## "Autumn On Old Main Street"

The Chamber Pride Committee would like to remind everyone about "Autumn on Old Main Street" to be held this Saturday, October 16th.

The parade down Main Street will begin at 9:00 a.m. Main Street will be blocked off for the day so only those participating with vehicles in the parade will be allowed to drive on Main Street. The parade will begin in front of the Feed Store. If you are entered in the parade, please begin lining up at the Feed Store at 8:30 a.m. The parade will continue up Main Street to the Menard Highway. It will cross the Highway and enter into the Courthouse parking lot. It will turn in the parking lot towards City Hall and enter back onto the Highway and back down Main Street, ending up back at the Feed Store.

Approximately 40 booths will be set up all along Main Street and at the Courthouse lawn. They will open at 9:00 a.m., so come early and plan to stay for a great day!

There is a nice variety of booth types that have registered for booth space. The requests have come from San Angelo, Odessa, Ballinger, Sonora, Grape Creek, Menard, Mertzon, Midland and several from Eldorado.

Crafts that will be available will be several types of wood craft products, crochet, a number of clothing booths (cotton jackets, tee and sweat shirts, skirts, short and pant sets, blouses, and kids clothes), cook books, rifle raffle, general crafts and gifts, Christmas Around the World, Tupperware, pumpkins, pumpkin decorating, face painting, hand made jewelry, farm dolls, home-made honey, knives, ropes, baseball cards, and personalized hair bows.

There will be a car wash just south of the Memorial Building. Also in that area will be free fire truck rides.

The food and drink booths will have funnel cakes, popcorn, lemonade, tea, tater twist, baked goods at several booths, and a bake sale at the library, snow cones, cokes and lemon and cherry chills.

For the children there will be a petting zoo on the South of the Courthouse lawn. A special train and train station will be at the old empty filling station on the South end of Main Street (by Pat's Hair Salon).

The Wild Bunch from Sonora will have a camp set up in the parking lot in front of the Courthouse.

Bud Arendt will shoe horses in the bank parking lot. Billy Frank Blaylock will tool leather in front of his building.

Anyone who has a booth can set up at 8:00 a.m. Your booth space number will be assigned to you at the Old Hotel Lot at that time.

A Co-Ed Washer Pitching Tournament will be held on the vacant lot next to Pat's Hair Salon. Sign-up will be held between 10:30 and 11:30 a.m. and the games will start at 12:00. The cost per entry is \$15.00 per couple. It will be Double Elimination with no bust limit. Cash prizes will be awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place. The Cow Town Cafe will be the location for an afternoon filled with fun for those who enjoy 42 and/or 84 games. Registration will be held at 11:00 a.m. in front of the cafe. The Old Jail Building will be open from 10:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. for tours.

A free stage will be set up in front of the bank with continuous local entertainment from 10:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m.

The Way-Off Broadway Players will be presenting **The Ballad of Gopher Gap** at the Playhouse on Main Street. Performances times are 11:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Tickets are \$5.00 for Adults and \$3.00 for Children (11 and under).

The Chamber Pride Committee will be selling Home-Cooked Sack Lunches for \$4.00 beginning at 11:30 a.m. and continuing until 1:30 p.m. at the 1907 Old Bank Building.

At 1:00 p.m., Cedar Creek band from Sonora will play at the Old Hotel Park. The will play until 3:00 p.m. At 9:00 p.m. this same band will perform for a Chamber of Commerce sponsored dance at the Memorial Building. Admission to the dance is \$5.00 per person. Tickets may be purchased at the door.

At 1:30 p.m. the 1907 Old Bank Building will be the place for a Historical Marker

dedication. We urge everyone to come out for this important historical milestone in the history of Eldorado.

The Eagles dominated the game defensively holding Rankin's All-State running back to 25 yards rushing as well as a huge "Goal Line Stand" in the third quarter. The final score was Eldorado-14, Rankin-0.

Farley Dakan scored the first touchdown on a 1 yard run with 3:22 remaining in the first quarter. The PAT was good by Robert Sanchez.

For the rest of the first half, each team traded possessions with most of the second quarter played between the 20 yard lines.

