Mexico Missionary To Speak At Assembly Of God Church

Reverend Mike Powell, newly approved Assemblies of God missionary to Mexico, will be speaking at Agape Assembly of God, 502 Warner in Eldorado, on Saturday, February 27th at 7:00 p.m. and on Sunday, February 28th at 11:00 a.m., according to Reverend Terry Allen, pastor.

Mike has already had several opportunities to gain missions experience Mexico. One avenue has been through participation in Ambassadors in Mission (AIM). AIM is Assemblies of God sponsored that program places volunteers on short-term ministry trips with missionaries around the world. "I've ministered in AIM trips, food distributions, crusades, and construction teams in San Louis Potosi, Guadalajara, and Nuevo Laredo, Mexico," Mike explains.




