NOTICE OF STOCKHOLDERS MEETING

MOBILIZATION OF ALL BOY SCOUTS TO BE ANNIVERSARY WEEK FEATURE

Spectacular Demonstration of Scout Preparedness to Follow Annual Rededication Ceremonies on Nineteenth Birthday of Scouting in America.

Boy Scout Anniversary Week will be celebrated this year during the week of February 8th through the 14th. February 8th will mark the observance of the 19th birthday of the Boy Scout Movement in this country. Three events of outstanding importance to the nation will mark the celebration. On the evening of February 8th more than 800,000 Scouts and their leaders will stand at attention and rededicate themselves to the principles of the Scout Oath and Law. On February 9th, in nearly every city and hamlet of the country, Scouts will mobilize to perform a community Good Turn. It will be a spectacular demonstration of the rapidity with which Scout can be mobilized for emergency service at any time. February 10th patriotic pilgrimages to the graves of Presidents of the United States and to other places

of historic interest will be taken by many Scouts.

Rededication Ceremonies

At 8:15 o'clock on February 8th the rededication ceremonies will be observed. Every Scout, wherever he may be, will stand at attention and rededicate himself to the principles for which the Scout Oath and Law stand. Boy Scouts—Troop Scouts, Sea Scouts, Lone Scouts and Rural Scouts—representatives of every section of the country and of every type of American home will "Be prepared" to pledge themselves anew to the ideals and objectives of the Scout Movement, which in its 19 years of progress in this country has become the greatest organized effort on behalf of boys of which history holds record.

Comes of Age

This year's Anniversary Week will be of especial significance because, in addition to marking the 19th birthday of the Boy Scouts of America, it will also mark the 21st birthday of Scouting throughout the world. The Boy Scouts of America was incorporated in Washington, D. C., on February 8th 1910. In England the Movement had been

launched there years before by General Sir Robert Baden-Powell, its founder.

In observance of the celebration, Boy Scouts will wear their uniforms throughout the week, to school and in their homes.

Special Days

In addition to the three days of national activity, each day of Anniversary Week is designated for some activity of especial interest to Scouts and the people with whom they come in contact. February 10th will be observed as Scout Sunday. Scouts in Troops will attend Church in uniform at either morning or afternoon services. Scouts wearing uniforms will serve as ushers in their places of worship and Ministers, Priests and Rabbis, will be urged to preach Scout sermons. Monday February 11th, will be observed as School Day. Scouts will participate in School demonstrations to show that Scouting augments school work and tends to increase interests of boys for school work and education. All Scouts will wear their uniforms to school during Anniversary Week. On Wednesday, February 13th, Scouts will participate in civic Good Turns, doing something to improve their community. [The day will be designated as "Citizens' Day." On Thursday, February 14th, the last day of Anniversary Week, the Scouts will observe "Home Day." On this day they will do some good turn in their own homes. Emphasis will be placed on Merit Badge activities in Carpentry, Plumbing, Painting, Handicraft, and Scouts will be urged to do something that will be useful to their parents. Each Scout will be urged on that day to relieve his parents of the burden of some of the household tasks in which he usually takes no part.

KNOW TEXAS

Gen. Sam Houston defeated Santa Anna in command of a Mexican army at the battle of San Jacinto April 21, 1836 and Texas thereupon became an independent Republic.

Texas remained an independent Republic from 1836 to 1846 under the successive administrations of Presidents David G. Burnett, Sam Houston, Mirabeau B. Lamar, Sam Houston (second term) and Anson Jones.

On February 16, 1846 Texas was annexed to the United States and President Anson Jones retired in favor of Gov. J. Pinckney Henderson.

Texas then included the present eastern half of New Mexico, the portion of Oklahoma today lying north of the Texas Panhandle, Southwestern Kansas, a large portion of Central Colorado and a section of Wyoming.

W. J. CARSON DIES IN SAN ANGELO

W. J. Carson, a former resident of this county and at one time Representative to the State Legislature from San Angelo, died in San Angelo Saturday afternoon and was buried under the soil of his early cowboy days, in Fairmount Cemetery. Mr. Carson came to this country from Blanco County in the early days and has many friends among the old timers in this section of Texas.

WORDS AND PEACE

Whether words, as embodied in the Kellogg peace treaty and ratified by the United States Senate and signed by more than half a hundred other powers, can effect peace among nations of the world will be shown as civilization continues its onward march. No matter what may have been the reasons behind opposition to the entrance of the United States into the treaty relations, even the most bitter opponents and reservationists will submit to the action and help give it a fair test. In the past there have been few, if any, such far-reaching attempts at securing a compact of this nature.

A treaty is an agreement, nothing more and nothing less. It seeks to reach the minds and motives of nations and to express them, just as contracts constitute agreements between individuals and corporations. In a treaty there must be a "meeting of minds" as the meaning is phrased in private contracts. Acts such as has been signed serve to take the place of codified international law. The Kellogg treaty simply means that the various powers have put into words their full force of opinion against war as an institution of civilization. As Senator Walsh, of Montana, put it, "The treaty is more than a feeble gesture. A nation that violates it will be an international lawbreaker." Words do have power. Words brought Magna Carta, that great document of English liberty. Words gave the people of the United States their government. Words have outlawed nearly all forms of wrong-doing, but not until public opinion in the agreement of minds made it so. Neither the Kellogg pact nor any other treaty between nations will ever accomplish the desired purpose unless the letter is a true representation of the spirit.

From this time on let the world look upon other methods of settling disputes than the taking up of arms. If those who have ratified this treaty truly represent the spirit of the peoples that make up the nations involved, the world may rightly expect a period of peace never before equalled for length of time. If the wording of the pact represents the spirit that inspired it, and if the new generations springing up take peace for granted by consistently refusing war as a means over an inglorious age in the conflict of blood. —Pickerill Servicè.

