

Texas to get \$1.9 billion for transportation

AUSTIN - A six-year spending plan that would give Texas \$1.9 billion for highways, bridges, buses and rail systems was unanimously approved by the House Transportation Committee last week. It is part of a total spending plan of \$218 billion that is expected to win approval from the full House next week, but still must be merged with a similar bill passed earlier by the Senate.


