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FLDS Church holds fast to Doctrine of Blood Atonement

Editor's note: The Success this week begins a series of articles delving into the belief system of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Dav Saints (FLDS). The first installment focuses on the Doctrine of Blood Atonement

To fully understand the teachings of Prophet Warren Jeffs and his Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (FLDS), one must first understand the teachings of the early Mormon Church, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (LDS), as handed down by the group's first Prophet, Joseph Smith, and how those teachings were carried forward and expanded upon by his successors, including church pioneers like Brigham Young.

First and foremost, FLDS devotees consider themselves to be true Mormons, meaning that it is they and not the mainline LDS Church who is the rightful heir of Joseph Smith's prophecy. By holding fast to traditional church doctrines like Plural Marriage and Blood Atonement, doctrines which were first promoted and then later forsaken by the LDS Church, FLDS faithful believe that they are Smith's living legacy and that it will be through them that God's earthly kingdom will be restored.

Many conservative Mormons broke with the LDS church in the 1890s when the church renounced the practice of polygamy, or plural marriage. Eventually, the disaffected Mormons began to gather in small groups, finally coalescing into a handful of fundamentalist sects. Chief among these were the early

zona border called Short Creek.

Few realized then that Short Creek, later renamed Colorado City, Arizona and Hildale, Utah, would become the center of the fundamentalist Mormon universe. Today, the sprawling town, and its outlying neighborhoods, is home to nearly 10,000 people who look, not to the Mormon Temple in Salt Lake City, but to FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs, for spiritual guidance.

Jeffs' followers differ with the mainline Mormon Church over a number of core beliefs, one of them being Plural Marriage. But another area of strong disagreement involves the Doctrine of Blood Atonement, the belief that there are some sins so egregious that the sinner's own blood must be spilled in order to atone for them.

Church historians disagree over whether it was LDS founder Joseph Smith, or his successor, the church's second prophet, Brigham Young, who first introduced the doctrine of Blood Atonement. There is little debate, however, that by 1856, the doctrine was widely accepted by the Mormon faithful.

That same year, Brigham Young delivered a sermon, that was later published in the Journal of Discourses, saying, "There are sins that men commit for which they cannot receive forgiveness in this world, or in that which is to come, and if they had their eyes open to see their true condition, they would be perfectly willing to have their blood spilt upon the ground, that the smoke thereof might ascend to heaven as an offering for their sins; and the smoking incense would atone for their sins...


"And further more, I know that there

themselves, and the only condition upon which they can obtain forgiveness, would beg of their brethren to shed their blood, that the smoke thereof might ascend to God as an offering to appease the wrath that is kindled against them, and that the law might have its course. I will say further; I have had men come to me and offer their lives to atone for their sins.

"It is true that the blood of the Son of God was shed for sins through the fall and those committed by men, yet men can commit sins which it can never remit.... There are sins that can be atoned for by an offering upon an altar, as in ancient days; and there are sins that the blood of a lamb, or a calf, or of turtle dove, cannot remit, but they must be atoned for by the blood of the man."

In 1978 the LDS Church repudiated the Doctrine of Blood Atonement, just as it denounced the practice of Plural Marriage some 90 years earlier, bringing it in line with the teachings of most mainline Christian churches that only the blood of Jesus, shed some 20 centuries ago on the cross at Calvary, can atone for sin. Most fundamentalist Mormon groups, and in particular the group that occupied Colorado City/Hildale, viewed the LDS action in 1978 as another in a long line of heresies.

In 1988 Rulon Jeffs succeeded Leroy Johnson as the Prophet of the fundamentalist Mormons of Short Creek. In 1991, he formally incorporated the church under the name Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, with himself listed as president, agent and sole trustee. It was he, perhaps more than any other man, except for CONTINUED ON PAGE 7

Home from Fallujah

Marine Corps Lance Corporal Jesse Estrada, came home from Iraq Tuesday and was met by a group of family members and friends when he entered the Mathis Field Air Terminal in San Angelo.

Estrada has been serving near Fallujah in central Iraq, an area of the country where coalition forces have recently faced stiff resistance from Iraqi insurgents. He says that his job as a supply corporal, for the most part keeps him out of the line of fire, except when his unit, the 2nd Supply Battalion traveled by convoy to deliver supplies to other units.

"Most of the time we sat around hoping that a rocket didn't fall on us," father Frank Estrada, Sr., and several other family members including: stepfather Antonio Ramirez; grandmother Elvira Zamarron; sister Monica Estrada, God-father Saviado Gallegos; aunt Janet Espinosa and niece Marysa Espinosa.

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Estrada's brother, Frank Estrada, who works as a jailer/dispather for the Sheriff's Dept. and is a volunteer Firefighter, stayed home to organize a welcome by the Fire Department and EMS. Several emergency service personnel turned out to give Estrada an escort into town, complete with sirens and flashing lights.

