Headlines From Around The World

Washington, D.C.

A federal three-judge panel replaced Whitewater Special Prosecutor Robert Fiske this week with an independent prosecutor, Kenneth Starr. Starr, a former federal judge and most recently Solicitor General in the Bush administration will take over the investigation into the failed Madison Guarantee Trust Savings & Loan and possible connections to the Arkansas Governor Bill Clinton.

Havana, Cuba

Cuban President, Fidel Castro announced this week that due to extreme hardship placed on his island nation by economic sanctions from the United States his government is considering opening it's borders to allow it's citizens to flee to America. Caught off guard by Castro's announcement Clinton administration officials speculated that another wave of refugees combined with the Haitians already streaming toward U.S. shores could "swamp the system."

Florida Governor Lawton Childes stated that his state would bear the brunt of any mass exodus from Cuba and called on the federal government to act to head-off a crisis

Washington, D.C.

Clinton administration officials and congressional leaders are teaming up for a "double-play", eleventh hour drives to pass a health care reform bill and a crime bill in the face of growing opposition to each. President Clinton's health care proposals were declared "all but dead" by congressional leaders in his own party this week. Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell (D) Maine, unveiled his own health care proposal and offered it as a substitute for the President's.

On the question of President Clinton's proposed crime bill, Republicans and conservative Democrats are trying to muster the votes to block passage, if only by procedural maneuvers. However, liberal Democratic Congressmen also began to shy away from the bill when an amendment to allow death row inmates to appeal on grounds that executions are not racially balanced was dropped from the bill this week.

Lamar Smith Meets With U.S. Fish & Wildlife

Congressman Lamar Smith met Wednesday, August 3rd with Texas Director Sam Hamilton of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service to discuss the agency's plans to declare parts of 33 Texas counties as "critical habitat" of the golden-cheeked warbler. Smith presented Hamilton with a copy of 26 questions he has submitted to Fish & Wildlife about the proposed "critical habitat" and how it will affect private property owners.

"While a wide gulf remains between our positions," said Smith, "it's always constructive to meet face-to-face on issues of this magnitude."

At the meeting, Smith urged Hamilton to compensate landowners whose property values are reduced by environmental regulations. Hamilton suggested tax breaks and direct payments funded by savings from agricultural subsidy reductions. Hamilton also admitted that the

current regulatory system subjects property owners in critical habitats to an "expensive and slow" permit process, which he said was likely to continue despite efforts at streamlining. Legislation would be required for a major structural changes in the process, Hamilton said.

Smith responded by noting that

much of the current controversy would vanish overnight if the Department of the Interior accepted an appeals Court ruling that it does not have statutory authority to define harm to an endangered species as modification of it's habitat, critical or not

Sanford's wife is named Shelly. Together they have 5 sons. Shae 16, Kyle 11, Keith 10, Tyler 8 and Caylor 5.



Out here in West Texas, a baseball strike probably won't affect us much, one way or the other. We are a long way from a big league ball park so our local economy isn't influenced by that sort of thing. However, baseball is rightly called the national pass-time and as such, many of us take at least a passing interest in the game.

As the strike date looms near, those teams atop their respective divisions are fighting to maintain position. The reason being that a strike will probably end the season and those teams will be awarded their division titles. The Texas Rangers are still a game or two ahead in their division and the Houston Astros are only a game or so behind their division leader, so interest here in Texas is heightened, more so than in other parts of the country. Plus, I can't remember the Rangers ever winning a division title, much less a pennant.

Kathy and I took the kids to see a couple of Rangers games this summer. We went to The Ballpark in Arlington and really enjoyed it. The stadium is the most beautiful I've ever seen. I've been in Yankee, Dodger and Tiger stadiums and they pale by comparison. And the Astrodome, well, let's face it folks, it may have been, as it's builders proclaimed, the eighth wonder of the world, and it does host lots of events (baseball, football, conventions, rodeos, expositions, even dirt bike races) but it's not a true ballpark.

Those of us who are Cowbov fans see the turmoil in that franchise and look back longingly on their glory days of the 60's, 70's and early 80's. Lt. Governor's Report

A visitor to the Senate office buildings would never guess that the Legislature is official on break.

Texas' citizen legislators, paid \$600 per month, have been working all year, holding hearings, taking testimony and leading negotiating sessions - all in anticipation of a legislative session that is still half a year away.

And it's not just the Senate putting in the long hours. Under Speaker Pete Laney's no-nonsense leadership, the House has been every bit as dedicated to finding solutions to the major problems long before the first gavel comes

When the 74th Legislature convenes in January, it will be the best prepared Legislature ever to congregate in Austin.