The third quarter was when the Eagles dealt the devastating blow to the #1 ranked Red Devils. Rankin sustained a drive that resulted in a 1st and goal from inside the Eagle 5 yard line. The Eagles

defense stopped the Red Devils on a big 4th and goal on the one foot line. This is where the Eagles began their 99 yard drive which included a 21 yard fake punt by Travis Whitten, as well as a crucial pass from Farley Dakan to Hunter Preston.

Dear Editor:

The Schleicher County Resource Conservation & Development Council (RCDC) is presently working with the Angelo State University Small Business Development Center (SBDC) on a very important project. This project includes both an Economic Development Survey as well as an Economic Development Plan for our community. Both of these projects would not be feasible or possible without the guidance and assistance of the SBDC and the graduate students at A.S.U.

At the end of October, the RCDC will be sending each resident of Schleicher County an Economic Development Survey. This survey will have several different options regarding economic opportunities which we as a community may wish to pursue. The survey will also ask residents to rank these different opportunities in order in which they feel those are most feasible and attainable. In addition, the survey will ask certain questions regarding the demographics of each respondent to the survey. It is very important that each of these be answered to allow our friends at the SBDC to accurately tabulate the response to this survey.

The results of this survey are very important to the future of Schleicher County and its residents. In the last several weeks we have seen how vulnerable our local economy is to outside pressure with the possible repeal of the Wool/Mohair Act. In addition, although the Oil & Gas industry has been steady over the last couple of years, reserves continue to decline in the county. These two mainstays to our local economy cannot and will not continue to support those of us who wish to raise our families in this county.

In closing, when you receive your survey, please take the time to give some serious thought to your responses. The results will be used in formulating a plan for our county and its residents.

Remember, we as residents have two options: 1) Sit back and do nothing, or 2) Plan and move forward. Option #1 doesn't look so good for me or my family. How about yours?