FBC to mark bus wreck anniversary

A memorial service is slated for Wednesday, Oct. 13, 2004 at 6:30 p.m. at First Baptist Church of Eldorado to mark the one-year anniversary of the tragic bus wreck that claimed the lives nine people, six of them members of the church.

"This is certainly a time for us to reflect and remember those who were lost, but we also want to celebrate the lives of our dear friends and consider some of the good things that stemmed from this event," Pastor Andy Anderson told the Success recently.

A group of twelve senior adults from First Baptist Church, and three of their friends, left Eldorado on Sunday, Oct. 12, 2003, heading for a tour of southern states, and planning a visit to the Grand

Ole Opry in Nashville before turning north to tour the Civil War battlefield at Gettysburg, PA.

Just before noon the following day, their bus collided with the rear of a tractor trailer rig parked off the side of Interstate 20 near Tallulah, LA. Eight of the passengers were killed in the impact, or died shortly after the wreck. Among the dead were Kennith and Betty Richardson, Domingo and Delia Pina, Mary Ruth Robinson, all of Eldorado, as well as Jean Demere and Jimmy Teel of Water Valley and Laverne Shannon of San Angelo. A ninth victim, Billy Frank Blaylock of Eldorado, died nearly a month later in a San Angelo hospital, where he was recuperating from his injuries.

Word reached Eldorado moments after the accident and grief-stricken family members and friends flocked to the church. Even as neighbors sought to comfort one another, many wouldn't feel the full impact of the tragedy for several days. There were funerals to plan, and survivors who needed prayer.

The survivors, seven of them initially, were taken to hospitals in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi. Six of them, Dana Owens, Mary Barton Robinson, Ken Thomas, Olean Stricklan, Mabel Blaylock and Jim Robinson would eventually recover and return home.

First Baptist Church is located at 109 W. Gillis Avenue in Eldorado. The memorial service is open to the public and everyone is invited to attend.

He told the Success Wednesday morning that he isn't really sure where his next duty station will be. He is slated to report back to his unit in Camp Lejeune in two weeks where he will find out what his next orders are.

One year later, a reporter's perspective

As a veteran journalist, my senses have been hardened to car-accident scenes, crime scenes, fires and images thereof. I simply consider it part of the job.

But as I arrived on the scene of the Oct. 13, 2003, deadly church-bus accident on I-20 just west of Tallulah, I knew these images would stay with me. My first thoughts were, "Oh, my God!"

Accident and crime scenes tend to ignite the adrenaline fuses in reporters, so when I crossed the interstate that morning to take photos, I was eager to find out what happened - and how. But the excitement quickly turned to dread. As rescue workers ment officials asked us not to capture images from the other side of the bus, I found a spot near the back of the tractor-trailer to gather my thoughts. I'll never forget what I saw when I looked up into the front of the bus.

The driver, Kenneth Thomas, who police say fell asleep at the cause he sat only inches from where result of God's mercy.



School district report cards out...

Based on the new Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) test and completion and dropout rates, the Texas Education Agency has rated 1.5 percent of Texas' school districts as exemplary, the highest rating. Nineteen districts and 517 campuses were named exemplary, meaning 90 percent of students received a TAKS passing rate and 95 percent completed high school.


The next highest rating recognized, achieved by 30.5 percent of Texas' school districts, requires a 70 percent passing rate and an 85 percent graduation rate. In all, 374 districts and 2,531 campuses were named recognized.

Academically acceptable, the third category, was conferred on 58.3 percent of districts. A total 715 districts and 3,585 campuses were dubbed academically acceptable, which requires a 50 percent passing rate on the reading, writing and social studies portions of TAKS with 35 percent passing math and 25 percent passing science. A 75 percent graduation rate also is required.

Statewide, about 2 percent of school districts (26 districts) and 102 campuses got the equivalent of CONTINUED ON PAGE 6

AUSTIN, Texas -- Discover treasures from Texas' prehistoric and historic past at celebrations across the state during Texas Archeology Month (TAM) in October. "I am very proud of the young men on the J.V. football team," Eagles coach Don Richters said. "They played as hard as they could play for four quarters."

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
Hernandez scored on a lead and a sweep to lead Eldorado's offensive attack.



Lemony Cheesecake

- **Squares**
 - 2 cups vanilla wafer crumbs
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 1/2 cup margarine or butter, melted
 - 3 (8-ounce) packages cream cheese, softened
 - (14-ounce) can Eagle **Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk (NOT** evaporated milk)
 - 3 eggs 1/2 cup lemon juice from
 - concentrate 3/4 cup strawberry preserves
- 1. Preheat oven to 375°F (325°F for glass dish)

1 cup unsifted flour 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar

- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- tablespoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup cold margarine or butter, cut into small pieces
- 3 cups miniature marshmallows 1 (14-ounce) can Eagle
 - **Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk (NOT** evaporated milk)
- cup peanut butter flavored chips or 1/2 cup creamy
- peanut butter cup coarsely chopped peanuts or cashews
- (3-ounce) can chow mein noodles

Chill thoroughly. Cut into bars. Store loosely covered at room temperature.


