Valedictorian is Shannon Chrisman with a four year average of 99.534; Matt Williams is salutatorian with a four year average of 98.288.

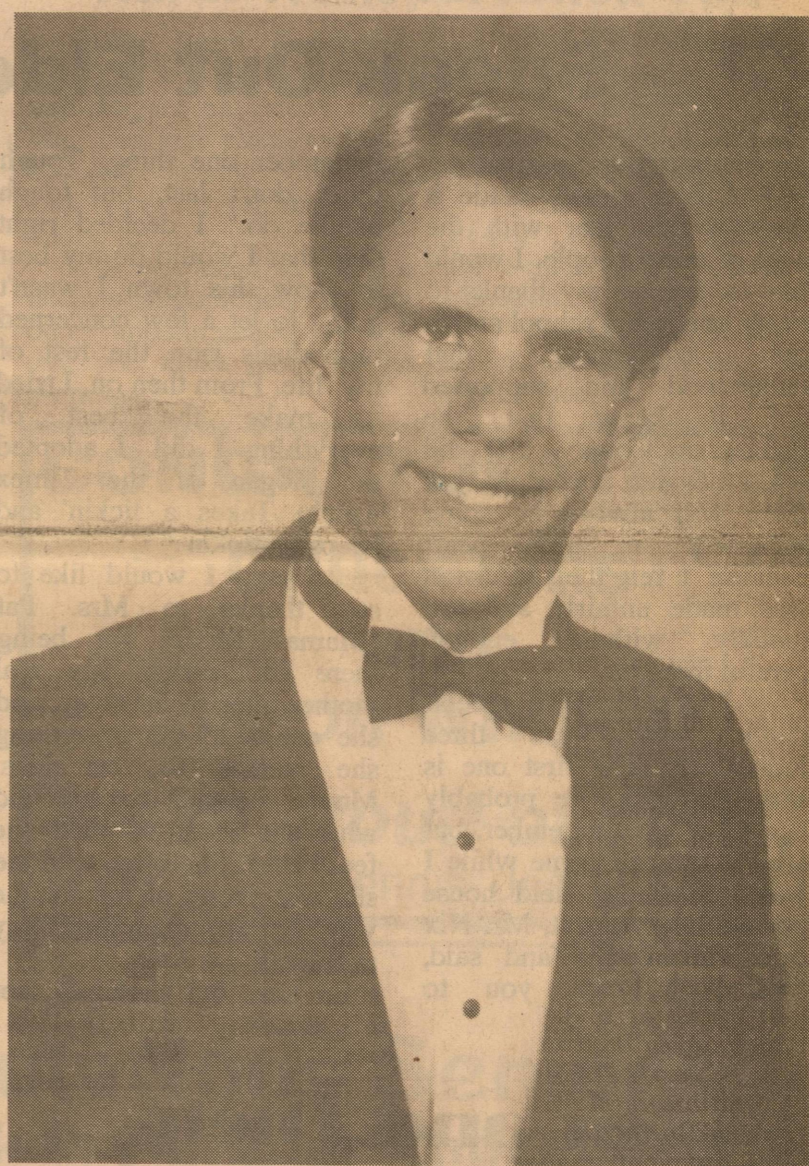

### Our Sympathy

#### R.R. Calcote

R. R. "Bob" Calcote, 89, died Saturday, May 15, 1993 in a nursing home in Midland, Texas. Services were held in Ellis Funeral Home in Midland and graveside services were held in Eldorado Cemetery on May 17th.

Bob was born on November 8, 1903 in Schleicher County Texas. He was a rancher and owned Oilfield Cafe at Hadacol Corner near Midkiff, returning in 1970. He was a member of Oddfellow Lodge in Rankin, Texas.

Survivors include a son Herman Calcote of Gleenallen, Alaska; a daughter Helen Lawson of Midland; 11 grandchildren; 17 great-grandchildren; and numerous nieces and nephews.

"Uncle Bob," known fondly by nephews and nieces, was the last serving son of the Schleicher County pioneer family of Robert Lee and Emma Henslee Calcote. Bob was preceded in death by his loving wife Winnie, his parents and ten brothers and sisters; Effie, Maude, Media, Charles, Bill, Fines, Busters, Henry, Ed and Minnie.

The Calcote Family moved to Schleicher County in 1901. They bought ranch land eleven miles north of Eldorado. Robert Lee, known to all as "Peg Leg" because he wore a homemade wooden leg, built a store, on the property.

The Calcote Store was an ideal location because it was about half way between San Angelo and Sonora on the only dirt road between the two sites. In the early 1900's a trip from San Angelo to Sonora in horse or ox pulled wagons required several days traveling, usually camping

out at night. The Calcote Store had a good camp ground and sold fresh horses and supplies.

Later when motor vehicles traveled this road the Calcotes sold gas and oil as well as supplies.

The store remained open until the 1920's. Robert Lee died on October 21, 1925. Emma, with the help of her sons, continued to ranch until October 5, 1940 when she, her son Henry, Henry's wife Dardanella and their baby Patsy Irene, were all killed by a former employee of the Calcote Family. About a year later the ranch land was sold.

#### Terry Ann Dockal

Terry Ann Dockal, age 42, of Grape Creek passed away Friday, May 7, 1993, in Shannon Medical Center.

Services were held at 11 a.m. on Tuesday, May 11th in Kerbow Funeral

Chapel in Sonora, with burial in Sonora Cemetery.

She was born January 11, 1951, in San Angelo. She attended Sonora schools and graduated from Sonora High School in 1969. She had lived in Grape Creek for 16 years. She was a Methodist and a member of the Concho Riders Club. She married James Dockal in September 1984. She was a beautician.