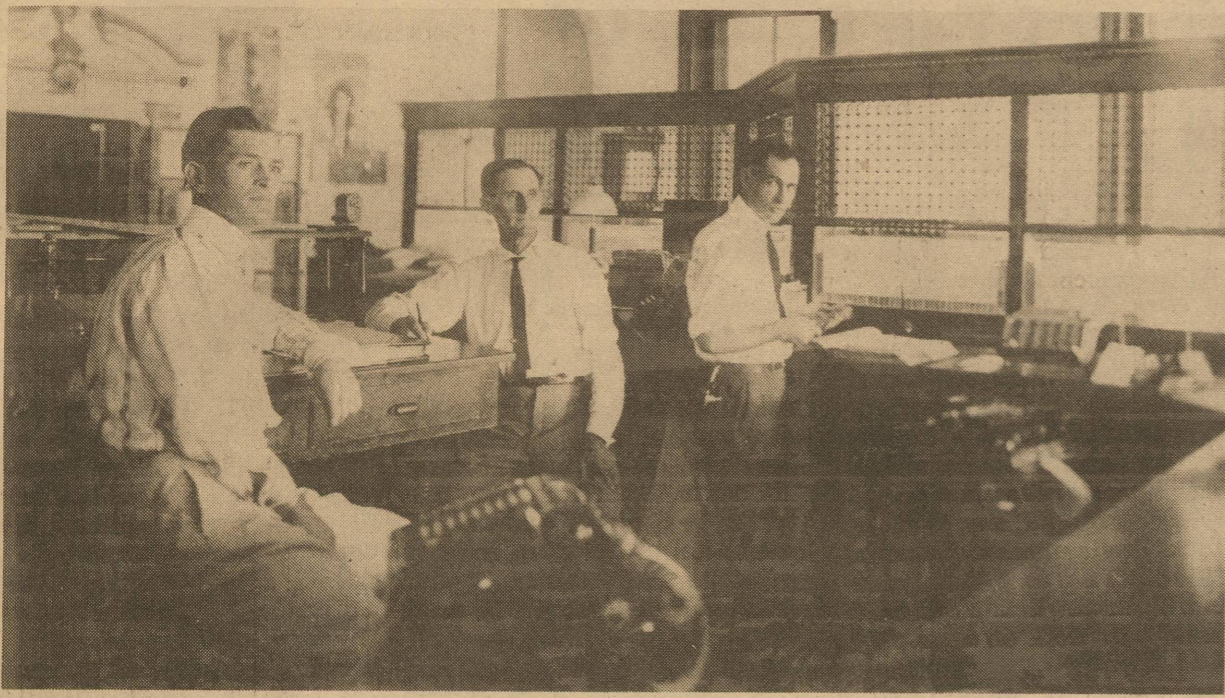

# 1907 Bank Building Dedication

An exciting celebration is planned in Eldorado for Saturday, October 16th. Fun and festivities are scheduled all day as citizens celebrate "Autumn on Old Main Street."

One of the days highlights will be the dedication of an Official Texas Historical Marker for the Old 1907 Bank Building on Main Street. The Historical Restoration Committee, The Schleicher County Historical Society, The First National Bank, Maggie Williams, Isabella McCutcheon and lots of citizens have helped make this event possible. Time and money have been donated and spent to save this beautiful old building for Eldorado to enjoy. Here is its story:

The years between 1900 and 1910 brought increased growth to Schleicher County and Eldorado. The population in 1900 was 515 and ten years later it was 1,893. This increase of citizens, businesses and public services created a need for adequate banking facilities.

On December 19, 1906, a group of interested investors met in Eldorado with the idea of forming a bank for the community. The out growth of this meeting was subscription of stock in the amount of \$30,000 and the naming of the original incorporating officers: Sol Mayer, Chairman; W.B. Silliman, Secretary; M.B. McKnight, C.H. Murphy, R.W. Murchison, Wm. Bevans and Abe Mayer, Stockholders. The

name formed was "The First National Bank of Eldorado, Texas." It was agreed that a new rock building would be erected to house the institution.

On February 18, 1907, the stockholders and directors voted to buy a lot on Main Street, next to the Elder Hotel, from I.H. Elder. The committee also contracted Drew & Harvey to build the bank building.

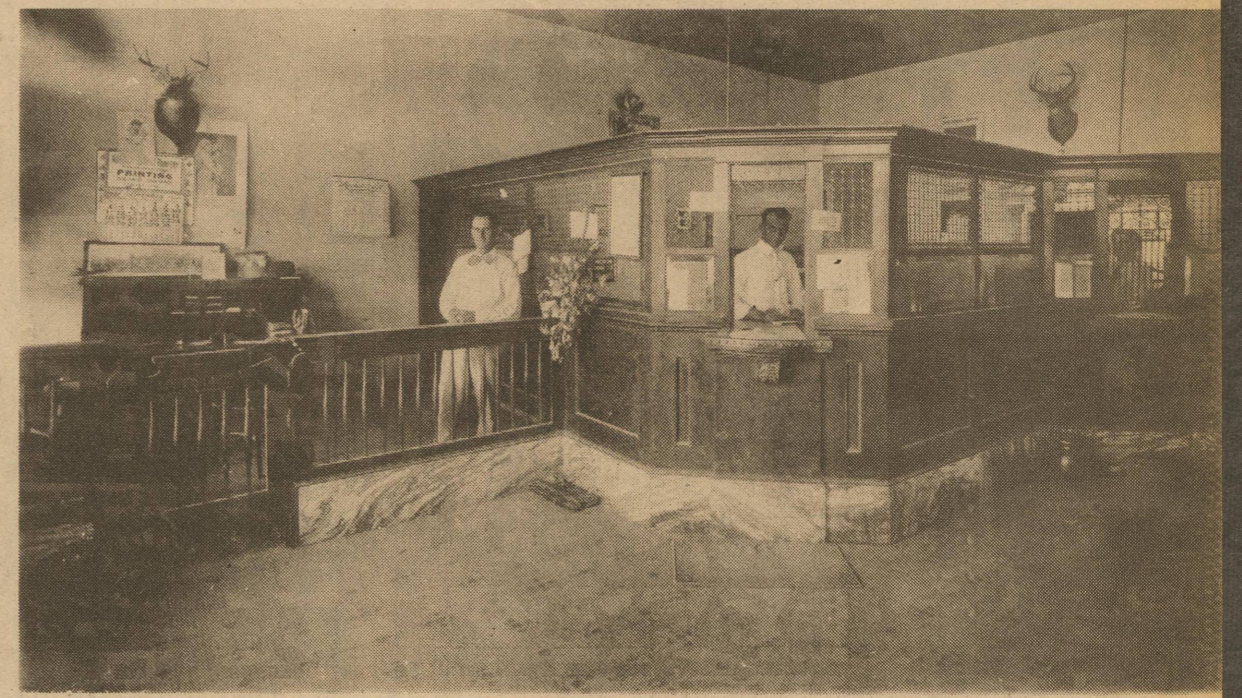
Native limestone from local quarries were used in the construction of the new bank building. The style was Renaissance Revival featuring dentils and parperts terminating with stone spheres. In 1907 this new modern structure was one of the most modern and beautiful buildings in Eldorado.

