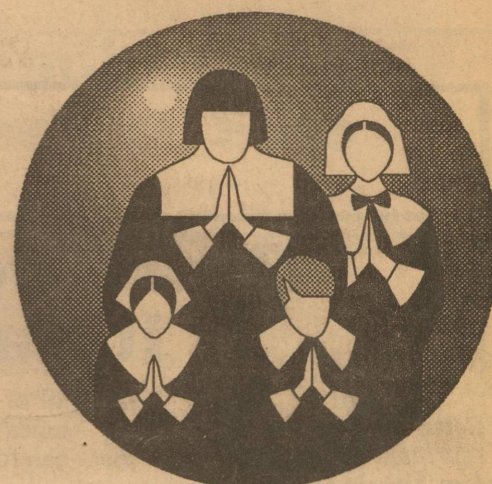

Eagles End Season Setting New Records

The Eldorado Eagles end their season impressively with three new team records and four new individual records. Compared to previous seasons with Doug Kuhlmann as head coach, team records were set this year in passing, defense, fumble recoveries, and average passing yards per game. The eagles held opponents to 68.2 passing yards per game and recovered 24 fumbles.

Farley Dakan broke the five-year passing record. Dakan passed for 742 yards as the team averaged 75 yards per game in passing offense. Pepper Nix set new five-year highs in receiving yards (247) and with interceptions. Casey Triplett grabs the five-year honors in tackles with 151.

The Eagles held teams to an average of 12.5 points per

game while scoring an average of 26.5 points. In average total yards gained, the defense held opponents to 243.5 yards per game while the offense gained 282.6 yards.

Statistics never tell the whole story. Looking back over the year, one has to conclude that the coaches and the young men that took the field are winners. They ended with an overall record of 6-4. With only two district losses, they were tied for second place. One must not forget that among their achievements was the defeat of Rankin who was ranked first in the state among 1-A schools. Eldorado fielded a fine team this year. As the basketball season begins, don't forget to tell the football players you know that you are proud of their achievements.

Used Oil Recycling Program Begins In Eldorado

November 12, 1993, marks the kickoff of the City of Eldorado's used oil recycling program. This center, at 6 South Cottonwood, was initiated by the City of Eldorado with assistance from the Concho Valley Council of Governments and funding by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, is an effort by the City of Eldorado to provide a place used oil to be dumped. "One of the most important goals is to impress upon the do-it-yourself oil changes of Eldorado the importance of keeping their oil drainings out of alleys, ditches, garbage and trash receptacles, vacant lots and the ground water," said Mayor Nikolauk. He also cited the need to educate do-it-yourselfers about how to collect and recycle oil in an environmentally sound manner.

Eldorado's desire to do its share to combat the harm done to the environment by improper

disposal was yet another reason for creating the site. Last, but by far not least, Nikolauk said, "we want to lend our assistance at energy conservation through the re-use of this valuable energy resource." The oil from this tank will be transported to a remanufacturer to be reprocessed into motor oil, heating oil, and diesel.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the Department of Energy estimate that in excess of 180 million gallons of used oil are mishandled annually by do-it-yourselfers.

Expanded Area Calling - A Possibility For Eldorado

Senate Bill 632 passed the Texas Legislature and went into effect on September 1st of this year. This law permits local telephone calling areas to be expanded up to 50 miles. The law, as implemented by the Texas Public Utility Commission, allows for persons in the Eldorado phone exchange to petition the PUC to expand their calling area to include San Angelo, Christoval, Sonora, Mertzon, and possibly other communities.

If the calling area is expanded, persons in Eldorado will be able to call any exchange within the expanded area toll-free. The toll-free aspect would be two-way, meaning that calls to these exchanges from Eldorado or from these exchanges to Eldorado would be toll-free. A charge not to exceed \$3.50

monthly will be assessed to each private line. Business customers will pay a charge not to exceed \$7.00 monthly for the expanded calling service. These monthly charges would remain in effect only until the next rate ruling by the PUC.

To begin the process with the PUC, a petition form at least 5% of the customers in the exchange must be forwarded to the PUC requesting the action. The PUC will then conduct a balloting of the customers in the Eldorado exchange. 70% of those ballots returned to the PUC must be in the affirmative for the plan to be implemented.

In the coming weeks, a petition will be circulated throughout the community requesting that the PUC initiate expanded area calling service for the Eldorado exchange. For information, contact Randy Mankin at 853-2703.

Fourth and eighth grade students will now be tested in the areas of science and social studies. Students will also be given an end of year test in Algebra I and Biology. Firemen Attended Training School

Tim Talley, volunteer fireman of the Sonora Volunteer Fire Department of Sonora, Texas, and James Mack Holley of the Schleicher Volunteer Fire Department of Eldorado, have attended the 64th Annual Texas Firemen's Training School, July 1993. The school, attended by nearly 2,000 students representing about 750 cities from more than 25 states, was held on the Texas A&M University campus.

