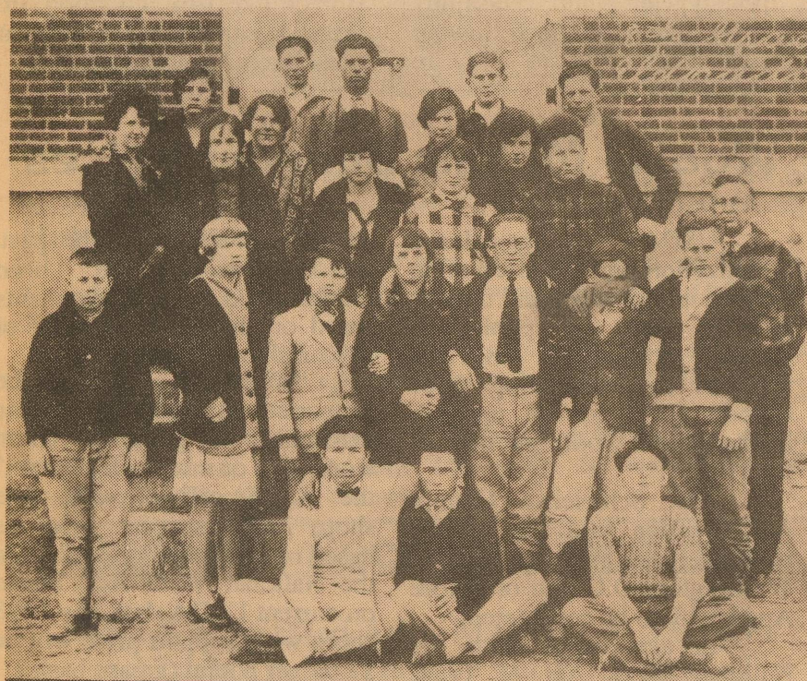
On April 3, 1929, the city of Eldorado elected Fred O. Green as Mayor; Aldermen were John Davis, H.G. Parker, Joe Williams, H.W. Wiedenmann and Frank M. Bradley; City Marshall was S.M. Oglesby.

Since the first election, mayors elected have been: 1931-J.N. Davis, 1935-A.T. Wright, 1939-L.L. Baker, 1940-J.L. Ratliff, 1943-L.L. Baker, 1947-Jess Thompson, 1949-J.C. Ratliff, 1953-Eldon Calk, 1973-Raymon Mobley, 1977-J. Patrick Ragsdale, 1979-Jimmy Doyle, 1982-Bob Lester, 1989-Richard Preston, and 1991-John Nikolauk.

City secretaries hired by the city have been: 1930-A.J. Atkins, 1958-Lum Burk, 1971-Phil Olson, and 1979-Carolyn Mayo.

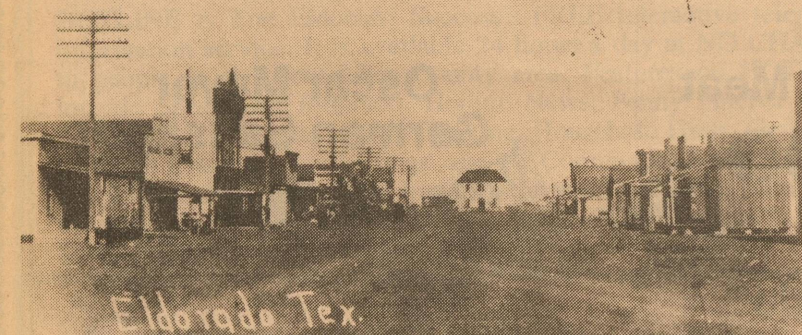

View of Eldorado's main street, looking toward courthouse which burned in March of 1917.