I'm proud of the work being done by the Texas Senate during this supposed "down time." And, I'm confident that the Senators' work and studious preparation will pay enormous dividends during the next session.

Here are some of the issues that your Senators have been

State Budget. Writing a twoyear budget is the one task that comes before all others. Speaker Laney and I are committed to passing a balanced budget without new taxes -- even if it requires painful spending cuts.

Lubbock Senator Montford, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and House **Appropriations** Committee Chairman Rob Junell of San Angelo, will take the lead on preparing a truly bare-bones they arrive in January

Public School Facilities. The state is under a court order to find a more equitable way to pay for school buildings and other facilities. A special Senate committee, led by Senator Teel Bivins of Amarillo, has developed a plan that is expected to meet with the court's approval.

Public School Reform. Two major public school reform initiatives are underway. Senator Bill Ratliff of Mt. Pleasant is leading the committee to streamline the Texas Education

Agency and put more power in the hands of local schools. Meanwhile, the education commissioner, at the Legislature's direction, budget draft for lawmakers when completely re-writing the entire education code. These longoverdue efforts will be the conerstone of school reform legislation next session.

Juvenile Justice. The juvenile crime epidemic is so severe that a complete overhaul of the juvenile justice system is required. Senator Chris Harris of Arlington has taken the lead in re-writing the entire Family Code, where most of the juvenile justice laws are found.

In addition, Crockett Senator Jim Turner, as chairman of the

Inmates P.O.'ed About Pants Most male state prisoners don't like to pull down their pants to relieve themselves, but the new flyless version of the standard-issue white cotton pants being phased in by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice leaves them no

choice. Inmate Alan Wade Johnson, serving a life sentence for rape and robbery at the Mark Stiles Unit in Beaumont, sent a letter to Lt. Gov. Bullock, a few legislators and the media, according to a report in the Austin American-Statesman.

"You (may) crack a smile and laugh about it, but give it time to sink in and think about the consequences of over 100,000 male prisoners wearing female attire and believe you'll understand (it's) not so funny," wrote Johnson, who urged Bullock to "consider the emotional impact of those of us who will be forced to dress like a

Larry Kyle, assistant director of industry for the prison system, said the new pants, though cheaper and easier for inmates to manufacture, have resulted in an outcry, because the design is less "user-friendly."

last week. The former Texas congresswoman's testimony was criticized! by civil rights groups, who said it: was a disguised attempt at forcing Americans to carry a national identification card.

"Jordan is bowing to politics: and to public pressure," said Jeanne Butterfield of the Americani Immigration Lawyers Association.

Jordan, who denied the allegations, said there currently is no easy way to check the immigration status of new workers as required by law. Under the current system, 29 different documents can be presented as proof of citizenship, or legal residence.

Jordan wants Texas, California,

give employers access to Social Security databases. Job seekers would be asked for their Social Security numbers, and employers would check to see if the number

was valid. **AG Files Immigration Suit**

State Attorney General Dan Morales sued the federal government last week in an attempt to recoup \$5 billion for services that officials say Texas provided to undocumented immigrants over the past

Morales denied charges of "im-migrant bashing," saying the lawsuit did not seek elimination of any services to immigrants. He said the sult simply asks for restitution for

Joining Texas in the lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court in Brownsville, were Dallas, Harris, and Hidalgo counties; the El Paso and La Joya school districts; and the city of Odessa.

State Jail Chief Named

Thomas A. Baker, retired commander of Bergstrom Air Force Base in Austin, was named last week as director of the new state jail division. Baker started his new job immediately.

The state jail program, which by next year will include space and rehabilitation programs for about 25,000 nonviolent inmates, is scheduled to begin Sept. 1.

Spring rains have delayed the construction of the first jail in Beaumont until at least October. But state leaders worked out a stopgap measure to house the first inmates in existing community

Florida, Illinois and New York to facilities or in a partitioned area of prison.

> The delay has drawn the ire of Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who earlier criticized the Texas Board of Criminal Justice for what he termed a lack of planning.

TDCJ executive director James "Andy" Collins said programming has been planned and construction is continuing on schedule.

By late 1995, 18 state jails are expected to be in operation.

Baker, who holds a master's degree in business administration, retired as an Air Force lieutenant general in August 1993. He has served as deputy director of operations in the Pentagon.


Super Collider Settlement Faced with the alternative of expensive, lengthy litigation, members of the commission that oversees Texas' investment in the super collider last week approved a settlement with the U.S. Department of

Texas contributed \$539 million of the more than \$2 billion spent on the atom smasher and wants to recoup its losses.

The proposed settlement was approved by the National Research Laboratory and now goes to Congress for approval. It would give Texas title to the buildings and land on the collider's campus and \$145 million in cash.