Firemen chose their course at the school from a list including Fire Fighting, Fire Prevention, Fire Department

Officer Training, Fire Department Pump Maintenance, Specialized Fire protection, and Disaster Rescue Training.

Firemen, James Mack Holley and Tim Talley were sponsored by Sutton and Eldorado County Farm Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies by contributing toward the cost of the school. Since volunteer firemen are interested in attending this school to help do a better job of fire fighting and fire prevention, 100 County Farm Bureaus and the Texas farm Bureau Insurance

Companies in the statewide program have sponsored 100 firemen at the school.

"The Farm Bureau Insurance Companies believe Volunteer Fire Departments have been very effective in reducing the amount of loss involved by fire in rural area," said President S.M. True, Jr. of Plainview. "It is our hope in sponsoring this program that the firemen will help the Sutton and Schleicher Volunteer Departments to better serve the residents of Sutton and Schleicher Counties."

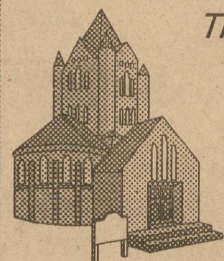

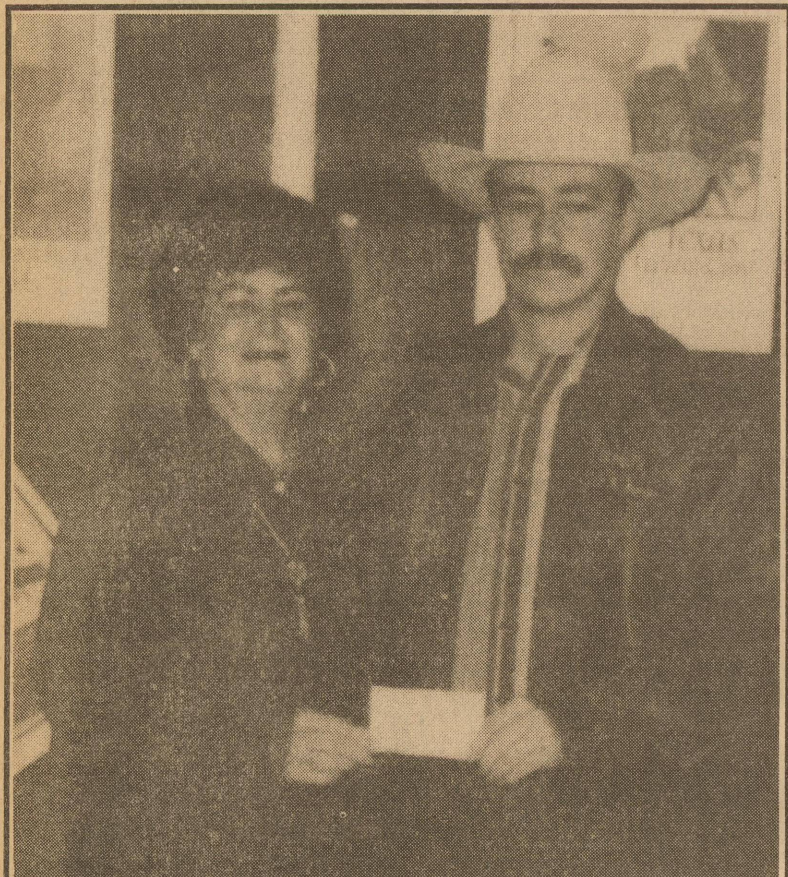

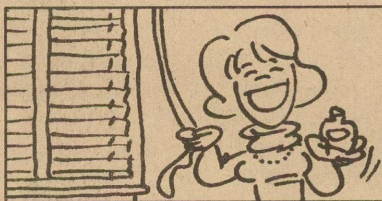

On defense Michael Mayo, Lewis Martinez and Brandon Leggett were some of the leaders.

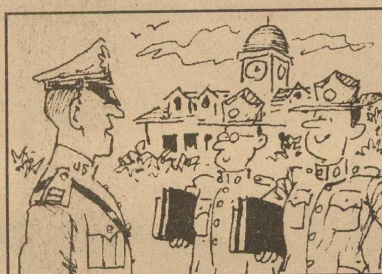

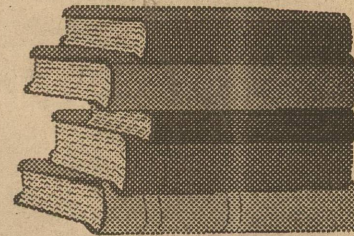

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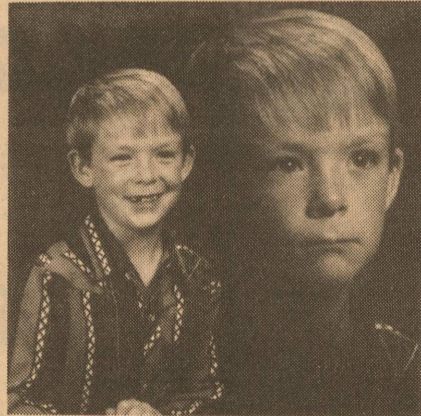
