Gesch on paid leave as **SCISD Supt**

SCISD Superintendent Mark Gesch was placed on paid leave Monday night by the SCISD board of trustees effective at 5:00 p.m. that same day. The action came after a 50-minute closed-door executive session in which the trustees conferred with attorney Sara Leon by telephone. When the group emerged into open session they voted unanimously to grant a request from Gesch that he be placed on voluntary leave for personal reasons. Gesch was not present for the meeting.

Mr. Gesch could not be contacted for comment and SCISD trustees declined to comment on the circumstances surrounding his leave of absence. The school's attorney, Sarah Leon of Austin, later confirmed that Gesch would be paid during his leave, but did not comment on how long the leave of absence might last.

It is noteworthy that Gesch's two-year contract was not extended by the board when other administrative contracts were renewed earlier this year. He has one year remaining on his contract, which reportedly pays him \$81,000 per year.

Additionally, the board has called an emergency meeting for 12:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 17, at which time they will discuss hiring an acting superintendent. The meeting will be held in the Middle School Library.


In dealing with a separate personnel issue, the trustees met in executive session to discuss what the agenda termed a "level three employee grievance." At one point the Middle School teacher Rick Singleton joined the trustees behind closed doors but left the session before the trustees returned to open session. Once they did return, however, the trustees moved tabled any further discussion of the matter.

The meeting was the group's regular monthly session and was called to order by Board President Jo Helen Kotsch. Also in attendance were trustees Berta Nicholson, Eddie Albin, Jan Wanoreck and Lupe Sanchez. Trustees John Paul Joiner and Kurtis Homer were absent.

Arizona man says FLDS prophet stole his family

Richard Holm, 51, of Colorado City, Arizona, an admitted polygamist, says he never expected to find himself fighting for custody of his children. Much less, did he think the court battle would involve the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (FLDS). As a faithful member of the church and loyal follower of its prophets, Holm says he was stunned to learn that he had been excommunicated by new FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs.

Holm, a respected businessman and

longtime member of the Colorado City, AZ City Council, said he thought life was about as good as it could get. He and his two wives, Lorena and Alice, and their seven children owned and operated a Motel in the twin cities of Colorado City and Hildale. Holm also provided transportation for the church's former prophet, Rulon

Holm says that new prophet Warren Jeffs secretly recorded meetings his father had with church members. Among those recordings are audio tapes of confessions that church members believed were meant only for the ears of their former prophet. Holm says those tapes are now being used to blackmail and intimidate FLDS members into following the leadership of Warren Jeffs.

"He is a sinister man," Holm said of Warren Jeffs. "Only an family this way."

Holm believes that the new Prophet became aware of a con-

fession he made about some youthful municated by Warren Jeffs. indiscretions. "I wasn't always close to God and I made some mistakes when I was young. But I confessed those and cane back to the faith and back to the church," Holm said.

But priest-penitent confidentiality apparently doesn't apply in the FLDS, at least according to Richard Holm. He says

that Warren Jeffs used the information in It was like a death sentence." his confession against him and ordered him out of his home and away from his family. The order to vacate his home was based on the fact that it was built on property owned by the United Effort Plan, a trust fund controlled by the FLDS.

Holm says his greatest mistake was actually leaving the property instead of fighting the eviction notice. Recently another man, Ross Chatwin, won a court battle with the FLDS and was able to stay in his home after he was excom-

Recently, Holm sought and won the right to visit his seven children, something he says has made his life a little easier. "They are my whole life. I can't imagine life without them.

Holm says Warren Jeffs decision to move a portion his FLDS faithful to Texas is a strange one. "I think his decision to move has a lot to do with the pressure Warren is under here in Colorado City," Holm said. "I'm not sure why he chose Eldorado, or Texas for that

> matter," Holm said. "It might have had something to do with the Supreme Court striking down Texas' anti-sodomy law."

Holm noted that Jeffs, who has a well publicized penchant for security and who travels with a group of body guards, could be on the coming to Texas because he fears reprisal from those he has stepped on in Colorado City. "People like me," Holm said. "There are a lot of people like me who have had their lives ruined by this snake."

