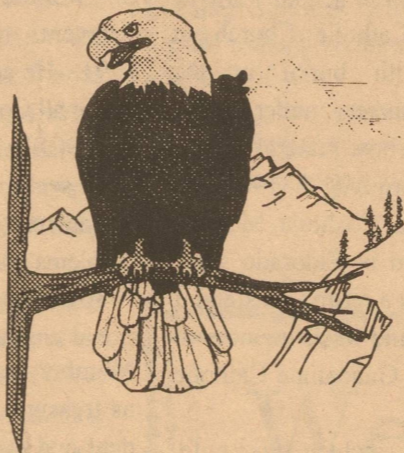


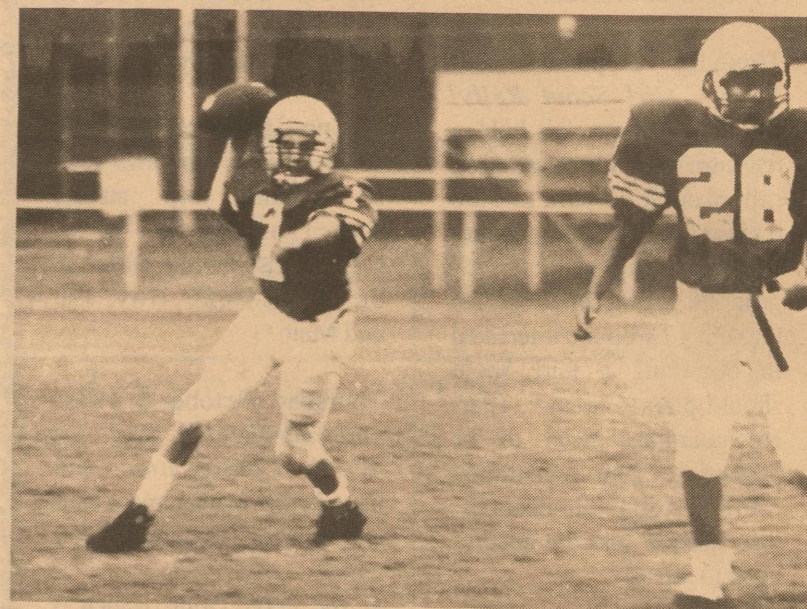

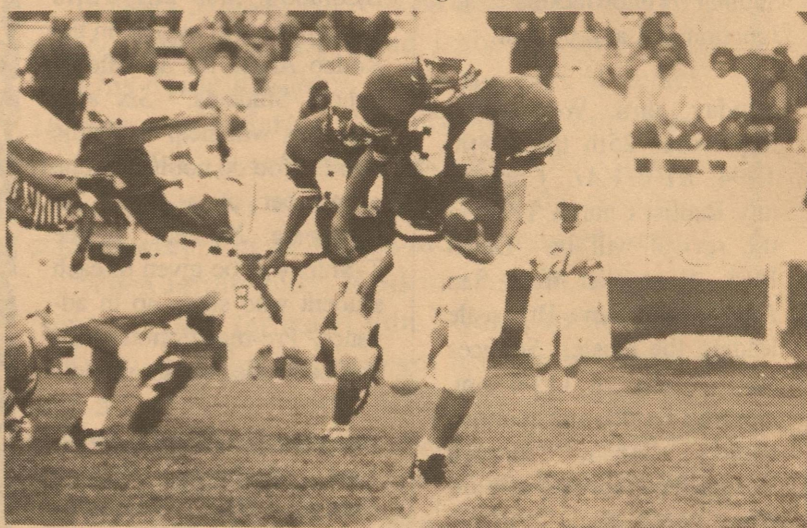

Eagles JV Stun Sonora 22-0

The Eldorado Eagles JV team traveled to Sonora last Thursday evening to take on the Sonora Broncos' JV. The Eagles were able to capitalize on strong Defensive play to take home a 12-8 victory.

Both teams had to contend with a constant rain which made moving the ball difficult and turnovers plentiful. But, the Eagles scored first on a 55 yard run by Clay Butler to make the score 6-0. However, a two point conversion attempt was fumbled and Sonora ran it back to move the score to 6-2. Sonora added a touchdown on a 70 yard run but failed on their 2-point conversion attempt. At half-time the score stood at 8-6 in favor of the Broncos.

