Behind The Scenes

Take a tour behind the scenes of the upcoming production of "The Odd Couple," and you will see that putting on such a play takes a lot more than memorizing lines...

In addition to the very visible actors, there is a crew of untiring stage hands, and a Jack-in-the-box director who is working almost around the clock.

Hard-working stage directors for the production are Dorothy Dacy and Pansy Jay, and for "The Odd Couple," the stage set-up is no small feat. For every scene, the props must be in the right place, and scene-to-scene changes must be made swiftly. These ladies also need to attend every practice session, where they (again, and again), set up, clean up, and try to memorize from their notes what needs to be where at what time, such as: where is the telephone at the beginning of the second act? Don't forget the box of Kleenex on the side table before the second act, second scene. Make sure the photo album is in place by the sofa, and there is a clean drink in the Dr. Pepper bottle. If you don't think these ladies have a full-time occupation during the play, just come out and help with the next one!

And where would the Way-Off Broadway Players be without their light and sound manager and Jane-of-all-trades, Geneva McWhorter? Geneva has helped with almost every production the WOBP has put on during the last years; she is there the first day practices start and is the last to leave after the last performance. Whenever

props need to be rebuilt, lights need to be moved, walls need to be changed, electric outlets installed - Geneva is there to do it. County Agents Report

Selection and correct planting could mean the difference between having a beautiful shade or ornamental tree - or having wood for the fireplace.

"There's a lot of furor during this time of the year," said Alan Dreesen, forester with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. December, January and February are the peak, and best, months to plant bare-rooted trees, and would-be arborists are busy choosing and sowing that shade or ornamental tree.

Container-grown or "ball and burlap" trees can be

planned any time of the year.

"Whatever type of tree you choose, the most important thing to remember is to plant the right tree in the right spot," Dreesen said.

Soil is the first factor to consider when choosing that perfect spot. Sandy loam soil will grow almost anything, while clay soils can limit the type of tree that will flourish.

Secondly, cold hardiness must be considered. Subtropical or tropical trees are meant for those areas only. For example, palm trees should be planted in the Rio Grand Valley and not the Hill

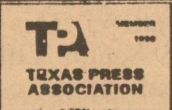

Free Tax Assistance

Lower-income working families may be eligible for government checks of up to \$2,211 from the Internal Revenue Service.

Local IRS employee Dawn Sanders said volunteers in an IRS sponsored community program known as the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program will provide free tax help that includes determining if a family qualifies for government refunds through the earned-income tax credit program. "If a family made less than \$22,370 in 1992, they may qualify for the earned-income credit," Sanders said.

VITA volunteers have gone through special IRS sponsored training and are qualified to assist taxpayers with basic tax questions involving filing status, dependent exemptions, tax-credits, and itemized deductions. VITA volunteers can also prepare 1040EZ,

1040A and basic form 1040 for taxpayers. "VITA volunteers do not handle complicated tax returns nor answer questions outside the scope of their expertise," Sanders said.

A VITA site will be located on our community this year at the Eldorado Memorial Building for Thursday, February 18th from 9:00-12:00 p.m.

"Taxpayer's going to a VITA site should bring this year's tax package received in the mail, W-2s, information on any other income and expenses, and a copy of last year's income tax return if available," Sanders added. Additional information about VITA sites is available by contacting Joyce Whitten at 853-3109.

Country.

Arborists also need to keep in mind the special features of a tree in order to pick a planting site. "Some flowering trees need full or partial sunlight," he said.

A fourth factor to consider is how big the tree will grow. Short trees should be planted under utility lines, for instance.

Additionally, trees with surface roots should be planed away from foundations and sidewalks to avoid later problems.

Trees should be adapted to the area in which they will be planted. Many trees from the northern United States will not grow well in Texas, or may have chronic maintenance, insect or disease problems later on. "They're not in their best habitat when we bring them south," he said.

"An important principal is to look at natural, undisturbed, areas, near your home. Look at what's growing there. Chances are, those trees will do well in your yard."

After the tree is planted, it should be kept watered during the first year or two, especially during dry months, he said.

"As a general rule, we don't recommend that you fertilize that tree the first year."

Often, fertilizer promotes a flush of top growth, which the root zone may or may not be able to support. "Trees live in their roots, that's where all of the water and nutrients come from," Dreesen said.

He strongly urged the use of organic mulch as well. Mulch will hold moisture in the soil around the roots during dry months. It keeps the root zone cooler so that roots can develop better. Additionally, mulch will reduce the amount of weeds so that lawnmowers or weed eaters do not have to be used near trees. "I know of cases where young trees were completely cut off.