Holm says he doesn't expect a mass exodus from Colorado City to Texas. "I have trouble picturing a mass move away from here," Holm stated. "What he may be doing is building his own sort of Disneyland down there where his most obedient followers can come and visit for a few days and while they are there they get to see the wizard."

Holm went on to say that much to fear from Warren Jeffs. "Warren is a coward and he is going to do whatever he can to stay

out of trouble," Holms said. "I've heard him say in his sermons that if he is ever arrested he will be killed in jail. I honestly believe that he believes that."

Holm says he would like to visit Eldorado someday and see the YFZ Ranch. "I want to see what Warren is spending all that money on. I want to see what he is spending my money on."

YFZ officials ignore TCEQ warnings

A cement bulk plant and a rock crusher appeared to be running full steam ahead last week, well after a shut down order issued by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ).

Aerial photos taken on Wednesday, June 9, 2004, also revealed another large foundation being constructed adjacent to five other structures already built, or nearing completion. Additionally, a metal barn had been built nearby.


Ricky Anderson, TCEQ Region 8 Director, told the Success on Tuesday that YFZ officials have applied for a permit to operate a rock crusher, but that no such permit has been issued. Additionally, the state's order to halt operation of a the rock crusher and cement bulk plant remains in place.

Meanwhile, the TCEQ is pushing ahead with its investigation. Already, a series of alleged violations regarding the cement bulk plant and a non-permitted sewage treatment facility have been referred to the agency's enforcement division.

Documents obtained by the Success reveal that TCEQ investigators from the San Angelo office are perhaps the most concerned about the sewage treatment facility, which they say is inadequate and poses a danger to groundwater, as well as a threat of discharge into Milligan Draw, a feeder of the South Concho River.

San Angelo investigators were so troubled by the sewage facility's lack of capacity that they referred to it as a Class V Injection Well. A TCEQ spokesman said the designation means that the facility is not capable of safely treating the amount of sewage it is receiving and that there is a danger of untreated waste leaching into the groundwater.

TCEQ is the agency that oversees many of the day-to-day operations of the City of Eldorado as well as other municipalities statewide. It is empowered by the State Legislature to act on behalf of the state and has far reaching enforcement powers and can levy fines of up to \$10,000 per day per violation.



Right now, Texas has 51 WMAs, a big chunk of them in East Texas.

They are "working laboratories," the TPW says, so, while we just drove right in, calling ahead is probably a good idea.

Some WMAs are open year round. Others, like Mason Mountain northwest of Austin or Sierra Diablo, the westernmost WMA southeast of El Paso, are restricted access that absolutely require prior approval.

At Gus Engeling, bug spray and water are essential. You can see some wildlife from your car, maybe along Catfish Creek, and certainly on Beaver Pond.

The hikes will take you deeper into the woods where you might run across a deer or armadillo (we did) or maybe a raccoon or - I must report the possibility - a Bigfoot.

In any event, this off-the-beaten-path trip was a nice surprise and a great start to the summer."



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

Order Prohibiting Certain Fireworks in Unincorporated Areas of Schleicher

County, Texas

Whereas, the Texas Forest Service has determined that drought conditions exist in Schleicher County; and

Whereas, on the 14th of June, 2004, the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County has determined that the normal danger of fire in the unincorporated areas of Schleicher County is greatly enhanced by the extremely dry conditions now ex-

NOW, THEREFORE, the Commissioners Court of Schleicher adopts this Order prohibiting the sale or use of restricted fireworks in the unincorporated areas of Schleicher County.

A. No person may sell, detonate, ignite, or in any way use fireworks classified under 49 C.F.R. part. 173.100(r)(2)(10-1-86 edition), as "skyrockets with sticks" and "missiles with fins" in any portion of the unincorporated area of Schleicher County

B. This Order does not prohibit:

1. Common fireworks, small in size classified as Class C explosives;

2. Large fireworks devices designed primarily to produce visible or audible effects by combustion, deflagration, or detonation and classified as Class B explosive by the U.S. Dept. of Trans. (TEX. OCC. CODE, Chapter 2154).

C. A person commits an offense if the person knowingly or intentionally violates a prohibition established by the Order. An offense under this order is a Class C Misdemeanor

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




