the United States. It will aid in the strengthening process of Ashlynn's muscles, which have been extremely weak since birth.

Ashlynn receives Physical and Occupational Therapy at the West Texas Rehab Center three days a week along supplemental therapy given by parents at home. All of this is to develop and strengthen her muscles in the hopes that she will walk and perform some of the every day skills that come natural



A recent study of 1,250 adult men done by MEN'S Health Magazine compared men's healthstyles to that of women. They found that 15% of the men were less likely to limit their cholesterol intake, 14% less likely to eat enough fiber, 10% more likely to add salt to their food and 14% less likely to limit the intake of fat. Men are 17% more likely to speed, 8 % less likely to wear their seat belts, 19% more likely to drive after drinking alcohol, and 12% more likely to drink alcohol in excess.


This week's spotlight shines a light on Peggy Ussery. Peggy is married to Abbie Ussery, and is an employee at Schleicher County Medical Center.

The meeting allowed attendees to meet their state senators and representatives and discuss with them the needs of the local hospitals. Several proposals have been made the concerning state upcoming budget and the Funding

proposals reduce this funding to very low levels. The State is placing all the burden on the local hospitals.

On February 9, 1993, responsible! the City of Eldorado City Hearing on the proposed Litter Ordinance. Each of us knows that we should not littering on private or public litter - however, from the amount of litter that just mysteriously shows up on our streets and lots, some of us litter anyway.. If you are caught out on the State highway, you may be assessed a fine up to \$1000. Here in town, we could only suffer in silence and just pick up after the "litter bugs" and properly dispose of the litter.

All that has changed! Effective immediately, Ordinance #101-93 is in effect and establishes a penalty of not less than \$50.00 plus court costs but not more than \$250.00 plus court costs for persons found guilty of littering and dumping within community. The Ordinance states that it is unlawful to litter. Littering is defined as throwing or placing garbage, rubbish, refuse, junk, ashes, filth, wastepaper, weeds, brush, grass cuttings, rock, or other waste matter of whatever kind in or on any private or public property.

Lawfully posted notices will be allowed; however, should precautions to securely post such notices so that they do not blow down and become litter. Of course, with a name, phone number or address on poster, etc., it won't be too difficult to determine who is
