Fort Concho Annual Training Program

The Fort Concho Museum will hold its annual program training volunteer guides on the three Saturdays of March 6, 13, and 27. The location of the classes will be Officers' Quarters #8 on East Avenue D. Each program will begin with a coffee/social at 8:30 a.m.; training begins at 9:00 a.m. and each day's sessions will conclude shortly after 1:00 p.m. There is no charge for the program.

Volunteer guides assist Fort Concho staff with special tours in the evenings and on weekends. They also staff several of the exhibit buildings during peak periods on weekends over the spring, summer, and fall months. 

The planting of grain temperatures and so that sorghum should occur when flowering will occur before soil temperature, at the two inch depth is a minimum of 55° F for a seven day average and on a warming trend. For corn the temperature can average two to five degrees cooler at the time of planting, however, an increasing soil temperature is critical when planting in cool soil. The time period for planting corn is usually nine to twelve days before the last average freeze. date for the area. Corn planting should approximately two weeks after the average freeze date, especially in areas where corn plants will be stressed by heat or lack of moisture in a period approximately two weeks prior to the silking state through pollination. If corn planting is delayed too long producers would be better off to plant another crop such as grain sorghum. Sorghum plants moisture and have stress can undergo a semi-dormancy and wait for a rain and more conditions continue grain development.

ideal The plant population for grain sorghum is 50,000 to 55,000 uniformly spaced plants per acre and for corn 18,000 to 20,000 plants per acre with very few skips. To obtain this desired plant population a producer should take into consideration the number of seed per pound, the percent germination, soil temperature and soil moisture conditions.



Insights by Dr. Lee Brewer

dangerous. Plato, in The Republic, warned us of this fact 2,400 years ago. Democracy has in its foundations a flaw which will topple its inherent pillars of strength if we are not ever on guard. In its design to give each man his say and freedom it opens the doors to rooms which are better left locked. "My beliefs," and "my opinions" become the tests by which good and morality are measured. It does not matter if I am intelligent, moral informed, I have the right to decide for myself, and to some extent for everyone else. eventually, as is evident America today, this leads to the place where personal proclivities become the alters at which the orals of the ages are sacrificed.

It is no longer proper to speak of art, language or lifestyles as good or bad. Instead, we must respect them for being "alternate." If I disapprove of someone's activities on a religious or ethical basis, it is I who am "narrow," "bigoted" and a danger the rights and happiness of others. I need to "respect" the rights of others to choose their own way regardless of disrespectful their choices are to my beliefs and the future of my nation and children.

Plato states that when

appetites usurp the place of reason rudeness becomes honesty; extravagant and irresponsible gestures become generosity; and a lack of shame becomes courage. Our society has become so centered on individual concerns that it is forced to proclaim vices as acceptable virtues to keep from shaming those who chosen to reject traditional understandings of right and wrong. It is protection of vice which has become the virtue, for this, they say, is the "guardian of our freedom."

Democracy must not be allowed to stand for anarchy, where every man is unrestrained. 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Dr. Stanley Spoke To SCISD Students

by Ilse Williams

Mrs. Diane Stanley, a nationally known author of children's books, spoke to Eldorado elementary and middle school students on Monday, February 8th in the High School Auditorium. She had been invited (and paid) by the EMS Partnership Initiative. She presented programs to three different groups: elementary, 5th and 6th grade, and 7th and 8th grade. Eighth graders had prepared a set of questions for her.

Mrs. Stanley was born in Abilene, Texas, lived in New York, California, and then, again in Texas, where she now is a resident of Houston. How did she come to write? What does it take to write and illustrate a book? How does an author or illustrator find a publisher? What is an author's workday like? How long does it take to write one of her books? Does an author get much advice from others? Is writing fiction more fun than writing non-fiction? These were some of the questions she addressed in her presentation.

Stanley, wrote mystery she took her first art class, and this experience changed her life. For the first time she

Although she had been encouraged to write at an early age (her mother, Faye stories), and she enjoyed English and drama in high school, she had no plans to be a professional writer. She went to college, where she earned a degree in history and political science. It was there, in her senior year, that was told that she had a real

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talent for art; doing art became an inspiration, almost an obsession with her. As today's kids become hooked on video games, she became hooked on art.

She took more art classes; preferring precise art, she decided to become an illustrator for medical books. She spent one more year at the University of Texas, then another year in Scotland, learning more about her profession.

She married, had children, and thus began to look at children's books, thinking that was something she would like to try, too. She had illustrated about ten books before she attempted to write her first book. It was turned down twice, but finally was successfully published.

National recognition and praise were given to her biographies of famous people. She has re-created the life stories of Shakespeare, Queen Elizabeth I, the Zulu King Shaka, Peter the Great, and is now working on biography of Cleopatra.

Commenting on her shift from writing fiction to writing non-fiction, Mrs. Stanley told the eighth graders that writing fiction was more fun, but that she derives a deeper satisfaction from writing research-based, factually accurate

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Satisfying as it might b, writing a biography as the one about William Shakespeare is a long, tedious process. Stanley's husband. Peter Vennema, does big part of the research. He reads almost everything he can find on the subject, then recommends five to seven biographies to her to read. During her reading she takes a bundle of notes. then she shares her writing with her husband, her eleven-year-old son, and other close friends, several of them also writers of children's books. finally she presents the manuscript to an expert in the subject matter to make sure the text is faithful to the currently known facts.

The words, however, are only half the story. While she composes the text, she designs the illustrations that will accompany the narration. In a historical biography, these illustrations must be as accurate as the text. The young picture showing William Shakespeare in grammar school must show the customs of the time: only attended school; students stood up to answer the teacher's questions; students sat two to a bench, and the teacher (a man, of course) kept his switch by his side, ready to discipline any student who could not

remember his lesson.

When Stanley wrote more interesting to adults her book about Shaka, the Zulu King, she encountered an additional challenge. No written records existed about the king; his life story had to be reconstructed from oral histories. The Zulu culture of today incorporates many things not known during Shaka's time; while cotton is presently the traditional fabric, grass clothing was worn during Shaka's reign. "Illustrations, too, are a real commitment," affirmed Mrs. Stanley.

Once the sketches and text, the "dummies," are finished, a publisher must be convinced to take on the story. In the luckiest of cases, a contract is written, an editor gets to suggest changes, and the book is almost on its way to stardom.

Mrs. Stanley works approximately 3-5 full days to complete and refine each illustration in her books but enjoys this part of the process more than any other. Asked whether she ever considered becoming an art teacher, Mrs. Stanley admitted that was never her desire.

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


