

Electronic campaign reports to exclude donor names

AUSTIN — Attorney General John Cornyn issued an opinion March 17 on a new law requiring candidates for statewide and legislative offices to file electronically with the Texas Ethics Commis-

Under the law, each candidate will file a list of their campaign donors' names, addresses and amounts of political donations, and the Ethics Commission will post those filings on the Internet in beginning in July.

Cornyn said the street address or post office box of each donor will be deleted before being made available electronically.

The deleted information will be available to the public on paper only at the Ethics Commission offices in Austin.

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

The Austin law firm of Bickerstaff, Heath and Smiley will be hosting this year's seminar.

The commissioners then agreed to delay drawing up plans for hangar and fuel service construction at the airport's new runway pending further study by the court. A transfer of budgeted funds was approved by the court and payment of the county's current bills was ordered.


