The event served as the grand opening for Schleicher County's new airport and was hosted by several local pilots.

No public input on county's tax increase

Schleicher County Commissioners met for two special public hearings on Thursday, September 15 and Monday, September 19 for the purpose of receiving public comment, but no one from the public appeared to address the issue.

Among other business the men conducted at the Sept. 15 meeting was the purchase of five voting machines and computer software. The action was necessary to comply with new federal law requiring voting machines be accessible at all polling places in order to assist handicapped voters.

Commissioners Bill Clark, Johnny Mayo, Kirk Griffin and Matt Brown were present for the Sept. 15 meeting, which was called to order by Judge Johnny Griffin.

Besides buying voting machines, the men also heard a request from Eldorado Elementary principal Maela Edmonson who asked the county waive or reduce fees at the Civic Center so that a Parent Teacher Organization festival could be held on Oct. 29th. The men set a one-time cleaning fee of \$100 for the

The commissioners then passed Resolution No. 091505 declaring their intent to adopt a map of county roads that will clarify the existence of public

interest in certain roads. The men will hold a public meeting on March 13, 2006 in order to receivé comments on the matter. The map, which includes fifty-two county roads, will be on exhibit at the Schleicher County Courthouse before the public meeting in March.

The commissioners also adopted and signed a resolution supporting the National Incident Management System (NIMS). As stated in the resolution the Homeland Security Presidential Directive requires state and local governments adopt the NIMS by the fiscal year 2005 as a precondition for the receipt of federal grants for certain disaster and hazard situations. As part of the measure, all emergency first responders must complete a basic training course before Oct. 1, 2006.

The meeting on Monday, Sept. 19, 2005 was attended by Commissioners Johnny Mayo, Kirk Griffin and Matt Brown. Commissioner Bill Clark was absent.

Following the second public hearing on the proposed tax rate, the men voted to meet Monday, September 26, 2005 at 9:00 a.m., at which time they plant to vote on the proposed tax rate.

The commissioner then held a public meeting on the proposed 2006 budget, with no one from the public appearing.

Judge Griffin advised the commissioners that the court budget will have to be adjusted slightly to accommodate a mandated pay increase for court reporters and the administrator of the 51st District Court.

Fire Chief Jerry Jones then spoke with the court about purchasing equipment to put a new water truck together. Jones said he is still looking for a vehicle to mount the new tank and pump.

Before adjourning, the men approved an indigent request for payment of a utility bill in the amount of \$42.60.

City council meets, raises utility rates

The Eldorado City Council raised utility rates Monday evening following a hearing at which no one from the public appeared to comment on the matter. Water rates were increased from \$2.00 to \$2.50 per 1,000 gallons with the minimum residential rate staying at \$10 for the first 3,000 gallons.

Likewise, natural gas rates went up as the overhead charge, the amount the city charges above the price it pays to West Texas Gas, rose from \$2.50 to \$2.75 per 1,000 cubic feet.

An assortment of other city fees, including garbage fees and tapping fees in the water and gas department, also went up. The council decided, however, to postpone implementation of a higher fee for summer gas reconnects, but that fee, too, will go up next year when the price increases from \$5 to \$20.

The meeting was held Monday night to make up for the one last week that was cancelled when not enough council members were present to make a quorum. Mayor John Nikolauk called the meeting to order with council members Juaquin Rojas, Richard Mendez, Tommy Minor and Dora Bosmans in attendance. Council members Bill McCutcheon and Toni Sudduth were absent.

Also on hand for the meeting were City Secretary Carolyn Mayo and Utility Superintendent Floyd Fay. So was Fire Chief and **Emergency Services Coordinator** Jerry Jones, who met with the council to ask them to approve a resolution supporting the National Incident Management System. He explained that the resolution was required if the city hoped to continue receiving Home-

Polygamous AZ cop failed to report sex abuse cases

Sam Roundy, the former police chief of Colorado City, AZ told state officials recently that he failed to report numerous cases of sexual abuse to child welfare authorities. Roundy, 50, reportedly declined to admit to practicing polygamy but did acknowledge that he cohabitated with his wife and two companions with whom he had 21 chil-

Roundy's admissions came as part of an ongoing investigation by the Arizona Peace Officer Standards and Training Board into the Colorado City police department.

