### **Sheriff questions** phone call from Fred Jessop

Schleicher County Sheriff David Doran received a phone call this week from a man identifying himself as Fred Jessop, the 94-year-old patriach of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. Doran said that the man phoned him last Saturday at the urging of officials from the YFZ Ranch.

"I can't say whether or not it was Fred Jessop. He provided me with the right pieces of information that would tend to identify him and he certainly sounded as if he could be 94, but I still have my doubts," Doran told the Success.

Doran said the man told him he was fine and didn't need any help, adding that he was retired and staying out of church business.

Jessop, known as "Uncle Fred" to the FLDS faithful, was slated to succeed former FLDS Prophet Rulon Jeffs. But, that office was claimed by the late prophet's son, Warren Jeffs. in 2002. Shortly thereafter, the new prophet excommunicated many in the church's heirarchy. Then, late in 2003, as construction was getting under way on the group's new compound near Eldorado, Fred Jessop went missing.

Despite rampant rumors that Jessop had been kidnapped, and/or killed, no one in the closed communities of Hildale, Utah or Colorado City, Arizona, came forward to report Jessop until two weeks ago. That prompted a missing person report being filed in the national law enforcement data banks and led to inquiries here in Eldorado as to Jessop's whereabouts.

Sheriff Doran noted he was contacted last week by YFZ officials who wanted to clear up the matter and they offered to put him in touch with Fred Jessop. He said he told the men he had to meet with Jessop face-to-face in order to confirm his identity. Doran said that Saturday's phone conversation falls far short of proving that Jessop is alive and

"In fact it raises more suspicions than anything," Doran told the Success.

He then noted that he has been in close contact with Sheriff Kirk Smith in St. George, Utah, who has jurisdiction over Hildale, and with whom the missing person report was filed. Doran said that Smith assured him his department was closely monitoring things here in

Doran says he has also contacted Colorado City Police Chief Sam Roundy who tells him that his contacts report Fred Jessop is alive and well and wanting to be left alone. "I still have very serious doubts about this whole thing," Doran added.

True to form, no one connected with the FLDS Church or the YFZ Ranch is willing to comment about Fred Jessop's whereabouts. The Success has made repeated attempts to contact church and ranch officials concerning the issue. So far, no one is willing to comment.

# Into the flames

### Eldorado's finest battle series of destructive fires

Eldorado residents, most of whom were blissfully ignorant of the grass fire raging near the outskirts of town, awoke Saturday morning to the acrid smell of smoke that had settled over the town. During the frantic night, Eldorado volunteer firefighters shifted from fire to fire, trying to stay ahead of a series of blazes sparked by lightning after a line of thunderstorms pushed through the area.

The worst of the fires began just southeast of town on the Mertz Ranch and was almost extinguished by the rain. "We had just come from another fire on Pat Jackson's place in the east end of the county and we thought the rain was going to put his one out," Fire Chief Jerry Jones commented later.

Jones said that firefighters found a vantage point where they could watch the fire as the rain swept across. "It almost flickered out," Jones said. "But the rain passed and it grew and grew."

Fire crews then found themselves trying to make their way across muddy pastures and through locked gates to get to the fire which flared up quickly when it crossed over to pastureland the rains had missed. Jones said a number of trucks got stuck in the mud or had flats as they crossed rough terrain trying to get ahead of the fire.

Jones noted that units from the Sonora Fire Dept. assisted with the grass fires.


Another round of thunderstorms sent firefighters scurrying again Saturday afternoon, this time to a tank battery fire on County Road 410 (Poor Boy Lane) where lightning had touched off a fire on an oil lease. Fire crews used foam to quench the flames before they could spread.

A leaky plastic water line in an upstairs bathroom was blamed for a fire Sunday evening inside the Jennifer Sellers residence at 206 North Divide. Investigators say that the water leak dripped down on a 220 volt electrical receiptical in the ground floor kitchen, causing an electrical spark.

The first firefighters reaching the scene donned air packs and entered the smoke-filled home, going from room to room looking for anyone who might be injured or unconscious while others contained and extinguished the flames in the kitchen. Fortunately for all concerned, no one was at home at the time of the blaze.