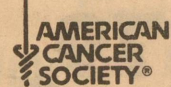

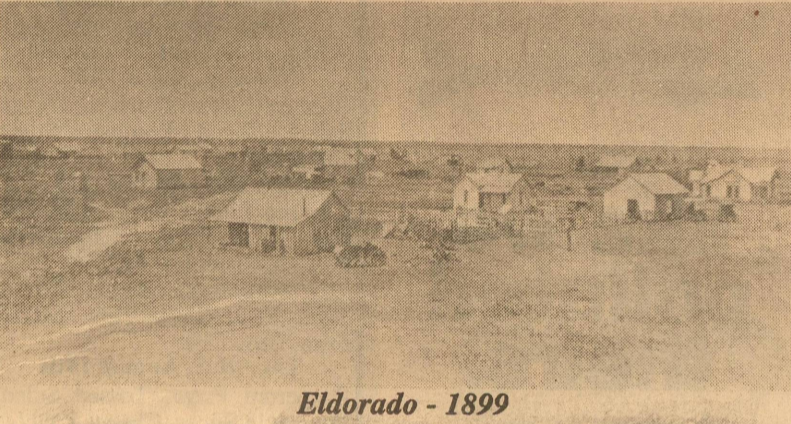

The area of West Texas that would later be Schleicher County was first projected in 1842 when Texas was still a Republic. President Sam Houston granted H.F. Fisher, Burchard Miller and Joseph Baker, 3,000,000 acres of land between the Llano and Colorado Rivers extending far into West Texas. The purpose of this "Fisher-Miller Grant" was to settle one thousand immigrant families in west Texas. The future Schleicher County lay squarely in the center of the grant; however the colonist failed to settle this far west because lack of water, hostile Indians, and open wilderness kept them away.

This first attempt to settle West Texas fell short of its expectations but it brought to Texas Gustave Schleicher whose name is perpetuated by our county.

Gustave Schleicher was born and educated in Germany. In 1847, in company with thirty nine former students of German Universities, he formed the "Colony of Forty" and purchased a large body of land in West Texas. In 1853 Gustave was elected to the house of Legislature, and was chosen surveyor of Bexar Land District. In 1859 he was elected a

member of the State Senate. When the Civil War began in 1861, he entered the engineer corps and served in the confederate army with the rank of Captain through out the war. He was elected to the Forty-fourth Congress, reelected to the Forty-fifth and Forty-sixth. He died Jan. 10, 1879, in Washington D.C., and is buried in San Antonio, TX. Even though Gustave Schleicher did not live to see the creation of our county in 1887, when Schleicher County was separated from Crockett County, we know he would be proud of his name sake.

In 1887 Schleicher County was so sparsely populated it was attached to Kimble and later Menard Counties for judicial purposes.

In July 1901, Schleicher County organized its own government after separation from Menard County, Eldorado became the county seat and officers were elected. The first county officers elected were: Judge - A.B. Priour; Commissioners for Precincts 1, 2, 3 and 4 were: John Rae, C.C. Yaws, W.D. Ake and James Garrett; County and District Clerk - J.C. Bates, Jr.; Sheriff and Tax Collector - Henry Mills; County Treasurer - J.L. Allen; Tax Assessor - C.C. Doty.

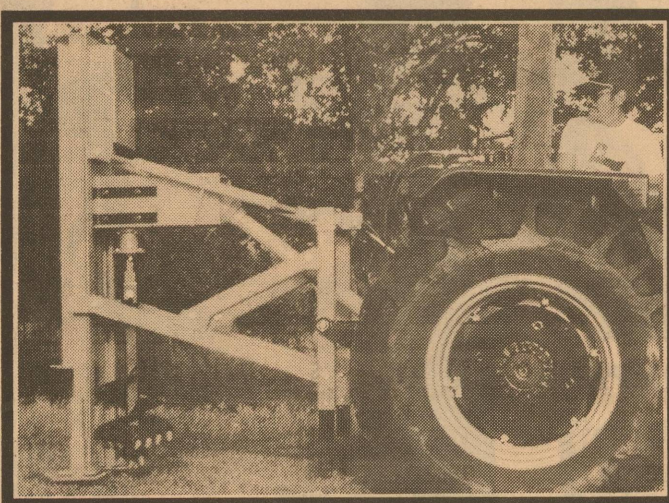