Additionally, when

planting, soil indigenous to the area should be put into the hole, instead of organic fillers. "In other words; but back what you took out," he said.

This enable the tree to better establish a root system and eases water movement from the planting zone and vice versa.

When planting large container-grown or "ball and burlap" trees, the dirt ball needs to be a couple of inches higher than the surrounding ground, he said. "As the tree settles into the planting hole, this will keep the top of the dirt ball from dropping below ground height," he said. "If too much water gathers in the hole, it will drown the tree."

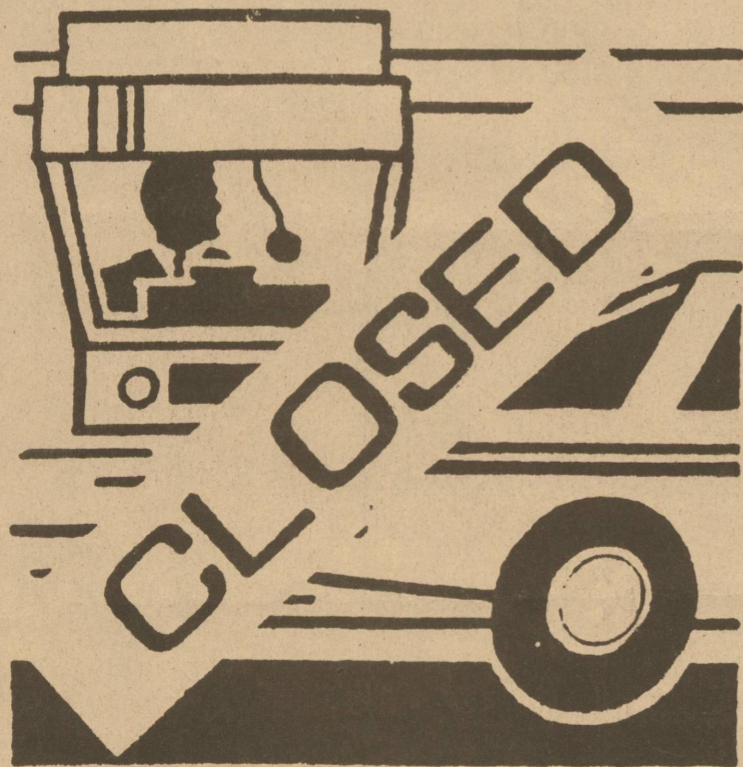

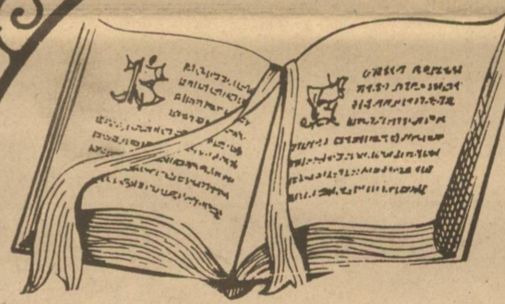

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISCHARGE PERMIT RENEWAL

CITY OF ELDORADO, P.O. Box 713, Eldorado, Texas 76936 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for renewal of Permit No. 10165-01 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed and average flow of 385,000 gallons per day. The wastewater treatment facilities are approximately 5,000 feet northeast of the intersection of U.S. Highway 277 and U.S. Highway 915 in Schleicher County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into an unnamed tributary of the South Concho River; thence to the South Concho River in Segment No. 1424 of the Colorado River Basin.

In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, the Commission staff must determine the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge. The unclassified receiving waters of the unnamed tributary of the South Concho River have no significant aquatic life uses. The designated uses for Segment No. 1424 are contact recreation, high quality aquatic habitat and public water supply. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing instream uses. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revision.

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will

enforce more stringent effluent limitations in order to meet existing applicable rules and regulations. It is proposed that the expiration date of the renewed permit be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code and 31 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application specifically requests a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and daytime phone number of the person making the request; (2) the statement "... request a public hearing"; and (3) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. 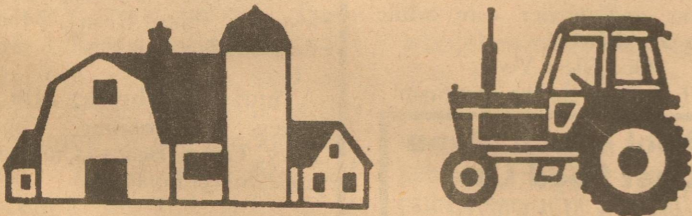