A trick-play in the third quarter saw Eldorado's Cory Reeves rumble for 53 yards from punt formation to score the Eagles' go-ahead touchdown. The two-point conversion attempt failed and the Eagles' defense held on to secure the 12-8 win.

In the game, the Eagles had 7 first downs on 245 yards of total offense. Of that total, 220 came on the ground while 25 was gained by passing, the Eagles fumbled 4 times, losing 3 to the Broncos.

Offensive Leaders for the Eagles were Clay Butler with 10 carries for 82 yards and a TD. Cory Reeves one run for 53 yards and a TD. Garrett Bownds 8 tries for 34

yards, Ricky Gibson 6 carries for 24 yards, Beau Sallee rushed 9 times for 24 yards and Brandon Dresner carried twice for 3 yards. Casey Snelson connected on both of the two passes he threw. Wade Dakan hauled in one pass for 17 yards while Clay Butler caught the other for 8 yards.

Defensively, the Eagles held the Broncos to 2 first downs and 86 yards of total offense. Sonora players fumbled the ball 6 times and the Eagles recovered 3 of those.

Coach Paul Michalewicz stated after the game, "Because it rained the whole game, it made it difficult to move the ball offensively. Our kids did a good job of maintaining their composure. The Offensive line did a good job of blocking and we controlled the ball enough to rest our Defense."

"The Defense did an outstanding job," continued Michalewicz. "Sonora had only two first downs. One was by penalty and the other on their 70 yard TD run."

Aaron Turbeville was named Eagles' JV player of the week for his determined play against the Sonora JV and for his strong play during the week in helping the Eagles Varsity prepare for their game against Sonora.

The Eagles JV has an open week this week, but will face Wall at 6:00 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 29th at Eagle Stadium.

EMS Eagles Split Pair With Sonora

The Eldorado Middle School split a pair of games with the Sonora Broncos here last Thursday evening. In a steady rain, the 7th Grade Eagles upended the Sonora 7th Graders by a score of 22-0. In the second game of the night, the Eagles 8th Grade squad fell in a close match with the 8th Grade Broncos by a score of 8-0.

In the 7th Grade contest, Running Back Lance Mitchel provided lots of excitement. He scored the Eagles first points after dropping the ball on a sweep around the right end. Mitchel recovered his fumble, reversed his field and scored from 29 yards out. The Eagles second score came when Lance Mitchel hit Tight End Steven Valero on a 40 yard sweep pass play.

On the opening kick-off of the second half, Lance Mitchel returned the kick 65 yards for yet another score. The 7th Grade Eagles have improved their season mark to 2-0.

Coach Larry Mitchel commented after the game that "The offensive line led by Bobby Adame and Kary Gibson did an outstanding job! Joseph Wink,

Casey Poyner and Francisco Garza had good defensive plays for the Eagles to keep Sonora from scoring."

Following the 7th Grade Game, the 8th Graders kicked-off in a steady downpour. Neither team was able to move the ball very effectively due to the wet conditions. Dropped passes and fumble, killed several Eldorado drives. Sonora scored on an 80 yard punt return and converted on the two point try to account for all the scoring in the game.

