> I don't know about you, but stuff like that intrigues me and I can't just read that without want ing to know more. I called up the man, Tom Johnson, and asked him about his bone playing. He seemed anxious to talk, so we agreed to meet at the Monahan adio station.
> He had a bag of bones with him. Some were wooden, some were real cow bones. He plays them by holding two bones in one hand and banging them together They sound like castanets. Sometimes he plays with two bones in each hand.

Bones Johnson played bones for his family and friends but didn't get serious about playing bones until he retired from an ornamental ironworks firm when he was 62 years
gan playing at festivals all over Indiana, Ohio and Illinois. Audiences appreciated his unique instruments and he became a popuar entertainer.
He turned his welding shop into a woodworking shop and began making bones for the public from rosewood, oak or ironwood. He gave a free lesson with every set of bones he sold.
Harold's brother Norman can play the bones. So can Harold's three sons, David, Larry and Tom. Tom's son Ben started playing bones when he was six. He's in high school now and occasionally he and his dad will play bones at some event in the Monahans area. With their midwestern roots, the father and selves as Indiana Bones
Tom got interested in bones when he was in his thirties because he didn't want to see the special ar form fall from the family tree.

We got the radio station owner, Hal Callaway, to play some music with a good beat over the huge studio speakers. Tom accompanied the music and the sound of rattling bones filled the room. Tom used both hands "My dad says you can't be a good bones player unless you can pray with both hands at the same time," says Tom. "Besides, if you use two different sets of bones, you get wo different sounds."
He says one reason his dad became well known was most people had never seen or heard the bones. "They make a very unusua sound and are used just to keep the rhythm."
He says the ability to read musie is not necessary to play your body and if you can pat your feet, you can play bones." Except for his dad, his brothers and his son, Tom has never seen another bones player.

## Proposal would bar auto insurance premium surcharges

Austin - Many Texans who
have been in motor vehicle accidents involving claims for bodily injuries have noticed that their pre injuries have noticed that their premiums go up 15
The Texas Department of Insurance is proposing a rule that would bar these insurance premium surcharges for drivers at fault in accidents causing less than $\$ 1,000$ in repairs and less than $\$ 3,000$ in medical expenses.
A public hearing on the proposal is scheduled for July 1, Insurance ommissioner Elton Bomer said. While consumer groups wel comed the idea of limiting the sur charges, insurance industry officials said the proposal could penal ize accident-free drivers.
About 44 percent of noninjury accidents in Texas result in vehicle damage of less than $\$ 1,000$. About 20 percent of all injury accidents than $\$ 3,000$

The board of regents face a May 18 deadline in filing notice with the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. In its motion to seek an appeal, the board said, "If the Hopwood injunction is not challenged, all institutions in the state of Texas are
at a competitive disadvantage in at a competitive disadvantage in the recruitment of students." Regents said it is essential for the U.S. Supreme Court to decide whether U.S. institutions of higher learning can consider race when scholarships and financial aid.

In permitting the 450 statechartered banks to operate offices under the same rules as nationally chartered banks, Ghiglieri made he decision because she want to put state be doesn' want to put state banks in a posiwith national banks.
Her decision came a week after federal judge in Dallas sided with the U.S. Comptroller of the Curby Nationerger application filed by NationsBank of North Carolina
and NationsBank of Texas. NationsBank of Texas is a branch of NationsBank of North Carolina and does not pay state franchise taxes and avoids other Texas laws.

Other Capital Highlights

- Houston attorney Joe Jamail, an alumnus of the University of Texas at Austin, has given his alma mater \$2 million for minority-student scholarships: $\$ 1$ million to endow a scholarship program for undergraduates and $\$ 1$ million fo a similar program for law students. Black and Hispanic enrollment a UT has dropped since the 1996 Hopwood ruling stopped racebased admissions policies.
- A study of the 23,000 sex offenders in Texas state prisons has identified 33 inmates as violent predators. Those inmates may qualify for involuntary commitment beyond the completion of their sentences under a proposal to be debated during the next legisla

been "discontinued " In ceived by Rep. Turner, TPWD states, "Two ingredients considere essential for such a program are the trust of landowners and an ability to protect their confidentiality. Unfor tunately, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is unable to provide us an assurance that landowner confiden tiality could be protected.
The proposed plan would have allowed landowners to sign a federal Safe Harbor Agreement whereby any additional endangered species habitat created by the landowners by monitoring the Safe Harbor program participants themselves, as opposed to monitoring by the federal authorities.