Fire Chief Jerry Jones says that the water leak that caused the fire had wet down enough of the kitchen to keep the flames from rapidly spreading into nearby rooms.

Jones notes that after their busy weekend, local firefighters are ready

### City council budget talks turn to role of administrator

The Eldorado City Council met Thursday evening, August 19, 2004, ostensibly for a budget workshop, but before the meeting was over, council member Toni Sudduth would question whether City Administrator Randy Mankin's role as owner and publisher of The Eldorado Success is putting the city in jeopardy of a lawsuit because of the newspaper's coverage of the story surrounding the YFZ Ranch.

Mayor John Nikolauk called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. with councilmembers Bill McCutcheon, Toni Sudduth, Dora Bosmans, Tommy Minor, Richard Mendez and Juaquin Rojas in

The group methodically went through budget discussions and the meeting was winding down when Ms. Sudduth challenged Mankin's part-time position as city administrator and questioned how much of Mankin's newspaper work was being done on city time. She also claimed that he took too much time away from work and was in arrears on his vacation time.

Mankin disagreed with that and referred to records he keeps in his day planner. He noted that in addition to taking care of business at City Hall, he receives numerous calls at all hours of the night and day, even while he is at his newspaper office.

Sudduth argued that Mankin has a conflict of interest and said that he should conduct city business only when he is at City Hall and suggested that he tell persons calling him at home or at his newspaper office to contact him later at his city office.

Mankin said he appreciated the opportunity the council had given him and said he tries to do his best on behalf of the city. He pointed out that he drives his own vehicle and provides his own fuel and cellular phone. He went on to say that he resented being confronted about his job performance in front of his employees and family members (Mankin's wife, Kathy was present, covering the meeting for the Success). He noted that other employees are given the courtesy being discussed in executive session.

Mankin then offered to resign if the council felt he could no longer serve effectively. The offer was flatly rejected by Mayor Nikolauk, who polled the remainder of the council on the question.

Council member Bill McCutcheon offered a motion that the council consult an attorney in hopes of settling the issue. Mankin pointed out that the item had been brought up without being on the agenda and urged McCutcheon not to offer a formal motion since it would violate the Open Meetings Act. Mankin said that instead he would seek a legal opinion on the matter on the council's

At that point, Sudduth asked that an attorney other than James Kosub be consulted. Mayor Nikolauk noted that Kosub is the city's attorney and would be called concerning the issue. He agreed, however to check with a Texas Municipal League attorney, in addition to Kosub.

In the less exciting, but equally important budget workshop that preceded, the council met with Mankin, City Secretary Carolyn Mayo and Utility Superintendent Floyd Fay. During the twohour long workshop, the council looked over the city's financial condition and reviewed several reports presented by Ms. Mayo. It was noted that a warmer than usual winter and a wetter than normal summer greatly curtailed the amount of







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### Eagles excel in final tune-up with McCamey \*

Warbirds to begin 2004 campaign with Chirstoval here tomorrow night

The Eldorado Eagles took the field Friday evening in their second and final scrimmage of the season against the McCamey Badgers.

"For the most part we looked good," said Head Coach Gary Grubbs, "The only thing that really hurt us was poor tackling on a few plays."

The Warbirds gained 114 of their 202 total yards through the air and pounded out the remaining 88 yards on the ground. Quarterback Frank Edmiston racked up most of the Eagles passing yards with 103, including a 41-yard touchdown pass to Terrell Boysaw.

Boysaw ended the contest with 66 yards receiving on four catches. Jorge Bustos hauled in a 20-yard reception, Kolby Dombroski caught a 17-yard pass, both Rigo Arispe and Ryan Cathey had 5-yard receptions and Eric Garcia caught a pass for 1 yard.

Cathey led the Eagles' ground game with 41 yards on only three carries, while Edmiston tallied 25 vards on five attempts.


"We got off to a slow start in practice leading up to McCamey, said Grubbs. "It probably had to do with school starting and the kids getting back into the routine, but defensively we suffered from it."