Survivors include her husband, James Dockal of Grape Creek; her mother, Metha Trainer of Sonora; a son, Louis Edward Smith of San Angelo; a foster daughter, Lisa Alexander of San Angelo; and two special aunts, Jamie Trainer of Tuscon, Ariz., and Dymple Thomas of San Angelo.

She was preceded in death by her father, the late Louie Trainer.

Pallbearers were Glen Davis of San Angelo, Charles Susaraba of San Angelo, Lee Bloodworth of Sonora, and Monte Dillard of Sonora.

### Hospice Extends Services To Eldorado And Sonora

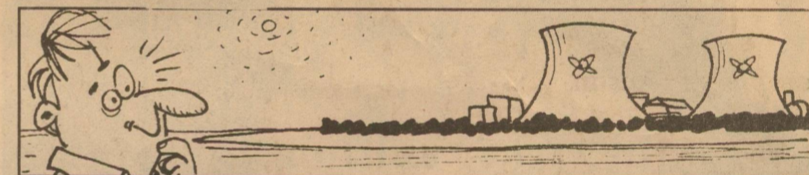
Hospice of San Angelo, Inc. has extended its services to the Eldorado and Sonora communities.

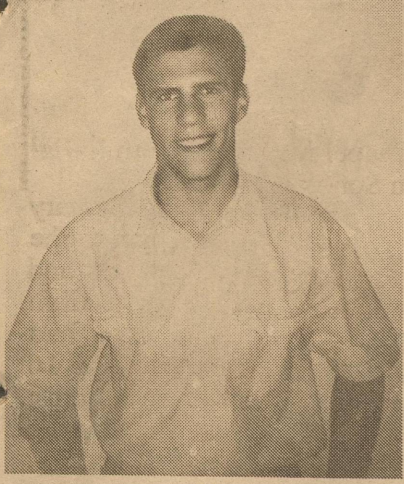

# William's Named EHS's First National Merit Scholar

Matthew Williams, '93 salutatorian, has recently been named a National Merit Scholar. Williams is the first EHS graduate to receive this honor since the inception of the program.

The process begins for a student when he/she is a junior and takes the PSAT/NMSQT. Of the one million students who take the test, 50,000 are designated as commended scholars.

Of the 50,000 commended scholars, 15,000 are chosen as finalists. At this point each student must take the SAT and write an essay focusing on his academic experiences and aspirations.

Based on the student's SAT scores, his essay, and his activities, the selection committee makes its final choices. Williams scored 1450 out of a possible 1600 points on the SAT. He has also been active in basketball, track, debate, readywriting, one-act play and science competition. He recently received the Coaches'

Fighting Heart Award, one of the most coveted athletic awards, for his endeavors.

Of the 15,000 finalists, 6,500 are named National Merit Scholars. Of that number the top 2,000 receive unconditional scholarships. Williams is one of that elite 2,000.

Williams attributes much of his success to the encouragement and high expectations of his parents.

"When I was quite young, I had two summers of intensive basic math and reading under my mother. This opened doors to higher learning by establishing thought patterns and logic skills early in my education," Williams said.

Being named a National Merit Scholar places

Williams in a select group made up of less than one percent of the nation's students.

"Until I received this recognition, I really did not know if I could compete at a national level. While I have had exposure to some excellent teachers, I have not had access to advanced courses such as are offered in private schools or larger public schools," Williams said. "To me, this recognition is a realization of my belief that, with determination, an individual can excel in any environment."

Williams will attend Harvard University in Cambridge, Mass. this fall where he plans to study computer engineering.

# Town Meeting Held

The City of Eldorado conducted a Town Meeting on Tuesday, May 18, to outline the City's options for the future of solid waste collection and disposal. A total of 33 persons were in attendance with a total of 24 citizens present in addition to City personnel.

Mayor Nikolauk opened the session, giving those in attendance a brief background on the evolution of Subtitle D which will go into effect October 9, 1993, and its direct impact on small communities such as Eldorado due to much higher operating costs and 30-year monitoring requirements. Mr. Nikolauk introduced Gary Harris from the engineering firm of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper of Midland. Mr. Harris has been directly involved with SPEC (Sparsely Populated Entities Coalition) who requested and received variance for WT communities from some of the stringent standards outlined in Subtitle D. Mr. Harris' firm completed a written study outlining the options available to the City of Eldorado. They also estimated costs associated with each option using a 15-year period and an assumption that 80% of the trash generated within the City of Eldorado is residential while 20% is commercial. He stated that commercial accounts must be billed according to volume in order to create a fair basis. The four major options were broken down as follows:

private commercial firm to haul garbage to regional landfill and closing local landfill prior to October 9, 1993;

2) Contracting with a private hauler but maintain the landfill under a Type IV Permit (yard and construction debris only);

3) City continuing picking up of City of Eldorado customers' garbage and hauling garbage to regional landfill and operating Type IV Permit landfill;

4) City continuing hauling of City of Eldorado customers' garbage and operating landfill under Subtitle D standards with Arid Exemption application made and new truck and compactor purchased.

It was stressed,

however, that whichever option is chosen, the rates will at least double to cover the increased expenses of operation.

An unofficial poll was conducted among those present and the voiced consensus indicated a desire to continue operation of the landfill in acceptance with Subtitle D. Those speaking out felt that despite the increased costs of landfill maintenance and additional equipment needs, the most important factors were convenience and level of service.

The City will be taking the initial steps toward certification of the landfill in the near future, beginning with closure of filled areas and decisions on new equipment purchases.
