## Bishop Visits United Methodist Church

Bishop Ray Owen, newly elected and assigned bishop of the Southwest Texas and Rio Grande Annual Conferences, paid a visit to the First United Methodist Church last Tuesday. During his visit with the Administrative Council of the church, the Bishop shared his vision for the more than 500 churches in those conferences. He is personally asking each church to establish a new ministry that benefits their respective communities. The type of ministry to be established is entirely up to each individual church. The eighteen members who were present responded willingly to the Bishop's challenge. A church-wide planning meeting is already scheduled to consider that challenge as well as other ministry opportunities open to the church.

The role of bishop in the United Methodist Church is extremely important. This position is considered the most powerful position in Protestant Christianity. While a bishop performs many functions, one of the most important is the appointing of pastors to various churches. The bishop has complete authority in such matters.

Bishops are elected for life and assigned to serve for four years at a time. Bishops are only allowed to serve one area for eight years. On rare occasions bishops are granted permission to serve in one area for twelve years but never more than twelve. The Southwest Texas Annual Conference includes churches in or around San Angelo, Austin, San Antonio, Victoria, Corpus Christi, McAllen, and all the areas in-between.

## NOTICE TO CITY GAS CUSTOMERS

In a continuing effort to upgrade service for our gas consumers, the City has begun a long range program to install gas regulators equipped with automatic cut-offs at each customer meter. When the gas plant malfunctions and shuts down or a failure of line pressure is experienced, these regulators will prevent gas from entering customers' homes or businesses when the gas system re-starts. Homes and businesses which use gas space heaters or furnaces without automatic cut-offs are very susceptible when this condition occurs. Some residences/businesses are currently equipped with the new regulators.

Since the regulations are relatively expensive, we have established these priorities for the conversions:

**1st Priority** - Homes utilizing space heaters without automatic cutoffs

**2nd Priority** - Homes utilizing space heaters or furnaces with automatic cut-offs

**3rd Priority** - Businesses using space heaters or furnaces

If your home or business falls within the 1st or 2nd priority, or you know of someone who does, please advise the City at 853-2691.

United Blood Services must collect at least 17,000 blood donations in the coming year to provide for the many transfusions area patients will need. Two-thirds of men and women over 17 are eligible to donate, yet fewer than five percent of these healthy adults take time to give blood. If each eligible person would donate blood just once in 1993, patients needs would be met easily. For those who have never donated blood before, this is

a perfect time to start, because the need for new donors is always growing.

Giving blood takes just a few minutes, is virtually painless and is safe. A person cannot get any infectious disease by donating blood. All materials used in the donation process are sterile and disposable; they're used once, then thrown away.

### Winging It



Each year, the state requires that school districts administer the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test. This test is designed to help parents, students, and teachers identify students' strengths and weaknesses in writing, reading and mathematics.

In September, 1992, the TAAS tests were given at Grades 3 and 7 and at the Exit level in October of 1992. In May of 1993, the TAAS tests will be administered to Grades 4, 8, and 10. Students must meet minimum expectations on all three tests to receive a high school diploma.




