

play. The attempt failed though when the pass was incomplete.



When the Eagles took possession of the ball on their own 20, they were dropped for a fifteen-yard loss. On 2nd and 25 the Hawks intercepted a pass and returned it for their final score. With the only successful PAT of the game the final score was Wall 31. Eldorado 12. While everyone in Eldorado would have preferred the Eagles to win Friday night, the Eagles still have nothing to hang their heads about. They scored twelve points against a defense that had given up only 18 points all season. The Eagles came away empty-handed in their quest for a victory over the Wall Hawks last Friday night. The final score was 31-12, but the score did not accurately reflect how closely the game was contested until half way through the fourth quarter when Wall began to pull away.

The Eagles received the opening kickoff returning it to the fifty-yard line but eventually were forced to punt. Punting proved to be an Eagle highlight as McGinnes consistently punted well. The punt was downed on the Hawk 11. Wall

was held and attempted to punt, but the Eagles blocked and covered the punt for an Eagle Touchdown - the first time Wall had been scored on in the first half this year. The point after attempt failed as the Hawks blocked the kick.

On the following kickoff the Hawks moved the ball from the Hawk 36 to score in less than three minutes. The point after attempt failed went the snap was muffed leaving the score at 6-6.

The Hawks moved the ball from the Eagle 45 to the 2-yard line where they were stopped from scoring as time ran out and the Eagle defense stood their ground. The half time score was Hawks 18, Eagles 12.

The third quarter vas scoreless. The Hawks opening drive began from the Hawk 6 with a completed pass to their own 46 - the completion was controversial as it appeared the receiver never had control of the ball. However, the drive was stopped when Eldorado intercepted a pass on their own 40. When the Eagle offense took the field the Hawk defense stiffened forcing the Eagles into a 3rd & 21 situation. On third down the Eagles attempted a pass which was intercepted by the Hawks on their own 24-yard The Eagle defense line.

"Autumn On Old Main Street" was a true fall festival with over 500 people attending and participating in the fun, food and fellowship.




With over 50 booths and displays, there was something everyone, including for paintings, sculptures, Indian

night sky, lightening flashing, the plane rocking side to side, and a mighty dip or rise in elevation every so often (just to make me realize how fragile that little commuter plane really is against the hostile elements), I gripped the arm rests tightly, silently praying that the pilot had learned how to fly . . . in bad weather . . . at night. Well, he had, I guess, because we did land safely at San Angelo.

The flight from Dallas to San Angelo, starting at eleven Sunday night, was one of the more exciting plane rides I've taken and, I dare say, more exciting than any of the passengers had ever taken either. I have no great faith in those little commuter planes, although they do not necessarily have any worse safety records than the large planes. The jets just give me a little more confidence whereas those thirty two seater turbo[™] props just don't instill confidence.


I wonder about the crews also. If the pilot is so good, why isn't he flying the big jets making the big bucks? The stewardess on these local flights seems a little less enthusiastic about serving drinks and handing out pretzels. Is this as high as the crew aspired to fly? Or does your class ranking in flight training determine what size plane and how remote a market you'll have to serve?

Sunday night's return flight to Mathis Field was right out of some "Bogart Movie." As we hurtled through the ink black sky, flashes of lightening would reveal the rain drops on the portholes. We were bounced and tossed and pushed from side

Careening through the to side. The plane yawed and sky, lightening flashing, felt as if it was flying almost sideways at times. A few passengers lost their lunches and dinners, and others merely looked straight ahead. They say there are no atheists in fox holes and there may not be any in small aircraft flying in thunderstorms, either. I am just glad that I had specifically asked for seats not in the rear of the plane. The rear seats always feel the turbulence more. I know that may not make sense since the plane is merely one flying tube stuffed with thirtysomething people.


As I looked toward the front of the cabin I could see heads bobbing, a few passengers trying to pretend to read and the stewardess bravely trying to serve beverages of our choice. She didn't get past row three before the pilot called her on their intercom, and out of our hearing, and told her to put up the drink cart and strap herself into her seat. Although I could not hear exactly what he told her, and she did not repeat it. she sat down and strapped herself in her seat. Stewardess do not strap themselves in except for the moment of take off and the moment of landing. Mere turbulence does not keep them from handing out those bags of peanuts or pretzels and serving me my beverage of choice. Anyway, looking toward the front of the pane it looked like a scene out of some forties movie. The only thing missing was that none of the men had fedoras and none of the women had their hair in pompadours.

Maxine slept through most of the flight. How, I do not know!