AZPOST officials say it is likely Roundy will be decertified when the board next meets on Oct. 19.

The state of Utah moved to revoke Roundy's peace officer certification last year, at which time he resigned as chief of the department that polices the twin communities of Hildale, UT and Colorado City, AZ. The two cities are actually one town that straddles the Utah/Arizona

Transcripts of Roundy's interview with AZPOST investigators indicate that he admitted to not reporting as many as 25 cases of sexual abuse to the proper

authorities. Among those was the child molestation indictment of David Leroy Steed, 22, of C-City, AZ.

State law required Roundy to report the incidents to Child and Family Welfare officials.

Roundy told investigator Dan Altenes that he didn't realize he was supposed to report the cases. "Maybe I've been in Hicksville too long and not looking out at what's coming in," Roundy

Roundy further admitted to investigators that while serving as police chief he worked as a volunteer security guard for leaders in the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, a polygamous Mormon sect headquartered in Colorado City/Hildale.

The sect's present leader, Warren Jeffs, in Arizona on state warrants for arranging and performing marriages with underaged girls. He is also wanted on federal charges of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution.

Many of Jeffs followers moved to Schleicher County in 2004 where they are building a massive white temple on the YFZ Ranch, some 4 miles northnortheast of Eldorado on County Road 300.

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Abetting North Korea's Nuclear Ambition

Far from disarming North Korea, "diplomacy" strengthens it.

The draft agreement to end the nuclear standoff with North Korea is already being celebrated as a triumph for "diplomacy." President Bush has cautiously lauded the new deal as "a step forward in making this world a more secure place." Under the agreement, North Korea will receive economic aid, free electricity, and guarantees against U.S. attack-in return for signing the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty and abandoning its suspected nuclear weapons

But isn't this exactly what the United States has tried in the past?

In the early 1980s, alarmed at North Korea's construction of a nuclear reactor capable of yielding weapons-grade material, America tried to induce the North to sign the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty. By 1985, after much stonewalling, Pyongyang finally agreed to ratify the treaty--but then demanded military concessions in return for promising to forgo nuclear weapons. Rather than dismissing these demands as extortion by a hostile nation, by 1992 the United States had agreed to cancel its military exercises in the area and to withdraw U.S. nuclear weapons stationed in South Korea; the South gave up its nuclear program and also offered a non-aggression pact and economic benefits. During this period, meanwhile, the North, bolstered by guarantees of security and the West's willingness to swallow its lies, completed two

In 1993, after preventing required inspections of its nuclear facilities, Pyongyang announced its intention to withdraw from the treaty. Our response? More "diplomacy"--in the form of the "Agreed Framework," brokered in 1994. Under this scheme the North agreed to freeze its plutonium program in exchange for two light-water nuclear reactors (putatively for generating electricity) and, until the reactors were operational, 500,000 metric tons of oil annually (nearly half its annual needs). The United States, along with Japan and South Korea, paid for these lavish gifts. The agreement also provided for the lifting of trade and diplomatic restrictions, previously imposed as penalties for North Korea's aggression against its neighbors.

reactors capable of yielding weapons-grade fuel.

This shameful deal openly rewarded the North-already closer to acquiring nuclear weapons--for its aggression and lies, and furnished it with the means to become a worse threat. And indeed, by 2003--when the North actually did withdraw from the treaty--it was clear that Pyongyang had continued secretly to develop weapons-capable nuclear technology.

The pattern is clear: the North threatens us, we respond with negotiations, gifts and concessions, and it reemerges with even greater belligerence.

Without economic aid, technical assistance and protracted negotiations affording it time, it is unlikely that the North--continually on the brink of economic collapse--could have survived, let alone built the fourth-largest army in the world. The North is believed to have sold long-range ballistic missiles to Iran, Yemen, Pakistan and Syria. By some estimates, North Korea already has the material to create eight nuclear bombs. As it doubtless will continue engaging in clandestine nuclear development, the North may soon be wielding--and selling--nuclear weapons.