Texas could receive another \$65 million if its plan for a cancer treatment center is approved.

But GOP gubernatorial candidate, George W. Bush, wasn't impressed with the proposed settle-



City Changes Parking On Field Street

A new parking plan is going into effect in the 200 block of W. Field Street. The area around the school administration building has been restriped and angle parking will replace parallel parking on both sides of the street. Also a center median has been striped with no parking allowed in that area. The Eldorado City council in response to requests from a group of concerned parents and the school administration authorized the new parking scheme.

Along with the changes on Field Street, the City has also employed a Code Enforcement Officer to help enforce the changes. Bobby Phillips, who serves as the City's night watchman has been upgraded by the City to the position of Code Enforcement officer and charged with enforcing city ordinances such as parking violations, livestock and noise violations.

Among Phillips new duties will be the investigation of citizens's complaints and the issuance of such citations as may be required. All citations issued by Phillips will be referred to Municipal Court Judge, Pat Ragsdale at City Hall.

Among other topics discussed by the City Council, is the possibility of joint participation by Eldorado, Schleicher County, Sutton County,

Crockett County, the City of Sonora and the Crockett County Water Improvement District in a Tri-County Area landfill. Since the landfill at Ozona has recently closed, and the one at Sonora is due to be closed by 1997 or sooner, the new landfill that the City of Eldorado hopes to permit could be the only one left in the area.

Efforts are currently underway to establish cooperation among the governments in the three counties and test the feasibility of an area landfill. One possibility now under consideration by a steering committee representing the six governing bodies is the creation of a"Tri-county Municipal Solid Waste Landfill District."







mostly silent on responsibility. The other way to help these forgotten people is for government to use its tax dollars to help them. I agree that not all of the help has been wisely distributed but that does not make the basic premise unreasonable.

There is the problem of unintended results that often occurs when new solutions are attempted for new problems. but that representative government is supposed to go back and rework the solutions.

Randy mentions that Americans are not flocking to Canada to get medical help and for good reason. You have to be a Canadian to get coverage under their system. The fact that wealthy Canadians come over here to get faster service is sign of their own self importance not of any failure of the Canadian system. Wealthy Americans will no doubt find doctors willing to charge them more money for faster service. The idea of universal health care is not to give everyone equal coverage but only basic equal access. Those who have the money will always get better treatment at least as far as speed, extra perks, or other amenities that money can buy.

As for red tape there seems to be a considerable amount even without the introduction of the federal government. Lastly if you look back in history the Federal government became involved in regulating us either because we asked them to or we did such a poor job of regulating

ourselves that the National government was forced to step in. If you do not believe this just look back at some tapes of Oval Faubus, then the steps of Central High school in Little Rock denying an equal education to African-Americans to preserve a way of life that many Arkansans thought was just fine.

Commission on Children and Youth, has held hearings across the state to gain a first-hand look at the problems and temptations facing youths today.

Prison Construction & Jail Overcrowding. Nowhere has interim activity been more productive than in the state's expansion program. prison Senator John Whitmire, the Senate's point man on corrections, and his counterpart in the House, Representative Allen Hightower, have led the effort to speed up the prison expansion program and 8,000 new create almost emergency beds to avert summer riots. In addition, Whitmire has kept an eagle's eye on the progress of the new state jail program to ensure that the project gets off on the right foot.

Medicard. Spending for Medicaid, the combination federal and state health insurance for the poor, has grown faster that any other single area of the budget. Senator Judith Zaffirini of Laredo and the Health and Human

Services Committee she chairs are looking at a number of innovative reforms to save money and streamline the delivery system. Zaffirini's work in this area will make a no-new-taxes budget possible.

Judicial Reform. The federal government has stopped the creation of new district courts in Texas, posing a serious threat to the administration of swift and fair justice. I've appointed an informal working group -- including Senators Ike Harris of Dallas, Rodney Ellis of Houston and David Sibley of Waso, as well as several judges -- to look at all the options for reforming the way judges are selected. This group is particularly concerned with finding ways to reduce the influence of partisan politics and campaign contributions or the judiciary.

Telecommunications Policy Government policy has not kept up with technological advances. Senators Ken Armbrister of Victoria and Carl Parker of Port Arthur, along with Representative

Curt Seidlits, are taking the lead on re-shaping state law to further development of the information highway in Texas. Their efforts will ensure that Texas has a comprehensive plan to allow new technology to flourish in Texas, creating jobs and improving our quality of life.

These are just a sampling of the major issues being addressed during the Senate's alleged vacation. All 31 members of the Senate are committed, hardworking lawmakers who truly love their state. They're not putting in these long hours for money or glory. They're not interested in grabbing headlines or making a name for themselves.
