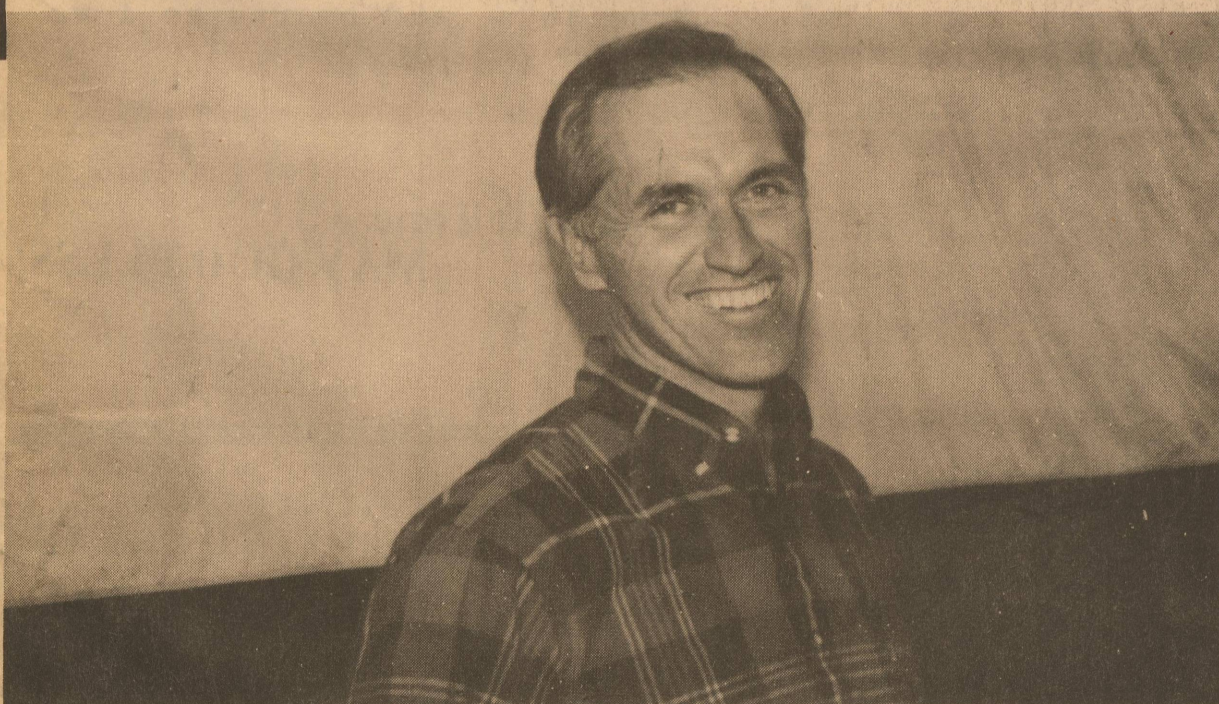
### Sr. Woman Of The Year

### TOP OF THE DIVIDE by Thomas Giovannitti

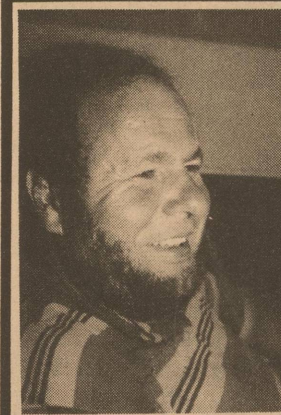

Children and teens of low-income uninsured working families can obtain free eye care from optometrists. The American Optometric Association is asking teachers and school nurses to help locate students who may qualify.

The exams will be given in optometrists' offices to coincide with Save Your Vision Week, March 7-13.

To be eligible the person must have a job or live in a household where there is one working member; have no health insurance; have an income below an established level, based on family size; and have had no eye exam within 12 months.

## KTB Received President's Award

Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc., (KTB) received the 1992 Environmental and Conservation Challenge Award - the nation's highest environmental honor - at a White House ceremony on December 2, 1992 in Washington, D.C.

KTB won one of 13 Presidential Citations being presented nationwide to U.S. individuals and organizations for outstanding environmental achievements. Nine others will receive Presidential medals. Of almost 300 applicants, KTB was the only Keep America Beautiful affiliate to win this honor and the only winner from Texas.

The Awards program, judged by an independent panel in four categories, (Partnership, Environmental Quality Management, Innovation, and Education and Communications) is run by the Council on Environmental Quality, in partnership with the National Geographic Society, the Hearst Corporation, the Business Roundtable and the World Wildlife Fund. The program was established in 1991, and recognizes innovative and effective leaders distinguished as pioneers in protecting and conserving our environment.

"KTB won this award in the Partnership category, which reinforces what we have known for so long - that partnerships are the key to solving Texas' environmental challenges," said KTB Board Chairman Bill Vincent,

Richland Hills, Texas. "Our thanks goes out to those Texans who made this award possible, the grassroots volunteers, the corporate sponsors, teachers, chambers of commerce and local and state government agencies. This is your award."

The Chamber Pride Committee received an exact replica of the award that was presented to KTB. This award will be framed and displayed, along with the other awards the Chamber Pride Committee has received, in The Gallery on Main Street (between the Theater and the Chamber of Commerce).

She also reports that circulation has doubled in the elementary library and students are currently involved in the Bluebonnet Reading Program. 4:00-8:00 p.m. to give students the opportunity to work on research projects.
