ELDORADO CHRISTMAS SADDENED BY TRAGEDY

MRS. B. A. WHITTEN DIES OF BURNS

The Christmas celebration ended in a tragedy in Eldorado Christmas day, when Mrs. B. A. Whitten was severely burned about 5:80 o'clock Christmas morning. When she attempted to build a fire in a heating stove on the Whitten ranch seven miles west of Eldorado. The children had awakened and wanted their mother to get ap with them to see what Santa Claus had brought and she poured some coal-oil in the heater to build a fire, or rekindle the fire, the stove was full of coals and hot ashes, which caused the explosion and setting fire to the entire room.

Mr. Whitten with a quilt carried his wife from the building and extinguished the fire only after he had burned badly himself, he returned for his two children, but they had gotten out of the building but were burned about the shoulders.

Mr. Whitten then got his car and started to town, he having no clothing except his underwear, he had drained his car the night before and it sot hot and stopped near the John Loudecke home, Mr. Leudecke then brough them on to town, An ambalance was called from San Angelo and Mrs. Whitten was rushed to the hospital. but died about 11:45 a. m. December 23, Christmas day.