On January 14, 1913, the First National Bank consolidated with Eldorado's other bank, Eldorado State Bank. The same rock building continued to house the bank until 1942 when a new modern ceramic tile and brick building was constructed for the growing banking institution.

E.L. "Pat" Filey and C.M. Weatherly bought the old rock structure and converted it into a recreation center for men to play pool and dominoes. Over the last fifty years the "Pool Hall" has remained about the same, men still play dominoes there almost every weekday.

Women were not invited to this predominately male center; it has always been an unwritten law! Wives never wanted to joint his bunch of males - they were just glad to get their husbands out of the house for a few hours! This issue has remained an acceptable custom over the years.

On February 6, 1992, Isabella Isaacs McCutcheon and

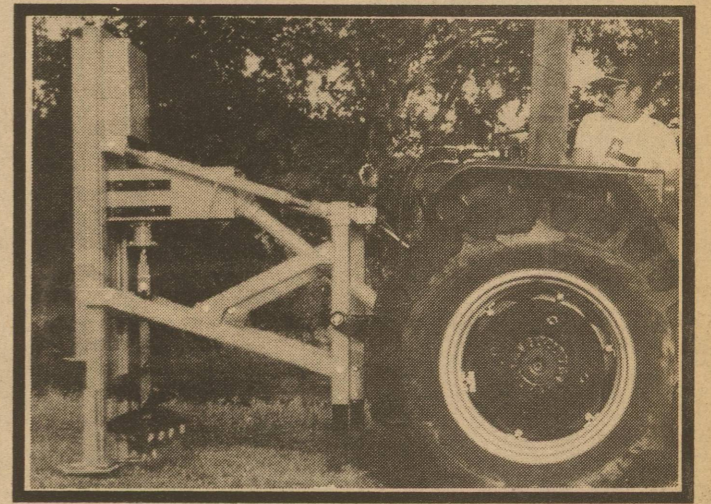


Another view inside the 1907 bank building. Pictured are J.B. Christian, Ollie Alexander and Joe Williams.

Maggie Lee Isaacs Williams, daughters of Will L. Isaacs and granddaughters of J.F. Isaacs purchased the pool hall. The Isaacs girls wanted to preserve the landmark for Eldorado. They also wanted to dedicate this old bank building to the memory of their grandfather, who helped organize the bank, and served as director and vice president. The also wanted to dedicate the pool hall to the memory of their father who spent many days playing pool and dominoes in the center after his retirement.

The dedication ceremony will take place at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, October 16th at the Old Bank Building, 109 Southwest Main Street.