What made this cycle of appeasement possible-and why do our political and intellectual leaders insist that further "diplomacy" will work? Because they cling to the fiction that North Korea shares the basic goal of prosperity and peace. This fantasy underlies the notion that the right mix of economic aid and military concessions can dissuade North Korea from its nuclear ambition. It evades the fact that the North is a militant dictatorship that acquires and maintains its power by force, looting the wealth of its enslaved citizens and threatening to do the same to its neighbors.

But this abstract fact, the advocates of "diplomacy" believe, is dispensable; if we ignore it, then it ceases to exist. Notice how, in preparing the way for renewed talks, the Bush administration ceased describing North Korea as part of an "axis of evil"--as if this could alter its moral stature.

What the advocates of "diplomacy" believe, in effect, is that pouring gasoline onto an inferno will extinguish the fire--so long as we all agree that it will. Thus: if we agree that North Korea is not a hostile parasite, then it isn't; if we pretend that this dictatorship would rather feed its people than amass weapons, then it would; if we shower it with loot, it will stop threatening us. But the facts of North Korea's character and goals, like all facts, are impervious to anyone's wishful thinking. Years of rewarding a petty dictatorship for its belligerent actions did not disarm it, but helped it become a significant threat to America.

There is only one solution: the United States and its allies must abandon the suicidal policy of appeasement.

Round Two — Hurricane Rita

As I write this, the eye of Hurricane Rita is passing just south of Key West Florida as the storm churns westward toward a predicted landfall on the Texas gulf coast. Hurricanes are notoriously tricky beasts whose paths are difficult, if not impossible to predict. As it stands now, forecasters believe Rita will hook to the north and come ashore early Saturday morning, somewhere near Houston.

Hurricane prediction is still more of an art than a science, as we were reminded with Katrina. Three days before landfall most people believed Katrina would strike the Florida panhandle. Katrina proved to have a mind of her own, much to the dismay of those along the Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama coastline.

One newscaster said today that he shuddered to think what would happen if Rita slammed into New Orleans. Much of the city remains submerged in the wake of Katrina. The death toll, he said, would be staggering.

This was the same guy who



several days ago was saying Katrina's death toll would easily exceed 100,000. I received a press release from Task Force Pelican moments ago and the list confirmed fatalities from Katrina totals 768. Please, don't think that I am down playing that number. Each and every one represents a human life that was snuffed out... a family torn apart.

But the death toll from Katrina has been far lower than expected.

Yes, it would be horrible if New Orleans were to be hit again. Think for a minute, however, how much worse it would be if Rita were to slam into Houston as a category 4 or 5 storm.

With the nation's emergency response system already stretched to the breaking point, a direct hit on Houston could be catastrophic.

Then there is the petrochemical industry. If you're already concerned about the price of gasoline, let Rita tear up a few refineries along the Houston Ship Channel and see what happens.

We're fairly insulated out here in remote West Texas. Sure, there is the occasional tornado and the ever-present drought conditions. Dirt storms, hail, flash floods, range fires, rattlesnakes, mosquitoes, grasshoppers...sort of sounds like the ten plagues of Egypt, doesn't it? Still, we're almost immune to hurricanes and earthquakes.

We are not protected, though, from the economic impact that storms like Katrina and Rita can bring. Our neighbors on the gulf coast — and they are our neighbors, no matter how many miles may separate us — have taken on the chin. It looks as if some of them are about to answer the bell for round two and climb back in the ring with Hurricane Rita.

Williams to oversee relief effort

Railroad Commissioner Michael Williams will lead the state's efforts to assist Hurricane Katrina survivors now in the Lone Star State, Gov. Perry announced.

Williams will help coordinate government and private entities' actions in securing housing, jobs and other forms of assistance for those displaced by the Aug. 29 storm.

Yes, robed ones still working on it

The Texas Supreme Court conting ues to deliberate the constitutionality of the way public education is funded in the Lone Star State.