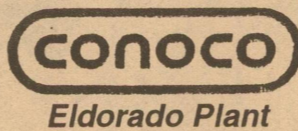

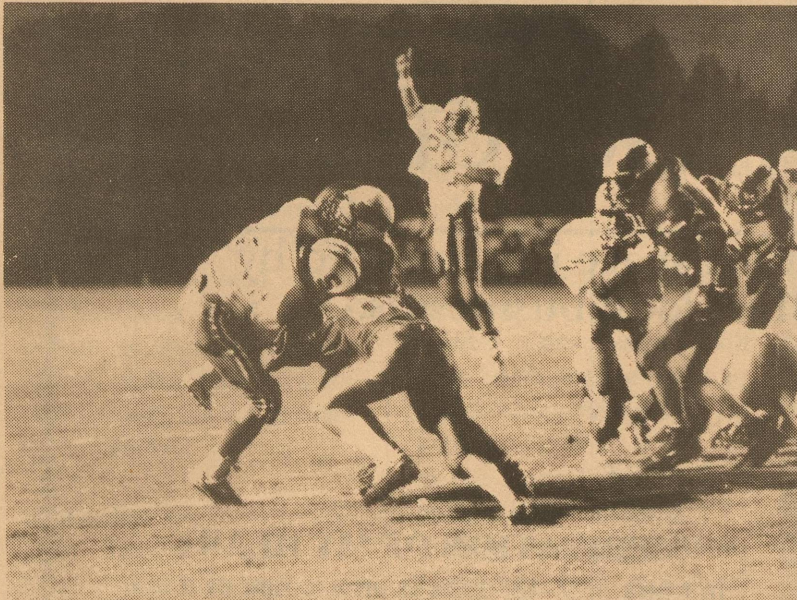

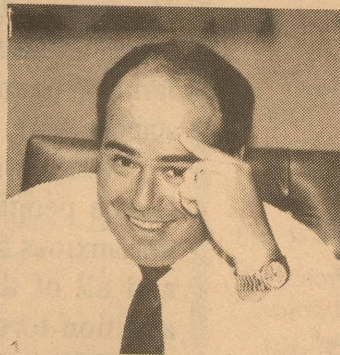

Loomis On The Law

In a previous edition I discussed what a Will is and the advantages of having a Will. Your Will may contain a provision, or provisions, which create a trust, or trusts, to hold some or all of your assets. A trust created in a Will is referred to as a testamentary trust. A trust is a 3 party agreement or document. It consists of a grantor (sometimes referred to as the "settlor"), the trustee, and the beneficiary or beneficiaries. (However, a person can be in more than one of the positions of the same trust.) The grantor creates the trust and puts assets into the trust. The trustee holds and manages the assets for the benefit of the beneficiaries. The person making a Will is the grantor of a testamentary trust.

Trusts are created for an infinite number reasons and purposes. They are created in Wills and other estate planning documents primarily for 2 reasons:

1) For tax reasons. If your estate is, or is expected to be, in excess of \$600,000.00 in value (the current limit) upon your death, then you should consider creating trusts for tax purposes.

2) To appoint a Trustee to manage the assets you give to minor children who are named as Beneficiaries of your Will. Without a trust for minor children, it will be necessary to have a guardian for the estate of the minor child appointed, a time consuming and expensive procedure which is unnecessary if

you simply create a trust for minor children in your Will, and appoint a person to act as trustee. Trusts for minor children should be thought of not only for your children, but also for grandchildren, or any other minor children who may be beneficiaries or contingent beneficiaries of your Will.

In addition to appointing a trustee for the trust, you can recommend to the Court that a particular person act as guardian of the person of a minor child or children. The Court will follow your recommendation unless it appears to the Court that it would not be in the best interest of the child or children to have that individual act as guardian of the person of the minor child or children.

MEDITATION OF MY HEART

In Mark 5:22-42, there is an account of a man named Jarius who entreated Jesus to come and heal his dying daughter. In the last part of verse 36, Jesus tells Jarius, "Be not afraid, only believe." Those words were spoken to encourage Jarius to continue on in spite of what the circumstances were. Let us look at those circumstances.

When Jarius found Jesus in verse 24, it states "much people thronged him." Can you imagine this anxious father trying to get Jesus to his house and all of these people getting in the way? In addition to the throng of people, some woman touches Jesus, gets healed and Jesus stops to find out who touched him. Delays! Delays! I am sure Jarius was worried that they would never reach his daughter in time.

Just when it seems they are ready to go again, some people from Jarius' household come to say "Thy daughter is dead, why troublest thou the Master any further?" It is at this point that Jesus steps in and says "Be not afraid, only believe." He clears out the crowd, then Jesus, Jarius, Peter, James and John continue on to Jarius' house. Arriving at the house, the sounds of futility met them in the cries of the mourners. Within the house, Jarius comes face to face with the impossible, the lifeless body of his beloved daughter. Still the words of Jesus, "Be not afraid, only believe." give him hope and peace. Then Jesus takes hold of the problem and the impossible must yield to Him. Jesus restores the daughter to Jarius, well and whole.

Many of our petitions are subjected to the delays Jarius experienced. Everything seems to be going so slowly. Then other people receive their answers and we are still waiting. Finally, there comes that moment when only the word "Impossible" can describe our situation and we are tempted no to "trouble the Master" anymore. But, when Jesus speaks to our hearts, "Be not afraid, only believe." the delays start to clear out. When we are faced with the sights and sounds of the impossible, his words brace us up and give us courage and faith to continue on. the impossible must yield to His will and give way to the miracles He performs in our lives.

Today in the face of the impossible, let the Master of the impossible speak to you heart, "Be not afraid, only believe."