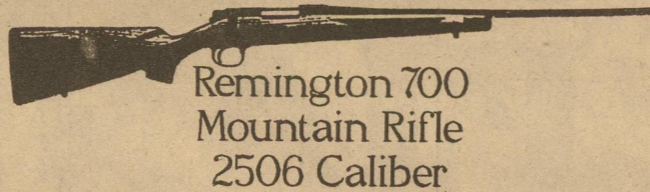

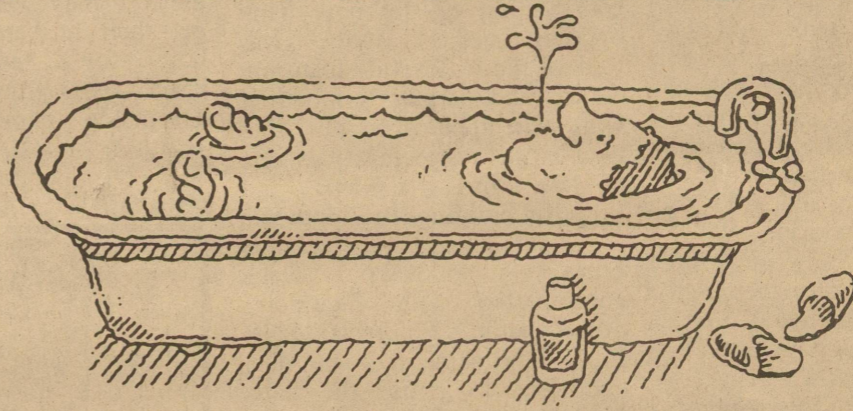

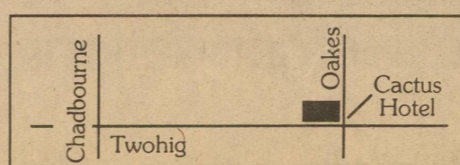

## ASCS Update

submitted by the Schleicher County ASCS Office

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is seeking comments on an interim rule which proposes changes in the price support program for upland and ELS cotton, according to Randy Weber, acting executive vice president of USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation.

Provisions on which comments are requested are:

\* Updating current bale packaging requirements;

\* Increasing the uniformity between CCC price support programs by providing administrative actions to be taken against producers who violate terms and conditions of loan and loan deficiency payment agreements.

\* Allowing cotton clerks to prepare loan deficiency payment documents for producers in addition to the loan documents that they are currently authorized to prepare.

\* Incorporating the new system of classification of upland cotton;

\* Removing the requirement that cotton must be classed within 15 days from the date the warehouse receipt was issued in order to be eligible for price support.

\* Clarifying the manner by which CCC will determine the value of loan collateral delivered to or acquired by CCC that is not eligible to be forfeited to CCC in settlement of the loan.

The interim rule was published in the October 6th Federal Register.

Comments must be received by November 6th and should be sent to: Director, Cotton, Grains, and Rice Price Support Division, USDA/ASCS, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013.

Comments will be available for public inspection during normal business hours in Room 3623-S of USDA's South Building.

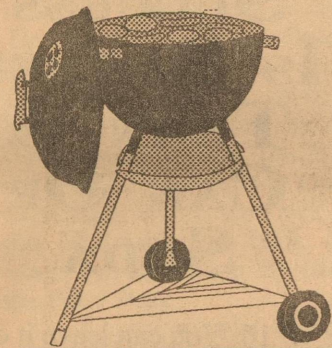

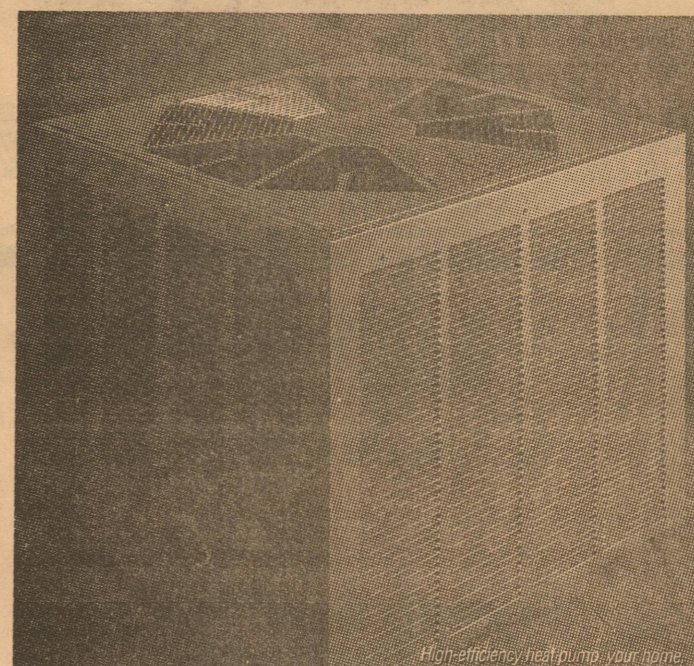