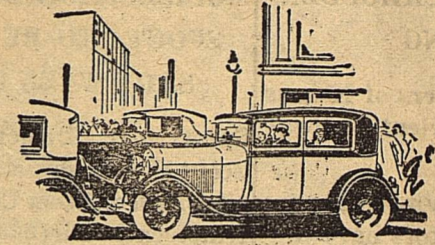

Abilene, Texas.—The total miles traveled by Abilene citizens on trolley cars and busses in this city during 1928 would equal a distance of more than 11 times around the world, according to figures compiled by the traffic department of the West Texas Utilities Company.

Trolley cars and busses of the company traveled a distance of 289,648 miles over the city streets of Abilene. The busses traveled 13,680 miles farther than the street cars, figures disclose. Total car miles was 137,984 against a total bus miles of 151,664.

As evidence of the growth of Abilene during 1928 are the comparative figures of the company covering number of passengers carried by street cars and busses. Last year 73,085 more passengers were hauled than in 1927. The street cars carried 479,943 persons in 1928 against 460,605 in 1927. The busses transported 212,849 passengers in 1928 while in 1927 they only hauled 159,102.

SAVE THE SOREHEADS

"Go to bed with the chickens? Most certainly not!" Exclaimed a well known radio entertainer in mock indignation. "No, indeed, I'd never be able to sleep on those sticks the way they do." For more reasons than one I am inclined to sympathize with this gentleman's point of view. nevertheless, I firmly believe that, short of literally going to bed with them, the man who comes nearest to living with his chickens is going to get the greatest profit out of them. He will do so because he knows his flock both individually and collectively. The slightest change in their habits or appearance will immediately attract his attention and if disease threatens he is able to nip it in the bud long before it reaches the danger point.

Of course, not every one can give full time to the care of his fowls, nor is it altogether necessary. There are certain times every day when they must receive attention for feeding and the like. Then, scan each fowl as closely as possible and angle out for closer examination any that show the slightest signs of possible disease. One particularly malignant disease which may crop up at any time, more especially in the fall of the year, is chicken pox or sorehead. As this disease may be carried by mosquitoes, your flock may become infected no matter how careful you may have been to keep your own houses, yards and runs in a sanitary, healthful condition.

A number of eruptions or nodules, varying from the size of a pinhead to that of a pea or hazelnut, appear on the comb, wattles, eyelids, ear lobes, beak and nostrils and sometimes on other parts of the body, such as the neck, legs, under the wings, on the rump and about the vent. On the body, the nodules may become larger than on the head. The nodules begin as small, red or reddish gray deposits with a shiny surface. They gradually enlarge, becoming dry, shriveled uneven and wartlike in appearance, while the color changes to yellow, brown or dark brown. As these nodules increase in number and the inflammation extends, large areas of skin will become thickened and covered with hard, dry crusts, closing the nasal openings and eyelids, often making it difficult to open the beak.

If the attack is mild the eruptions are limited to the head, the nodules are distinct and small and the general health is not affected. The nodules seem dry, heal and shrink, the crusts become loose and recovery is rapid. But in malignant cases the eruption is more general, the nodules are large and there is considerable inflammation and ening of large areas of skin. When the crusts are rubbed off there will be a watery discharge

from the ulcerated surfaces, which will later thicken, become thick and yellow and will give off a disagreeable odor. In this type of the disease there is fever, rapid loss of flesh, prostration and death.

At the very first sign of this disease give the whole flock large doses of epsom salts, once each week for two or three weeks at least. Mix one pound of epsom salts in a small tempting wet mash feed for each one hundred leghorns, or one pound for each 75 of the heavier breeds. For half-grown stock give one-half the amount. Put the mash in long troughs so they can all get to it and eat it up in a few minutes. If wet mash feed is not being given, the epsom salts can be put in the drinking water but in a wet mash it is much more effective. Remove all affected fowls to a separate location well removed from the poultry flock. Then make a thorough clean up of all houses, coops and feeding equipment.

Clean and disinfect all hoppers troughs and drinking fountains, roosts, dropping boards and other removable equipment. Remove, and burn all litter and droppings. Finally make a strong solution of some good coal tar dip and disinfect and spray it into every nook and cranny where mosquitoes, parasites or disease germs might find a hiding place. If possible, always change clothing and shoes before going from infected fowl to healthy ones.

Give each of the affected fowls from one-half to one teaspoonful of epsom salts and repeat the dose two or three days later if there is no improvement. A local application is also very healthful with a small swab or feather, apply a good dip and disinfectant or tincture of iodine to each of the sores, crust and nodules after removing the scales. The disinfectant should be used full strength, so be careful not to let it get in the eyes. Also apply once each day or two some reliable sore-head remedy. A good poultry prescription tonic in large doses will be found very beneficial at this time. Careful of oil of oregano, hysgic following out of this treatment should give highly gratifying results if started soon enough.

In the fall, about the time chicken pox usually appears in your locality, I advise giving all young fowls and in many cases older ones too, large doses of epsom salts once a week for three or four weeks. Give same amount of epsom salts and in the same way as recommended above I also advise extreme precautions in cleaning and disinfecting at this time. All houses and sleeping quarters should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected every week or ten days for some time. The disinfectant should be forced into all dark corners and hiding places of mosquitoes and other insects with a good force pump. I have been using this treatment for preventing chicken pox for several years with excellent results. If my chickens do take the disease at all, it is usually in a very mild form.

Vaccination with a specially prepared vaccine is being used with varying results in some localities. The question is serious enough to justify the trouble and expense even if it was effective.