The high court's deliberations began in early July, following testimony from the Texas attorney general, appellant and attorneys for more than 300 school districts whose cases were combined in the initial complaint heard in the court of Travis County State District Judge John Dietz.

"The Texas Supreme Court considers this a matter of pressing public concern," said Osler McCarthy, the court's attorney and public informa-

But McCarthy said there is a legal dispute over whether a deadline exists for the Supreme Court to rule.

The attorney general believes the state's appeal of the trial court's decision supersedes Dietz's Oct. 1 dead line for the state to act, but appellees believe the state Supreme Court must act in accordance with the deadline, McCarthy said.

Regardless of whether a deadline to act exists, the Texas Supreme Court's forthcoming decision is widely considered the key to solving school finance reform and property tax reform.


The Texas Legislature failed to cure the problems in one 140-day regular session and two 30-day special sessions following Dietz's fall 2004 ruling.

Meanwhile, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Tom Craddick postponed a Sept. 21 meeting of the Legislative Budget Board due to the impact of Hurricane Katrina. The LBB was to review budget execution requests made by the governor during August.

When I spoke at the Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce banquet last month, some friends told me if I came early I could tour the Robert E. Howard house. I had heard of Robert E. Howard only as the creator of Conan the Barbarian. I had no idea of his significance or influence in the typewriter and a bed. He stayed world of supernatural and fantasy literature.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

PROPOSITION 4 (SJR 17) SJR 17 would authorize a district judge to deny reinstatement of bail or new bail to a person accused of a felony, if the person's bail had been revoked or forfeited as a result of the person's violation of a condition of release related to the safety of a victim of the alleged offense or to the safety of the communi-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the denial of bail to a criminal defendant who violates a condition of the defendant's release pending trial."

PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 21)

SJR 21 would authorize the Legislature to exempt commercial loans from state usury laws that set maximum interest rates. "Commercial loans" are loans made primarily for business, commercial, investment, agricultural, or similar purposes and not primarily for personal, family, or household purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to define rates of interest for commercial loans.'

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 87) HJR 87 would increase the size of the

State Commission on Judicial Conduct from eleven to thirteen members by increasing from four to five the number of public members and by adding a constitutional county court judge. The additions would ensure that the commission has an odd number of members, which is required by another provision of the state constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to include one additional public member and a constitutional county court judge in the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct."

PROPOSITION 7 (SJR 7)

SJR 7 would authorize new options for reverse mortgage agreements for senior homeowners allowing them to draw advances at unscheduled intervals, if and when needed, and only in the

amounts needed, during the loan term. These are in addition to options that would allow a lump sum payment after settlement or regular periodic, predetermined equal amounts over a term of years or the lifetime of the homeowner. Additionally, SJR 7 would: (1) prohibit the agreement from requiring the use of a credit card, debit card or similar device to obtain an advance; (2) prohibit the charge or collection of a transaction fee solely in connection with any debit or advance, after the time the extension of credit is established; and (3) prohibit the lender or holder from unilaterally amending the extension of

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing line-of-credit advances under a reverse mort-

PROPOSITION 8 (SJR 40)

SJR 40 would clear individual land titles by relinquishing and releasing all claims of state ownership interests, including mineral interests, in two local areas, namely, a roughly 4,600 acre area located roughly 14 miles southeast of Gilmer, Texas, and a separate 900 acre area located north of Tyler, Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by relinquishing and releasing any state claim to sovereign ownership or title to interest in certain land in Upshur County and in Smith County.'

PROPOSITION 9 (HJR 79)

HJR 79 would authorize the Legislature to provide staggered six year terms of office for board members serving on regional mobility authorities, with no more than one-third of the board positions being appointed every two years.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a six-year term for a board member of a regional mobility authority."

Cold Weather Preparedness Check List

- Make certain your furnace is working properly.
- Have all fireplaces and chimneys checked and cleaned prior to the first use of the cold
- Place a working smoke detector on every level of your house, including one in every bedroom and outside of each sleeping area.
- Make sure kids know and understand fire safety. Show your children where smoke alarms are located, and make sure they recognize the smoke alarm's sound (and understand that it signals a home fire).




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