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



### YFZ Ranch hauling wastewater to San Angelo

TCEQ District 8 Director Ricky Anderson confirmed this week that wastewater is being transported from the YFZ Ranch near Eldorado to a wastewater treatment plant at the San Angelo landfill operated by Trashaway. Anderson said that his inspectors had visited the ranch on August 16th to confirm that an above ground storage tank had been installed. He said that since that time ranch officials have hired a licensed wastewater hauler to transport the waste to San Angelo. Anderson said that his inspectors have received trip tickets documenting the process and that they continue to closely monitor the situation at the YFZ, which he says will only last until a permanent wastewater treatment plant can be constructed at the ranch.





Chipotle Cream Place steaks and marinade in foodsafe plastic bag; turn to coat. Close bag; marinate in refrigerator 6 hours or overnight, turning

occasionally. Remove steaks from marinade; discard marinade. Brush peppers and onions with oil. Place steaks and vegetables on grid over medium, ash-covered coals. Grill flank steaks, uncovered, 17 to

21 minutes for medium rare to medium doneness (top round steaks 16 to 18 minutes for medium rare), turning occasionally. Grill peppers and onions 16 to 18 minutes, turning occasionally; remove peppers and continue grilling onions 8 to 10 minutes or

Cut vegetables into strips; combine. Carve steaks across the grain into thin slices. Serve beef and vegetables in tortillas with Chipotle Cream. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

Chipotle Cream: In small bowl combine 1-1/2 cups dairy sour cream, 3 tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro and 1 tablespoon adobo sauce from canned chipotle peppers. Cover; refrigerate. Makes about 1-1/2 cups.

### **Marinade Magic**

There's no mystery to marinating. Marinades are seasoned liquid mixtures that serve two purposes: to add flavor and, in some cases, to help tenderize. A tenderizing marinade must contain an acidic ingredient like lemon juice, yogurt, wine or vinegar — or a natural tenderizing enzyme from fresh papaya, ginger, pineapple or figs. Use flavor marinades for tender beef steaks.

- Top Sirloin
- Top Loin (Strip) ■ Tenderloin
- Porterhouse/T-Bone
- Ribeye ■ Chuck Top Blade

To add flavor, steaks need only be marinated for 15 minutes or up to

Use tenderizing marinades for less tender beef steaks.

- Chuck Shoulder ■ Top Round
- Skirt
- Flank

To tenderize, steaks need to marinate for at least 6 hours or up to 24 hours. Marinating longer than this can result in a mushy surface texture.

### **More About Marinades**

■ Always marinate in the refrigerator, never at room tempera-

ture where bacteria can thrive. Marinate in a food-safe plastic bag or nonreactive container. Turn the steak occasionally to allow even exposure to the marinade

■ If a marinade is to be used as a baste for the beef or later as a sauce, reserve a portion of it before adding the beef. Marinade that has been in contact with raw meat must be brought to a full rolling boil before using as a sauce.

■ Never save and reuse a marinade

■ Allow 1/4 to 1/2 cup marinade for each 1 to 2 pounds of beef.

### Here's the Rub

Rubs are blends of fresh or dried herbs and spices that add flavor to steaks (they don't tenderize). It's easy to make your own or you can purchase prepared blends in the supermarket spice section. Apply rubs evenly to both sides of steaks. The amount depends on your taste preference and the beef cut.

### Garlic-Thyme Rub

1 to 2 tablespoons cracked black pepper

3 cloves garlic, minced 2 teaspoons dried thyme leaves

Combine all ingredients in small bowl. Makes 2 to 3 tablespoons.

### Lemon Pepper Rub

2-1/2 teaspoons lemon pepper 3 large cloves garlic,

1-1/2 teaspoons dried oregano leaves

Combine all ingredients in small bowl. Makes 2 tablespoons.

### **Spicy Seasoning Rub**

3 tablespoons chili powder 2 teaspoons ground cumin

1-1/2 teaspoons garlic powder 3/4 teaspoon dried oregano

leaves 1/2 teaspoon ground red pepper

Combine all ingredients. Cover and store in airtight container. Shake before using to blend. Makes about 1/3 cup.
