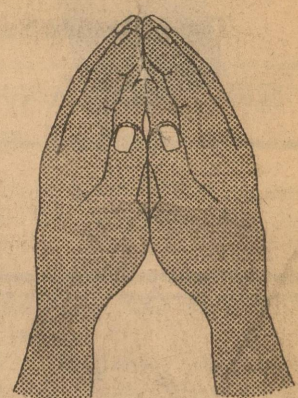

"Holiday Delights" Cookbook Available At WTU

The 1993 "Holiday Delights" cookbook is now available at your local West Texas Utilities Company office. This year's cookbook is a recipe collection of past favorites to use for entertaining, baking, and gift-giving. Each recipe features a nutritional analysis for each serving to help if you are watching calories, cholesterol, fat, sodium, etc.

The holiday season brings with it thoughts of baking and food preparation. WTU has a few tips to offer during this time of year. Food safety is particularly important during the holidays when traditionally larger quantities of food are prepared. Here are a few food safety precautions to follow:

- * Thaw turkey in the refrigerator or in cold water, never at room temperature, to prevent bacteria growth;
- * Do not oven-roast meats at temperatures below 325°. Temperatures below 325° are not enough to destroy bacteria that may develop in large cuts of meat or turkey during long cooking periods;

* Cooked food should never be left at room temperature for more than 2 hours, including preparation time. Refrigerate promptly;

* Refrigerate cream, custard, or meringue pies and any food with a custard filling, such as cakes, cream puffs or eclairs, just as soon as they have cooled slightly. Follow the same precautions for salads and sandwiches made with salad dressings containing eggs or milk products;

* Keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. Hot foods should be kept at 140° until served. Cooked cold foods should be kept at 45° or lower. By planning ahead and following these food safety tips you can help ensure your families' health during the holidays and the rest of the year. Remember to stop by WTU for your free cookbook.

9th Annual Kimble County Wild Game Dinner

It's almost time! The Ninth Annual Wild Game Dinner will be held in Junction, Texas at 6:30 p.m. on Saturday, November 27, 1993. Held on Thanksgiving Saturday each year, the fun-filled event gives everyone a chance to sample a combination of delicious fried and barbecued native and exotic game donated by area landowners and hunters.

In addition to featuring the native whitetail deer and turkey, the Wild Game Dinner draws on the large number of exotic game available in Kimble county. Exotic deer on the menu include: Axis, a very large red deer with white spots, originally from India; Sika, A chocolate brown deer native to Japan; and Fallow, a reddish-brown, white, or spotted deer native to Germany.

Other exotic on the menu include Russian Boar; Barbados, Mouflon and Corsican rams and Catalina goats from the Mediterranean islands; Aoudad form Northern Africa; and Black Buck antelope form India.

Mountain oysters and alligator are the only animals on

the menu which are not usually found live in Kimble County. Potato salad, beans, Texas venison chili, tea and coffee round out the menu.

The \$6.00 donation provides its maker not only with admission to the event and a wonderful meal, but also with an opportunity to win one of the many door prizes which will be given away during the evening. The 1993 door prizes include at least 25 rifles and shotguns, scopes, knives and sharpeners, binoculars, coolers, camping gear, a shoulder mount, gift

certificates and many other items.

The Wild Game Dinner is held at the Coke R. Stevenson Center on Highway 83, just north of interstate 10 at Junction, Texas. Advance reservations are not required.
